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Today, figures were released showing that the unemployment rate remained steady at 4.3% in May, its lowest level since 1970. In the month of May alone, our economy added 296,000 new jobs, wages continued to rise, and inflation remained low and stable.

THE STRONGEST ECONOMY IN A GENERATION. President Clinton's three-part economic strategy -- cutting the deficit, investing in our people, and opening new markets to American goods and services -- is working for America's families. Since 1993 it has helped bring about:

- **Over 16 million new jobs.** Since President Clinton took office, the economy has added over 16 million new jobs -- with more than two million new jobs in manufacturing and construction combined. Over 93 percent of new jobs generated during the Clinton Administration have been in the private sector, the highest percentage since the 1920's.
- **The lowest unemployment level in 28 years.** In 1992, the unemployment rate was 7.5 percent. In May 1998, the unemployment rate was 4.3 percent -- remaining at its lowest level since 1970. For the first time in 28 years, the unemployment rate has been below 5 percent for 11 months in a row.
- **An increase in family income of nearly \$2,200.** Real wages are rising at their fastest pace in 25 years and a typical family's income is up nearly \$2,200 since 1993, when adjusted for inflation;
- **Turning the corner in basic American industries.** Since 1993, the economy has added 1.4 million new jobs in construction, 159,000 new jobs in the automobile industry, and 702,000 new manufacturing jobs.
- **Opportunity for more Americans to share in the benefits of the new economy.** Under President Clinton, the African-American unemployment rate has fallen from 14.1 percent to 9 percent, and the Hispanic unemployment rate has dropped from 11.3 percent to 6.8 percent -- as low as it's ever been. But much work remains, since these unemployment rates are above the national average.

THE BALANCED BUDGET: BUILDING ON SUCCESS. The President's agenda builds on this record. His plan calls for projected budget surpluses to be reserved pending Social Security reform, but provides targeted tax relief for child care, education, and the environment -- all fully paid for. These targeted tax relief efforts would:

- **Make child care more affordable,** increasing the Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit for 3 million working families;
- **Increase energy efficiency and improve the environment,** investing \$3.6 billion over the next 5 years in tax cuts for energy efficient purchases and renewable energy;

Will try to be as brief with this as possible as to your request as to the status of marriage in Hawai`i.

On December 4, 1996, Judge Kevin Chang ruled that the State of Hawai`i did not present compelling reasons to deny three same-sex couples marriage licenses, and ordered the state to execute his opinion that those licenses be issued immediately.

Not surprisingly, the State appealed Judge Chang's decision, and in doing so, also requested a stay of execution of Judge Chang's order, which was granted, until that time that the State's appeal is ruled upon by the Hawai`i Supreme Court, the final authority in this matter at this level.

So, technically, Hawai`i does recognize that the marriage laws apply to all couples, but the State is not, at this time, required to issue licenses to same-sex couples (yet more discrimination perpetrated by the State).

There is no timetable for the next ruling from the Hawai`i Supreme Court. They could rule today that they've heard and read sufficient evidence to issue their opinion, and do so, or they could say that they want to hear more arguments, in which case, the State and the plaintiffs would be given a year to prepare their briefs. So the ruling from the Hawai`i Supreme Court could come today, or a year from whenever.

Against this backdrop, our opponents have been successful in getting two damaging questions placed on the November ballot. One calls for a Constitutional Convention (Hawai'i's Constitution could be rewritten at this convention to only recognize opposite-sex marriage) and the other calls for a Constitutional Amendment (giving the Legislature the power to define marriage in terms of one man and one woman).

Our community is in the process of mobilizing to defeat both of these ballot questions.

Hope this helps.

**Modified Gramm Amendment Would Consume
Nearly 80 Percent of Tobacco Revenues Between 2008-2022**

Background note: This is based on OMB's analysis of receipts under the McCain bill.

Talking Points:

- I strongly urge you to vote against the Gramm amendment because it would prevent the legislation from achieving important health goals.
- Over the first four years, the Gramm amendment would spend \$13 billion for tax cuts, or 28 percent of the \$45.7 billion in spending under the McCain bill. If funding for states and farmers is held constant, funding for public health and research would be reduced by 67 percent.
- Over the next five years, the Gramm amendment would spend an additional \$30 billion on tax cuts, or 42 percent of the \$71.1 billion in the McCain bill allocated for spending. If states and farmers get first priority in terms of funding, the amendment would *completely eliminate* all funding for public health and medical research during those years.
- Between 2008 and 2022, the Gramm amendment explodes: it would absorb \$225 billion, or 78 percent, of the \$289.5 billion in the McCain bill allocated for spending. If states and farmers get first priority in terms of funding, the amendment would completely eliminate all funding for public health and medical research during those years. Funding for the states would be reduced by 62 percent, and funding for farmers would be reduced by 57 percent.
- The Gramm amendment would thus eviscerate funding for critical public health programs such as smoking cessation, education and counteradvertising. This would significantly undermine efforts to reduce youth smoking in this country and help adults who want to quit. Critical funding for medical research would also be cut drastically, including research into smoking-related diseases such as cancer and heart disease.
- Additionally, States would be expected to forgo their claims in court and receive, in exchange, minimal compensation for their enormous expenditures related to smoking-related illnesses. Funding would also be significantly reduced for tobacco farmers, who have done nothing wrong and who deserve to be compensated for the losses they will suffer as a result of tobacco legislation.

Tobacco --Update: On Thursday, Senator Daschle filed a cloture petition in order to bring debate to a close. The cloture vote will take place on Tuesday. The Senate will also vote on Tuesday on a Coverdell amendment which allocates over \$3 billion a year on anti-drug efforts, significantly reducing funding available for public health and research. We are working to draft a scaled down version of the Coverdell amendment, in order to attract the votes of those members who might otherwise support Coverdell but also wish to provide significant funding for public health and research.

Senator Gramm continues to modify his pending marriage penalty amendment. The latest version would cost \$13 billion over the first four years, or 28.4 percent of the \$45.7 billion in spending under the McCain bill. If funding for states and farmers is held constant, funding for public health and research would be reduced by __ percent. Over the next five years, the Gramm amendment would spend an additional \$30 billion on tax cuts, or 42 percent of the \$71.1 billion in the McCain bill, completely eliminating funding for public health and research, and reducing funding for farmers by __ percent. Between 2008 and 2022, the Gramm amendment would absorb \$225 billion, or 78 percent, of the \$289.5 billion in the McCain bill, leaving no funding available for public health, research or farmers, and reducing state funding by __ percent.

In order to attract votes away from the Gramm amendment while preserving funding for public health and research, Senator Daschle plans to offer an alternative tax cut which would provide married couples with a 20 percent deduction against the lower-earning spouse's income, phased out between \$50,000 and \$60,000 of income. The amendment would also provide full-deductibility of health insurance costs for the self-employed. The Daschle amendment would cost significantly less than the Gramm amendment, and targets tax relief at those couples who are actually penalized by the tax code.

On Thursday, the Senate failed to table, by a vote of 29-66, Senator Durbin's second degree amendment to strengthen the company-specific look back penalties. Earlier in the

week, the Senate adopted a McCain amendment by voice vote which restored \$3 billion in funding to the VA for smoking-related illnesses.

The House has still not taken up tobacco legislation. On Wednesday, Larry, Erskine and I met with Representative Waxman to seek his advice on how to jump-start the process in the House. Waxman believes that the Hansen-Meehan bill is a viable vehicle in the House, given that it has 90 cosponsors (including 11 Republicans). He urged us to issue a stronger endorsement of the Hansen-Meehan bill that clearly states that you would sign the bill provided it includes adequate assistance to farmers and farming communities. We [are preparing such a statement] [issued such a statement on Friday when you were in Boston].

Equal Pay -- Equal Pay Act 35th Anniversary: You, along with the Vice President and the First Lady, are scheduled to participate in an event on Wednesday to commemorate the 35th anniversary of President Kennedy's signing of the Equal Pay Act in 1963. Dr. Dorothy Height, who attended the signing in 1963, is also expected to participate. You will (1) announce a Council of Economic Advisors report on the wage gap and (2) urge Congress to pass Senator Daschle's and Congresswoman DeLauro's equal pay bills, which the Vice President supported at an event on April 2.

Drugs -- Drug Courts: On Thursday, the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse (CASA) released the first major review of the effectiveness of drug courts. The CASA study was commissioned by the National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP), a bipartisan group of judges, prosecutors, treatment providers and others, working to implement effective drug courts across the country. The study found that drug courts provide more comprehensive supervision, monitoring, testing, and treatment than other forms of community supervision of drug offenders. Specifically, the report cites that 55% of drug courts require at least two drug tests per week; 35% require weekly tests; and 10% require tests every other week. In comparison, under probation supervision, 52% of jurisdictions reported monthly drug testing; 8% tested weekly; and 33% tested on a less frequent, or random basis. In addition, CASA found that drug use and criminal behavior were substantially reduced while offenders were under drug court supervision, as well as after leaving the program. Drug courts have flourished in the past few years, due largely to the 1994 Crime Act which authorized the first-ever federal funding for drug courts. Between 1995 and 1997, the Justice Department provided \$56 million to drug courts, and as of last month, there were drug courts in 275 jurisdictions.

Welfare Reform --Urban Challenges: You recently asked about areas where there may be insufficient jobs for those leaving the welfare rolls. While there are areas--both urban and rural--where unemployment remains high and job opportunities lag behind, there is still little solid or widespread evidence that people are being pushed off the rolls without jobs. (The New York study that received a lot of attention was preliminary and had serious flaws.) Only a small number of welfare recipients in a handful of states have hit time limits yet. State studies find 50-65 percent of those leaving the rolls are working. Early

evidence suggests that about half those who leave due to sanctions are working; others rely on family, or other public and private social services. It is difficult to determine how many more people would now be leaving the rolls if there were more jobs available in their area.

Caseload declines are not entirely related to employment opportunities; the extent to which people leave the rolls is also a function of different state policies. States such as IL and MN have generous 'make work pay' incentives which allow people to combine welfare with work for a longer period of time. Other states have immediate work requirements, shorter time limits, or stricter sanctions that accelerate movement off the rolls (MA, WI). Other states have just been slower to implement welfare reform so it is too early to see the impact of these changes (CA, WA). In addition, some individuals cannot take advantage of existing job opportunities due to child care, transportation, or skills mismatch issues.

Nevertheless, a recent Brookings study of welfare caseload trends in 23 major cities and urban counties reveals some interesting trends. Between 1996 and 1997, caseloads declined in all of the areas studied, ranging from a 4 percent drop in Bridgeport to a 29 percent drop in Milwaukee. Caseloads dropped less dramatically (5-10 percent decline) in Los Angeles, St. Louis, Seattle, and Cleveland. San Francisco, New York, Boston, Wayne Co, Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, Chicago and Denver all experienced 10-15 percent declines, and caseloads in Miami dropped 17 percent. 1998 welfare caseload data is not yet available at the sub-state level.

The relationship between caseload declines and economic factors is not clear-cut in these cities. For example, Chicago has the largest caseload decline among big cities even though its drop in unemployment and growth in employment are slower than Los Angeles, where caseloads have declined more slowly. Based on economic and employment factors, caseload size, and other issues, Los Angeles, Philadelphia and New York are among the places that face some special challenges and that we need to pay close attention to over the next year.

The Welfare-to-Work Competitive grants you announced on May 27th are targeted at the hardest-to-place welfare recipients in high poverty/high welfare areas, with about 70 percent of the funds going to urban areas. DOL approved 4 grants totaling \$16 million in Los Angeles; 2 grants totaling \$10 million in NYC; 3 grants totaling \$11 million in Chicago; and 2 grants totaling \$6.3 million in Philadelphia. The Welfare to Work Partnership's eight-city campaign with the Enterprise Foundation will also help connect welfare recipients with private employers in areas with high concentrations of poverty and welfare dependency (Atlanta, Baltimore, Dallas, Denver, New York, San Antonio, St. Louis and Washington, D.C.).

Welfare Reform --HHS Study on Individuals Leaving Welfare Rolls: HHS just announced it will be making funds available to 8-10 states to track and monitor the status of people leaving the welfare rolls. The studies will also track families who are not coming onto the rolls either because of diversion programs, new eligibility rules, or other factors. HUD, USDA, and DOL are participating in the research effort by contributing funds to study impacts on families in public or assisted housing and rural areas, and to do in-depth interviews about employment status. Results will probably not be available for several years.

Welfare Reform --PBS Special "Ending Welfare As We Know It": On June 5th, PBS airs a 90-minute documentary billed as "an eye-opening look at how American families are coping in the new era of welfare reform". The documentary was developed by Roger Weisberg, producer of the 1994 documentary "Making Welfare Work", and hosted by Meredith Vieira, co-host of ABC Daytime's *The View*. The documentary asks broad questions about how welfare reform is working, but focuses on the experience of six 'hard-to-serve' families who are struggling with the transition in Wisconsin, Florida, and New Jersey. Apparently the decision to focus on the tough cases was deliberate; unfortunately, it ignores successes such as Rhonda Costa.

Health Care -- Medicaid Coverage of Viagra: As early as next week, HHS is expected to announce that the Medicaid statute does not allow for the exclusion of Viagra as a covered drug. As long as it is proven to be prescribed for a medically necessary reason, the Department's Office of General Counsel has determined that it must be covered. States will, however, be able to limit the number of pills dispensed and will also make coverage subject to a prior authorization requirement (which requires physicians to provide an explicit medical rationale for the dispensing of this medication). Although Medicaid covers very few men (about 90 percent of the covered population are women and children), this issue concerns the state because they believe it could signal the beginning of an influx of required coverage for "designer drugs." When the Department releases this decision, it will stress that the Secretary does have the authority to exclude this drug if state experiences clearly illustrate that it is being inappropriately prescribed and excessively utilized. We will work closely with the NGA, the Governors, and Medicaid directors to collect data to see if such a determination can be made.

Health Care -- Coverage of Viagra Compared to Birth Control: Although most private sector plans already have decided to cover Viagra (although with varying degrees of limitations), many still do not cover birth control pills. This has led many women's advocacy organizations to suggest that private sector coverage rules represent a double standard. The widespread media coverage and controversies surrounding Viagra have served to intensify pressure from these groups to support mandating the coverage of birth control pills. There is a policy justification for the differences in coverage policies: Viagra and other covered drugs treat a medical condition, while birth control pills are, in most cases, intended to prevent a "medical condition." Since the debate around Health Security

Act, we have generally hesitated to endorse explicit benefit mandates in private insurance. Because the Medicaid statute does require the coverage of birth control pills, our position with the women's groups is strengthened since the Federal government is not taking perceptively conflicting positions on these drugs. However, we wanted to advise you that this issue could arise in the upcoming Congress, as Senator Snowe (R-ME) has introduced legislation to mandate that all health plans cover birth control pills.

Health Care --Patients' Bill of Rights Update: On Thursday, Congressman Norwood called Chris Jennings to advise you that he is interested in developing a strategy to obtain sufficient support for a discharge petition. Such a petition would bypass the Committee process and send patients' bill of rights legislation to the House floor for a vote.

Mr. Norwood is becoming increasingly frustrated with the Republican Leadership's delay in developing a Republican alternative to the Dingell/Ganske patients' rights legislation. As you know, Congressman Norwood has his own bill with over 200 co-sponsors. He has also indicated a desire to determine if it is possible to agree on one bill with Congressman Dingell to increase the likelihood of succeeding with this discharge petition approach and passing a bill through the House. Although he has not completely given up on the House Republican Task Force, he is highly skeptical that they will come up with something that he can support. He is placing a self-imposed late June deadline for the Republican Leadership to act on this issue. However, even if the Republicans propose a bill, he will oppose it if it is weighted down with poison pill provisions designed to ensure that nothing passes this year. We are following up Congressman Norwood's call by meeting with Congressman Dingell. Subsequently, we will have a joint meeting with Representatives Ganske, Dingell, Norwood to develop a legislative strategy. Finally, to maintain the public focus on this issue, we are contemplating recommending a public event with you, Senator Kennedy, other Members of Congress, and Helen Hunt (if available) on June 15.

Health Care -- Minnesota AARP Event with the Vice President: On Wednesday, the Vice President addressed the biannual, national AARP conference in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He focused his remarks primarily on the Administration's Medicare record and was extremely well received. The issue, however, that got the most attention in Minneapolis was his reiteration of your call on Congress to pass a patients' bill of rights and his highlighting of the experience of native resident Ricka Powers with her HMO's handling of her breast cancer case. The health plan that Ms. Powers charged with mishandling her case (Health Partners) has vehemently denied her accusations. The only reason why Health Partners' denials are worth noting is because they are one of the more well respected HMO plans in the country and have some credibility with outside validators.

It is important to note that neither you nor anyone within the Administration singled out this company in the event or subsequent to it. We were advised about her experience by the National Breast Cancer Coalition and a medical clinic in Minnesota that we felt to be quite credible. However, because Minnesota state law confidentiality requirements prohibit the plan from releasing any specific information about her case without her explicit permission, it is impossible for us to confirm the degree to which either side's

charges are accurate. But like most disputes, it appears that the truth may lie somewhere in between these opposing viewpoints. Although we are quite confident Ms. Powers' case has a substantial degree of merit, we believe it may be wise to advise avoiding referencing this case in the future.

Health Care -- Prostate Cancer Update: We have been extremely successful in highlighting the new Medicare preventive benefits and research breakthroughs for breast cancer. However, we have yet to have the same level of success highlighting our significant record on prostate and colorectal cancer. For this reason, we are contemplating Father's day as a time frame for focusing attention on these two issues. Administration initiatives we believe we could highlight include: the new Medicare colorectal and prostate screening preventive benefits, your support for Medicare coverage of cancer clinical trials, historical increases in the NCI budget, genetic discrimination legislation, and the patients' bill of rights. Until recently, prostate cancer research and breakthroughs have not received the attention or funding that other politically salient diseases have, such as breast cancer and AIDS. The NCI, however, now believes that there is new potential in this area, and is therefore increasing funding to begin new clinical trials and other research in this area, efforts which will be enhanced if Congress passes your proposed 67 percent increase in cancer research. In addition, one of the greatest barriers to progress in this prostate cancer research is the lack of success in enrolling men in clinical trials. Your proposal to cover cancer clinical trials, which is currently being carried in the McCain version of the tobacco legislation could make a significant difference in attracting men into these studies. It is important to note that the Medicare prostate preventive benefit does not go into effect until the year 2000. The reason for the delay of implementation has much less to do with cost than it does with the lack of evidence that screening makes a difference in morbidity. Experts believe that this test has many false positives and even when it finds cancer, the jury is still out as to whether or not we catch it soon enough to make a difference given the treatment outcomes. It is our hope and expectation, however, that in prostate screening and research should lead to lower mortality rates in the future.

Health Care --Genetic Discrimination Update: Labor and Human Resources Committee Chairman Jeffords has asked us to participate in a work group to mark up a bill to prohibit genetic discrimination by health insurance plans. This legislation responds to your call to build on the anti-genetic discrimination provisions in the Kennedy-Kassebaum law and includes new anti-discrimination provisions, such as ensuring genetic information is not used to prohibit access to the individual market or to raise group premium rates in the individual or group market. The legislation also prevents insurance companies from disclosing genetic information to other insurers, plan sponsors, and other regulated entities. The Labor Committee is pushing this as a freestanding bill because they believe that few other initiatives have a chance of passing out of committee and the Senate as a whole. We are providing technical assistance and developing outside organizational support to ensure that a strong bill has the potential to pass the Congress

this year. We are concerned, however, that Senator Jeffords is seeking a lowest common denominator approach to the extent that it is virtually meaningless.

Health Care -- Assisted Suicide Rollout: On Friday, the Justice Department released its interpretation that the Controlled Substance Act does not give the Drug Enforcement Agency the authority to penalize physicians who are prescribing medication to assist patients who commit suicide. As you will recall, Senator Hatch and Congressman Hyde requested this opinion in hopes of using this authority to preempt the Oregon assisted suicide law. As you directed, we clearly enunciated your strong opposition to assisted-suicide as well as your openness to contemplating legislative options in this area.

Health Care -- Medicare Coverage of Abortion and the Hyde Amendment: It is a little known fact that Medicare covers approximately 500 abortions a year for women who receive the benefit through their eligibility to Social Security Disability Insurance. In recent weeks, the Catholic Health Association has indicated its concern that it may have to provide abortion services if some of their institutions decide to avail themselves of the new Balanced Budget Amendment provisions that allow them to become a provider sponsored organization (PSO). In addition, Senator Nickles has requested that the Department advise him about the applicability of the Hyde amendment to Medicare. We are working with HHS, OMB, Justice Department, and the Counsel's office to determine current Medicare coverage practices as well as to develop options to how we could respond to these inquiries. We are extremely concerned that Senator Nickles is soon going to highlight this issue as yet another abortion wedge issue. You will be receiving an options memo on this controversial issue shortly.

Here's my take on a tobacco/drug enforcement amendment, back w/real money, to put at the beginning of any drug substitute. Here's what it does:

1. Takes \$200 million of the top of the Trust Fund each year to fund state and local tobacco/drug enforcement (but does not include state and locals in enforcement section of public health account). This is about 1/2 a billion less than the latest Leahy amendment proposed spending.

CHAPTER 1 -- INCREASED RESOURCES FOR STATE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

SEC. ____ In General. -- Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (42 USC 371 et seq.) is amended --

(1) by inserting after Part Z the following new part AA:

“PART AA DRUG AND TOBACCO ENFORCEMENT

“SEC. ____ Authority to Make Drug Enforcement and Tobacco Anti-Smuggling Grants.

(a) Grant Authorization. -- The Attorney General after consultation with the Secretary of the Treasury, may make grants to units of state and local government, law enforcement agencies, Indian tribal governments, and multi-jurisdictional or regional consortia thereof to assist law enforcement and establish cooperative efforts to implement the drug and tobacco enforcement provisions of this Act and related provisions of federal, state and local law.

(b) IN GENERAL. -- Grants under subsection (a) may be used to support projects, programs, and activities to --

(A) hire additional personnel and pay overtime costs;

(B) procure equipment, training, technical assistance or information systems; or

(C) fund operations and initiatives including but not limited to --

(1) multi jurisdictional task forces and strike teams that integrate Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies and prosecutors for the purposes of combating illegal trafficking in drugs and tobacco products;

(2) utilize additional state and local law enforcement officers to disrupt illicit commerce in black market tobacco products and illegal drugs;

(3) target the domestic sources of controlled and illegal substances, such as precursor chemicals, diverted pharmaceuticals, clandestine laboratories, and cannabis cultivations;

(4) conduct financial investigative programs that target the identification of money laundering operations and the seizure of assets obtained through illegal drug trafficking and tobacco smuggling;

(5) strengthen enforcement and prosecution efforts targeted at criminal gangs engaged in drug trafficking and tobacco smuggling;

(6) demonstrate innovative approaches to enforcement, prosecution, and adjudication of drug offenses and other serious crimes;

(7) provide enhanced state and local law enforcement training related federal efforts to combat illegal tobacco products.

(c) Amounts. -- There is authorized to be appropriated \$200,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999 through 2003 from the Trust Fund under section 401 to be used to carry out this section.

CHAPTER 2 -- INCREASED RESOURCES FOR FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

SEC. _____. INCREASED RESOURCES FOR FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

(a) BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO AND FIREARMS -- In addition to other amounts appropriated for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms for a fiscal year, there is authorized to be appropriated from the Trust Fund under section 451(b)(2)(D) \$75,000,000 for each of fiscal years 1999 through 2003 for anti-smuggling and drug enforcement activities.

(b) CUSTOMS -- In addition to other amounts appropriated for United States Customs Service for a fiscal year, there is authorized to be appropriated from section 451(b)(2)(D) \$25,000,000 for each of fiscal years 1999 through 2003 for anti-smuggling and drug enforcement activities.

(c) MINIMUM FUNDING -- In section 451 (b)(2)(D) --

(1) strike clause (iii) and insert the following:

“(iii) Anti-smuggling and Drug Enforcement activities under Title 11, Subtitle D, in addition to any other amounts made available under section 1139.

“(I) The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms shall receive not less than 10% of the funds provide in subparagraph (D) in each of fiscal years 1999 through 2003 for the costs incurred by the Bureau for drug and tobacco enforcement.

ADVISORY BOARD ACTIVITIES

Religious Leaders Forum. On June 1, the Reverend Dr. Suzan D. Johnson Cook hosted the Religious Leaders Forum in Louisville, KY. Reverend Tony Campolo gave a rousing keynote address, and DOJ Director of Community Relations Service Rose Ochi moderated one of the panels. Approximately 100 people attended and participated in small breakout discussions. Numerous ideas were elicited and many people indicated a renewed commitment to racial reconciliation activities in Louisville and the surrounding area.

United South and Eastern Tribes. On June 3, Governor William Winter, senior Initiative staff and I participated in a panel discussion in Nashville, Tennessee with the United South and Eastern Tribes. During our two-hour panel, we heard directly from the Tribal leaders, as well as other Tribal government officials, on a variety of topics. Major issues included the concern that Indian people did not want to be assimilated into one America, the importance of the Initiative valuing the government-to-government relationship between the Tribes and the Federal government, the need to protect the cultural heritage of Indian people, and the need to protect sacred sites and a consistent federal policy on such protection.

American Bar Association. On June 4, Angela Oh discussed the importance of racial reconciliation at an American Bar Association planning meeting for their 1999 National Conference on Race Relations.

New Jersey Region National Conference. On May 28, Governor Kean spoke at this

conference on the Initiative to an audience of 100 composed of staff, administration and board members from a number of school districts.

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

June Advisory Board Meeting. We continue to plan the June Advisory Board meeting, scheduled for June 18 in Washington, D.C. Before the June 18 meeting, some Advisory Board members will meet as subgroups for internal discussions focusing on issues such as education, economic development, leadership, and a vision for one America. The Advisory Board members will be able to use the subgroup meetings as opportunities to review progress made to-date and develop ideas to promote continuing support for work started during the Initiative year. On June 18, the full Advisory Board will meet publicly to present issues and ideas for deliberation and consideration.

One Year Anniversary. We have prepared summaries of Initiative accomplishments and questions and answers in anticipation of press inquiries on the occasion of the one year anniversary of your June 1997 San Diego speech launching the Initiative. These documents were distributed to Advisory Board members and White House staff. In addition, Dr. Franklin has written an op-ed about the Initiative which we will send to several major news magazines to coincide with the one year anniversary.

Prayer for Racial Reconciliation. We sent letters to participants in the New Orleans and Louisville Religious Leaders Forums and other religious leaders asking them, during the weekend of June 12-14, to recognize the anniversary of the announcement of the Initiative, offer a prayer for racial reconciliation during their worship service, and plan other activities to reinforce the message of racial reconciliation.

Brooklyn Unity Awards. On June 2, Deputy Director for Outreach, Mike Wenger, delivered the keynote address at the 10th Annual Brooklyn Unity Awards Ceremony in Brooklyn, NY. Over 100 people attended the event sponsored by Brooklyn Borough President Howard Golden, who presented awards to four programs in Brooklyn which are bringing people, young and old, together across racial lines.

Fact Book. Initiative staff met with the Council of Economic Advisors and the White House Communications Office this week to discuss the final stages of preparation for the Race Fact Book that CEA is preparing for the Initiative. The report is expected to be released in September.

Website Update. The One America Dialogue Guide was posted on our website. This guide on how to conduct a discussion on race is available on the website in two forms. One format is easily viewed while visiting the site, and the other enables visitors to print the guide in its original format.

FEDERAL AGENCY ACTIVITIES

Department of Justice

American-Arab Committee. On June 12, the Attorney General will address the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee.

Department of Agriculture

Food Assistance For Indian Reservations. At the Oglala Sioux Reservation in Pine Ridge, SD and the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation at Fort Yates, ND, USDA unveiled a new food package for the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the expansion of the FDPIR Fresh Produce Pilot Project, and a pilot project through which commercially labeled commodities are being provided to program participants.

Minority Outreach. On May 18, state officials from USDA agencies conducted a Hispanic Growers Outreach meeting in Yakima, Washington and identified 36 specific needs by the group.

Department of Commerce

First Annual Minority and Women-Owned Business Trade Fair. On May 29, at the Washington Convention Center, the Minority Business Development Administration participated as an exhibitor at a trade fair sponsored by the Black Business and Professional Network of Washington, D.C.

Department of Health and Human Services

Substance Use Among Racial and Ethnic Subgroups. On June 12, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration is planning to release its first comprehensive analysis of 1991-1993 data from the *National Household Survey on Drug Abuse* on substance use among racial-ethnic minority subgroups. The findings reveal that: compared to total U.S. population, Native Americans exhibited the highest levels of substance use; levels of substance use among Hispanic sub-groups ranged from high to comparable use relative to the total U.S. population; African Americans exhibited high levels of substance use relative to the total U.S. population; and, while high enough to warrant concern, substance abuse levels among Asian/Pacific Islanders were low relative to the total U.S. population.

Department of Energy

Tribal Council. On June 4, Secretary Peña met with Tribal Chairman Mervin Wright, Jr., Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council to discuss the proposed cooperative agreement

between the Tribe and the Department which provides training, equipment, and funding to prepare for an emergency during the first shipment of spent nuclear fuel from foreign research reactors. The shipment will be traveling through their reservation in July en route to the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory.

Department of Education

Unz Initiative. DOEd staff are working with White House and DOJ staff to determine the implications for civil rights enforcement and bilingual education programs of the passage, on June 2, of CA's Proposition 227. The initiative, which aims to end bilingual education in CA and replace it with a one-year immersion program for limited-English-proficient students, passed with more than 60% of the vote. An immediate court challenge is expected.

Hispanic Legislators. On June 19, Secretary Riley will address the National Association of Hispanic Legislators in Houston, TX.

Small Business Administration

Welfare to Work. The SBA continues to work to further the goals of the Welfare to Work Initiative by sponsoring the Women and Minorities Conference in Tacoma, WA.

General Services Administration

Energy Tribal Workshop. On May 27 - 29, GSA partnered with the Rosebud Sioux Tribe and other agencies to co-sponsor the Inter-Tribal Council on Utility Policy in Rapid City, SD. GSA provided information on how the Tribal organizations can take advantage of opportunities to provide power to the Government in the newly deregulated power environment.

RADIO ADDRESS ON TOBACCO BILL
June 6, 1998

Good morning. We are living in a very exciting time, when our country and our Congress face many challenges to strengthen our nation for the 21st Century. Today, I want to talk to you about the most important issue before the Congress right now -- and one that affects our children most of all: the tobacco bill.

Over the past five and a half years, our nation has confounded the conventional wisdom and broken through political paralysis to address many of our most difficult challenges. We turned a deficit, projected to be \$290 billion when I took office, into a balanced budget) and now we are working to reserve the surplus until we save Social Security. We ended decades of rising welfare dependency) and now we have the lowest percentage of people on welfare in three decades. We stopped the seemingly inexorable rise in lawlessness, and now crime is down for [six] years in a row. The American people did this by demanding that our leaders put aside partisan differences, focus on the national interest over narrow interests, and above all, come together in common sense and act.

Today, we have a rare and fleeting opportunity to take such bipartisan, historic action on the greatest single public health threat we face: the deadly addiction of tobacco. The statistics are well known to us now, but they have not lost their power to shock: Smoking kills more people every year than AIDS, alcohol, car accidents, murders, suicides, drugs and fires combined. Ninety percent of all smokers lit their first cigarettes before they turned 18. Every day, 3,000 more young people will start smoking -- and 1,000 of them will die early as a result.

Now, thanks to groundbreaking steps taken by my administration, the courage of parents and the public health community, the determination of public officials at every level, and committed and courageous bipartisan leadership on Capitol Hill, America is ready to break through gridlock once again. We can make 1998 the year when we enact comprehensive, effective legislation that puts tobacco out of the reach of our children forever.

This is the critical moment of truth for Congress. Senators John McCain and Fritz Hollings have brought to the floor a landmark proposal to protect our children from tobacco. This bill raises the price of cigarettes if tobacco companies do not show clear progress in reducing teen smoking; it ends the manipulative marketing campaigns that seek to lure children to smoke; it would be the most significant protection for the public health and safety in many years. And this legislation also protects tobacco farmers and their families etc.

There is a broad consensus for this bill. It is reasonable; it is bipartisan; it is in the interest of our children. But for weeks now, the Senate has not acted, as a small band has done everything it could to avoid angering big tobacco by avoiding a vote. Today, I say to them: The debate has gone on for long enough. You are standing in the way of saving one million lives. And the American people will not stand for it.

The Senate should do nothing else until it passes tobacco legislation. It is time to put aside narrow interests for the national interest, and come together for the good of our children.

Class Size Reduction: Sen. Patty Murray is preparing to introduce your class size proposal within the next week to ten days. She has lined up 10-12 cosponsors, and believes she can more than double that number before the bill is introduced if she could identify credible offsets to replace the tobacco funding. DPC and OMB have been working with her office to identify potential offsets, and will have several for her consideration early next week. We are working closely with Sen. Murray, with Daschle's office and with NEA, AFT and other education groups to design and carry out a coordinated legislative, communications and grass roots strategy that can help us gain some traction on this issue over the next several months.

Bilingual Education: The House Education and Workforce Committee passed, on a party line vote, Rep. Riggs's proposal to replace the existing bilingual and immigrant education programs with a block grant to states that requires students to learn English within 2 years. The Education Department is nearing completion of an Administration alternative to this bill, which will be ready for transmission by the end of next week, if you wish to put an alternative forward. The Hispanic Caucus remains opposed to the introduction of any alternative at this time; though this situation could change if, as a floor vote nears, it becomes apparent that other Democrats will want cover in order to oppose the Riggs bill.
