(a) Each State's estimate must factor out any caseload decreases due to Federal requirements or State changes ~~since FY 1995 that affect an individual's eligibility for assistance. These include:~~

~~(1) Changes in eligibility rules since FY 1995 that directly affect a family's eligibility for benefits (e.g., more stringent income and resource limitations or time limits); and~~

~~(2) Procedural changes that have the effect of significantly delaying or denying eligibility (e.g., documentation requirements that create obstacles to the receipt of assistance).~~

A State need not factor out calculable the effects of enforcement mechanisms or procedural requirements that are used to enforce existing eligibility criteria (e.g., fingerprinting or other verification techniques) to the extent such mechanisms or requirements identify or deter families that were ineligible under existing eligibility rules.

Preamble language for Section 271.42

Thus, we propose to give States credit for caseload reductions except when those caseload reductions arise from two kinds of changes in eligibility: (1) changes in eligibility rules that directly affect a family's eligibility for benefits (e.g., more stringent income and resource limitations or time limits); or (2) changes in procedural conditions of eligibility that also have a direct and significant effect on caseloads by delaying or denying eligibility ~~(e.g., documentation requirements that create extra obstacles or delay receipt of benefits).~~

Under this approach, we would not give States credit for caseload reductions due to new procedural requirements where such requirements served simply as an obstacle that had the effect of keeping to keep eligible families from seeking or receiving assistance. We would allow States to get caseload reduction credit where they can show (through actual case studies, sampling, or other reliable techniques) that new enforcement mechanisms or procedural requirements (such as fingerprinting or other verification techniques) have resulted in the identification of families that were ineligible under existing eligibility rules, or the deterrence of such families from applying for benefits. ~~In making this distinction, States could report the actual number of cases identified as fraudulently seeking benefits or they could use a sample to determine what percentage of cases were deterred because they were ineligible (and not accurately reporting their circumstances). Unless a State provided documented evidence that cases were diverted from the rolls due to fraud or misreporting, we would exclude all cases diverted from the rolls by procedural requirements from the State's caseload reduction credit.~~

Through this policy approach, we are seeking to achieve the balance identified by Congress: that a State should receive credit for moving families off welfare, including by detecting and preventing fraud, but should not be able to avoid its accountability for work as a result of any changes that restrict program eligibility.

***Labor-HHS-Education Budget Victories
An Historic Investment in Educational Opportunity***

November 12, 1997

Now I ask you -- and I ask all our nation's governors; I ask parents, teachers, and citizens all across America -- for a new nonpartisan commitment to education -- because education is a critical national security issue for our future, and politics must stop at the schoolhouse door.
President Clinton, State of the Union Address, February 4, 1997

The Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations bill which the President signed today meets our national commitment to expand educational opportunities for all students. In addition to an 8% increase in Head Start, the bill increases discretionary funding for Education Department programs by more than \$3.2 billion over FY 1997 -- \$200 million more than the President won in the Balanced Budget Agreement. Overall, the bill represents the largest increase in America's national education investment in thirty years. The bill also contains an important agreement allowing continued progress toward high national standards and voluntary national tests in the basics of reading and math.

HELPING YOUNG CHILDREN GET READY TO LEARN

Head Start

The legislation includes the President's \$324 million (8%) [**Barry had \$374 million over the FY 1997 level**] increase in Head Start, allowing 836,000 children to be served. With this increase, Head Start funding will have increased 55% since 1993, continuing progress toward the President's goal of serving one million children.

HELPING STUDENTS MASTER THE BASICS AND ADVANCED SKILLS

Voluntary National Tests

The bill allows continued development of the 4th and 8th grade national tests, and shifts control over test policies and development to the independent, bipartisan, National Assessment Governing Board (NAGB), as the Administration had proposed. The bill provides \$16 million dollars to support the testing plan, and allows for pilot testing of test items to begin next fall. The bill also provides for a study of ways to link state tests to each other and to NAEP, an existing national sample test, that reflects high national standards.

America Reads

The Corporation for National and Community Service -- *AmeriCorps* -- won an increase of \$64 million in the two bills that fund the program. This is more than a 10 percent increase, a stark contrast to the *31 percent cut* in the House versions of the bills, and more

than the increases provided by the Senate. The new funds will be used to expand the America Reads program, connecting AmeriCorps members with schools to recruit and coordinate trained volunteers to provide children with the extra practice they need to learn to read well and independently by the end of third grade.

The bill also provides for \$210 million in FY 1999 for the America Reads Challenge legislation that is currently moving through Congress. In addition, funds are provided in FY 1998 to help train college work-study tutors.

Technology Literacy Challenge Fund and Technology Innovation Challenge Grants

The technology education programs -- which were protected in the Balanced Budget Agreement -- received a *91 percent increase*, from \$305 million to \$545 million. That is \$39 million *more* than the President proposed. These programs are designed to facilitate school access to the Internet and equip teachers with skills needed to integrate computers into their classroom instruction.

Charter Schools

President Clinton's public charter schools program received a *57 percent increase*, from \$51 million to \$80 million. This program provides start-up funding for public schools that parents, teachers, and communities create -- and that States free from most rules and regulations and instead holds them accountable for raising student achievement. The increase will help accelerate progress towards the President's goal of developing 3,000 new charter schools by early in the next century.

After-School Learning Centers

This *new investment* of \$40 million will help extend learning opportunities for children and their families at schools across the country, keeping schools open late, on weekends, and in the summer so young people will stay off the streets and out of trouble.

Comprehensive School Reform

The bill includes \$150 million in *new funds* for an initiative, supported by the President, to help low-achieving, low-income schools transform themselves through proven reforms, addressing failing schools without abandoning public education.

Bilingual and Immigrant Education

The bill includes a *35 increase* in bilingual and immigrant education secured by the President in the Balanced Budget Agreement. This victory, increasing total funding to \$354 million, will help more children master learn English and prepare to meet the same challenging academic standards as all other students.

IDEA

The bill strengthens our nation's 20-year commitment to disabled children and their parents, providing \$4.4 billion dollars for special education -- an increase of *\$775 million* over FY 1997.

Goals 2000

The bill provides \$491 million for the President's Goals 2000 school reform program. Communities in every state are using Goals 2000 funds to upgrade curriculum, improve teaching, increase parental involvement in schools, and make greater use of computers in the classroom. Since 1994, over \$1.3 billion has been invested in this vital initiative.

Title I

The bill provides nearly \$7.4 billion to support extra help in basic and advanced skills for more than ten million disadvantaged students in elementary and secondary schools. Under the Clinton Administration, investment in Title I has grown by over \$ 1 billion.

HELPING STUDENTS GET A COLLEGE EDUCATION AND CONTINUE LEARNING FOR A LIFETIME

Pell Grants

Congress adopted President Clinton's proposal to increase the maximum Pell Grant by \$300 to \$3,000 -- *the largest increase in two decades.* In addition, the program was expanded to serve an additional 210,000 low-income students who have been denied Pell Grants because of anomalies in the design of the program.

HOPE Modification to Enhance Eligibility for Financial Aid

At the last minute, appropriators added the President's proposal to ensure that families' eligibility for Federal financial aid is not reduced as a result of the tax cuts for higher education. This was a part of the Administration's original HOPE Scholarship proposal, but was not included in the recent tax legislation. In addition, a provision was added to reduce the interest rate on consolidation loans in the guaranteed student loan program to match the lower rate which has been offered under direct lending, and to allow consolidations into either program.

OTHER VICTORIES

The bill fully funds the Education Department's Office for Civil Rights; meets the President's request for increases for Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Hispanic-Serving Institutions; increases funding for teacher training in the Eisenhower Professional Development program; and maintains our investments in School-to-Work,

Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities, College Work-Study, and other education programs. The bill also includes [increased support for *Opportunity Areas for Out-of-School Youth*][?].

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 /PRNewswire/ -- The Rev. Fred Phelps, who brandishes signs such as "God Hates Fags" and declares that homosexuals are beyond redemption, "is promoting a viewpoint that conflicts with Christian teaching," Family Research Council's Director of Cultural Studies Robert H. Knight said Monday. "Mr. Phelps' public pronouncements were seen most recently outside the Human Rights Campaign dinner on Saturday night and magnified by national media coverage. His contention that certain people are automatically excluded from the possibility of God's grace is unbiblical. In 1 Corinthians 6:9-10, homosexuals are included in a list of sinners, who, if unrepentant, will not inherit the kingdom of God. Verse 11 says, however, 'And that is what some of you were. ...'

"The implication," Knight added, "is clearly that the apostle Paul's followers included former homosexuals. So where do Mr. Phelps and his group come off saying that these people are unworthy of the same salvation that he claims to have? God does condemn homosexuality, but he doesn't 'hate' homosexuals. We believe that he wants them to change -- like any other sinners.

"We regret that Mr. Phelps has offered the media a crude caricature of Christian resistance to the homosexual agenda. His views do not represent those of Family Research Council or any other pro-family organization with which we work. While we share Mr. Phelps' opposition to homosexual activism we believe that homosexual individuals deserve compassion and are capable of hope, healing and salvation. We also call on the leaders of the Human Rights Campaign and other homosexual activists to expunge the word 'hate' from their regular discourse. We respect them as individuals even though we are compelled to resist their agenda. Their

personal attacks on people who disagree with their point of view are unwarranted and divisive," Knight said. "Recasting a sincere policy disagreement as simply a form of 'hate,' as some participants at the White House Conference on Hate Crimes this week have often done, is a flagrant breach of civility and an attempt to intimidate individuals who merely seek to exercise their freedoms of speech and conscience.

"Personal testimonies from former homosexuals can be seen and heard on our new video documentary: Hope & Healing: Stories of Coming Out of Homosexuality. A companion booklet, also entitled Hope & Healing, offers an authentic Christian approach of ministering to people struggling with homosexuality," Knight concluded.

U.S. Chamber of Commerce President Tom Donahue appeared with the President today to urge the hundreds of thousands of companies who belong to over 3,000 chambers of commerce nationwide to join the Welfare to Work Partnership and look to welfare recipients to fill critical labor shortages.

President Unveils New Results-Focussed Welfare to Work Rules

The President today unveiled new federal welfare reform rules which underscore his commitment to work and welfare reform. The rules provide additional guidance to states operating the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) welfare reform program and to states and localities receiving Welfare to Work (WtW) grants enacted in the Balanced Budget Act.

The new rules uphold the law's strong emphasis on work by underscoring the importance of the law's work participation rates. Under the TANF program enacted last year, states must put an increasing percentage of adults to work each year (25 percent of all families must work in fiscal year 1997 rising to 50 percent in 2002; 75 percent of two parent families must work in 1997, rising to 90 percent in 1999). The rules announced today provide a clear and firm structure of penalties for those states that do not meet these critical work rules. States that fail the work participation rates will be assessed penalties based on degree of noncompliance. They will then be given an opportunity to correct the violation -- and if they do not make substantial progress, then they will receive a financial penalty (up to 5 percent of their welfare block grant). By law, states that are penalized must expend more of their own funds to make up the penalty amount, to ensure that families are not short-changed.

The new welfare rules do recognize that some welfare recipients may, at a given time, be unable to join the work force. For example, the rules allow states to grant temporary waivers from the work rules for victims of domestic violence who are unable at that point to work, but only if they provide services to help those individuals prepare for work and become self-sufficient. States that fail the work participation rates because they grant such good cause domestic violence waivers will be eligible for reasonable cause exceptions from the penalties.

The new welfare rules ensure that states and localities have the flexibility they need to design welfare to work initiatives that meet individual needs and local conditions. Both the TANF and Welfare to Work rules provide tremendous flexibility to state and local governments to decide what programs and services will best help families become self-sufficient.

Both the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) regulations (issued by the Department of Health and Human Services) and the Welfare to Work (WtW) regulations (issued by the Department of Labor) will be published in the Federal Register this week for 60 days of public comment.

Barry White walked a few of us through the welfare entitlement issues in the budget. Here are a few key items:

They are wondering whether to propose any more legal immigrant benefit restorations, and what piece of the remaining cuts would be the best candidate for restoration. Ideas were food stamps for children, (either all or just those who were here when the law was signed) and additional SSI restorations. They didn't have a position on this yet.

USDA wants \$4billion for a new proposal ("Children's Hunger Initiative for Learning and Development"), an expansion of school breakfast for families with income over 185% of poverty. OMB was quite negative on this, arguing there is no link between this investment and any outcome.

They mentioned the work we are doing on child support systems requirements/penalties that would have budget implications.

They might put a legislative proposal in the budget to ensure that we don't lose child support collections due to the TANF separate state programs problem. They raised the possibility that, depending on the outcome of the TANF reg discussion, we could add in work requirements for separate state programs.

They are concerned that Congress may want to raid welfare research funds for other purposes, and said we need a strategy to defend these dollars.

There were several smaller items I can go over with Cynthia. Since Jen Klein wasn't there, I believe they plan to meet again to discuss child care.

Labor-HHS-Education Budget Victories Hex-Dump Conversion
An Historic Investment in Educational Opportunity

November 13, 1997

Now I ask you -- and I ask all our nation's governors; I ask parents, teachers, and citizens all across America -- for a new nonpartisan commitment to education -- because education is a critical national security issue for our future, and politics must stop at the schoolhouse door.

President Clinton, State of the Union Address, February 4, 1997

The Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations bill which the President signed today meets our national commitment to expand educational opportunities for all students. In addition to an 8% increase in Head Start, the bill increases discretionary funding for Education Department programs by more than \$3.2 billion over FY 1997 -- \$200 million more than the President won in the Balanced Budget Agreement. Overall, the bill represents the largest increase in America's national education investment in thirty years. The bill also contains an important agreement allowing continued progress toward high national standards and voluntary national tests in the basics of reading and math.

HELPING YOUNG CHILDREN GET READY TO LEARN

Head Start

The legislation includes the President's \$324 million (8%) [**Barry had \$374 million over the FY 1997 level**] increase in Head Start, allowing 836,000 children to be served. With this increase, Head Start funding will have increased 55% since 1993, continuing progress toward the President's goal of serving one million children.

RAISING STANDARDS: HELPING STUDENTS MASTER THE BASICS AND ADVANCED SKILLS

Voluntary National Tests

The bill allows continued development of national tests in 4th grade reading and 8th grade math, based on widely accepted national standards used in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). It shifts control over test policies and development to the independent, bipartisan, National Assessment Governing Board (NAGB), as the Administration had proposed. The bill provides \$16 million to support the testing plan, and allows for pilot testing of test items to begin next Fall. The bill also provides for a feasibility study to determine if existing state tests can be linked to the NAEP standards, and to each other.

America Reads

The Corporation for National and Community Service -- *AmeriCorps* -- won an increase

of \$64 million in the two bills that fund the program. This is more than a 10 percent increase, a stark contrast to the *31 percent cut* in the House versions of the bills, and more than the increases provided by the Senate. The new funds will be used to expand the America Reads program, connecting AmeriCorps members with schools to recruit and coordinate trained volunteers to provide children with the extra practice they need to learn to read well and independently by the end of third grade.

The bill also provides for \$210 million in FY 1999 for the America Reads Challenge legislation that is currently moving through Congress. In addition, funds are provided in FY 1998 to help train college work-study tutors.

Technology Literacy Challenge Fund and Technology Innovation Challenge Grants

The technology education programs -- which were protected in the Balanced Budget Agreement -- received a *91 percent increase*, from \$305 million to \$545 million. That is \$39 million *more* than the President proposed. These programs are designed to facilitate school access to the Internet and equip teachers with skills needed to integrate computers into their classroom instruction.

Charter Schools

President Clinton's public charter schools program received a *57 percent increase*, from \$51 million to \$80 million. This program provides start-up funding for public schools that parents, teachers, and communities create -- and that States free from most rules and regulations and instead holds them accountable for raising student achievement. The increase will help accelerate progress towards the President's goal of developing 3,000 new charter schools by early in the next century.

After-School Learning Centers

This *new investment* of \$40 million will help extend learning opportunities for children and their families at schools across the country, keeping schools open late, on weekends, and in the summer so young people will stay off the streets and out of trouble.

Comprehensive School Reform

The bill includes \$150 million in *new funds* for an initiative, supported by the President, to help low-achieving, low-income schools transform themselves through proven reforms, addressing failing schools without abandoning public education.

Bilingual and Immigrant Education

The bill includes a *35 increase* in bilingual and immigrant education secured by the President in the Balanced Budget Agreement. This victory, increasing total funding to \$354 million, will help more children master learn English and prepare to meet the same challenging academic standards as all other students.

IDEA

The bill strengthens our nation's 20-year commitment to disabled children and their parents, providing \$4.4 billion dollars for special education -- an increase of *\$775 million* over FY 1997.

Goals 2000

The bill provides \$491 million for the President's Goals 2000 school reform program. Communities in every state are using Goals 2000 funds to upgrade curriculum, improve teaching, increase parental involvement in schools, and make greater use of computers in the classroom. Since 1994, over \$1.3 billion has been invested in this vital initiative.

Title I

The bill provides nearly \$7.4 billion to support extra help in basic and advanced skills for more than ten million disadvantaged students in elementary and secondary schools. Under the Clinton Administration, investment in Title I has grown by over \$ 1 billion.

HELPING STUDENTS GET A COLLEGE EDUCATION AND CONTINUE LEARNING FOR A LIFETIME

Pell Grants

Congress adopted President Clinton's proposal to increase the maximum Pell Grant by \$300 to \$3,000 -- *the largest increase in two decades*. In addition, the program was expanded to serve an additional 210,000 low-income students who have been denied Pell Grants because of anomalies in the design of the program.

HOPE Modification to Enhance Eligibility for Financial Aid

At the last minute, appropriators added the President's proposal to ensure that families' eligibility for Federal financial aid is not reduced as a result of the tax cuts for higher education. This was a part of the Administration's original HOPE Scholarship proposal, but was not included in the recent tax legislation. In addition, a provision was added to reduce the interest rate on consolidation loans in the guaranteed student loan program to match the lower rate which has been offered under direct lending, and to allow consolidations into either program.

OTHER VICTORIES

The bill fully funds the Education Department's Office for Civil Rights; meets the President's request for increases for Historically Black Colleges and Universities and

Hispanic-Serving Institutions; increases funding for teacher training in the Eisenhower Professional Development program; and maintains our investments in School-to-Work, Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities, College Work-Study, and other education programs. The bill also includes [increased support for *Opportunity Areas for Out-of-School Youth*][?].

With this \$374 million increase, Head Start funding will have increased 57% since 1993. The program will serve an estimated 836,000 children in 1998.

RAISING STANDARDS: HELPING STUDENTS MASTER THE BASICS AND ADVANCED SKILLS

Continues Development of Voluntary National Tests. The bill allows continued development of national tests in 4th grade reading and 8th grade math, based on widely accepted national standards used in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). It shifts control over test policies and development to the independent, bipartisan, National Assessment Governing Board (NAGB), as the Administration had proposed. The bill provides \$16 million to support the testing plan, and allows for pilot testing of test items to begin next Fall. The bill also provides for a feasibility study to determine if existing state tests can be linked to the NAEP standards, and to each other.

Provides Funding for the America Reads Challenge. The bill provides \$301 million in new America Reads funding. This builds on current AmeriCorps tutoring efforts, and more than 800 colleges that have committed to using Federal work-study slots tutoring children who need help in reading.

- AmeriCorps and the senior volunteer programs won an increase of \$64 million in the two bills that fund National Service program (\$39 million in the bill being signed today). This will fund more than 3000 AmeriCorps members and senior volunteers who will recruit more than 100,000 volunteer tutors.
- State teacher training and family literacy efforts are increased a total of \$47 million, and \$5 million is provided to help provide training for tutors.
- \$210 million for pending legislation based on the President's America Reads initiative. The House version of that legislation -- promoting tutoring, family literacy, and teacher training -- passed the House with the Administration's support on November 8.

Brings Technology to the Classroom. Technology education programs received a *91 percent increase*, from \$305 million to \$545 million, including:

- *Technology Literacy Challenge Fund.* The bill provides \$425 million, more than twice as much as the \$200 million appropriated last year, to help States, communities, and schools acquire hardware, software, and connectivity linkages; provide professional development in the integration of technology into the curriculum; and apply technology to support school reform efforts and opportunities for all students.
- *Technology Innovation Challenge Grants.* The bill includes \$106 million--a 41 percent increase over last year's level of \$75 million--to support 15 new projects focused on delivering the most effective training for teachers in using educational technologies, as well as 62 existing projects involving a wide range of innovative strategies for improving teaching and learning and increasing student access to technology.

Expands Choice and Accountability in Public Schools. President Clinton's Public Charter Schools Program received a *57 percent increase*, from \$51 million to \$80 million. This program provides start-up funding for public schools that parents, teachers, and communities create -- and that States free from most rules and regulations and instead holds them accountable for raising student achievement. By the end of next year, the Department of Education will be funding nearly 1,000 locally-designed charter schools, accelerating progress toward the President's goal of developing 3,000 new charter schools by early in the next century.

Supports Certification of Master Teachers. The bill includes \$18.5 million in support of the President's plan to help 100,000 teachers nationwide seek certification as Master Teachers by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

Provides After-School Opportunities for Children. The bill dramatically expands support for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers program, providing \$40 million to support hundreds of after-school centers in rural and urban schools across the country that will provide academic enrichment, tutoring, and other learning opportunities while giving students a safe haven during the often-dangerous after-school hours.

Supports Strategies for Transforming Failing Schools. The bill includes \$150 million in *new funds* for an initiative, supported by the President, to help low-achieving, low-income schools transform themselves through proven reforms, addressing failing schools without abandoning public education. Will help almost 3,000 schools implement successful reforms.

Helps Children Learn English. The bill includes a 35% increase in bilingual and immigrant education secured by the President in the Balanced Budget Agreement. The bilingual education funding will help school districts teach English to more than a million limited English proficient children, as well as provide some 4,000 teachers with the training they need to do their jobs better. The Immigrant Education program will help more than a thousand school districts provide supplemental instructional services to 875,000 recent immigrant students.

Helps Children with Special Needs. This bill appropriates \$3.8 billion for Special Education Grants to States, an increase of \$700 million that will raise the Federal share of serving about 6 million children with disabilities by 19 percent. This increase will help States and school districts improve educational results for children with disabilities and help these children meet high standards, as called for by the recently enacted Individuals with Disabilities Act Amendments of 1997.

Promotes High Standards for All Children. **The bill provides \$491 million for the President's Goals 2000 school reform program.** Communities in every state are using Goals 2000 funds to upgrade curriculum, improve teaching, increase parental involvement in schools, and make greater use of computers in the classroom. Since 1994, over \$1.3 billion has been invested in this vital initiative.

Funds Extra Assistance for Low-Income Schools and Students. The bill provides nearly \$7.4 billion in Title I to support extra help in basic and advanced skills for more than ten million disadvantaged students in elementary and secondary schools. Under the Clinton Administration, investment in Title I has grown by over \$1 billion.

HELPING STUDENTS GET A COLLEGE EDUCATION AND CONTINUE LEARNING FOR A LIFETIME

Increases Pell Grant Award to \$3,000 Maximum. Congress adopted President Clinton's proposal to increase the maximum Pell Grant to \$3,000 -- *the largest increase in two decades.*

Approximately 3.7 million students will receive the \$300 increase, and an additional 214,000 low- and moderate-income families that were not previously eligible will receive Pell Grants.

Protects Families' Financial Aid Eligibility. The bill includes the President's proposal to ensure that families' eligibility for Federal financial aid is not reduced as a result of the tax cuts for higher education. This was a part of the Administration's original HOPE Scholarship proposal, but was not included in the recent tax legislation.

Reduces Student Loan Interest Rate. A one-year provision will reduce the interest rate on consolidation loans in the guaranteed student loan program to match the lower rate which has been offered under direct lending, and will allow old loans to be consolidated into either program.

STRENGTHENING OUR NATION'S COMMITMENT TO EQUITY IN EDUCATION

Fully Funds Office for Civil Rights. The bill fully funds the Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights, meeting the President's request for a 12% increase in order to protect America's students from illegal discrimination in education.

Increases Funding for Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Hispanic Serving Institutions. The bill meets the President's request for increases for both Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Hispanic-Serving Institutions, providing greater support for these vital postsecondary institutions.

OTHER VICTORIES

The bill also maintains our investments in Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities, School-to-Work Opportunities, College Work-Study, and other education priorities.

Attached is what we sent to HHS. It finally dawned on OMB that the penalties most strongly linked to child support (misuse of funds and the one related to child support) are not that likely to be imposed and therefore not that strong a disincentive for states. So they asked to piggyback onto our chosen penalties for work for the most part. We told them HHS may argue that there is no link between some of those penalties and child support.

REG LANGUAGE:

271.51: Degree of Non-Compliance and 272.5 -- Reasonable Cause Exception

Here is the language HHS has already agreed to:

We will not forgive the state penalty under 272.1(a)(4) [work participation rate penalty] based on reasonable cause unless a state demonstrates as part of its reasonable cause application that it has not diverted cases to a separate state program for the purpose of avoiding the TANF work participation requirements.

Possible revision:

Work: We will not forgive the state penalty under 272.1(a)(4), 272.1(a)(9), 272.1(a)(11), or 272.1(a)(14) based on reasonable cause if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of avoiding the work participation rates.

[Note: 4 penalties above are work participation, time limit, failure to maintain assistance to parent who can't get child care for child under 6, and failure to sanction individuals who refuse to work.]

Child Support: We will not forgive the state penalty under 272.1(a)(4), 272.1(a)(6), 272.1(a)(9), or 272.1(a)(14) based on reasonable cause if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of preventing the federal collection of child support.

[Note: 4 penalties above are work participation, failure to require individuals to cooperate with child support rules, time limit, and failure to sanction individuals who refuse to work.]

272.6(I) -- "Some or all" of penalty after corrective compliance plan fails:

Work: We will not reduce the penalty under 272.1(a)(4), 272.1(a)(9), 272.1(a)(11), or 272.1(a)(14) if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of avoiding the work participation rates.

Child Support: We will not reduce the state penalty under 272.1(a)(4), 272.1(a)(6), 272.1(a)(9), or 272.1(a)(14) if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of preventing the federal collection of child support.

[Note: same penalties as under reasonable cause.]

PREAMBLE LANGUAGE:

In several places where we discuss penalties, we note that we will not forgive certain penalties due to reasonable cause, reduce certain penalties after a corrective compliance fails, or reduce the work participation rate penalty based on the degree of non-compliance if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of avoiding the work participation rates. The same is true for certain other penalties if we detect a significant pattern of diversion of families to a separate state program that achieves the effect of preventing the federal collection of child support.

We plan to monitor states' actions to determine if they constitute a significant pattern of diversion. For example, if we came to the conclusion through an examination of statistical or other evidence that a state was assigning people to a separate state program in order to prevent federal collection of child support, or in order to evade the work requirements, we would conclude that this is a significant pattern of diversion, and would deny that state certain types of penalty relief.

A state would be permitted the opportunity to prove that this pattern was actually the result of state policies and objectives that were entirely unrelated to the goal of diversion, but we would make the final judgment as to what constitutes a significant pattern of diversion.

THE WHITE HOUSE
NOVEMBER 13, 1997**

Six years ago, I set forth a vision to keep the American Dream alive for every person willing to work for it ... to keep America the world's strongest force for peace, freedom and prosperity ... to bring all of us together across the lines that divide us into One America. That vision is coming alive all across our country. Our economy is the strongest in a generation. Crime, welfare, unemployment are falling. But we must continue to move forward.

I believe the best way to sustain and build on our progress is to provide all Americans a world-class education. In my State of the Union Address, I challenged all Americans to join me in a non-partisan effort to make sure every 8-year old can read, every 12-year old can log on to the Internet, every 18-year old can go to college, and all Americans can keep learning throughout their lifetimes. These must be America's central education goals. And they are at the heart of my 10-point Call to Action for American Education.

Now, less than a year after I issued that challenge, America and Congress have answered the call. By signing this bill into law, I am signing into the record books the best year for American education in over a generation.

First and foremost, we are taking historic steps to make sure that every child in America can meet high, national standards of academic achievement -- so that every child can master the basics. This bill represents a breakthrough for national standards. For the first time, we will have workable and generally agreed upon standards in reading and math. And for the first time, we will have voluntary national tests to measure performance in fourth grade reading and eighth grade math -- and Congress has voted to support the development of these tests. The tests will be created by an independent, bipartisan organization, and they will be piloted in schools next fall.

The importance of this cannot be overstated. We must demand high academic achievement from all our children. Our children will rise to the expectations set for them. We know that every child can meet high standards -- and with these tests, we will see to it that they do. I thank Sen. Bingaman, Rep. Miller and everyone who worked across party lines to forge this essential progress in American education.

We are also taking concrete steps to help our children meet these standards and help every 8-year old read on his or her own. This bill expands the America Reads Challenge and strengthens the partnership between AmeriCorps members and schools to recruit trained literacy volunteers. All of us can give our children the practice and extra attention they need to read by the end of third grade.

Second, this bill will take significant steps to ensure that every 12-year old logs onto the Internet. This bill nearly doubles our national commitment to technology education. We are well on the way to connecting every classroom and library to the Information Superhighway by the Year 2000. And when we do, a child in the poorest inner-city neighborhood or the most isolated rural community will have the same access to the same information as a child in the wealthiest suburb, for the very first time.

Third, this bill -- along with the college tuition tax cuts I signed into law this summer -- will make it possible for every 18 year old who is willing to work for it to go to college. The measure I sign into law today includes the largest increase in Pell Grants scholarships in two decades, raising the maximum grant and serving an additional 214,000 students. I have said that our mission must be to make the 13th and 14th years of education as universal as high school is today. With all of these investments, the doors of college have been thrown open wider than ever before.

Taken together, this is a remarkable series of concrete steps toward our vision of giving Americans the world's best education. And I thank all who supported and fought for this measure.

This legislation does even more to meet the challenges I set out in my State of the Union Address. It promotes innovation and expands public school choice, helping parents, teachers and community leaders open some 500 new charter schools and clearing the way for 3000 such schools by early in the next century. It recognizes that learning begins in the earliest years of life and significantly expands investment in Head Start. It challenges teachers to reach higher standards, and honors those who do, by helping **100,000 educators seek certification as Master Teachers. It builds on our work to bring discipline and order into the lives of our children, with \$40 million to help schools stay open late, on the weekends and in the summer to keep young people off the streets and out of trouble.**

There is still more to do to meet our educational challenges. We must pass a G.I. Bill for America's workers, which simplifies existing training programs and will help all Americans who need them to learn new skills for the workplace. And we must meet the quiet crisis of crumbling and crowded school buildings across America. We cannot build our children up in buildings that are literally falling down.

Finally, this bill continues our efforts to strengthen families on so many other fronts. It expands educational opportunity for the disabled, recent immigrants, and children growing up in

our poorest neighborhoods. It significantly increases funding for biomedical research, from cancer to Parkinson's disease to the human genome project. And it will help make the new powerful AIDS therapies more available to needy patients.

These are just some of the important provisions in a measure that honors our vital and shared duty to prepare our children for the challenges of the future. As much as any bill in years, it extends opportunity to all Americans, demands responsibility from all Americans, and helps build a community of all Americans. And I am proud to sign it into law.

Negotiations in the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee on Superfund reauthorization ended last week. Last week, Administrator Browner and Sens. Baucus and Lautenberg responded to the "global offer" presented by Committee Republicans. Senators Chafee and Smith have decided not to respond to the Democratic offer. They indicated that mark-up of a Superfund Reauthorization bill should not be expected this year.

In the House, Chairman Boehlert has indicated that the Transportation and Infrastructure Subcommittee on Water Resources and the Environment will proceed to a mark-up on this week. Subcommittee minority and majority staff are caucusing this week to discuss the differences between Rep. Boehlert's bill and Rep. Borski's position on reauthorization.

In the House Commerce Committee, Rep. Bliley has still not rescheduled a 10/30 hearing to focus on the majority's proposals on remedy and community and state role issues. However, Finance and Hazardous Materials Subcommittee Chairman Oxley has indicated that he plans to introduce Superfund reauthorization proposals in the near future. His bill is expected to be co-sponsored by a number of "blue dog" Democrats. EPA has not been given the opportunity to review his proposal.
