Attached is one cut at an education strategy document that will hopefully get you through Thursday in one piece. In addition, I have marked up a copy of the charts that you all left me Tuesday night, in case you want to incorporate a revised version of that for your meeting.

Sorry I won't be able to make it, but just think of this as FMLA in action.

The latest information I have is that staff in ED were given until COB Thursday to produce an initial draft strategy for each of the 10 points. If we have to put this more serious strategy effort on a fast track, I can try to meet with the ED folks all day on Friday, with the purpose of turning their drafts into a more finished product by (COB Friday? Monday? Tuesday?) that we can then either turn in to COS or POTUS if we absolutely must in order to convince them that there is in fact a strategy. Better still, we could use as the focus for the continuing discussions of what was to have been the regular Monday afternoon education strategy group, with the objective of completing an agreed-upon comprehensive strategy by some fixed deadline.

I don't want to drag this out, but I do think it is worth taking the time to get this right, even if it means we get by for the next few weeks with our best guess as to what the next 3-5 events for POTUS should be. To get a strategy we all think is appropriate and likely to succeed will require some time to determine what is workable, some good creative thought to see how the various strategies can best fit together, and some real attention to what expectations we can meet and want to create. I'm afraid that anything we through together in the next few days will not meet this standard, will not muster much enthusiasm from WH and ED folks who will have been left out of the process, and will last for a short time while we go back and try again. So, anything we can do to buy a little breathing and thinking time would be helpful.

MEMORANDUM FOR BRUCE REED

I understand from Elena that the need for an education strategy may be more urgent than we had discussed earlier today.

The Education Department draft strategies are due to Leslie Thornton COB Thursday. If necessary, I can spend the day on Friday working with folks to turn those drafts into something we can use. I'll touch base with you on that tomorrow.

In the meantime, the attached reflects our conversation earlier today, as well as a conversation Elena and I had this evening.

The basic strategic approach in the attached document is:

1. Keep the primary focus on the national standards/testing proposal, to get it clear in the public mind, to build momentum behind it, and to make it more difficult for the opposition on the right to get a foundation for effective attack.
2. Pay period public attention to related reform agenda, as a way of speaking to different audiences, keeping those issues alive, and making news that will keep an overall focus on education
3. Do enough to keep the legislative ball moving forward on issues requiring Congressional action. (note: this piece needs to be filled in in conjunction with budget strategy and with the process following up Tuesday's meeting with the Congressional leadership and the Education Working Group Riley will head up.)

I'll call you in the morning. If you want in to conference in to the AFT meeting, I should be able to, and I would like to be part of that discussion if possible.

OVERVIEW OF EDUCATION STRATEGY

1. Keep the primary focus on promoting plan for national standards and national tests, while also promoting related K-12 education reform initiatives (e.g., Charter Schools, Teacher Standards, America Reads, Technology)

➤ **Enlist the participation of a critical mass of states and cities**

Initial target states for standards/testing initiative: Maryland, Michigan, Colorado, North Carolina, Delaware, California, Ohio

Initial target cities for testing initiative: Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Seattle, Houston, Washington D.C.

Initial target states for charter schools: Missouri, Washington

Initial target states for reading challenge: Michigan, Texas, California,

➤ **Gain endorsements from key constituency groups to promote national efforts and to promote state and local participation:**

Target Constituency Groups for Standards/Testing Initiative: AFT and NEA, PTA, School Principals and School Administrators, National School Boards Association, Chief State School Officers, Urban League, Business Coalition for Education Reform (e.g., BRT, NAB, Chamber of Commerce, NAM)

Target Constituency Groups for America Reads: All major K-12, Literacy, and Higher Education groups

➤ **Highlight Promising Practices and Approaches that Reflect President's Call to Action**

Standards/Testing Initiative: Highlight states, school districts, schools or significant projects that reflect high standards in reading and math, or high or improved student performance in 4th grade reading or 8th grade math

Charter Schools: Highlight states with strong charter schools laws and/or visit exemplary charter schools

America Reads: Highlight states or cities with statewide tutoring programs (e.g., Michigan, Delaware, Boston), and colleges that provide work-study and other tutors

Teaching Standards: Highlight teachers who receive National Board for Professional

Teaching Standards certification this Spring, and highlight local (AFT or NEA) programs to reward good teachers and remove incompetent ones

- **Generate Favorable Editorial Coverage (with a focus on standards/testing initiative)**
Encourage favorable op-eds from bipartisan opinion leaders (e.g., Ravitch, Price)

Encourage Secretary Riley and appropriate senior WH and ED staff to meet with editorial boards while traveling over the next few months.

- **Use Announcements of Grant Awards, Reports and Studies to highlight Priority Issues**

Use announcements of technology literacy challenge grants, charter schools grants and ED reports/guides, ED report based on Teaching Directive for radio addresses and other means of keeping issue in front of the public

Events/Activities

February:

- Release National Assessment of Education Progress national math scores at event in Michigan, and gain endorsement of Gov. Engler for testing proposal. Other principals can simultaneously visit other states with high scores or significant gains (Maine, North Carolina)
- Presidential Directive to OSTP, ED and NSF and other agencies, to ensure that executive branch resources to support math and science education are focused nationally on preparing students to meet 8th grade math standards, and to coordinate national mobilization of scientific, mathematical and technical communities in support of preparing students to meet 8th grade math standards

- Work through Budget process
- Hold Education Days at WH, giving key members and their constituencies a chance to discuss education issues
- Grass roots mobilization of constituency groups around budget, 10-point Call to Action, and specific legislative proposals
- Promote other Administration legislative priorities -- including reauthorization of Special Education and Vocational and Adult Education Acts

**WHITE HOUSE PROPOSED LANGUAGE ON REASONABLE EFFORTS
ADOPTION 2002 REPORT**

- **Clarifying “Reasonable Efforts”:** *(d) A proposal to clarify the “reasonable efforts” requirement and other law as it relates to permanency and safety;*

PROPOSED ACTION STEPS

To ensure the protection of children by clarifying or proposing changes to legislation regarding “reasonable efforts,” reunification of children with their families, and termination of parental rights:

- The Department will issue administrative guidance within 60 days that clarifies the “reasonable efforts” provision of Title IV-E of the Social Security Act. This clarification will advance the goal of giving every child in our nation’s public child welfare system a safe and permanent home by making it clear that in determining whether and when to remove a child from his or her family, whether and when to reunify the family, and whether and when to seek an alternative permanency plan, the child’s health and safety shall be the paramount concern.
- Members of Congress have developed a number of proposals to address this issue, and the Department will work with them to achieve statutory changes reinforcing this administrative clarification.
- The Department in particular will work with Congress to more clearly and appropriately define the circumstances in which “reasonable efforts” to reunify a family should not be undertaken. The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), as amended by Congress in 1996, already requires that, as a condition for receiving funds under the Basic State Grant Program:
 - 1) the State may not mandate the reunification of a surviving child with parents found to have aided, abetted or committed:
 - murder
 - voluntary manslaughter
 - serious bodily injury to their children; and
 - 2) conviction of any of the above mentioned felonies constitutes grounds for the termination of parental rights.

The Department will work towards amending the Title IV-E provision of the Social Security Act by incorporating an expanded version of this list of circumstances in which reunification is not appropriate.

- The Department will also issue model guidelines for State legislation that will advance the goal of giving every child in our nation's public child welfare system a safe and permanent home by making it clear that in determining whether and when to terminate parental rights, the child's health and safety should be the paramount concern.

DISCUSSION

Since 1980, Federal law has required that "reasonable efforts" be made both: 1) to prevent the unnecessary removal of children from their families; and 2) to reunify children, when possible, who have been placed in foster care, with their families. The goal of this provision was to reduce the phenomenon of children languishing unnecessarily in foster care. The Federal "reasonable efforts" requirement has been both heralded as being essential to effective child welfare practice and criticized for being unclear and a barrier to child safety and permanence.

Consultation with the field revealed that there is wide variation in how current "reasonable efforts" law is interpreted by caseworkers, agencies, and judges around the country. There was a strong consensus that some clarification of the reasonable efforts requirements is needed to allow for better, more timely decision making in individual cases, although there were divergent opinions on what degree of specificity would be useful from the Federal government.

The proposals outlined above will send a clear message that Federal law requires that the health and safety of children shall be the paramount concern in making decisions about whether and when to remove children from families, whether and when to reunify the families, and whether and when to seek alternative permanency plans. They also will make clear to the States the Administration's view that the child's health and safety should be paramount in determining whether and when to terminate parental rights.

I want to start by wishing all of you a Happy Valentine's Day -- I can think of no more fitting occasion to talk about the efforts we are making to give America's neediest children the gift of a loving, safe and permanent home.

Both the First Lady and I have said many times that our country is only as strong as our children are safe and healthy. The First Lady has worked harder than anyone I know to ensure all of our children's welfare, and she has devoted her career to making their concerns our first priority. She deeply believes that every child deserves a loving home, and we would not be here today without her dedication and commitment.

We know that our children's well being depends on two fundamental elements: safety and stability -- for without these, children cannot thrive. But we also know that far too many of our children are endangered in their own homes. The public child welfare system was created to provide a temporary haven for those children . . . not to let them languish in foster care.

Nearly half a million of our children are currently in foster care; of those children, nearly 100,000 will never return to their original homes, and many of those children will never know what it is like to live in a real home until they grow up and start their own families. But it doesn't have to be that way. We can find adoptive and other permanent families for waiting children like the ones who have joined us today, and the children whose valentines you see hanging here.

In December I called on the Department of Health and Human Services to devise an aggressive legislative and administrative strategy to double the number of children we move from foster care to permanent homes annually by the year 2002, and to move them there more quickly. I am proud to say that you went to work immediately to produce this blueprint for achieving our national goal.

Today, I am pleased to accept this report. **Now, we must move quickly to put our plan into action so that no child is deprived of a safe and permanent home for even one day longer than necessary.**

First, every state agency, family court and case worker in the country must understand that our children's health and safety are the paramount concerns of the public child welfare system, especially when determining whether to remove a child from her home or to return her to

it. We will work with Congress to make sure that the law explicitly reflects this priority, and we will issue guidelines to the states so there will be no question as to the law's meaning.

Second, to meet our goal of moving 54,000 children into permanent homes in 2002, we will work with states to set yearly targets. To help them reach these targets, my balanced budget includes \$10 million annually for the next three years to give technical assistance to state agencies, courts and communities. And it also includes \$10 million to establish competitive grants to develop model strategies for moving children from foster care to permanent families more quickly.

Third, we will propose legislation to give states bonuses for every child that is adopted over the prior year's target, with even larger bonuses when the child has special needs. My balanced budget will start paying for these bonuses, but we expect them to pay for themselves, since it costs far more to keep children in foster care than to secure adoptive homes for them.

Fourth, to achieve our goal of moving children out of foster care more quickly, we will work with Congress to shorten from 18 to 12 months the time a child waits for his first hearing. And we are going to call it a permanency planning hearing so that there is no mistake as to its purpose.

Fifth, to give credit for model strategies that are working -- and to spread the word of their success -- we will give national awards for excellence every year in November, National Adoption Month.

Finally, we must redouble our efforts to make sure that no child of one race is deprived of a loving home with a family of another race -- it is illegal, it is wrong, and it hurts our neediest children. The HHS will continue to ensure that states are meeting their obligations under the law, and penalize states that are not.

By putting this plan into action today, we are ensuring that no child will languish in foster care when loving families are out there, ready, willing and able to open their hearts and their homes.

Adoption 2002 is just one part of our strategy to guarantee the well being of our most vulnerable children. By giving states flexibility to develop their own strategies, we are moving even closer to achieving our goal. That is why I am pleased to announce that I have approved Ohio's child welfare waiver. This waiver gives Ohio the authority to design and test a "managed care" approach to improve child welfare services and move children out of foster care more quickly.

By working together -- across party lines, at every level of government, in our businesses, religious groups, communities, and in our homes -- we will help to make sure that every child in America can grow up in a safe and nurturing home. That is a goal we can all be proud to support. Thank you, God bless you, and Happy Valentine's Day.

Preparing our children for the 21st century is among our most important national priorities. Over the past few years, scientific research has demonstrated that the earliest years of life -- before children reach school age -- are critical to their cognitive, emotional and physical development.

President Clinton is meeting the challenge to improve those years by investing in research, supporting parents and caregivers, and investing in programs that provide early intervention to disadvantaged families. The Clinton Administration is committed to building on this progress. The President and the First Lady will convene a White House conference this spring to further explore the implications of these scientific discoveries and research for parents and policy makers.

43% increase in Head Start, created Early Head Start for 0-3 year olds and improved program quality. For more than thirty years, Head Start has been one of our nation's best investments in helping low-income parents be their children's first teacher, and in making sure that children start school ready to read and ready to learn. For that reason, President Clinton has made expanding and improving Head Start a priority of his Administration. Over the past four years funding for the program has increased by 43% serving 800,000 low-income 3-4 year olds, including thousands of 0-3 year olds and their families. Initiated in 1994, *Early Head Start* now totals 142 programs across the country, expanding the proven benefits of early childhood development to low income families with children under three and to pregnant women. Over the last three years, the Clinton Administration has also invested significantly in improving program quality, providing local programs with the resources they need to attract and retain high quality teachers and to improve the quality and safety of the Head Start centers. The President's 1998 budget proposal provides a \$324 million increase, serving 122,100 more children than in 1993 while continuing to increase program quality and the zero-to-three program and remain on course to serve 1 million children by 2002.

Increased participants in WIC program by 1.7 million. WIC Supplemental Nutrition Program provides nutrition packages, nutrition education and health referrals to low-income pregnant women, infants, and children. Over the past four years participation has expanded by 1.7 million, or 30% with the requested supplemental, from 5.7 to 7.4 million women, infants, and children. The increases in the President's budget proposal fulfils his commitment to achieving full

participation in WIC by the end of 1998. Research shows that WIC prenatal services save Medicaid much more by reducing health care costs in the first 60 days after birth.

Childhood Immunization Rates are at an All-Time High of 75 Percent. The President's Childhood Immunization Initiative focuses on five areas: 1) Improving the quality and quantity of vaccination delivery services; 2) Reducing the vaccine cost for parents; 3) Increasing community participation, education and partnerships; 4) Improving systems to monitor diseases and vaccinations; and 5) Improving vaccines and vaccines use. This initiative builds on the efforts of the past four years whereas in 1995, 75 percent of two-year olds were fully immunized -- an historic high. Including both funding for vaccine purchases and for immunization program activities, funding for childhood immunization has more than doubled since FY 1993. This has resulted in tremendous savings because vaccines are cost effective. For example, more than \$21 are saved for every \$1 spent on measles/mumps/rubella vaccine and more that \$29 are saved for every \$1 spent on diphtheria/tetanus/pertussis vaccine.

48% Increase for Children with Special Needs. Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) the Infants and Families Program supports the continuing efforts of States to implement quality statewide systems of early intervention services for infants and toddlers with disabilities aged birth through two and their families. Over the past four years funding for the program has increased by 48% or \$102.5 million. During the same period, the number of children served increased by 21.5 percent. An estimated 191,000 children will be served in FY 1998.

46% Increase in 4 years for Even Start. Even Start Family Literacy is a family-focused grant program to improve the educational opportunities of children and their parents in low-income areas by integrating family literacy activities, including early childhood education, adult education, and parenting education. Over the past four years funding for Even Start has increased by almost 46%. During the same period, the number of children estimated to be participating in Even Start has increased almost 132 percent, to an estimated 51,000 children in 1996. Even Start received \$102 million in funding in fiscal 1997, providing funding to every state and the District of Columbia to reach 576 programs.

Funding for Child Care in Public Housing has Tripled. The Early Childhood Development Program helps to provide quality child care opportunities for families living in public housing communities. The program helps to establish childhood development services to facilitate the employability of the parents or guardians who are residing in public housing, and to provide early childhood development services to families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. In 1996, \$21 million was awarded to public housing sites across the country.

42 States now have funding for Parent Resource Centers. In addition to involving parents in the development of state and local Goals 2000 education plans, the President's Goals 2000 program provides funding for each state to establish parent resource centers that help parents learn how to help their children achieve high standards. The centers coordinate existing programs, provide resource materials, and support a variety of promising models of family involvement programs. In fiscal year 1997, \$15 million in funding is available for support centers in 42 states, 14 more

than in 1996.

\$300 Million Plan Promotes Parents as First Teachers. The President's America Reads Challenge to make sure that every child can read well by the end of the third grade includes Parents as First Teachers Challenge Grants that will invest in proven efforts to provide assistance to parents who want to help ensure their children will read well. The grants will fund national and regional networks to share information on how parents can help children to read and fund the expansion of successful programs such as the Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters (HIPPO) or the Parents as First Teachers (PAT) program. The President's proposal includes \$300 million over 5 years for these grants.

Federal Government Supports Nearly 90% of all Children's Research. * The National Institutes of Health now supports 32,000 grants in more than 1,700 universities, medical schools, and other research institutions. This research has contributed to the major advance in brain research and its impact on early learning and language development. NIH's funding has increased funding 23% to \$12.7 billion in FY97.

Maintains the Commitment to the Medicaid Guarantee for 30 Percent of All Children Under 6 Years Old. This Administration has protected, preserved, and will improve on the guarantee of Medicaid coverage for 37 million Americans, including 10 million children under the age of 6. In 1995, the President vetoed the Republican Medicaid block grant proposal that would have ended the guarantee of coverage for up to 4 million children by 2002. At the same time, the President worked with States by granting 15 comprehensive Medicaid waivers and approving many more State plan amendments that improve and expand coverage for children.

President's Plan Seeks to Extend Health Coverage to Up to 5 Million Children. Although this Administration has made great strides in protecting the health of America's neediest children, there is still much to be done. In 1995, more than 10 million American children had no health insurance. Eighty percent (8 million) of the ten million uninsured children have a parent who is a worker. Many uninsured children have parents who earn too much for Medicaid but too little to afford private coverage, and an estimated three million children are eligible, but not enrolled in Medicaid. The President's budget takes three important steps to address the problem of the more than 10 million children who lack health insurance coverage:

- 1) Provides annual grants to states to cover health insurance premiums for children whose parents are in-between jobs;
- 2) Utilizes State Partnership Grants to help working families, who are not eligible for Medicaid, purchase private insurance for their children; and
- 3) Invests to expand Medicaid coverage by allowing states to extend one year of continuous coverage to children eligible for Medicaid, intensifying outreach to children who are currently eligible but not enrolled, and expanding coverage to reach poor children between the ages of 13 - 18.

22% Increases in Child Care funding. Since 1993 funding for child care has increased by 22%

providing quality services for over 660,000 children of which 65% are under 5 years of age. The Child Care and Development Block Grant Amendments of 1996 provide an important opportunity for states and communities to plan a more cohesive child care system that responds to the needs of all families and helps promote safe and healthy care for children of all ages. Increased federal funding over a six year period allows for multi-year planning.

Lead-Based Paint Removed from over x units. The Office of Lead Based Paint and Poisoning has as central to its mission the reduction of childhood lead poisoning. Of the 64 million dwelling units that contain lead-based paint, 4 million have lead-based hazards and are currently occupied by young children. The HUD program, combined with other local, state and federal funds, targets those houses where lead poisoning rates are highest and where private financing is not feasible
