AT THE SAVER SUMMIT PRESIDENT CLINTON ANNOUNCES A NEW STEP TO BOOST PENSION COVERAGE

June 4, 1998

*American workers generally need Social Security coverage, an employer-provided pension and personal retirement savings -- which constitute FDR's famed three-legged stool of retirement security. Today, Social Security is the sole source of income for 18% of senior citizens **and**, for two-thirds of the elderly, it is the primary source of income. These figures show that we must do more to promote employer-provided pension coverage and increase personal retirement savings. This is the purpose of the SAVER Summit.*

- **Today, President Clinton is announcing that under current law, employers can structure their 401(k) plans so that workers are in unless they opt out. Under standard practice, workers are out unless they opt to participate in the 401(k) plan.**

PRESIDENT CLINTON'S RECORD OF EXPANDING AND PROTECTING PENSIONS. For over five years, President Clinton has worked closely with the House and Senate, Democrats and Republicans, to **expand pension coverage, make pensions more secure, and simplify pension plan administration.**

The Retirement Protection Act of 1994, proposed by the Administration and passed by Congress, protects the benefits of more than 40 million American workers and retirees. The Small Business Job Protection Act of 1996 included measures **that expanded pension coverage by creating a simplified defined contribution plan for small businesses that is proving to be a big hit, and also promoted portability and streamlined pension plan administration.**

THE NEED FOR ACTION. Despite these achievements, there is more to be done. And the SAVER Summit will help to turn our nation's attention to the critical issue of private retirement savings, focusing on the best methods to encourage workers to plan and save for retirement.

Thanks to President Clinton's efforts to eliminate the Federal budget deficit, the net national savings rate has doubled -- from 3.1% of gross domestic product in 1992 to 6.4% in 1997. CBO and OMB both project that this year, the Federal budget will be in surplus for the first time in 30 years. While net national savings are up, however, the personal savings rate is far too low.

In addition to lacking adequate personal savings, many workers also do not have pension coverage through their employers:

- **Half of all American workers, more than 50 million, are not covered by a pension plan.** The problem of low pension coverage is especially acute for young and/or low and moderate income workers.
- **Only 21% of workers earning under \$15,000 per year have pension coverage,** as opposed to 81% of workers earning \$50,000 or more per year. *[private sector workers only]*
- **Just 15 percent of workers under age 25 are covered by a pension plan,** compared to 58 percent of workers age 35 to 49. *[private sector workers only]*
- **Only 24% of full-time workers in firms with fewer than 100 employees have pension coverage,** as opposed to 68% of full-time workers in firms with 100 or more employees.

A NEW EFFORT TO INCREASE PENSION COVERAGE. The Clinton Administration is taking another step to promote pension coverage, especially for workers of modest means. The President is announcing that under current law, employers can structure their 401(k) plans so that workers are in unless they opt out. Under standard practice, workers are out unless they opt in to the 401(k) plan.

A number of employers have reportedly been deterred from establishing such automatic enrollment 401(k) plans due to concern about whether this is allowable under current law; this step responds to these concerns.

Automatic election works as follows:

- A newly eligible employee is automatically enrolled in the 401(k) plan, with contributions through payroll deduction set at a standard percentage of pay.
- The worker must be given notice of the automatic enrollment and have the opportunity to opt out (or change the contribution percentage) before the first deduction is made.
- Employers would not be required to structure their 401(k) plans this way; the ruling only clarifies that firms have this option.
- *The information available suggests that for firms with automatic enrollment, participation rates in 401(k) plans are about 90 percent, compared to the overall 401(k) participation rate of 67 percent.*
- *For some workers, the need to complete a 401(k) election form – opting in – may be a deterrent to participation. Automatic enrollment gives employers an opportunity to encourage participation by eliminating this extra step.*

BUILDS ON PRESIDENT'S PLAN TO EXPAND PENSION COVERAGE. This step builds on initiatives that President Clinton proposed in his budget, all of which respond to the problem of inadequate pension coverage and savings rates:

- **A tax credit for small businesses that adopt pension plans and a simplified defined benefit plan for small firms.** Both of these proposals should boost pension coverage among small businesses, where coverage rates are lowest.
- **The Administration's pension package would also encourage those employers who do not offer a pension plan to give workers the option of contributing to individual retirement accounts (IRAs) through payroll deduction.** This should be particularly helpful for low-income workers, who are disproportionately employed by firms without pension plans.
- **Shortening the vesting period for employer 401(k) and other matching contributions from five to three years.** This is particularly important for low and moderate income workers and women, whose average job tenure is less than men's.

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A Step Backward

June 4, 1998

President Clinton's successful economic plan has restored fiscal discipline to Washington while investing more in our people. In 1993, President Clinton inherited a budget deficit of \$290 billion; thanks to two landmark budget packages, this year President Clinton will deliver a budget in surplus for the first time since 1969. The President's 1999 budget advances the successful strategy of fiscal discipline, coupled with strategic investments in education, health, and the environment.

The House Republican budget repeats the failed strategies of 1995 and the 1980's -- promising cuts that are unfair and unrealistic. Once again, the House Republicans in their May 12th detailed document proposed to eliminate major parts of the Medicaid guarantee, for example. Faced with fierce bipartisan opposition to the detailed cuts, House Republicans decided to hide all specifics and rely on vague and unrealistic cuts of the same magnitude. Noting this return to "Stockman-like tactics" when budgets assumed unrealistic unspecified savings that never materialized, the New York Times said the House GOP budget "fails the basic integrity test, and the House should vote it down, demanding instead a budget that is real, not rigged." [NYT, 6/1/98.]

The House Republican budget resolution opens the door to using part of the surplus for tax cuts before comprehensive bipartisan Social Security strengthening legislation is adopted. President Clinton is determined to reserve all surpluses to save Social Security first.

THE HOUSE REPUBLICAN BUDGET:

- **Includes \$125 billion in cuts** over five years radically departing from the bipartisan balanced budget agreement of last year and posing a threat to Medicare, Medicaid, education, Unemployment Insurance benefits, veterans benefits, law enforcement, and environmental protection.
- **Deep cuts in Medicaid or Children's Health --** Last year's balanced budget agreement reduced Medicaid per capita growth to below that of the private sector. This additional \$12 billion proposed cut unnecessarily reduces health benefits for poor families, seniors and people with disabilities too deeply and threatens the critical children's health expansion.
- **Medicare remains at risk --** The Committee budget included a \$10 billion cut in Medicare that has been heavily criticized on a bipartisan basis. To deflect criticism, the Republicans adjusted non-binding budget function totals to make it appear that Medicare would be spared. Not so. The House Republican budget still includes an instruction for the Ways and Means Committee to save \$13 billion over five years. A possible target is Medicare that, after Social Security, is the largest program under the Committee's jurisdiction.
- **New and misguided targets for cuts --** Other targets for savings to come from the Ways and Means Committee are Unemployment Insurance, child care and temporary aid to mothers and children on welfare, the block grant created by welfare reform in 1996.
- **Would mean a 14% cut in 2003 in the portion of the budget that funds critical programs in education, health, environmental protection, and law enforcement --** The House Republican budget advertises \$46 billion in nondefense discretionary cuts below the bipartisan balanced budget agreement. Incorporating the new transportation bill pushes this cut up to \$70 billion. Compared to the President's budget, this implies a 14% cut in 2003 in outlays. If this were done across the board, this would:
 - **Deny Head Start to 85,000 children in 2003, including 40,000 children in Early Head Start.**
 - **Deny Pell grants to 140,000 low-income students in 2003. Existing grants would be slashed by \$300 each..**
 - **Deny support to 400 school districts for Safe and Drug-free Schools in 2003.**

- **Undermine food safety by slashing by up to 1,000 meat and poultry inspectors in 2003. This budget would also create major delays in the drive to modernize the federal inspection system, including upgraded lab testing for harmful pathogens in the food supply.**
 - **Threaten public health by reducing funding for the Centers for Disease Control by more than \$340 million in 2003, cutting childhood immunization funding and reducing funds for breast and cervical cancer screening.**
 - **Deny assistance to low-income students. In 2003, more than one million students in our poorest communities would be denied services from Title 1 educational programs.**
 - **Eliminate training initiatives for at least 178,000 dislocated workers in 2003.**
 - **Hamper efforts to protect the environment, by slashing funds by 14 percent in 2003 for initiatives to combat climate change, designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, cut energy usage, and save consumers' money. It also jeopardizes the safety of drinking water and food supply by cutting funds meant to clean up factory farm pollution.**
 - **Delay environmental cleanup, jeopardizing public health by halting funding for the clean up of some Superfund sites.**
- **Additional cuts in veterans programs --** Within the highway bill, the Congress has already passed the veterans savings that were assumed in the House Republican budget. Their budget, however, still instructs the Veterans Affairs Committee to come up with \$10 billion in savings. **This \$10 billion in cuts in Veterans benefit programs would be cut beyond what is already in the highway bill.**

Riggs passed at full committee level today, with no amendments, on a straight party line vote

The Education Department, as directed, is completing drafting on legislation that fully incorporates our principles. This will be a set of amendments to the existing bilingual education legislation. I expect to see a draft of this late Friday or early Monday. We will meet the President's requirement of having a bill completed next week.

Congressman Becerra has indicated that the Caucus is open to an alternative to Riggs "if it is needed", and that they want to be part of the process of crafting an alternative. There was a meeting of members of the Hispanic Caucus and New Dems today, in which they agreed that (1) they wanted to make sure Dems stayed united on bilingual ed; (2) they would work together to craft an alternative if they determined one was needed; (3) they didn't know yet if they needed one, didn't think Riggs would come to the floor in the near future, and so felt no sense of urgency to figure out whether an alternative is needed.

As I see it, our key challenge is to make sure that the announcement of our proposal is timed so that it meets a receptive rather than hostile Democratic response. I think that the Dems will ultimately want an alternative before Riggs goes to the floor. However, at present, I think POTUS is probably on a faster track than either the CHC or the rest of the Dems. It remains to be seen how far and fast we can move the CHC and others next week. It is very clear that the advocacy groups are still firmly opposed to any alternative legislation, and will push the CHC very hard to remain opposed as well--regardless of what either POTUS or the Dem. Caucus need.

One big danger here is that the CHC thinks we are charging out with an alternative despite their wishes and without a clear legislative need, digs in their heels in opposition to our bill and brings the Black Caucus and others with them--and we have created a bad vote on our bill that parallels the testing vote.

The other big danger is that we leave the President looking like (and believing) he is sitting on the sidelines while the nation and the Congress debates the future of bilingual education, because he caved to pressure from the advocacy community.

I'll be working tomorrow to figure out a consultation/outreach strategy that can help advance our case, and preferably not blow up on us. If your schedule permits, I'd love your advice and counsel.

President Clinton's successful economic plan has restored fiscal discipline to Washington while investing more in our people. In 1993, President Clinton inherited a budget deficit of \$290 billion; thanks to two landmark budget packages, this year President Clinton will deliver a budget in surplus for the first time since 1969. The President's 1999 budget advances the successful strategy of fiscal discipline, coupled with strategic investments in education, health, and the environment.

The House Republican budget repeats the failed strategies of 1995 and the 1980's -- promising cuts that are unfair and unrealistic. Once again, the House Republicans in their May 12th detailed document proposed to eliminate major parts of the Medicaid guarantee, for example. The House Republican budget resolution suggests that pay-as-you-go rules and requirements of the Budget Enforcement Act are no longer necessary. It opens the door to using part of the surplus for tax cuts before comprehensive bipartisan Social Security legislation is adopted. President Clinton is determined to reserve all surpluses to save Social Security first.

THE HOUSE REPUBLICAN BUDGET:

- **Would mean a 14% cut in 2003 in the portion of the budget that funds critical programs in education, health, environmental protection, and law enforcement** -- The House Republican budget advertises \$46 billion in nondefense discretionary cuts below the bipartisan balanced budget agreement. Incorporating the new transportation bill pushes this cut up to \$70 billion. Compared to the President's budget, this implies a 14% cut in 2003 in outlays. 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OPPORTUNITY IN THE INFORMATION AGE

To ensure that all Americans have an opportunity to succeed in the Information Age, President Clinton believes that we must make universal technology literacy for our children a national goal. A NEW EFFORT TO EXPAND TECHNOLOGY LITERACY

The money would go to states that agree to establish technology literacy as a requirement for middle school graduation.

- (3) **Support for the E-Rate:** The President is urging telecommunications companies and the Congress to support the “e-rate” -- which will provide up to 90 percent discounts to our poorest schools to connect them to the Internet.
- (4) **Competition for High-Quality Educational Software:** The Administration will support \$15 million in competitions over the next three years to encourage the development of high-quality educational software and educational Web sites by students, university faculty, and commercial software companies -- and make it easier for teachers and parents to find high-quality educational resources.

Today, figures were released showing that the unemployment rate remained steady at 4.3% in May, its lowest level since 1970. In the month of May alone, our economy added 296,000 new jobs, wages continued to rise, and inflation remained low and stable.

THE STRONGEST ECONOMY IN A GENERATION. President Clinton's three-part economic strategy -- cutting the deficit, investing in our people, and opening new markets to American goods and services -- is working for America's families. Since 1993 it has helped bring about:

- **Over 16 million new jobs.** Since President Clinton took office, the economy has added over 16 million new jobs -- with more than two million new jobs in manufacturing and construction combined. Over 93 percent of new jobs generated during the Clinton Administration have been in the private sector, the highest percentage since the 1920's.
- **The lowest unemployment level in 28 years.** In 1992, the unemployment rate was 7.5 percent. In May 1998, the unemployment rate was 4.3 percent -- remaining at its lowest level since 1970. For the first time in 28 years, the unemployment rate has been below 5 percent for 11 months in a row.
- **An increase in family income of nearly \$2,200.** Real wages are rising at their fastest pace in 25 years and a typical family's income is up nearly \$2,200 since 1993, when adjusted for inflation;
- **Turning the corner in basic American industries.** Since 1993, the economy has added 1.4 million new jobs in construction, 159,000 new jobs in the automobile industry, and 702,000 new manufacturing jobs.
- **Opportunity for more Americans to share in the benefits of the new economy.** Under President Clinton, the African-American unemployment rate has fallen from 14.1 percent to 9 percent, and the Hispanic unemployment rate has dropped from 11.3 percent to 6.8 percent -- as low as it's ever been. But much work remains, since these unemployment rates are above the national average.

THE BALANCED BUDGET: BUILDING ON SUCCESS. The President's agenda builds on this record. His plan calls for projected budget surpluses to be reserved pending Social Security reform, but provides targeted tax relief for child care, education, and the environment -- all fully paid for. These targeted tax relief efforts would:

- **Make child care more affordable,** increasing the Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit for 3 million working families;
- **Increase energy efficiency and improve the environment,** investing \$3.6 billion over the next 5 years in tax cuts for energy efficient purchases and renewable energy;
- **Promote expanded retirement savings,** making contributions of up to \$2,000 to an IRA through a payroll deduction excluded from the employee's income for tax purposes;

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Q. What is your position on the Craig/Coverdell amendment to the tobacco bill?

A. Drug abuse among youth is a deadly serious issue, and that is why I have taken numerous actions to prevent it. But we should not allow people to manipulate this issue -- and others even further afield to kill tobacco legislation. The Craig-Coverdell amendment includes numerous provisions that have nothing to do with youth smoking including school voucher proposals and anti-union actions. We should focus in a tobacco bill on reducing youth smoking and not allow Members of Congress to inject these kind of poison pills.

Q. What is your position on the Daschle amendment to the tobacco bill?

A. I am skeptical of attempts to divert funding away from public health and medical research for a tax cut. I am concerned that these amendments will endanger our priorities -- namely, providing for smoking cessation and prevention, counteradvertising, research into smoking related diseases such as cancer and heart disease, assistance to farmers and farming communities, and reimbursement to the states for their expenditures for smoking-related illnesses. Of course, I would very much prefer Senator Daschle's amendment to the Gramm amendment, because it is reasonably sized and because it is far more targeted at families who actually experience a marriage penalty.

[Background: Senator Daschle's amendment would provide married couples with a 20 percent deduction against the lower-earning spouse's income, phased out between \$50,000 and \$60,000 of income. The amendment would also provide full-deductibility of health insurance costs for the self-employed. The Daschle amendment would cost significantly less than the Gramm amendment, and targets tax relief at those couples who are actually penalized by the tax code.]

Q. Do you think the bill is dying?

A. Absolutely not. Certainly I would have preferred for Congress to pass the bill last week. But these are complicated issues and members have a range of different priorities that need to be worked through. I always knew that passing a comprehensive tobacco bill would not be easy, and we are making steady progress. I continue to believe that the Senate, and then the full Congress, will pass this bill. They will otherwise have to explain themselves to the American people.

Q. What is your view of activity in the House?

A. Last week, I said how pleased I was to see that momentum for tobacco legislation is now building in the House of Representatives. I believe that the bipartisan, comprehensive legislation proposed by Representatives Hansen, Meehan and Waxman, which has over 90 co-sponsors, is a good, tough bill. I look forward to working with Representatives Hansen, Meehan, Waxman and all of their House colleagues to improve this bill in order to protect farmers and farming communities. With this change, I would be pleased to sign this bill. I call upon the House of Representatives to take up the bill and get down to the serious business of reducing youth smoking in this country.
