HRC is speaking to the Pediatric AIDS Foundation on Tuesday night, and they clearly want her to say something about pediatric drug labeling, the issue I mentioned in my email to you about issues and event ideas. I am sure I can work out some language with HHS, FDA, and OVP for HRC to get us through Tuesday. But after Tuesday would you like the DPC to take this issue on? Kessler met with Shalala on this issue late last week. Apart from the policy question of how best to achieve the shared goal of having pediatric labeling on more drugs, the strategic question is whether to move on this issue administratively and separately from FDA reform. Some people reportedly believe that it would make it more difficult to win passage of a good FDA reform bill.

I will try work out some language for HRC along the lines of "the Administration is committed to ensuring we make more progress on this issue," (which has been said before) and if possible something about time frames for action.

OMB and USDA have drafted legislation to implement the President's proposed "fix" to the food stamp 18-50 work requirement. I was surprised to discover that the current draft includes 2 changes to the welfare law that seem unrelated to the basic goal (which is changing the ban from "3 months in 36" to "6 months in 12," and setting up a real work program for these folks). These 2 changes are:

changing the criteria for getting waivers from the fs work requirement. Now the law allows 2 ways to get waivers: (1) areas with an unemployment rate over 10%, or (2) areas with insufficient numbers of jobs. This draft changes the 10% to 8%. It turns out that most of the areas that would be helped by such a change are areas that would already qualify under method 2. So why should we create a target for criticism when it doesn't even make much difference?

allowing job search to count for 10 of the 20 hours of work activities. Under current law, you can avoid the cutoffs if you are engaged in work activities for at least 20 hours a week, but none of this can be job search. We fought against this during the debate. But, now that the law is passed, it's not clear to me we would want to reopen this. I don't know how different this area is from TANF, where we clearly wouldn't allow this. But this was not part of what we advertised on this "fix", so I don't see why we should reopen old wounds. It will be tough enough to get Congress to look at this in the first place!

The "rush" here is that Raines is very anxious to get the Administration bill up to the Hill by the end of the week. I have told OMB to hold this because we may have problems. Should I tell them we want these changes deleted?

The President's Budget Cuts Taxes for Middle Class Families **Republican Charges that the President's Plan Raises Taxes are Plain Wrong**

President's Tax Cuts are Permanent. The President's budget cuts taxes by \$98 billion over five years. Those tax cuts include help for middle-class families who are raising children, saving to pay for college or to buy a new home. Under our budget, those tax cuts are permanent.

Republican Charge Rests on Three Misleading Assumptions. Some Republicans have claimed that the President's plan amounts to a \$23 billion net tax increase over five years. That charge rests on three misleading assumptions.

- (1) It assumes that our tax cuts are temporary -- which would only be true if our conservative economic assumptions prove inaccurate. *And for four years in a row, the deficit has been lower and growth has been higher than we have predicted.*
- (2) It also counts as a tax increase \$34 billion in savings from reducing unwarranted corporate subsidies and closing business tax loopholes. That is clearly not a tax increase on families.
- (3) Finally, the Republicans also count \$42 billion from the extension of expiring tax provisions like the airline ticket tax that even Majority Leader Armev has argued should not be viewed as a tax increase.

Background

The President's Tax Cuts Don't Sunset as Long as Our Economic Forecast is Accurate. Some Republicans assume that we sunset our tax cuts in 2001 in order to secure a balanced budget by 2002. But we would only do that if our economic assumptions prove to be too optimistic. **The fact of the matter is that our assumptions have proven to be conservative over the past four years: every year, the deficit has been lower and growth has been higher than we had predicted.** Since we took office, the actual deficit has on average been about \$50 billion lower than we had projected the year before. CBO has been less accurate: they have overestimated the deficit by \$59 billion on average. Furthermore, our current assumptions are equally prudent and conservative. Our estimates of GDP growth and inflation over the next 5 years are precisely the same as the Blue Chip private-sector consensus.

In addition to not counting some of our tax cuts, the calculation is also misleading because it assumes that the budget's \$34 billion in savings from reducing unwarranted corporate subsidies should be counted as a tax increase on middle-class families -- but clearly they are not.

As for the \$42 billion in revenue from extending expiring tax provisions, House Majority Leader Richard Armey stated that the extension of the airline ticket tax is not a tax increase at all. The *National Journal*, in its commentary on reinstating the airline ticket tax, noted that "*House Majority Leader Armey today said he does not consider the bill a tax increase because it reinstates a long-standing airline ticket tax that expired at the end of 1996. 'I consider [a vote for the tax] a maintenance of effort,' Armey said.*" [*National Journal*, February 25, 1997, page 3.] Over the next 5 years, the extension of the airline ticket tax produces \$32 billion -- more than enough to ensure that the President's budget includes a net tax cut, even in the unlikely event that our conservative economic forecasts prove to be wrong.

REMARKS ON HUMAN CLONING
Tuesday, March 3, 1997**

In recent days, all Americans were startled to learn of the successful cloning of a sheep by Scottish researchers. There is no question that this is a breakthrough of enormous consequence for science, medicine, and agriculture -- one that could yield important benefits in the years to come.

It also raises a very troubling prospect -- that it might someday be possible to use these techniques to clone human beings from our own genetic material.

There is much about this discovery and its applications that we still do not know. But this much we do know: any discovery that touches upon human creation is not simply a matter of scientific inquiry. It is a matter of human morality and human decency as well.

My own deeply-held view is that the prospect of human cloning is morally repugnant. It violates our most cherished concepts of faith and humanity. Each human life is unique -- blessed by the spirit of a mother and a father, born of a miracle that reaches beyond laboratory science. I believe that we must respect this profound gift, and resist the temptation to become our own creators.

That is why, one week ago today, I asked our National Bioethics Advisory Commission, headed by Princeton University President Harold Shapiro, to conduct a thorough review of the moral and ethical issues raised by this new cloning technology, and to recommend possible actions to prevent its abuse. Their report, due back in 90 days, will give us a better understanding of the scope and implications of this scientific breakthrough.

But there are steps we can take right now to prevent the possibility of human cloning. After reviewing the current restrictions on the use of federal funds for research involving human embryos, we found loopholes that could allow human cloning. Today, I am issuing a directive that bans the use of any federal funds for human cloning. Effective immediately, no federal agency may support, fund, or undertake such activity.

Of course, a great deal of research and activity in this area is supported by private funds. That is why I am urging the entire scientific community -- and every foundation, university, and industry that supports work in this area -- to heed the federal government's example. I am asking for a voluntary moratorium on all efforts to pursue or undertake human cloning, until our Bioethics Advisory Commission and our entire nation have had a chance to understand and debate the profound ethical implications.

Until we learn more about the potential uses and abuses of cloning, the sensible course is to proceed not just with caution, but with conscience as well. By insisting that not a single taxpayers' dollar supports human cloning -- and by urging a moratorium on all private efforts to pursue human cloning -- we can ensure that as we move forward on this issue, we weigh the concerns of faith and family, and not just of laboratory science alone.

In recent days, the world witnessed the successful cloning of a sheep by Scottish researchers. It is a discovery that could yield enormous benefits -- enabling us to reproduce the most productive strains of crops and livestock; holding out the promise of groundbreaking medical treatments and cures; helping to unlock the greatest secrets of the genetic code.

But like the splitting of the atom, this is a discovery that carries burdens as well as benefits. Today, science often moves faster than our ability to understand its implications. That is why we have a responsibility to move slowly and cautiously -- to harness the powerful forces of science and technology, so that we can reap the benefits, while avoiding the potential dangers.

This new breakthrough raises the troubling prospect that it might someday be possible to clone human beings from our own genetic material. There is much about cloning that we still do not know. But this much we do know: any discovery that touches upon human creation is not simply a matter of scientific inquiry. It is a matter of morality, decency, and spirituality as well.

My own deeply-held view is that the prospect of human cloning is morally repugnant. It violates our most cherished concepts of faith and humanity. Each human life is unique -- born of a miracle that reaches beyond laboratory science. I believe that we must respect this profound gift, and resist the temptation to become our own creators.

At the very least, we need a better understanding of the scope and implications of this breakthrough. Last week, I asked our National Bioethics Advisory Commission, headed by Princeton University President Harold Shapiro, to conduct a thorough review of the legal and ethical issues raised by this new cloning technology, and to recommend possible actions to prevent its abuse, reporting back to me in 90 days.

In the meantime, I am taking steps to prevent the more imminent possibility of human cloning. After reviewing the current restrictions on the use of federal funds for research involving human embryos, we believe there are loopholes that could allow human cloning if the technology were developed. Today, I am issuing a directive that bans the use of any federal funds for human cloning. Effective immediately, no federal agency may support, fund, or undertake such activity.

Of course, a great deal of research and activity in this area is supported by private funds. That is why I am urging the entire scientific community -- and every foundation, university, and industry that supports work in this area -- to heed the federal government's example. I am asking for a voluntary moratorium on all efforts to undertake human cloning, until our Bioethics Advisory Commission and our entire nation have had a chance to understand and debate the profound ethical implications.

As we gain a fuller understanding of cloning, we must proceed not just with caution, but with conscience as well. By insisting that not a single taxpayer's dollar supports human cloning -- and by urging a moratorium on all private efforts to pursue human cloning -- we can ensure that as we move forward on this issue, we weigh the concerns of faith and family, and not just of laboratory science alone.

I assume you don't plan to come to tomorrow's 11a.m. meeting of the federal agencies on the summit, which is fine.

The agencies submitted a hodge-podge of material that I have sent over to you. There are some good things in there, but we need to separate wheat from chaff. A lot of it is volunteering by Federal employees. I am doing a summary, but I also need to make sure I'm on your wave length in terms of what is a good idea. I would love to sit down with you in a day or two if possible.

I can make tomorrow's meeting productive by allowing some of the obviously better agencies to talk about their ideas, in hopes of bring other agencies up to their level. I would single out proposals that work with communities/voluntary efforts to help support the agency's mission.

One major question: I need to be sure I can define service in a way that distinguishes it from voluntarism. The Corporation has told me both that voluntarism is a subset of service, and that service is generally more sustained than voluntarism. Also, they say that service has more emphasis on how the person doing the serving benefits from their service. But I imagine that voluntarism types assert that many volunteers do sustained work, and that they get a ton out of it, so I'm not sure this distinction works. I assume service needn't be paid. I. PURPOSE

You will meet with Administration officials in the area of research and ethics to 1) issue a statement on cloning to assure the public that federal funds will not be used to clone humans; and (2) call on the scientific community to voluntarily refrain from human cloning until the ethical issues can be considered.

II. BACKGROUND

The recent announcement that Scottish researchers have successfully cloned an adult sheep has received widespread attention, since, hypothetically, similar techniques could be used to clone humans. Because of the ethical concerns human cloning would present, on February 24 you asked your National Bioethics Advisory Commission (NBAC) to review the legal and ethical issues involved and to report back within 90 days on possible federal actions (see attached letter to Dr. Shapiro, NBAC Chair).

Most scientists believe that human cloning faces major scientific barriers, and the majority of experts believe that any prospect of successfully applying this new cloning method to human beings in the near future is remote.

Human cloning research also faces federal funding barriers. On December 2, 1994, you issued a statement barring the use of federal funds to create human embryos for research purposes. Appropriations bills for FY96 and FY97 codified this policy and expanded it to cover HHS research in which human embryos are "destroyed, discarded, or knowingly subjected to risk of injury or death greater than that allowed for research on fetuses in utero." (The Administration has opposed addressing the issue through legislation and has supported repealing this provision)

There is some fear, however, that public concern over this issue could erode support for important genetic research programs, and/or result in overly-restrictive legislation. On February 26, testifying before the House Appropriations Subcom. on Labor, Health and Human Services, Dr. Varmus stated that while the idea of human cloning was "repugnant," he "would be concerned about a rush to legislate" a prohibition since legislation could also restrict related work that offers important medical, economic, and scientific benefits. A consensus is emerging that researchers should not pursue the cloning of human beings at least until the nation has more thoroughly considered the ethical implications of the

technology. The current restrictions do not assure this outcome for two reasons.

First, the current ban on using federal funds to create embryos for research does not explicitly prohibit all human cloning -- it only covers cloning of embryos that will be discarded (not implanted), and only covers HHS-funded research.

Second, the restrictions apply to federally-supported human embryo research only, not privately-funded activities. Privately funded facilities are free to engage in human cloning research under current law. There is a booming business in all forms of reproduction technology to assist infertile couples. Human cloning is not likely to be pursued in this context -- at least until it has a chance of competing successfully against existing technology -- but it cannot be definitively ruled out.

Congress has scheduled fact-finding hearings on human cloning March 5 (Technology Subcommittee, House Science Committee) and March 12 (Senate Subcommittee on Science, Technology and Space). NIH Director Harold Varmus has been asked to testify at both upcoming hearings.

Your statement at this time is intended to reassure the public; deter restrictive, ill-advised legislation; and strengthen the nation's resolve to consider ethical questions carefully before advancing human cloning by 1) clarifying that federal dollars cannot be used for human cloning and that you are signing a memorandum to that effect; 2) calling on the scientific community to refrain from human cloning at least until NBAC and the nation have carefully considered the issue.

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

FROM: MICHAEL COHEN

SUBJECT: NATIONAL STANDARDS AND TESTS: MEETING WITH EXPERTS

You will be meeting with a small group of experts (Marc Tucker, Diane Ravitch, E.D. Hirsch, Rick Mills, Roy Romer, Hugh Price, Don Stewart) as well as Secretary Riley and Deputy Secretary Smith, on national standards and tests on March 5. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss a range of options about how to move this agenda forward. This memo should help to prepare you for the meeting by summarizing the status of your proposal for 4th and 8th grade standards and testing, and identifying several different directions future action could take.

I. YOUR PLAN FOR NATIONAL STANDARDS AND NATIONAL TESTS IN 4TH GRADE READING AND 8TH GRADE MATH

Summary of Plan

In your State of the Union Address you challenged every state to adopt high national standards and by 1999, to test every 4th grader in reading and every 8th grader in math to make sure these standards are met. These national tests:

- o **Will be aligned with widely accepted national content standards.** In 4th grade reading, the test will be aligned with the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) reading standards, developed through a consensus process involving reading specialists, curriculum experts, state officials and others throughout the nation. In math, the test will be aligned with the TIMSS international math standard agreed to by experts in 41 countries, including the U.S.. The TIMSS standards are also very highly consistent with the national standards developed by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.
- o **Will be based on existing, widely accepted tests, and will produce individual scores for students and parents in terms of the national standards.** The new tests will be based on the existing NAEP and TIMSS tests, which are designed to be administered to samples of students and produce national or state-level scores only. The new tests will provide comparable scores for individual students, revealing how well individual students perform relative to clear national or international performance standards.
- o **Will be developed by recognized test developers.** The U.S. Department of Education will contract with a test developer to create these tests. The contracting process will begin shortly. The tests will be piloted in Spring 1998, and available for use in schools throughout the country in the Spring of 1999.

- o **Will be for voluntary use by states and local school districts.** Use of these tests will not be required as a condition of receiving federal program funds.
- o **Will be licensed to test publishers and interested states and school districts.** As a result of this licensing agreement, the federal government will not be involved in administering or scoring the tests, and the tests will be readily available.
- o **Will be available to parents and students on the Internet once the tests have been administered.** Each year, after the tests have been administered, the test questions and answers will be released publicly and placed on the Internet, so that parents can find out whether their children are meeting national standards even if their state or district does not use the tests.
- o **Will be the focal point for national efforts to prepare all students to reach the standards.** The point of the national standards and tests is to help improve, not just to measure, student achievement. Between now and when the tests are first administered, there must be a focused, sustained effort, and the local, state and national level, to prepare students for these tests. America Reads is one component of such an effort.

We will provide you an overview of the implementation strategy for this initiative shortly.

Reactions To Date

The reactions to this plan have mainly been quite positive. The Washington Post, USA Today, and many local and regional papers have expressed editorial support for this plan. As you know, the BRT endorsed it the day after the State of the Union Address. Maryland has already agreed to participate in the testing program, and Gov. Engler will announce his support later this week. Diane Ravitch and Checker Finn wrote a very positive op-ed piece in the Washington Post last week (copy attached). We expect other education and business groups to weigh in positively as their Spring meetings occur. In addition, informal conversations with state and local education officials and business leaders around the country have also been positive. They welcome the tests, and believe you have found a way of defining the issue that avoids old political battles.

Criticism of this plan has taken three forms. First, some have said that your plan goes too far. For example, Gov. Thompson wrote an op-ed piece in the New York Times, arguing that standards should be left to the states and local communities. Second, some in the education community have renewed the familiar argument that tests are not the solution to low performance. Instead, they argue that additional funding, better teachers, safer and more caring schools are what's needed. Third, some (e.g., David Broder, Robert Samuelson) have argued that your plan does not go far enough, because it is limited to only two subjects and grade levels, because it is not accompanied by significant new federal funding to prepare students to reach the standards, or because you do not require students to pass tests in order to graduate from high school or receive financial aid for college.

II. POSSIBLE NEXT STEPS

Your plan for national standards and tests in reading and math is a significant step forward, especially in light of the controversy that has surrounded the standards movement in recent years.

But it remains important to consider what else you can do to advance the standards movement and improve student achievement. The key questions are whether to propose national standards and assessments in other grades or subjects (and if so, in which), whether to leave these matters entirely to the states, or whether to adopt some kind of intermediary position. In considering these questions you should consider what steps make the most sense educationally, and also what steps will move the country forward rather than reviving tired arguments. We must be especially careful not to propose any new steps that will undermine state participation in this initiative, because this will be the most visible indicator of success. Below I lay out some basic approaches.

Approach 1: Lead a sustained national effort to prepare students to reach the 4th and 8th grade standards.

Setting national standards and creating national tests is not an end in and of itself; it should be the starting point for serious efforts throughout the country to prepare students to meet these standards and thereby raise academic performance. The most important follow up to the plan you have already announced is to lead a sustained effort to improve reading and math performance even before the standards and tests go into effect. Your America Reads initiative, is one significant element of this strategy, but there is more to be done. In reading, this includes identifying and promoting effective instructional programs and teacher training programs, especially through Title 1 and Goals 2000. And it involves a sustained effort to encourage parents to read to their children on a regular basis.

A comparable effort is required in math. The TIMSS study highlights the need to undertake a massive teacher retraining effort, and to challenge textbook publishers to create world class textbooks. Employers and professionals, such as engineers and scientists, can be mobilized to help by tutoring students, helping to train and support classroom teachers, assisting in developing curriculum materials, and showing students how math concepts are used in the real world. We have been working with OSTP, the Department of Education and the National Science Foundation to develop a strategy for coordinating federal resources to improve teaching and learning in math, and for systematically reaching out to the mathematical, scientific and technical communities.

Pro's:

- o There is the more public support for a limited focus on the basics than there would be on a broader proposal involving other subect areas (e.g., history).
- o This approach has the best chance of avoiding debilitating old debates about national standards; by winning over Finn, Ravitch, Engler. et. al., we have begun to transform the debate about national standards into a more productive one.
- o Succeeding at this effort will make it easier to push a more comprehensive approach down the road; overloading it early on in the process with a more ambitious agenda may

- o rekindle old debates and slow down progress on this more limited approach.
- o The most important thing to do is to help kids meet the standards; by sticking with this focused approach, we can spend scarce time and attention mobilizing resources to actually improve, rather than simply measure, student achievement.
- o If we can succeed in significantly raising student performance in these grades and subjects, achievement in other subjects and grades will also increase, because reading and math are a foundation for other learning, and because we will have demonstrated for the nation how to use standards and tests to boost achievement.

Con's:

- o Most of the arguments for national standards and tests in 4th and 8th grade reading and math can be made for other subjects as well: for the most part, well-crafted national standards will be more demanding than those set at the state and local level; we live in a mobile and diverse society, and national standards provide a common foundation for all; just as math is math regardless of where one lives, the same is essentially true of science, geography, and writing.
- o Our limited focus on reading and math could unduly restrict attention in local schools to these subjects, at the expense of science in elementary schools, history and literature in middle schools, etc.
- o Our limited proposal may seem small and inconsequential (even though it is not); we may be missing an opportunity to strike out more boldly.
- o As a strategic matter, we should recognize that whatever we ultimately accomplish will be less than what we aim for. If we don't aim higher, we might not accomplish our current proposal.

The following approaches are intended as possible additions to, not substitutes for, the approach described above. We believe that none of them should be pursued publicly over the next 4-6 months, or they are likely to undermine efforts to sign states up for participation in the 4th and 8th grade testing initiative.

Approach 2: Highlight the best standards in other subject areas and grade levels, and urge states to adopt them.

States, local school districts, and a host of national organizations (e.g. National Geographic Society, New Standards, etc.) have developed standards in all academic subject areas. These vary in rigor and quality. This is the right time in the national standards process to take stock of what has been developed, identify the most challenging and useful sets of standards from among those developed by states and national organizations, and urge all states to adopt the best standards and assessments that are identified. This would result in an overall improvement in the level and quality of state standards, and greater commonality -- though not necessarily strict uniformity -- in the standards among states. This 'bottom up' approach to national standards would also retain a good deal of flexibility for states.

This approach will work best if the judgements about the quality of existing standards are made by a nonfederal source. It will be politically very difficult for the Education Department to undertake this task. While no national organization is ideally suited for this role, the best candidate is ACHIEVE, the new entity established by the governors and business leaders after the 1996 National Education Summit in Palisades. The mission of this organization, once it is operational, will be to assist states to develop and implement high quality academic standards and tests. This approach, then involves reaching an agreement with the business leaders and bipartisan group of governors that, together with them, you will urge states to adopt or adapt the best standards identified by ACHIEVE.

Pro's:

- o By keeping the governors at the center of this approach, you will increase state commitment to using the best standards and keep the approach a bipartisan one.
- o This approach can promote national consensus on what students should learn in various subject areas based on the best standards that are available, and without raising the specter of federal intrusion.

Con's:

- o ACHIEVE's capacity to do this work is untried. It has yet to hire an executive director or staff, or conduct any work. In addition, ACHIEVE was established explicitly to focus on state, rather than national standards, since the political atmosphere at the education summit was very much in opposition to both national standards and federal involvement in standards. It is not clear if the ACHIEVE governing board has the political room needed to alter its mission as envisioned here.
- o Unless the governors and business leaders actually push states aggressively to coalesce around a small number of high quality standards and assessments, this approach may make a difference in only a small number of interested states, while the rest continue to act independently.

Approach 3: Incrementally expand your proposal to include reading and math testing at additional grade levels, and perhaps science as well. You can begin to broaden your proposal by testing math in the 4th grade as well as 8th, and reading in 8th as well as 4th. (You could also test both subjects in 12th grade, though the subject of high school testing is addressed in the next approach, described below). In addition, you could expand your plan by including the TIMSS science test at the 4th and/or 8th grades. Taken together, these steps would result in national tests in 3 subjects at both the 4th and 8th grade level, with a broader and deeper impact on teaching and learning.

Pro's:

- o Adding a 4th grade math test would give students and parents an additional, early benchmark to judge whether the student is proceeding on track. It would cause states,

- o schools, teachers and students to prepare sooner for international standards.
- o While not traditionally considered a basic skill, science is increasingly important. Adding science tests will help spur needed improvement in science curriculum and teaching. It also will increase support for the national testing plan from the scientific community, and will help grass roots efforts to involve scientists in efforts to improve public education.
- o A larger set of 3 subjects and 2 grade levels would make it more difficult to portray your plan as a small idea.

Con's

- o Expanding the original plan undermines our argument that we are focusing on the basic subjects at key transition points. Whatever the educational merits, this expansion will reduce our credibility and leave us vulnerable to the argument that the testing system will be expanded again in the future to include additional subject areas and grade levels.
- o Tests for three subject areas per grade level triples the amount of testing time required to participate in this initiative. This alone will be an obstacle to state or local participation, especially if these tests are added on top of state or local tests, rather than replacing them.
- o Though we have not yet costed out an expanded testing program, it is likely to be more difficult to accommodate in the current year budget. Additional tests will probably not be available for the initial 1999 administration, and the cost of paying for the initial administration of all tests will be significantly higher than initial estimates.
- o It will be far more difficult to launch an effective national movement to prepare students for these tests, if the number expands from 2 to 6. Failing to launch an effective effort to prepare students will weaken your message that the point of the tests is to give students a hand up, not a failing grade.

Approach 4: Focus on High School Completion: Appoint a commission to figure out how to get a good high school level test, appropriate for postsecondary education and employment. The absence of a high school level test leaves the 4th and 8th grade proposal seemingly incomplete. If standards are important, they are surely as important at the completion of high school as they are at earlier transition points.

However, testing at the high school level poses far more difficult issues than at earlier grade levels. There is no obvious 12th grade test to turn to, comparable to the 4th grade NAEP and 8th grade TIMSS tests. (The SAT's are not appropriate because they are only taken by college-bound students, and are not aligned with any curriculum standard.) It also is not clear what grade level(s) would be most appropriate for testing; 12th grade represents high school completion, but leaves students who do not meet the standards with no real second chances to improve. From this perspective, 0th grade testing would be preferable, if testing were to be done at a single grade level. Alternatively, a number of states, including Maryland and New York, are using a series of end-of-course tests each year in high school, instead of a single test or battery of

tests administered at one time. Finally, any high school testing proposal inevitably will raise questions about the consequences of student performance on these tests -- for high school graduation, college admission, financial aid and employment.

We believe that the best way to approach the issue of high school testing would be to appoint a commission, with significant representation from the higher education and employment communities, as well as from others with a stake in the education system. The charge to the commission would be to make recommendations about the desirability and uses of national standards and testing for high school completion, and for recommendations on the design, development and implementation of the system it envisions. Through its work, the commission would be expected to build a consensus around the recommended approach.

Pro's

- o It is even more important to have some kind of high-school level national standards and test than it is for 4th and 8th grade, because these standards determine what students will learn before they enter the world of work or postsecondary learning.
- o High School level tests, if they are challenging, will have a profound effect on teaching, curriculum, and learning throughout the K-12 system, since the entire system must be oriented to helping students pass the tests.
- o A commission, with a clear charge, will be seen as serious and important. It will demonstrate clear leadership, especially if its recommendations are bold and significant.
- o The high school level issues--including whether and/or how tests should be used for high school graduation, employment and student financial aid--are significant, and could benefit from sustained, visible national attention.

Con's

- o Precisely because high school standards and testing can have powerful effect throughout the K-12 system, this proposal can provoke criticisms of a federal takeover of school curriculum.
- o Appointing a commission may be seen as a way of dodging tough issues, rather than asserting bold leadership.
- o The commission may recommend steps that will be highly controversial, or that you may not wish to accept (e.g., require students to pass a national test in order to qualify for federal financial aid).

Overview of Implementation Strategy

- o State sign-up
 - o We intend to sign up a critical mass of states and local school districts over the next 4-6 months; 8-10 carefully selected states should provide considerable

momentum, and provide both the incentive and the political cover for many additional states to join. Maryland, Michigan set; California is a strong possibility as soon as late March. New York also looks promising. Over the next several weeks we will continue to identify states that are important bellweathers.

- o Education Department and DPC staff have meet with testing experts, test publishers and key state and local testing officials, to seek the advice and support of the technical experts in the field. An adequate comfort level among the state and local testing officials will make it easier to sign up additional states and districts.
- o You are scheduled to meet with 40-45 chief state school officers in mid-March to promote this plan
- o You can, if necessary, take the fight directly to the opposition --speak to at least one legislature not likely to be favorably disposed (e.g., Montana, to demonstrate your resolve and to take opposition arguments on directly)
- o We are developing a strategy to use Gov. Engler and Gov. Romer if possible, to recruit additional governors
- o We are exploring the possibility of sign-up by defense schools
- o Constituency sign-up
 - o Business Roundtable has formally endorsed this plan, and we expect the business community generally to actively support your efforts
 - o DPC and Education Deparemtn are working to gain endorsements from education, parent and other business groups; should be possible
 - o We will work closely with key constituency groups (parents, business and teachers) to press target states to sign up;
- o Test development
 - o RFP for test development to be let soon
 - o advisory committee of teachers and others to be appointed soon
 - o pilot testing in Spring 1998
- o Focused efforts to improve reading and math achievement
 - o Build strong ties to America Reads
 - o launch effort with OSTP, NSF, math/science/engineering, education and business communities to mobilize broad-based efforts to support math learning
 - o identify and promote examples of proven practices, and increase use in federal programs such as Title 1

- o strengthen teacher training and professional development
- o challenge textbook publishers to create world-class math textbooks

Summary of Plan

In the State of the Union Address you challenged every state to adopt high national standards

and, by 1999, to test every 4th grade student in reading and every 8th grade student in math, to see if they are meeting these national standards.

The 4th grade reading and 8th grade math tests to be used are based on existing, widely accepted standards and tests.

The 4th grade reading test will be based on the framework (content standards) which have guided the development of the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) assessment. The NAEP reading framework was developed by a consensus process involving reading and curriculum specialists from around the country. The NAEP assessment is aligned with this framework, and incorporates performance standards -- achievement levels (basic, proficient, and advanced) which tell how well students have mastered the content.

As you know, NAEP is currently designed to be administered to national and state samples of students, but cannot produce scores for individual students. Over the next two years, the Education Department will contract with test developers to develop a new test, aligned with the NAEP reading framework and designed to provide scores for individual students reported in terms of the NAEP performance standards.

In eight grade math, the starting point is the TIMSS test. This test was based on a consensus among experts in the 41 participating countries, including the U.S., regarding what students should know and be able to do in math and science. In math, this framework overlaps substantially with the widely accepted national math standards developed by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM). In turn, the NCTM standards have been the basis for the standards developed by most states, and have also guided the development of the NAEP math assessments. In short, in math, there is an extremely high degree of overlap between international and national standards -- and the international and national assessments based upon them.

Like NAEP, TIMSS is administered on a sample basis. Therefore, there is a comparable test development process to be undertaken over the next two years in order to produce a test that will provide scores for individual students.

Human Cloning
Possible Q's & A's

Question:

Why have you issued a directive prohibiting the use of Federal funds for cloning of human beings?

Answer:

I believe we need to make it absolutely clear that Federal funds will not be used in this manner, and the current prohibitions left room for other interpretations.

In 1994, I directed NIH not to support the creation of human embryos for research purposes, and Congression extended this ban to cover other forms of human embryo research. However, neither of these prohibitions would clearly cover the creation of human embryos, using cloning technology, that are intended to be actually implanted in a womb and carried to term.

My directive today will make it clear that federal funds are not to be used for cloning humans.

Question:

Would you support legislation to ban the cloning of humans?

Answer:

I think that legislation is premature at this time. Frankly, I believe that the broader Congressional prohibition on human embryo research risked cutting off sound research that has great medical importance. I think that we need a serious, public discussion-- which I have asked NBAC to lead -- rather than hasty legislation.

Question:

What are the next steps?

Answer:

I have asked the National Bioethics Advisory Commission (NBAC) to report back to me in 90 days with recommendations for possible federal action. They will review the ethical and legal implications as the basis for their deliberations, which will take place in open, public meetings. Each meeting will provide an opportunity for public input and education, which are crucial for reaching agreement on what we should do next. I will take NBAC's recommendations and develop proposals that will also require public comment before they become final.

Question:

What impact does the directive have on the private sector?

Answer:

The directive only covers work done by government scientists or in a federally funded laboratory. Therefore, I am also asking the scientific and medical communities to also refrain from cloning human beings at this time, until NBAC has had time for its deliberations. But, let me be clear, the majority of scientific experts believe that any prospect of successfully applying this cloning method to human beings in the near future is extremely remote.

Question:

Is animal research like the sheep experiment affected by the directive?

Answer:

No. The directive refers to the cloning of humans. The legislative ban also covers only human research. There is no ban, nor should there be any ban on animal cloning. There is very important scientific work that can be accomplished using animals. This work will have significant benefits for agriculture, medicine and veterinary medicine. It could also lead to improvements in organ transplantation and better treatments for burn victims or cancer patients. Also, by creating genetically identical animals, scientists testing drugs could use far fewer animals than they now need.

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Answer:

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In 1994, I directed NIH not to support the creation of human embryos for research purposes, and Congress extended this ban to cover other forms of human embryo research. However, neither of these prohibitions would clearly cover the creation of human embryos by cloning that are intended to be actually implanted in a womb and carried to term.

My directive today will make it clear that federal funds are not to be used for cloning humans.

Question:

Is this action really necessary? Are scientists really ready to clone human beings?

Answer:

While the majority of scientific experts believe that successfully cloning human beings is very unlikely in the near future -- we can not rule it out. It is important that we stop now and consider the ethical implications.

Question:

Would you support legislation to ban the cloning of humans?

Answer:

I think that legislation is premature at this time. I think that we need a serious, public discussion-- which I have asked NBAC to lead -- rather than hasty legislation.

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TALKING POINTS ON CBO ANALYSIS OF THE PRESIDENT'S FY 1998 BUDGET

Today, CBO clearly certified that the President's FY 1998 budget balances in 5 years. (See Table 6 of the CBO document) This is only the second time in 18 years that a budget submitted by a President reaches balance based on both Administration and Congressional estimates. (The first was President Clinton's FY 97 budget)

The bottom line is that CBO certifies that the President's budget reaches balance in 2002. So now both the Administration and CBO have concluded that our budget balances in 2002. The only remaining difference is whether or not we must undertake special measures -- such as a trigger mechanism to cut mandatory (except Social Security) and discretionary spending -- to achieve that goal.

No special measures will be necessary if our conservative economic assumptions prove to be accurate. We have a strong record on this front. For four years in a row, the deficit has been lower and growth has been higher than we had predicted. Since we took office, the actual deficit has on average been about \$50 billion lower than we had projected the year before. CBO has been less accurate: they have overestimated the deficit by \$59 billion on average. Furthermore, our current assumptions are equally prudent and conservative. Our estimates of GDP growth and inflation over the next 5 years are precisely the same as the Blue Chip private-sector consensus.

Even CBO Concedes "Slight Differences" Account for Almost Entire Gap Between Administration and CBO Baselines. To quote CBO: *"Although the Administration's economic projections are similar to CBO's projections that incorporate the effects of balancing the budget, slight differences in economic outlook essentially account for the entire \$60 billion difference in the baseline projections of the deficit in 2002."* [CBO, 3/3/97]

Today, the CBO certified that special measures we have identified would indeed bring the deficit down to zero. If our assumptions do not prove correct, we will pursue an expedited process with Congress to agree on how to close any budget gap. If that process breaks down, we have identified contingency measures to reach balance by 2002. Those measures include the sunseting of most of our tax provisions in 2001 and an across-the-board reduction in spending (except Social Security). The discretionary spending reductions would start in 2001 and the reductions in mandatory programs would begin in 2002. Today's CBO study shows that these measures -- which we believe will be unnecessary -- will work to bring the deficit down to zero.

Look How Far We Have Already Come. Two years ago, the President and Congress were embroiled in a budget battle that lasted straight into the next year. Last year, it took until mid April for CBO to certify that the President's plan reached balance. This year, the President proposed a balanced budget plan that for the first time since 1981, has been declared "alive on arrival." Now, CBO has certified that this plan reaches balance by 2002. The President's 1993 plan made the task of balancing the budget easier. That year, President Clinton inherited a record \$290 billion deficit. Four years later, the deficit has been cut 63% and is a smaller share of GDP than any other major economy in the world. Now, it's time to finish the job.

We Have Put a Real, Credible Plan on the Table. The President has submitted a balanced budget plan this year that even CBO certifies as being in balance by 2002. If some in Congress want to criticize that plan, they have an obligation to lay out a specific alternative. They should show how they would pay for

their tax cuts, what programs they would cut, how much they would invest in education, and how much they would cut Medicare and Medicaid.
