Clinton Administration Urges FCC to Investigate Hard Liquor Ads on TV and Radio

April 1, 1997

Announcement:

- Today, President Clinton is announcing that he is sending a letter to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Chairman Reed Hundt to: 1) explore the effects -- on children in particular-- of the distilled liquor industry's decision to end its 50-year voluntary ban on broadcast advertising; and 2) determine what actions the FCC should take in response to the lifting of the ban.

Background:

- In November 1996, the Distilled Spirits Council announced that it had ended its almost 50-year voluntary practice of refraining from broadcast advertising.
- In his November 9, 1996 radio address, the President urged broadcasters to follow the example of the four major broadcast networks and continue to honor the ban to keep liquor ads off the air. The President also said to liquor companies, "You were right for the last 50 years when you didn't advertise on television; you're wrong to change your policy now. This is no time to turn back."
- Although the major networks and cable companies have so far refused to accept distilled spirits advertising, a few liquor manufacturers have been able to run some ads on television and radio since the announcement; other liquor companies are currently preparing large advertising campaigns.
- Chairman Hundt also has opposed any move toward liquor advertising. In December, he challenged broadcasters to refuse liquor advertising, and indicated that "government action" might be appropriate if the broadcasters did not do so. An FCC inquiry can supply the information needed to evaluate the nature and extent of the problem posed by broadcast liquor ads and to consider appropriate action.

Alcohol Use by Youth

- Alcohol is the drug most often used by young people. Approximately one in four 10th grade students and one in three of 12th grade students report having had five or more drinks on at least one occasion during the last two weeks.
- Recent studies show a strong connection between underage drinking and violent youth crime, including murder and rape.

Clinton Administration: Reducing Youth Substance Abuse

- The President has pushed states to adopt a policy of zero-tolerance for teen drinking and driving or risk losing Federal highway funds.
- The President's fiscal year 1998 budget includes funding for a state demonstration program to drug-test teens before they receive their driver's licenses.

**Clinton Administration Urges FCC to Investigate
Hard Liquor Ads on TV and Radio
April 1, 1997**

Questions and Answers

Q. What is today's announcement?

A. Today, President Clinton is announcing that he is sending a letter to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Chairman Reed Hundt to: 1) explore the effects -- on children in particular-- of the distilled liquor industry's decision to end its 50-year voluntary ban on broadcast advertising; and 2) determine what actions the FCC should take in response to the lifting of the ban.

Q. Why are you announcing this now?

A. In February, Chairman Hundt again spoke out on the issue of liquor advertising. The President felt it was important to send a letter to the FCC to weigh in on this matter in view of the Chairman's recent comments.

In his radio address to the people last November, the President stated his firm opposition to the American liquor industry's decision to lift the voluntary ban on hard liquor advertising. At that time, President Clinton commended the major broadcast networks' commitment to honor the ban and keep liquor ads off the air.

While all of the major networks have upheld their pledge to refrain from such advertisements, hard liquor advertisements have appeared in the last few months on smaller broadcast and cable television stations, and radio stations.

Chairman Hundt has expressed interest in opening up an inquiry into such advertising, and the President decided that in light of recent events, he should strongly support this action.

Q. Why didn't the President go further and go after the beer and wine advertising as well?

A. First things first. The President's action today is meant to ensure that we don't backslide by allowing liquor advertising that will endanger our children. The President has mounted a full-scale assault on teenage drinking, for example by acting to make zero tolerance for teen drinking and driving the law of the land. The decision of the hard liquor industry runs counter to all these efforts, and we must act now to respond to it. The Administration is today asking the FCC to investigate the effects of liquor advertising on teen drinking and take appropriate action. This new and immediate threat merits immediate action; if the FCC's investigation reveals the

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need for still further action, the Administration will respond promptly. Parents have a hard enough time raising good kids; all of us have a responsibility to help make those jobs easier, not harder.

Q. Isn't this announcement minor league, especially since you're not going after the beer and wine industries?

A. No. Ask the parents whose children are at risk of underage drinking whether this announcement is minor-league. They know what the President knows -- that we must act now to prevent new threats to our children. The liquor industry's decision is irresponsible, and we must act now to respond to it. If the FCC investigation reveals the need for further action, the Administration stands ready to take it.

Q. What companies have already begun advertising on TV?

A. Several distillers, including Seagram and Allied-Domecq, whose brands include Kahlua and Hiram Walker products, have already hit the airwaves with commercials airing after 10 pm in selected markets.

Q. How many stations have started to run these advertisements?

A. A liquor industry source estimated that 50 cable and independent stations have agreed to air liquor advertisements. None of the major broadcast networks have yet agreed to air these commercials since the liquor industry announcement last November.

Q. What can the FCC do about the liquor industry's decision to advertise on radio and TV?

A. The letter the President is sending today asks the FCC Chairman to open an inquiry into the effects on children of liquor advertising. Once the FCC has investigated this matter, it can determine what further action is appropriate.

Q. How big of a problem is alcohol use by young people?

A. Alcohol is the drug most often used by young people. Approximately one in four 10th grade students and one in three 12th grade students report having had five or more drinks on at least one occasion during the last two weeks.

The average age when a person has a first drink has declined to 15.9 years old in 1993, down from the average in 1987 of 17.4 years old. According to the results of a 1995 national household survey, nearly 2 million young people rate themselves as "heavy" alcohol drinkers. It is further estimated that one-half of America's 2 million senior high school students drink monthly.

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Q. Is there any evidence which links hard liquor advertising and alcohol consumption?

A. This is what the President's letter is asking the FCC to explore-- what the effects will be of lifting the ban on hard liquor advertising. In determining the effects of lifting the ban, the FCC would be able to collect data on the link between advertising and children's consumption. However, the President's letter today does not predetermine the conclusion of the inquiry.

Q. How is this announcement similar to President Clinton's actions on tobacco advertising targeted at youth?

A. President Clinton firmly believes that we have a national obligation to act strongly to protect our children from threats to their health and safety. To this end, the President is sending a letter to inquire into the effects of hard liquor advertising on television on underage drinking, and to consider what actions are possible for the FCC to take in response to the lifting of the advertising ban.

The President fought to impose appropriate regulations on tobacco advertising that appeals to adolescents. Both actions highlight the President's commitment to help parents who are struggling to raise healthy and drug-free children.

For Discussion on Outcomes

By the time the Commission completes its work on January 20, 1998, you will have accomplished the following:

First, by heading this initiative through high-profile town hall meetings and a commission, you provided Presidential leadership that raised and sustained this issue to a height in the nation's psyche that it had not found except for discrete periods and only in times of trouble.

Second, despite the divisiveness that this issue often bears and bore in some cases over the past eight months, you framed and focused the debate with a positive, futuristic focus. Through this leadership and the commission, the country gained a genuine appreciation of racial diversity as one of America's true strengths.

Third, through your participation in the town hall meetings in particular, the country initiated, engaged and continues to engage in a far-reaching, constructive dialogue on racial issues between the races and among races.

Fourth, because of the commission's research, scholarship and public hearings, the American public received precise, accurate and concrete information on our racial history and destiny.

Fifth, due to the receipt of accurate and insightful information, the races gained a more accurate perception about themselves and how they perceive each other. This information brought the perception gap closer and debunked some of the myths and half-truths that have crept into the perceptions of one race's view of the other and itself.

Sixth, your leadership on this issue and the commission's work started a process that reversed, or at least halted, the disturbing trend of "resegregation" occurring throughout the nation.

Seventh, the commission provided concrete, specific recommendations for moving forward to achieve a nation that gains strength from its dynamic racial composition.

The commission will be charged with helping America prepare today for a 21st Century with a rapidly changing racial composition. Their task is to do the following:

- 1) help lead all Americans towards "One America" by bringing the races together through dialogue and education, and
- 2) raise and answer the tough questions facing an America with a dynamic and diverse population.

In particular, the commission could focus on the following areas as they affect our diverse nation: criminal justice system, education, housing, employment, melting pot tensions and economic issues. In fulfilling their charter, the commission will work to

- 1) heighten awareness of the importance of rising above race;
- 2) promote reconciliation;
- 3) confront negative stereotypes;
- 4) close the gap between the perceptions of the races;
- 5) encourage rational discourse on divisive issues;
- 6) provide an update on the state of race relations and discrimination in the U.S. today, including a report on our progress since the Kerner Commission;
- 7) provide recommendations for moving the country forward; and
- 8) offer a selection of realistic action items which you could pledge to pursue.

The Vice President and Secretary Riley will also be participating. California Superintendent Endorsement:

The California endorsement means that nearly 20 percent of the Nation's students are committed to participate in the standards and testing program. Superintendent Eastin's endorsement makes California the fourth state, after Maryland, Michigan, and North Carolina, along with the Department of Defense schools, to commit to participate in the national tests. California public schools serve over five million students, representing over 11% of the nation's public school enrollment.

Our understanding is that HHS is about ready to talk to the State -- maybe today or tomorrow -- and has a draft set of terms and conditions ready for discussion too.

The general asesment is that MD is in pretty good shape. The gist of MD is the same as Illinois -- the "guardianship" demo -- except that here a kid would only have to be in Foster Care for 6 months to be eligible for the guardianship benefit, versus 2 years in Illinois. From our end, this raises a question of whether there would be cost shifting from TANF to Foster Care. But since MD will have a control/comparison group and cost neutrality, I think the only issue is making sure that HHS will study the effect and that they will be able to measure it. They agree, and we will be working with them on the language to be sure.

The President has launched an aggressive campaign to challenge state legislatures, businesses, non-profits, and the faith community to take a leading role in helping move people from welfare to work:

- The President is traveling across the country to speak to state legislatures to challenge legislators to make welfare reform a success and to offer examples of what is working in other states and communities. Welfare reform was a central part of recent speeches in Maryland, Michigan, and North Carolina.
- The President is reaching out to employers large and small, challenging them to become involved in the welfare to work effort. The President initially spoke with a group of 14 CEOs interested in helping people move from welfare to work. During the State of the Union Address, the President announced commitments from five of these companies -- Sprint, Monsanto, UPS, Burger King, and United Airlines. The White House staff continues to speak with companies who have expressed interest in becoming involved.
- The President and Mrs. Clinton have met with religious leaders, including at the White House Prayer Breakfast and the Congressional Prayer breakfast, both times challenging the faith community to help with the welfare to work effort.
- The President's budget includes initiatives to **help companies and communities provide job opportunities for welfare recipients. His budget includes \$3 billion for a Welfare-to-Work Jobs Challenge to help communities move one million of the hardest-to-employ welfare recipients into jobs by the year 2000. To complement the \$3 billion Welfare-to-Work Jobs proposal, the FY 1998 Budget includes an enhanced and expanded Work Opportunity Tax Credit. First, the WOTC would be enhanced for long-term welfare recipients for three years. This credit would allow employers who hire welfare recipients to claim a 50 percent tax credit on the first \$10,000 of wages paid to that person for two years. Wages may include the cost of training, health insurance, and day care. Second, the WOTC would be expanded to make a new population -- 18-50 year olds made ineligible for food stamps -- eligible for the existing base credit for the next three years.**

Everyone thinks the HS service scholars is so good it should be a freestanding event later on; plus Gomperts left me a message that the search for more match is going "rotten."

I mentioned this anti-drug youth academy idea as a possible add-on if any or all of these ideas go south. People seemed interested, and I am trying to see how solid it is. (Ricia McMahon says it's extremely solid.)

Don asked Waldman to do some thinking about the speech at the summit itself, and call a meeting on it.

Let me know what you think. If you want to go ahead with highlighting Maryland, let me know if you want to call Townsend, or if I should.

Background on Standards and Testing in California

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Delaine Eastin's announcement of support for California's participation in your national standards and testing initiative comes against the backdrop of a difficult history to set standards and assess student progress in California over the past 5 years, as well as a major political battle with Governor Wilson over participation in Goals 2000. Her announcement will garner support among key segments of the education community (e.g., higher education, the AFT and NEA affiliates, the state PTA). It will also be played out in the press and in the political arena against the backdrop of recent battles and developments, including:

1. Gov. Wilson's cancellation of the California Learning Assessment System (CLAS) in 1994. The CLAS test, initially hailed as a model of new, performance-oriented assessments, was canceled by Gov. Wilson in 1994, only a few years after its initial administration. The testing program came under strong attack, especially by conservatives, for a number of reasons. A number of test questions were seen as focusing on values and invading student and family privacy, and some of the reading passages contained material some viewed as objectionable. The political outcry that was generated by these concerns overwhelmed the capacity of the Department of Education to defend the tests, and Gov. Wilson and the state legislature ended funding for the tests in 1994. Since that time, there has been no statewide testing in California, although local school districts continue to administer their own tests.

2. Establishment of a state standards commission. In 1995, Assembly Bill 265, with the support of both Gov. Wilson and Delaine Eastin, and over the opposition of conservative legislators, was enacted into law. The Act establishes a standards commission (2/3 of the members appointed by Gov. Wilson, 1/3 appointed by Delaine Eastin) charged with responsibility of developing model academic standards. The first standards, in Language Arts and Math at Grades 4, 8 and 10, are to be completed and presented to the State Board of Education in October 1997. Other subject areas will follow. These model standards will be the basis of statewide tests to be developed. The math and Language Arts tests will be available in 2001. However, unlike statewide tests in almost every other state, these tests will not produce individual student scores.

In addition, to encourage individual student testing, this legislation provides a \$5 per student state subsidy to local school districts that test all students using a state-approved test.

3. Delaine Eastin's Challenge Districts. In 1995, Delaine Eastin launched a standards-based challenge to local school districts in California, to adopt local standards and local assessments, and to be held accountable for year-to-year progress in reaching these standards. In exchange, the California Department of Education provides these districts with technical assistance, networking, and regulatory flexibility.

To support these local districts, and to shape the work of the standards commission discussed above, Delaine has worked with the higher education community and New Standards to develop

model standards. These standards, nearing completion, will be consistent with the NAEP and TIMSS frameworks that provide the foundation for the national tests.

Gov. Wilson's 9-month refusal to accept Goals 2000 funds. From July 1995 to March 1996, Gov. Wilson refused to permit California to accept Goals 2000 funds, because of unspecified concerns about "federal intrusion." This stance was well received among staunch conservatives in the state, including in the legislature. However, after increasing pressure from the education and business community, and considerable negative press, Gov. Wilson finally agreed to accept the funds after receiving assurances from Secretary Riley that this would not interfere with California's ability to control its own education system. California is now using most of its Goals 2000 funds to support an early reading initiative.

According to Larry Magid, the Natl. Governors Assn. will be sending a letter over later today asking that we drop the soft sanction provision. NGA routinely opposes sanctions, preferring positive incentives. (NEXTEA already provides for a positive incentive; the soft sanction would be an add-on .) Even though 11 states have primary seat belt laws and some governors have been outspoken in favor of them (Hunt, Glendenning), Larry thinks they won't object to an NGA position opposing sanctions.

In view of this opposition (and we may hear from some other states' rights groups), I assume we may want to send a decision memo to the President. I will draft one based largely on the DOT analysis I circulated earlier.

SUBJECT: WELFARE--TEXAS INTEGRATED ENROLLMENT PROJECT

As you know, Texas has asked for federal permission to issue a "request for offers" for a private company to operate an integrated enrollment system for Medicaid, Food Stamps, and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. Labor unions, particularly the public employees unions, strongly oppose any private sector role in the eligibility determination process.

We believe we must give Texas an answer immediately. The state has engaged in good faith discussions with various agencies for 9 months, and state officials are now publicly criticizing the Administration for the delay.

We believe we have a proposal which will break the stalemate, one which strikes a reasonable balance between allowing the state to explore innovative ways to deliver public services and ensuring beneficiaries' rights to assistance. As shown in the chart below, our plan would allow Texas to have private contractors obtain information and documentation needed to determine eligibility and assist an individual in completing an application for benefits. However, the final determination or "certification" of eligibility would be conducted by public sector employees.

Our plan would:

- Protect beneficiaries by ensuring only merit system employees, who are not subject to monetary or political pressures, determine benefit eligibility, consider appeals, and conduct quality control operations.
- Allow Texas to achieve program efficiencies through a bidding process. The Texas legislature, in authorizing the project in 1995, required any savings to be used to fund additional health and human services programs. The state estimates the savings will provide health care coverage for an additional 150,000 needy children.
- Apply to the Food Stamp program a definition of public and private responsibilities used successfully in Medicaid.
- Use waiver authority, which deems the project an experiment, allows for public comment, and enables us to limit the experiment to Texas or a handful of states.

We would allow the state of Texas to release a request for offers based on these principles. Once the state chooses among the bids, the state would be required to submit to us the proposed contract for approval.

Background on Texas Proposal

The new welfare law explicitly allows states to contract with private entities to administer Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Because of this new authority in TANF, some states are seeking new contracting authority for Medicaid and Food Stamps as well, so they can operate privately-run, one-stop eligibility centers. In addition to the Texas proposal discussed below, Wisconsin has submitted a proposal which would allow 10% of its welfare offices to be operated by private entities.

Federal agencies and the state of Texas have been negotiating since June 1996 over the state's proposal to privatize the administration of TANF, Medicaid, Food Stamps, and certain other federally-funded nutrition programs. The state legislature passed the plan with bipartisan support, with endorsements from Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and other leading Democrats. Under the Texas plan, private contractors would collect information about applicants (including by conducting interviews) and make eligibility determinations. The State would retain control over the appeals and quality control processes. An estimated 15,000 state jobs would be eliminated or transferred to the private sector. The state would require bidders to comment on whether they plan to hire displaced government workers. Such companies as Lockheed, EDS, and Arthur Anderson have indicated an interest in bidding.

Texas has argued that it cannot proceed with plans to contract out TANF (as allowed by the welfare law) unless the Administration allows private contracting for Food Stamps and Medicaid, because maintaining separate eligibility systems for these programs creates administrative difficulties. To take the most obvious problem, a dual system would require many individuals to go to one location to apply for TANF and another location to apply for Food Stamps and Medicaid. Texas wants a one-stop eligibility center.

Texas state officials are becoming increasingly impatient with HHS and USDA for not having ruled on their proposal. In a recent letter to HHS, state officials threatened to proceed with the project without Federal approval. State officials also point out that they have pledged to reinvest the savings from their plan in additional health and human services programs, and that these savings could provide health coverage for 150,000 Texas children. Rep. Charlie Stenholm, one of the Administration's strongest welfare reform allies, complained about the delay to Frank Raines in a February 24th letter, saying the state of Texas is "willing to make accommodations to address administration concerns." Secretary Shalala has promised Texas an answer by early April. Most recently, we heard from Rep. Stenholm's office and from Gary Mauro that Texas would accept modifications of its proposal as long as we allow the State to go forward with releasing a "request for offers" ("RFO") to potential bidders.

Labor leaders would like us to refuse the Texas request entirely. They see even limited privatization as a dangerous precedent and have made clear that they view this decision as critically important to public employee unions.

Recommendation

All the relevant agencies and White House offices agree that the Administration should draw the line on the basis of our existing Medicaid policy, which allows privatization of some but not all administrative functions. Under this approach, the application, interview, and other information-gathering can be done by private employees; the eligibility determination itself, as well as appeals and quality control, must remain in the hands of public employees. In addition, the Administration should ensure that contracts protect against the possibility that private firms will use procedures that lead to inappropriate denials -- or, as OMB notes, inappropriate grants -- of program benefits.

This general approach has both strong precedent and good sense behind it. The Medicaid program already allows private hospital workers to do intake and eligibility work, up to the point of actually determining eligibility. Allowing privatization of these functions, conditioned on appropriate contract incentives and safeguards, strikes the right balance between allowing states to explore innovative ways to deliver public services and ensuring that beneficiaries' rights are protected. There is little doubt that this approach will displace some state workers and displease public employee unions. But we have crossed this bridge already in Medicaid and other contexts; for example, the Department of Labor has granted a waiver to Massachusetts to contract out all employment services and is prepared to do the same for other states as well.

In line with this view, we recommend that we inform Texas of the principles we will apply in reviewing any privatization scheme and give formal permission to the State to issue its RFO. Once the State accepts a bid, we will review whether the contract appropriately accords with our principles. This approach gives Texas a lot less than it asked for, but allows the State to proceed with some reforms. It preserves a role for public employees, but will still anger the unions.

We appreciate the opportunity to comment on the draft whitepaper on welfare caseloads. Below are comments, both general and specific. Please let me know if more detailed comments, in the text itself, would be helpful.

Release of Report

Since caseload numbers for January 1997 will soon be available, we would like you to hold the release of the whitepaper so the two can be released together. The January 1997 numbers, which will show the caseload change during the Administration's first four years, will probably generate a fair amount of interest, and it seems to us to make sense to release the explanation of why caseloads have declined along with the latest data.

Model

We believe that the model, as constructed, may exaggerate the effect of the economy relative to policy initiatives. Specifically, the model leaves out certain policy initiatives which may correlate with a good economy or which could help explain some of the "unexplained" 26%.

For example, there have been large increases in Earned Income Tax Credit, child support collections, and overall (federal plus state) child care spending since 1993, all of which helped encourage people to leave the welfare rolls.

In general, the paper doesn't explain well why there is a 26% "unexplained" portion. Could the fact that you counted only state-wide waivers have increased the "noise" in the model?

We think the paper should discuss some obvious suspects, like public attention to welfare reform because of national and state debates, EITC, child care, etc.

Description

The discussion of "advanced responses" of the waivers (p. 5 and 10) misses an important point -- in order to apply for and obtain a waiver, states had to have a plan endorsed by their legislatures. Thus, a state like New Jersey had already passed a state law calling for the changes before it obtained the necessary waivers. The debate and passage of the new laws usually would get a lot of publicity, and there was little public recognition that the laws would not be implemented until the federal government gave permission. Thus the "advance response" isn't as much of a mystery as you imply. Similarly, the attention to welfare reform given during and immediately after the welfare bill signing seems to in and of itself contributed to a decrease in caseloads.

Also, speculating about the effects of the new law ("Implications for Welfare Reform" section) is outside the scope of the analysis and does not fit comfortably in an Administration document. It should be dropped.

Data Used in Report

Because of the parameters of the analysis, the whitepaper uses some data that is different than those commonly cited by the Administration. For example, the paper examines only 35 statewide waivers, while the Administration has repeatedly cited the fact that it has given waivers to 43 states. Also, the whitepaper uses decline in the percentage of the population on welfare through September 1996, while we are about to release data re: the percentage decline in the caseload through January 1997. I think the paper should refer to the more commonly used statistics at least once to help clarify potential confusion.

Also, rounding is applied inconsistently, making 42% into "almost half" but 32% into "almost a third." 42% seems a lot closer to two-fifth than to one-half. Also, page 5 says "45 percent" of caseload decline can be attributed to economic growth, and "roughly 30 percent" to federal welfare waivers.
