REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT
AND CHIEF OF STAFF ERSKINE BOWLES

The Briefing Room

6:15 P.M. EDT

THE PRESIDENT: Good afternoon. The vote that was just completed in the Senate clearly shows that a bipartisan majority of 57 clearly supports tough legislation to protect the children of this country from tobacco. Needless to say, I am very disappointed that a Republican minority blocked the legislation from being voted on.

Today, like every other day, 3,000 young children start to smoke, and 1,000 of them will have their lives shortened because of it. If more members of the Senate would vote like parents rather than politicians we could solve this problem and go on to other business of the country.

I have been working for three years now to protect our children from the dangers of tobacco. I want the tobacco lobby and its allies on Capitol Hill to know that from my point of view this battle is far from over.

Q Sir, what's your strategy, what do you do now?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, the Senate has to come back to it, but they have to do it in a hurry if we're going to act. After all, we only have six weeks until the August recess -- not quite that -- and then we have only a month or so when they come back, the month of September, because they will, doubtless, want to go home in October to campaign.

So the parameters of this bill are well-known; what has to be done to get a bill that can not only pass, but can actually be effective not only in raising the price of cigarettes, but in limiting advertising and having smoking cessation programs and giving the public health money out there, the research money we need. Everybody knows what has to be done.

We showed a lot of flexibility here in trying to work with the members of the Senate. We had a tax cut in there to deal with the marriage penalty for people with incomes under \$50,000. We had some more anti-drug money in there. The lawyer fee issue was addressed in the amendment most recently adopted. We can do this, and we need to do it and do it promptly.

There is not a lot of time, but I think it would be a great mistake for those who believe that because of the \$40 million ad campaign by the tobacco industry which has gone unanswered and which has a lot of things in it which are just false, that they now have a free ride on this to walk away from 1,000 lives a day. We don't have a free ride to walk away from 1,000 lives a day. And I believe we can do it.

Q Is it really dead? Isn't it really dead, Mr. President?
□,

THE PRESIDENT: No, I don't think it is dead.

Q You were depending on it for a lot of tax revenue, Mr. President. If you don't get it, where do you find that revenue?

THE PRESIDENT: That's not entirely true. It is true that a lot of the things that I think should be funded in terms of giving this money back to the states, who are out a lot of money because they spent a fortune treating people on tobacco-related illnesses, could be used to help children and families with things like child care. The Senate voted for that, and I thought it was a good amendment.

But the most important thing here is not that. The most important thing is to protect children from the dangers of tobacco. And that is at the nub of this and that is what needs to be put front and center. And if they will do it, we can still do this. But they have to hurry. There's not a lot of time.

Q Mr. President --

THE PRESIDENT: Mr. Bowles is handling all the details of this, and I think I should let him come up and talk about it.

Q Mr. President, do you think there will be political consequences for the people if this bill fails?

THE PRESIDENT: I certainly hope there will be, and there should be. I think that there are those who believe there won't be because the public has been treated to \$40 million of unanswered advertising by their allies. And they believe that the opinion that may be held in certain selected districts or whatever today is the one that will hold at election day. I don't believe that's true. I think when the American people understand fully what has been going on, they won't like what they see and they will be worried about these children. They nearly always -- the public almost always gets it right when they have enough time, and they've got plenty of time.

So I think we need to do this.

Q Mr. President, was it necessary to increase --

Q -- stay in session, and will you forego your own vacation in order to get this done? Would you forego your vacation?

MR. BOWLES: Sam, I'd be delighted to forego my vacation. As a matter of fact, seriously, I talked to Senator Lott today, and I told Senator Lott that we would be here in the month of August, that we would be here in the month of October, and we were prepared to move forward with this bill and continue to fight at every step of the process.

Q Is he the villain of the piece?

MR. BOWLES: I think there are 42 villains.

Q You're right, it was a serious question, and you answered it seriously. But the President could call on the Senate to stay in session until it took this bill up again and passed some version of the bill that could be sent to the House.

MR. BOWLES: We're going to continue both in the House and in the Senate to fight for passage of this bill. You're going to see this bill attached to almost every piece of legislation that comes down the pike. You're going to see us try to get the Hansen-Meehan bill discharged in the House of Representatives. We're going to continue to move forward with this bill because it's what the American people want, and 57 senators voted for it today.

Q What do you think really then stopped it cold in its tracks now?

MR. BOWLES: I think this is what I believe is the worst of Washington. I think politics stopped this thing cold.

Q Well, what do you say, Mr. Bowles, to those who say there was a \$350 billion deal that the state attorneys general made,

and that in the process of getting legislation you added on another \$150 billion which made it simply intolerable to the tobacco industry?

MR. BOWLES: I think that's incorrect. I think what we did was make this bill have a higher probability of doing something about stopping teenage smoking. Every study I've seen has shown that you need at least \$1.10 increase in the price of tobacco in order to do something serious about stopping kids from smoking. So this bill that we had had full FDA authority in there; it had \$1.10 increase in the price of tobacco; it had the right kinds of things in there to stop marketing to kids; and it had the right things in there to lessen the chance that kids would have access to tobacco. So it had the kinds of things that we felt were important.

In addition, it had what the Republicans said they needed. It had the anti-drug provisions; it had a tax cut. There's only one reason that this thing didn't pass, and that's that \$40 million that the tobacco industry spent on it and the \$12 million worth of campaign contributions that they had made.

Q Instead of getting a bill that the tobacco industry would have supported, that would have generated \$350 billion in revenue, that would have done all the things on advertising, you wind up with nothing.

MR. BOWLES: Oh, I don't think it's any chance that we're going to wind up with nothing. I think they have made a clear mistake. I think the American people will demand this happen. I have not met a single parent that wants their kids to begin to smoke.

Q So you think November is going to show the results of this?

MR. BOWLES: I certainly hope so.

Q How does this affect the balanced budget?

Q The President said the ad campaign has gone unanswered. Why has it gone unanswered? Why haven't you responded?

MR. BOWLES: The industry has spent \$40 million advertising. We have tried to do the best we could with the limited resources we had to come forward and get the message across to the American people. We have used the bully pulpit. The public health community has come forward with some ads, as you know, in order to educate people about this. We simply could not compete with that \$40 million that the industry chose to spend.

Q So your basic strategy now is to attach it to every bill that goes forward?

MR. BOWLES: We're going to try to attach it to every major piece of legislation that comes forward. We're going to make this a fight to the finish.

Q Mr. Bowles, does the tobacco industry have reason to celebrate tonight? Has its investment paid off?

MR. BOWLES: I think the American people have a reason

to really be sad tonight. I really do. I think every parent in this room should really be upset.

Q Did you and the President work the phones today, lobbying members of the Senate to try to --

MR. BOWLES: Yes, we did. And I think that's how we got 14 -- it's one of the reasons we got 14 Republicans to vote yes.

Q Approximately, how many senators did you talk to and the President talked to?

MR. BOWLES: I talked to a lot; I think the President said he talked to 10. I can't remember the exact number I talked to.

Q -- Republican Caucus today that led to this strategy of the defeat of the bill?

MR. BOWLES: I certainly think so.

Q Mr. Bowles, how will this affect the balanced budget?

MR. BOWLES: I don't think it's going to have a material effect on the balanced budget, Wolf. I think if you look at the budget we put together, the revenues that are going to come in here were going to be spent for research, they were going to be spent for counter-advertising and smoking cessation programs and public health. They were going to be spent for tobacco farmers and also going to be spent -- money going back to the states. And that's money now that we will not have, and therefore, we will not spend it.

Q Weren't you also going to spend money on child care?

MR. BOWLES: The child care money was in the money going to the states. There was about \$25 billion going to the states; some of that was child care money. There was about -- Bruce, correct me if my numbers are wrong -- about \$13 billion going for research, about \$13 billion going for smoking cessation counter-advertising and public health, and about \$10 billion going to the tobacco farmers. And I think that's roughly the whole amount of money.

Q Are you willing to come down on the overall number a little bit to try to meet the tobacco industry halfway?

MR. BOWLES: We have spent so long on this bill. We got it through the Senate committee on a vote by 19-1; we got 57 senators, well over a majority of the senators to vote for this thing. This is the right bill. This is the right construction. And we're going to go forward with this bill and try to get it passed.

Q Is this an indication, sir, that the President may have lost some clout with Congress because of his legal and personal problems?

MR. BOWLES: I don't see how. He got 57 senators to vote for him.

Thank you.

Health Care -- Gore's Family Conference: Next week, the Gores' will be hosting their annual family conference on the subject of health. You and the Vice President will be announcing a new Executive Directive on children's outreach and a multi-faceted national health initiative for older Americans, which includes: new preventive benefits for Medicare beneficiaries; a national Internet site for Medicare beneficiaries; and a new nationwide public/private Medicare council with over 80 organizations to ensure older Americans have the information they need to select health plans and to encourage prevention and wellness. To highlight the new Medicare preventive benefits, the First Lady will also announce a new public service announcement on osteoporosis, featuring her and Mrs. Gore. You will also renew your call to pass a patients' bill of rights and reiterate your commitment to continue to push Congress to pass comprehensive, anti-tobacco legislation.

Drugs -- Drug Courts: In response to your interest in drug courts, we are working with Rahm Emanuel on preparing to time the release of Justice Department drug court grants for an event the week of July 6. Approximately 150 jurisdictions will receive \$27 million in grants to help plan, implement, enhance, or evaluate drug courts. Some of the cities receiving grants include San Francisco, Omaha, Little Rock, Washington, D.C., and Atlanta. The drug court grants could be announced at the event to launch the national roll out of the youth anti-drug media campaign tentatively scheduled for July 9.

Drugs -- PRIDE Survey: On Thursday, the National Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education (PRIDE) released the findings of its survey on teen drug use for the 1997-98 school year. The annual PRIDE report is a survey of 154,350 students grades 6-12. Overall, drug, alcohol, and tobacco use by teens dropped -- the first across-the-board declines since the 1990-91 school year. The key exception to the declines were students in the 12th grade, who reported slight increases in their use of cigarettes, cocaine, uppers, and downers. However, for the first time in the 11 years of the PRIDE survey, cigarette use by junior high students fell (from 32% in 1996-97 to 29% in 1997-98). Marijuana use among both junior and senior high students also fell from last year's levels (from 15% to 13%, and from 36% to 33%, respectively).

Drugs -- Pulse Check: On June 25, ONDCP will release Pulse Check, its biannual report on the use and distribution of illicit drugs in 30 cities. The information contained in Pulse Check is gathered from ethnographers, law enforcement officials, and drug treatment providers. Some of the report's key findings include: (1) methamphetamine has continued its spread eastward and is now considered an emerging drug in Baltimore, and Columbia, MD; (2) heroin use is stable or rising, with young users who snort or smoke the drug increasing across the country; (3) crack is failing to attract new users, although powder cocaine use is rising among the affluent in a few areas; and (4) marijuana use is widespread, crossing economic and social groups. Director McCaffrey is planning to unveil Pulse Check with DEA Administrator Tom Constantine and NIDA Director Alan Leshner.

Crime -- Brady Handgun Checks: This Sunday, the Justice Department will release a report on presale handgun checks conducted in 1997. Last year, 2.5 million background checks of potential handgun buyers were conducted, preventing 69,000 purchases by prohibited purchasers. The vast majority of the 69,000 rejections -- roughly 62% -- were for felony convictions or current indictments; 9% were for domestic violence misdemeanors; 6% were fugitives; and 2% were for domestic violence protection orders. The report confirms the importance of Brady background checks: from February 28, 1994 (Brady Law effective date) through the end of 1997, 242,000 handgun sales to prohibited purchasers were blocked due to information yielded through checks. We have previously used a higher figure of 300,000 sales blocked, based on an earlier Justice Department estimate that 6,600 firearms sales are prevented monthly due to background checks. This estimate, however, also covered long guns since Justice could not separate out handguns from the data provided by states.

Crime -- Modified Assault Weapons: This week in the Senate Treasury-Postal FY 99 appropriations markup, we successfully fought off an attempt to undermine the Administration's recent decision to bar the importation modified assault weapons. Opponents of the Administration's decision had previously attempted to offer an amendment -- which was later withdrawn -- to grandfather more than a hundred thousand of these weapons into the country. To prevent such a broad-based amendment from passing, the Administration helped craft an amendment that passed to reimburse importers for a limited number firearms that were already in or en route to bonded warehouses (roughly 2,000-3,000 weapons). The weapons will then be destroyed.

Crime -- Drunk Driving/Zero Tolerance: As you know, the zero tolerance for underage drinking and driving provision you signed into law in 1995 required states to adopt this tough standard by October 1, 1998. On June 29, South Carolina will become the 50th state to enact a zero tolerance law. We would note, however, that Delaware's zero tolerance law does not fully comply with the federal standard and needs to be amended.

Education -- Teacher Education: Sen. Bingaman has proposed an amendment to the Higher Education Bill to be taken up by the Senate next week, that would impose new accountability requirements on teacher education programs. The bill would require

teacher education programs to publish the pass rate for students on state teacher certification tests and would ultimately cut off student financial aid to students in programs with less than a 70% pass rate. The amendment has the strong support of the NEA, is opposed by the higher education community, and by Sens. Jeffords, Kennedy, Coats and Dodd. We have been working with Bingaman and Kennedy to try to find an approach that retains the strong accountability emphasis without penalizing students for the low quality of their program.

Education -- Charter Schools: The Senate Human Resources Committee will mark-up a bill to expand the charter schools program when the Senate returns from the July 4th recess. The House passed a similar bipartisan bill last summer, which you supported. We are working with Sen. Kennedy to bolster his support for this bill, and to ensure that it provides incentives both for the more rapid expansion of charter schools and for strong accountability measures.

Welfare Reform -- U.S. Conference of Mayors Report: At its meeting in Reno on Friday, the USCM is releasing a report called "The Welfare Challenge Facing America's Cities." The report presents the results of a 125-city survey of mayor's views on welfare reform. The tone of the report is more positive than the report they released last June. They take a pragmatic view: while many mayors are concerned about the impact of welfare reform, they are working hard to facilitate the transition from welfare to work for their residents. They see some cause for optimism after the first 18 months, but also see the challenge of creating enough jobs and connecting people to those jobs. They cite concerns about adequate child care, transportation, skills training, and affordable housing near employment.

The report also estimates low-skills job gaps in many urban counties, based on projections by Regional Financial Associates, an economic consulting firm. RFA compared the number of low-skilled job seekers with the projected growth in low-skill jobs over the next five years, and concluded that there could be two job seekers for every low-skilled job. Specifically, the number of welfare recipients needing jobs over this period could exceed the number of jobs available by 353,000.

Projecting job gaps is difficult, and it appears that this study, like most similar studies, ignores the fact that some welfare recipients are already working and that they can take advantage of turnover in the labor market--not just new jobs. While the magnitude of the gap is hard to validate, the study does underscore important regional variations. In areas such as Fort Worth, Las Vegas, Little Rock, Miami, Phoenix, and San Francisco, projected job growth exceeds the expected number of job seekers; in areas including Detroit, Providence, Newark and Cleveland, the projected ratio of low skill jobs seekers to jobs is at least 10 to 1.

Nevertheless, the implication is that we need to work hard to ensure that welfare recipients can access employment opportunities created by our growing economy. We are

already spurring economic development in urban areas, through our Community Empowerment Fund, Community Development Financial Institutions, and a second round of Empowerment Zones. Our welfare-to-work transportation initiative and welfare-to-work housing vouchers will both go a long way to address this issue, as will the \$3 billion in welfare to work grants we secured in the Balanced Budget Act and the Welfare to Work Partnership's successful welfare to work hiring efforts.

Welfare Reform -- Federal Agencies to Issue Guidance to States on Civil Rights and Welfare Reform: After meeting with civil rights leaders several months ago, Secretary Shalala agreed to issue guidance to states on how civil rights laws apply to welfare reform, particularly the new parts of the welfare law relating to work and the time limit. As a result, HHS, DOJ, EEOC, DOL, and other agencies have finished draft guidance that they will share in the coming weeks with civil rights groups, states, and advocates. We share HHS's view that a user-friendly guide for states and caseworkers would be useful at this time. However, we want to ensure that states understand that these requirements are not new, and not misinterpret the guidance as imposing new requirements.

The guidance does include our first interpretation of how states may run afoul of the law in issuing exemptions to the five-year time limit. Our civil rights experts are in agreement that our guidance should say that **a racially neutral criterion that excludes a disproportionately greater number of minorities than non-minorities is permissible, so long as there is a substantial and legitimate justification for this criterion and there is no comparably effective alternative that excludes fewer minorities.** We are working with HHS to ensure a smooth roll-out of this draft with the states.

Immigration -- Agricultural Guestworkers: On March 12th, the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Immigration approved legislation sponsored by Rep. Bob Smith (R-OR) that provides for a new pilot program for the employment of temporary foreign agricultural workers. The bill includes provisions that would weaken or eliminate many of the worker protections provided for in the existing program (the H2A program). In a letter to the subcommittee, the Secretary of Labor stated that if the bill were presented to you, she would recommend a veto. However, in response to concerns expressed by growers and members of Congress (including Sens. Wyden and Graham and Rep. Bishop) about inefficiencies in the current H2A program, we initiated an inter-agency process to develop a streamlined proposal. We anticipate that several of the regulatory reforms contained in this proposal will be in place by the next growing season. Also, we intend to explore what substantive reforms we could effect to address the longstanding concerns by domestic farm workers that the H2A program does not adequately protect their interests.

Food Safety Initiative -- Senate Update: Of the Administration's proposed \$96 million food safety initiative for USDA and FDA, we received only \$16.8 million in the House Appropriations Committee and only \$2.6 million in the Senate. On Monday, the Senate is expected to begin voting on the Agriculture bill. Sens. Leahy, Harkin, and Daschle are willing

to work with us to offer amendments, but have indicated that they will only do so if we present an offset. On Thursday, we suggested an offset involving user fees which was rejected by Harkin's staff. OMB is working to develop some other possible offsets. In order to highlight the problem of food safety and to shine light on some non-legislative solutions that the Administration has already undertaken, the DPC is working on a possible event for Wednesday. Because summer is the most dangerous time of year for food safety, we believe that the July 4th radio address may be an appropriate time to raise the budget and other food safety issues that are currently pending in Congress. In addition to your FY1999 budget, there are other legislative proposals involving food safety currently pending. These proposals include mandatory recall for meat and poultry, civil fines for violations, and increased FDA inspection authority for imported foods.

At yesterday's H2A meeting, it was decided that the Labor Department will draft a NPRM that includes the following six regulatory reforms:

Require employers' H2A labor certification applications to be submitted 45 (rather than 60) days prior to the employers' "date of need."

Reduce the deadline for employer-provided housing to be available for inspection from 30 to 15 days prior to the employers' "date of need."

Growers will no longer be required to use a registered farm labor contractor (FLC or "crew leader") as a source of U.S. workers if the FLC has a demonstrated history of employing illegal or unauthorized workers or of other labor abuses.

Eliminate requirement that certified H2A employers provide notice of H-2A workers' departure for the place of employment.

INS to delegate H2A petition approval authority to DOL.

DOL will issue petition approval for replacement of certified H2A workers upon proof of the worker's repatriation.

These last two reforms impact the INS, so they will also need to do rulemaking. Sally gave them (DOL and DOJ/INS) a deadline of COB Thursday (June 25th) to give us drafts of these rules.

Also, the Labor Department will draft a letter to Sen. Coverdell that expresses our intentions on these reforms. This letter will also commit the DOL to initiating a process to address the more substantive areas of concern with the program. This last statement will likely signal to growers and farmworker advocates that we are planning to take on the wage and housing issues. We should see a draft of this letter tomorrow (Friday).

The general sense was that these reforms (particularly #5) will adequately respond to growers' concerns re: timeliness in the processing of H2A applications. Our hope is that the letter's signal on the housing and wage issues will indicate that we see this rulemaking as a first step and that we intend to tackle the more difficult parts of the program that need reform soon.

RADIO ADDRESS ON PROSTATE CANCER
JUNE 20, 1998

Good morning. Tomorrow is Fathers Day, the day we pay tribute to the irreplaceable role fathers play throughout the lives of their children. There is no greater responsibility -- and there is no greater reward -- for any man than raising a child. For me, there has been no job, not even the presidency, more important than being a father.

I want to talk to you today what we are doing to protect our fathers, our grandfathers, and all men from one of the greatest health threats they face: prostate cancer. This year, nearly 200,000 people will be diagnosed with prostate cancer -- and 40,000 will die from it. In fact, every year, as many men die from prostate cancer as women die from breast cancer.

For far too long, too little was known about prostate cancer. Too little was said about it, out of embarrassment and fear. Because of this, too little was done about it, as precious research dollars were spent on other problems.

For five years now, we have worked hard to increase public awareness about prostate cancer -- and to find a cure. Since I first took office, we have increased funding for prostate cancer research at the National Institutes of Health by 100%. This year alone, we are funding more than 450 critically important research projects on prostate cancer, ranging from prevention to detection to treatment. Last year, scientists at the Human Genome Project and Johns Hopkins University located the first gene known to predispose men to prostate cancer. Prostate cancer is the first disease being studied by the Cancer Genome Anatomy Project, a very exciting new program we recently launched at the NCI. We are closing in on this silent killer.

But as far as we have come, we know that many questions about prostate cancer remain unanswered. We do not fully understand the role of environmental and dietary factors in prostate cancer. We do not fully understand why the disease progresses at such varying rates in different men. We do not yet know why prostate cancer disproportionately affects African American men. And we do not yet know how to eliminate the risks of treatment for prostate cancer that discourage too many men from seeing their doctors.

The only way we will ever answer these questions -- and the only way we will ever beat prostate cancer -- is by continuing to invest in research. Today, I am pleased to announce that the Department of Defense is awarding \$60 Million in grants to some of the most promising research projects in the country. These grants will fund innovative new studies to determine the causes of prostate cancer, new methods of prevention and detection, and most of all, ground breaking new treatments that will save lives.

These grants are an important step in our fight against prostate cancer. But we must press on. This year, as part of historic legislation to protect our children from tobacco, I proposed to make the largest commitment in history to fund cutting edge cancer research. My proposal would also allow people on Medicare to participate in cancer clinical trials. This will be especially important for prostate cancer, which overwhelmingly affects men over 65. The more older men are able to participate in these trials, the more we will learn about this disease,

and the faster we will be able to find a cure.

But three days ago, a Republican minority in the Senate bowed to enormous pressure by the tobacco industry and voted against this legislation ... against protecting our children from tobacco ... against our families ... against increased cancer research ... against saving lives. And the American people won't stand for it.

This Fathers Day, as we celebrate how much fathers mean to their children, we should also renew our commitment -- as fathers, as parents, and as Americans -- to our families, by insisting that Congress join together in passing comprehensive bipartisan tobacco legislation that protects our children and strengthens our nation.

DOD Authorization/China: A cloture petition was filed today on the DOD Authorization bill; the vote will occur on Tuesday. If cloture is invoked on Tuesday, only germane amendments will be in order. Currently pending are two non-germane amendments offered by Senator Hutchinson - (1) an amendment to prohibit entrance/visas to any Chinese official participating in religious persecution; and (2) prohibit entrance to any official participating in forced abortion policies.

Emergency Spending and Y2K: the House Republican conference has decided NOT to allow any emergency designation of funding in the regular appropriations bills. This means that the Y2K money in the Treasury/Postal bill and the Defense bill will be stricken, probably with a self-enacting rule.

The House Appropriators are expecting a 1999 supplemental later this year to pay for all emergency spending which will be paid for with mandatory offsets. This bill would probably be around \$5 billion : \$3.85 bill for Y2K, \$250 mill for FEMA, \$1.1 bill for LIHEAP and possibly \$35 million for an ag provision on sanctions.

Acting Deputy Director for Management Ed DeSeve is scheduled to testify on Y2K before the House Reform & Oversight Subcommittee on Government Management on Monday, June 22.

FYI: Attached is a wrap-up of INS-related issues --

Restructuring Legislation: INS is still redrafting its restructuring legislative package. They plan to incorporate OMB's suggested expansion of the restructuring section in this revised draft. The draft is with the Commissioner and INS has told me it plans to submit a redrafted bill to the Department on Monday, June 22.

Hill Action: As a follow-up to Julie Fernandes' note, Lamar Smith's Immigration Subcommittee will not markup the Rogers-Reyes restructuring bill on Tuesday as expected. Apparently Chairman Hyde told Rogers that he was not using the Judiciary Committee to further the ends of the appropriators. As a result, the mark-up is off -- which may weaken Rogers resolve/ability to include an INS restructuring proposal in the CJS appropriations bill -- but I wouldn't bet on it.

Michael, you may want to raise the INS restructuring issue with the AG and Director on Tuesday to determine whether the Department and OMB will support a veto threat if restructuring along the lines of Reyes (two bureau within Justice) is included in CJS.

Naturalization: INS is still talking about some type of budget amendment to supplement FY 1999 for naturalization. They wanted to call Maria again. I told them not to -- that the WH would contact them about a follow-up meeting. I also said that from the DPC/OMB perspective INS must justify its current use of resources and outline a coherent backlog

reduction plan prior to any discussion of additional resources. I also told INS and the Department that they should not be floating any funding proposals to the WH that did not clear/having the blessing of the Department. I understand that Colgate told INS that seeking a supplemental appropriation at this time was "nuts."

Before I begin, I want to emphasize what previous speakers have said: there is no family health issue more important than protecting our children from tobacco. We have been working for some time now to forge an honorable, bipartisan compromise. But last week, in a brazen act of partisan politics, the Republican leadership chose tobacco companies over American families. The bill they killed not only gave parents a fighting chance against tobacco advertising that targets our children; it would also have protected kids from drugs, and given low- and middle-income families a tax break by ending the marriage penalty. **PRESIDENT CLINTON:
FIGHTING FOR LEGISLATION TO REDUCE TEEN SMOKING**

"Some have suggested that Congress should now just get in line and do what the tobacco lobby wants them to do... and appear to be passing a bill that will reduce teen smoking, that everybody knows will not have very much influence... We're going to stick with the children and their future...and keep working, to get a bill that will increase the price of cigarettes enough to deter smoking, that will have strong advertising restrictions, that will have strong access restrictions, that will invest in public health and do something honorable for tobacco farmers."

President Clinton is committed to passing landmark tobacco legislation that will reduce teen smoking and benefit the health and well-being of our children. The Senate's refusal to vote on this important legislation is a vote against our nation's families and children. The President will not accept scaled down legislation which does not seriously address the problem of teen smoking, but merely serves to give cover to members of Congress.

ON WEDNESDAY JUNE 17TH, THE SENATE REFUSED TO VOTE ON A BILL TO REDUCE TEEN SMOKING . The President supported legislation introduced by Senator John McCain (R-AZ) that contained the strongest anti-youth smoking provisions in our history -- legislation that would cut youth smoking in half over the next five years. When Senators could have sided with families and children, a minority of Senators chose instead to side with the tobacco industry, and blocked a vote on this important legislation.

WEDNESDAY'S DECISION WAS A VOTE AGAINST FAMILIES AND CHILDREN. The President worked in good faith with Senators who expressed concern about tobacco legislation and accepted Republican changes. Every major amendment to the tobacco bill was proposed by a member of the Republican majority. Tobacco legislation was voted out of Committee by a 19-1 margin; however, when the measure came to the Senate floor, many Republicans who had voted for the bill in committee switched their vote. In doing so, these Senators voted against:

- A law that would help save an estimated 1 million lives over the next five years by cutting youth smoking in half over the next five years;
- A tax cut to eliminate the marriage penalty for couples making less than \$50,000 a year, and increased funding for anti-drug measures;
- Caps on attorneys for lawyers involved in tobacco litigation.

THE PRESIDENT IS IN GOOD COMPANY. The President stands with leading public health organizations -- the American Heart Association, American Lung Association, and the American Cancer Society -- in calling for tobacco legislation that actually helps reduce teen smoking. That is why the President will not accept scaled down tobacco legislation that has no real chance of saving the lives of young people, but instead is simply intended to save the political lives of members of Congress.

THE TOBACCO LOBBY VS. CHILDREN AND FAMILIES. The Senate's vote and the lobbying effort by the tobacco industry, which spent \$40 million to defeat this measure, will not reduce the President's resolve or effort to pass tobacco legislation. The facts are clear: Smoking kills -- 3,000 children every day start smoking and 1,000 of those children will die early as a result. Instead of supporting a plan to reduce teen smoking, the Senate sided with the tobacco lobby. The Senators who blocked this vote are on the wrong side of this issue, and they are out of step with the communities and families of this country.

A STRATEGIC PLAN FOR REDUCING YOUTH SMOKING. For the last three years, the President has worked tirelessly to reduce teen smoking. The President has stated that tobacco legislation must meet 5 objectives: 1) a reduction in youth smoking by raising the price of cigarettes by up to \$1.10 over 5 years, with additional surcharges on companies that continue to sell to kids; 2) full authority for the Food and Drug Administration to regulate tobacco products; 3) changes in the way the tobacco industry does business, including an end to marketing and promotion to kids; 4) progress toward other public health goals, including biomedical and cancer research, a reduction of second-hand smoke, promotion of smoking cessation programs and other urgent priorities; and 5) protection for tobacco farmers and their communities.
