**PRESIDENT CLINTON AND VICE PRESIDENT GORE ANNOUNCE NEW INITIATIVES TO IMPROVE HEALTH FOR CHILDREN AND OLDER AMERICANS AT FAMILY REUNION CONFERENCE HOSTED BY VICE PRESIDENT AND MRS. GORE**

**June 22, 1998**

Today, at the seventh Family Reunion Conference in Tennessee hosted by Vice President and Mrs. Gore, the President and Vice President announced a series of new initiatives to improve health for older Americans and children, and to make the health care system more responsive to the needs of families.

**Children:** issued an Executive Memorandum that directs eight Federal agencies to implement over 150 new initiatives to help enroll the millions of uninsured children eligible for but not enrolled in health insurance programs; **Older Americans:** developed a multi-faceted national health initiative for older Americans, which includes: new preventive benefits for Medicare beneficiaries; a national Internet site; and a new nationwide public/private National Medicare Alliance Network with over 80 organizations to ensure older Americans have the information they need to select health plans and encourage prevention and wellness; **Families:** renewed the call on Congress to pass a patients' bill of rights.

**CHILDREN: SIGNED EXECUTIVE DIRECTIVE TO IMPLEMENT OVER 150 NEW FEDERAL COMMITMENTS TO ENROLL ELIGIBLE BUT UNINSURED CHILDREN.** Over 4 million uninsured children are eligible for but not enrolled in Medicaid, and as the new Children's Health Insurance Program is implemented, even more families will have children who are eligible for state or federal health insurance programs. Today, the President signed an Executive Memorandum that cuts across jurisdiction and traditional agency inflexibility by directing eight Federal agencies -- ranging from HUD to SSA to the Education Department -- to implement over 150 new Federal initiatives to help sign up the millions of uninsured children eligible for but not enrolled in health insurance programs. This action illustrates how a responsive and flexible government can meet the evolving needs of families. The initiatives include:

- **Sending letters to 350,000 federal workers, including Head Start teachers, school nurses, child support workers, and community health center directors** asking them to ensure that all of the families they work with whose children are eligible for Medicaid or CHIP are enrolled in these programs.
- **Working With National Organizations and Programs That Reach Millions of Families to Help Enroll Children in Health Insurance Programs**, including educating grandparents through the Medicare program, holding a conference with Historically Black Colleges to identify new strategies, and ensuring that sites, including 15,000 public housing projects, 400 IRS walk-in centers, and 113 job centers, have information for families about how to enroll children in health insurance.
- **Releasing a New Guide to Help Child Care Workers Enroll Uninsured Children.** Child care centers are one family-friendly setting where parents can learn about insurance programs they may be eligible for. There are already many efforts underway to link child care centers with the health needs of the millions of children in child care. Today, the Department of Health and Human Services is releasing a new child care handbook "Child Care and Medicaid: Partners for Healthy Children" to ensure that child care workers understand how to identify and enroll families with uninsured children.

**OLDER AMERICANS: ANNOUNCED NEW NATIONAL CAMPAIGN TO IMPROVE HEALTH OF OLDER AMERICANS.** One of the greatest concerns for families is the health of older family members. Today, the President and Vice President:

- **Implemented Historic New Preventive Benefits for Medicare Beneficiaries.** The President and Vice President announced that starting July 1st, for the first time, Medicare will cover two critical preventive benefits -- bone mass measurement tests to detect osteoporosis and diabetes education. The President signed into law these new benefits -- as well as a series of preventive benefits to detect cancer, which were implemented earlier this year -- as part of the historic Balanced Budget Act of 1997. These benefits underscore how Medicare is trying to encourage better health outcomes for families.
- **Launched a New Internet Site for Medicare Beneficiaries.** Families need good information to help make the best health care decisions for older family members. Today, the President and Vice President launched a new nationwide Internet site (Medicare.gov) so that families can understand the options and services Medicare provides. This information will be even more critical as the historic changes the President enacted as part of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 are implemented this fall. These reforms give beneficiaries new plan choices that will improve care for older Americans, but also have the potential to cause confusion.
- **Created a Nationwide Public/Private Medicare Education Alliance Network, including over 80 National Organizations, to Ensure Families Are Informed Health Care Consumers.** The President and Vice President announced that over 80 organizations, including the AFL-CIO, American Association of Retired Persons, Older Women's League, National Rural Health Association, and American Association of Family Physicians, are joining with the Health Care Financing Administration, Administration on Aging, and National Institutes of Health to launch a new National Medicare Alliance Network that will work to ensure that families have the information they need to make critical health decisions including: ensuring that Medicare beneficiaries learn of the new preventive benefits and other prevention and wellness strategies; understand new plan options so they can select the health plan that best meets their needs; and know the consumer protections available under Medicare.

**FAMILIES: MAKING THE HEALTH CARE SYSTEM MORE RESPONSIVE TO THE NEEDS OF FAMILIES**

- **Renewing Call on Congress to Pass a Patients' Bill of Rights.** The President also urged Congress to stop delaying and pass a patients' bill of rights to ensure that all families have the patient protections they need in a rapidly changing health care system. This patients' bill of rights should contain a range of protections, including guaranteed access to needed health care specialists, access to emergency room services when and where the need arises, and access to a meaningful **internal and external appeals process for consumers to resolve their differences with their health plans and health care providers.**

SUBJECT: Bilingual Education

On June 4, the House Education and Workforce Committee reported H.R. 3982, the English Fluency Act, introduced by Rep. Frank Riggs. This bill raises many of the same programmatic issues and political dynamics as the Unz Initiative in California. The purpose of this memo is to update you on this proposal and the development of an Administration alternative, and to present you with options for how to proceed.

**I. Overview of Riggs Bill**

The bill would eliminate the existing Bilingual Education and Emergency Immigrant Education programs and would (1) distribute funds through a block grant that is not targeted toward school districts with the highest quality programs and greatest funding need; (2) require states to withdraw funding from local programs in cases where students do not master English within two years and set a 3-year limit for serving any individual student, though it would not provide any extra help for students or corrective action for programs that need it; (3) not require States to maintain their own efforts; and (4) eliminate professional development programs designed to prepared qualified ESL and bilingual education teachers. The bill also seeks to sharply curtail the enforcement powers of the Education Department's Office of Civil Rights by voiding existing voluntary compliance agreements between OCR and local school districts with regard to educating LEP students and by requiring OCR to publish -- and the Congress to ratify -- new guidelines and compliance standards for Title VI enforcement. These provisions would weaken enforcement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and result in increased litigation.

**II. Development of Administration Alternative**

We are finalizing an alternative bill based on the principles you approved and Secretary Riley articulated in his statement of opposition to the Unz Initiative. This bill would amend (rather than replace entirely) the existing bilingual education program. Specifically, it would require participating school districts to (1) establish a goal of preparing LEP students to enter successfully regular English classrooms in not more than three years, (2) conduct annual assessments of student's English proficiency; (3) provide additional help for students not on track

to English proficiency; (4) develop a corrective action plan, to be approved by the Secretary, if a significant percentage of students do not meet the 3-year goal.

To ensure accountability for results, districts that fail to make adequate progress after implementing a corrective action plan would not receive additional funding. Districts that make outstanding progress toward the three year goal would receive an additional 2-4 years of funding.

In addition, the bill would guarantee local flexibility by removing the existing cap on funding for programs that do not use the students native language, and would remove the competitive priority currently given to programs designed to maintain native language while helping students learn English.

This bill would be a solid first step to reform federal programs to help students become proficient in English. The Education Department is working on a more thorough approach as part of its planning for the reauthorization of ESEA next year. This approach would include a more thorough overall of the bilingual education program, as well as an effort to make Title 1 a more effective tool for helping LEP students learn English.

In addition to this legislation, we believe a broader set of steps is necessary. The poor performance of Hispanic and other students with limited English proficiency in mastering English and in other academic subjects is not solely or primarily the result of bilingual education; it has as much to do with the overall quality of their schools and teachers, and the level of support they receive from the broader community. The Bilingual Education Program is not the only federal resource at your disposal to strengthen efforts to help students learn English. Our efforts, and the national debate, should not be focused solely on "fixing" one part of the problem.

Therefore, in preparation for the FY 2000 budget we are developing a larger package of initiatives. We are working to get the package ready for you to announce in the near future. Though there is still additional work to be done to put this package together, we expect that the final version will address the following elements:

- **A Legislative Proposal.** You would transmit the Education Department's amendments to the Bilingual Education Act, and also announce that next year you will propose changes to Title 1 to make it a more effective vehicle for helping students become proficient in English. This is important because more LEP students are served under Title 1 than by federal bilingual education programs. If you chose not to send legislation this session, you would instead announce your intention to transmit legislation to overhaul bilingual education next year, and give enough detail so that the underlying principles are clear and your announcement is credible.
- **A Directive to Identify National and International Models of Best Practice.** You would direct the Secretary of Education to produce and widely disseminate a report by next Fall that would identify places in the U.S. and internationally that help students

become proficient in English (or another 2nd language as appropriate) within 3 years.

- **An Initiative to Strengthen Teaching for LEP Students.** The existing bilingual education program provides strong support for the recruitment, preparation and continued training of bilingual and ESL teachers. We are exploring ways to strengthen this component. Options include further funding increases, additional incentives to attract teachers to the field, and the creation of mentoring programs for beginning teachers.
- **A Community-Based Initiative.** We are exploring how best to promote community based efforts to provide extra help for LEP students to learn English through after-school tutoring, Saturday programs, and other approaches. We are looking for ways to build on our work on America Reads, the 21st Century Learning Program, and High Hopes to accomplish this.
- **An R&D Initiative.** We intend to propose an R&D initiative that can point the way for how best to strengthen practice. This might include studies and demonstrations of best practices for students of different ages (ranging from the early grades to 18-24 year olds with little formal schooling), exploration of how technology can improve the delivery of services and the assessment of language proficiency, and other areas with the potential for high impact.
- **A Proposal to Help English Speaking Students Learn Foreign Languages.** This package provides an important opportunity to broaden the debate about bilingual education by recognizing the value of bilingualism in a global economy. In particular, we are looking at ways to provide incentives and support for more schools to provide foreign language instruction in the early grades, when students are best equipped to learn a second language.

### **III. Congressional Dynamic**

H.R. 3892 was reported out of committee on a straight party line vote (22-17). While the bill will certainly move in the House, there is no hint of movement on the Riggs bill in the Senate.

In the House, the bill may well proceed on two parallel tracks: as a rider to the Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations bill, and as a free-standing bill. The Appropriations bill will be marked up in subcommittee on June 24, and the Riggs bill will be incorporated into it. Subcommittee Democrats view the appropriations bill as so fundamentally flawed that they do not plan on offering any amendments to try and improve it. The bill will provide approximately \$2 [Jon--check figure with Chow or Frost] billion less than you have requested for overall education spending; make significant cuts in Administration priorities such as Goals 2000, and contain a number of unacceptable riders including a prohibition on national testing and the creation of one or more block grants out of existing programs.

House Democrats have not yet finalized a strategy for this bill at the full committee and when it comes to the floor. It appears likely that any amendments offered will be designed to promote a unified Democratic message rather than to materially improve the bill. We do not expect the Hispanic Caucus to mount an effort to strip Riggs from the bill.

It is also likely that the Riggs bill will come to the floor as a free-standing measure shortly after the recess. Few Members have focused on this prospect yet, and the extent to which Democrats are prepared to oppose Riggs without the cover of an alternative bill to reform bilingual education is simply not clear. Mr. Gephardt's office will be alerting members this week to the prospective floor vote. However, their preferences may not become clear until they return from recess.

Notwithstanding the success of the Unz Initiative, Committee Democrats (including moderates such as Reps. Roemer and Kind, and Hispanic Caucus Members Reps. Martinez, Romero-Barcelo, Hinojosa and Sanchez) did not feel compelled to offer an alternative to Riggs's bill during markup. However, as the prospect of a floor vote brings things into focus, this could change. Rep. Roemer now believes an alternative would be important. Leaders of the Hispanic Caucus, including Caucus Chairman Becerra and Education Committee Member Hinojosa, have quietly acknowledged that, for the greater good of the Democratic Caucus, such a floor alternative might become necessary. However, up until now they have been adamantly opposed to a floor alternative, and remain to be convinced that one is necessary for a successful floor strategy. In addition to their own apprehensions, Hispanic Caucus members are under substantial political pressure from bilingual advocates to steer clear of an alternative.

#### **IV. Legislative Options**

In order to proceed we must determine when and under what conditions to transmit legislation to reform bilingual education. There are two basic options.

##### **Option 1. Transmit An Administration Bill Independent of House Democrats**

Sending up a bill in the near future would demonstrate your clear commitment to reforming bilingual education, and would position you in the reasonable center of the emerging national debate, between those such as Unz and Riggs who are proposing extreme and punitive approaches on the one hand, and those who are defending the status quo that was rejected by a large margin of the public, at least in California. From this point of view, it will be important to transmit the bill as soon as possible in the event that the Riggs bill reaches the floor, or otherwise captures press attention as it moves forward. It will provide House Democrats with a ready-made alternative to Riggs if they feel the need for one. Even if this bill is not introduced or does not garner much support among Democrats, by staking out a clear and independent Administration position now, you can have a significant impact on next year's debate, when legislation to reform bilingual education is more likely to reach your desk.

There are significant legislative down sides to introducing an Administration bill now, if

House Democrats have otherwise concluded that they neither want nor need an alternative bill. In particular, introducing an alternative at this time would be perceived by the Hispanic Caucus as jumping the gun strategically, and preempting meaningful consultation regarding the substance of an alternative. It would generate a hostile reaction from the Caucus, and is likely to recreate the same divisions among House Democrats we saw last year on national testing. The prospects that the Black Caucus would ally itself with the Hispanic Caucus and Republicans in opposition to your bill are high. Under these circumstances, there is a good chance that your proposal would not find a Democratic sponsor, or if introduced and allowed to come up on the floor as an alternative to Riggs, would be defeated by a large, bipartisan margin. Opposition by the Hispanic and Black Caucus would almost certainly spill over into renewed opposition to continued funding for the national test (though the prospects of support from the two caucuses is slim at best in any event), and perhaps to other legislative battles as well.

Further, there is the outside chance that sending up an Administration alternative that lacks support from Democrats could push Riggs to seek to narrow the differences between his approach and yours. He has indicated privately that he does not see large differences between his approach and the principles outlined in the Administration's opposition to Unz, and that he is ultimately prepared to drop the civil rights enforcement provisions in his bill. If Riggs were to modify his bill in order to more closely reflect the principles in ours, we would have a difficult time opposing his bill and would risk infuriating Democrats if we cut a deal with him.

#### **Option 2. Defer to the Congressional Democrats on the Timing of Transmittal**

An alternative course of action would be to proceed immediately to consult with members of the Hispanic Caucus and other Democrats on the shape of an alternative bill, using the Administration bill as the starting point, and making our 3-year goal and strengthened accountability as nonnegotiable principles which must be incorporated into any legislation we would support. While there is no guarantee that Democrats in general and the Members of the Hispanic Caucus in particular will endorse our approach, we can gain leverage in these negotiations by making clear that a veto threat to Riggs remains dependent upon the introduction of an alternative consistent with our principles. We can also make clear that we will transmit a reauthorization bill next year that is fully consistent with these principles.

If we determine together with House Democrats that an alternative is strategically necessary when the bill comes to the floor or is taken up by the appropriations committee, we could then introduce a bill consistent with our principles that would unite, rather than divide Democrats. Alternatively, if House Democrats either do not want an alternative when the Riggs bill or the Appropriations bill reaches the floor, or will not support an approach based on our principles, we can reassess our position at that time and either send up our own alternative or choose to wait until next year's reauthorization.

This approach is more likely to unite the Democrats over a potentially divisive issue, keep them united for the larger education and other battles over the coming months, and enable those

of us in the Administration to focus our time and energy on fights with Republicans rather than on infighting within the Democratic Caucus.

There are clear down sides to this approach as well. It places a large measure of control over the timing and, to some extent the content, of your own proposal in the hands of Members who do not share your views about the need or way to reform bilingual education. Consequently, the chances are high that you would not transmit legislation at all this year, and you would therefore be unable to position yourself or to effectively define the debate.

**Recommendation:** Your advisors are split on this issue. On policy grounds, Bruce Reed favors Option 1, though he recognizes that your final determination may depend more upon political than policy calculations. **[this is the language you and Bruce wanted a few weeks ago]** Maria Echeveste, Janet Murguia, Mickey Iberra and Karen Skelton recommend Option 2. **[need to determine Riley's and Stein's position--though if their staff are any guide, they will go for Option 2]**

**House Republican Leadership to Release Health Bill.** Responding to pressures related to the perception that Republicans have not been responsive to the demand for a patients' bill of rights or tobacco legislation, the Republican House Leadership is expected to release their version of a patients' bill of rights next week. It is expected that this bill will include a watered-down patients' bill of rights initiative, combined with "Health-Mart" and "multi-employer welfare association" provisions that many believe will be flawed policy. The combination of these two provisions may well enable small businesses to exempt themselves from state-regulated health provisions, which would have the effect of eliminating state-passed protections and lead to further segmentation of an already flawed marketplace. The Republican initiative may include some inefficient tax incentive initiatives, but it remains unclear how they would be paid for. As of this writing, it is uncertain whether this bill will satisfy Congress Norwood's desire for a patients' bill of rights initiative. If it does, the likelihood of a discharge position passing the House will be extremely unlikely. If not, we can expect an intensive effort by both Congressman Norwood and Congressman Dingell to collaborate on a discharge position.

## HEALTH IDEAS

**Release New Executive Order Authorizing OPM to terminate FEHBP Insurance Plans Who Are Out of Compliance with Kennedy-Kassebaum Law.** To provide additional enforcement teeth for both states and HCFA, this policy would allow FEHBP to take actions, up to and including termination in the plan, against insurers who have discriminated against sicker patients. Although there have not been any new reports of problems in this area, this action would be characterized as reducing the likelihood that we will see additional marketing and other administrative abuses.

**Release new HHS Report on Long-Term Care and Announce Policy Initiative(s).** A new report from HHS shows that millions of American families care for chronically ill elderly relatives and friends, and this is a significant strain on families. The President could announce an initiative to encourage private long-term care insurance by offering it through Federal Employees' Health Benefits Plan and by explaining to new Medicare beneficiaries that Medicare does not cover long-term care and that they should consider private insurance. In addition, if we are willing to consider proposals with budgetary effects, we could announce a new respite care tax credit (still in the early stages of policy development).

**Approve the 25th State Children's Health Insurance Program.** As of June 19, 20 states have had their plans approved; In early July, we anticipate that we will approve the 25th CHIP plan, achieving the half-way target. The states that have been approve have estimated that they will be covering 2.5 million children when their plans are fully implemented. We could release another progress report, maybe bring in the Governors, or bring in families who have already been helped by the program.

**Enhance Welfare-to-Work Commitment by Giving States Option to Maintain Health Insurance for Working Adults.** We will hopefully be able to bridge an impasse about publishing the "100-hour rule" reg. This will allow the states who did not have an 1115 welfare waiver before welfare reform to have the option of expanding coverage to two-parent families under Medicaid.

**Announce Outreach Effort for Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries.** A new report, to be released by Families USA in early July, will show that about 3.9 million beneficiaries -- nearly half who are eligible -- do not get premium assistance under Medicaid. We could announce ore release an executive directive to order HCFA, SSA, and Administration on Aging implement new outreach and enrollment initiatives (this could either be a proactive initiative or at least to inoculate ourselves against a report that is likely to receive a great deal of attention).

**Announce and Promote Policies for People with Disabilities.** We have been working on administrative and legislative policies to encourage de-institutionalization for people who would rather reside in the community. There also has been legislation on "return to work;" we could offer policies that are affordable and paid-for in this context. These actions could be announced on July 26, the anniversary of the Americans with Disability Act (note: the Vice President has

tentatively agreed to unveil a wheelchair at the FDR Memorial that day), or the President can highlight new State Medicaid options created in the Balanced Budget Act at the National Governors' Association conference in early August.

Q: What did the President announce today?

A: Today, President Clinton announced that the Department of Health and Human Services will issue annual reports providing fuller and more accurate information on teen tobacco use than ever before, including information on teen tobacco use by brand. Noting that parents have a right to know which companies are marketing products to their children and that public health officials can use this information to reduce tobacco use among youth, the President reaffirmed his commitment to taking every step he can -- with or without the Congress -- to stop teen smoking. When the Congress takes up comprehensive tobacco legislation, these new data will form the basis for lookback surcharges that will ensure tobacco companies undertake meaningful efforts to reduce youth smoking.

Q: How will these new data be used?

A: The collection of data on youth tobacco use by brand will give parents new information and provide public health officials with new tools to address youth tobacco use. With this information, public health officials can determine how different kinds of tobacco marketing campaigns (e.g., the Joe Camel campaign) affect tobacco use, and they can target their tobacco control efforts accordingly. And when the Congress once again takes up comprehensive tobacco legislation, these new data will form the basis for lookback surcharges that will ensure tobacco companies undertake meaningful efforts to reduce youth smoking.

Q: How will these new tobacco data be collected?

A: To provide the information the President has called for, the Department of Health and Human Services will expand one of its major annual surveys, the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse (NHSDA), conducted by the Office of Applied Studies in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. In particular, HHS will:

Expand the NHSDA to collect information on youth tobacco use by brand. Currently the survey collects information on the percentage of children that use different types of tobacco products (e.g., cigarettes, smokeless), but does not collect information about which brands of these tobacco products children use.

Increase the number of teenagers surveyed. HHS will increase the number of 12- to 17-year-olds surveyed to 22,500 to provide more precise estimates of youth use of tobacco, drugs, alcohol, and other substances.

Introduce Computer-Assisted Technology. The survey will incorporate a new, state of the art technology called "Audio Computer Assisted Self Interview" or ACASI to collect information from respondents. With ACASI, respondents listen to questions through earphones and enter their responses by punching keys on a laptop computer. The greater privacy and confidentiality afforded respondents through ACASI increases the truthfulness of survey responses, which improves the accuracy and usefulness of the results. For 1999, this technology will be used only for questions related to tobacco use. It will be incorporated for other questions during the 2000 and 2001 surveys.

Q: By adding tobacco questions to the drug survey, isn't the President once again saying he thinks tobacco is a greater threat to our children than drugs?

A: In fact these changes will help us collect better information on both drug use and tobacco use. Expanding the number of 12- to 17-year-olds surveyed in the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse will give us more precise estimates of nationwide use and incorporating computer-assisted technology will improve the truthfulness of the responses.

Q: Does the President's action today mean that he has given up on Congress?

A: Not at all. The President will continue to fight for bipartisan comprehensive tobacco legislation in both the Senate and the House. But the President is determined to move forward to protect America's children from tobacco, with or without the Congress.

In a few moments I will be leaving for the Vice President's Family Reunion Conference in Nashville, where I will speak about the health care concerns American families face. Before I depart, I want to make clear: one of the most important health issues our families face is youth smoking. 3,000 children a day start smoking, and 1,000 of them will die early because of it. That is why, three years ago, through the FDA, we began to act to end the practice of tobacco companies marketing to our children. And that is why, for the past year, we have been working to forge an honorable, bipartisan compromise that protects our children from the dangers of tobacco.

A majority of the Senate stands ready to join us in making progress; but last week, the Republican leadership placed partisan politics -- and tobacco companies -- above America's families. Their vote was not just pro-tobacco; it was anti-family. The bipartisan bill they blocked would not only protect families from tobacco advertising that targets children; it would also protect kids from drugs, and give low- and middle-income families a tax break by ending the marriage penalty. It would [improve child care and] make an important investment in cancer research.

The congressional leadership seems willing to walk away from its obligation to America's children. But this issue is too important to walk away. I will continue to do everything in my power to protect the health of our children. And while we wait for Congress to heed the call of America's families, I am today asking the Department of Health and Human Services to produce the first-ever annual survey on the brands of cigarette that teenagers smoke, and which companies are most responsible for this problem. Parents, quite simply, have a right to know. Public health officials can also use this new information to reduce youth smoking. Once this information becomes public, the tobacco companies will no longer be able to duck their responsibilities -- and neither will Congress. From now on, the new data will help to hold tobacco companies accountable for targeting our children.

Again, I urge Congress to pass a comprehensive, bipartisan bill -- rather than a watered-down bill, written by the tobacco lobby, that aims not to save the lives of children but to save the political lives of the congressional leadership. America's children deserve better than that, and I will continue to do everything I can to ensure that they receive it.

Before I begin, I want to emphasize what previous speakers have said: no family health issue is more important than protecting our children from tobacco. We have been working for some time now to forge an honorable, bipartisan compromise. A majority of the Senate stands ready to make progress by passing meaningful legislation. But last week, in a brazen act of partisan politics, the Republican leadership chose tobacco companies over American families. The bipartisan bill they blocked would not only give parents a chance against tobacco ads that target children. It would also protect kids from drugs, and give low- and middle-income families a tax break by ending the marriage penalty. It would [improve child care and] make an important investment in cancer research. **So this was not just a pro-tobacco vote; across the board, it was an anti-family vote.**

The congressional leadership will not succeed in clouding the debate or changing the subject from the health of our children. And they will not convince me that this battle is over, because we're going to keep on fighting it until we win it for our children. I urge all members of Congress to join in passing comprehensive legislation that curbs youth smoking. But one thing I will not do is participate in a charade that fails to protect our kids and instead gives political cover to the allies of the tobacco lobby. I will not settle for anything less than honest legislation. Because our children deserve no less.

In many ways, this is a moment of great opportunity for America. Our economy is strong and social problems are on the mend. Families are more secure. For five years now, our administration has fought to give America's families more options for affordable health care. We've helped Americans keep health coverage when they change jobs. And we've proposed a patients' bill of rights to ensure that all families have the protections they need in a changing health care system. Families benefit only when we put their interests above special interests -- just as we are trying to do with the tobacco bill -- so I urge Congress to act to protect patients' rights before the end of this session.

America is making great progress in protecting the health of all our family members, from the oldest to the youngest. Previous speakers described the steps we're taking to fulfill our sacred obligation to older Americans. I want to take a moment to explain what we're doing for younger Americans -- our most precious responsibility as parents, and as a nation.

Last year, we made a historic investment in our children's health that will give up to 5 million uninsured kids access to the medical coverage they deserve. In my balanced budget for

1999, I have proposed to give states the funds and flexibility to enroll hard-to-reach children -- because millions of them, though eligible for Medicaid, remain without coverage. And, as recent studies have shown us, uninsured children are more likely to be sick as newborns; less likely to be immunized; and less likely to receive treatment for recurring illnesses, like ear infections or asthma. Without treatment, those conditions can have lifelong consequences.

**Every family knows: there is no concern greater than a child's illness; there is no priority greater than a child's health.** That is why, four months ago, I asked eight federal agencies to find new ways to help provide health care for children. And today, I am signing an Executive Memorandum directing those agencies to implement more than 150 initiatives, from information for schools and child care centers to partnerships with job centers and Head Start. Working together, we can enroll the millions of uninsured children in Medicaid or our new Children's Health Insurance Program.

As the health care industry evolves, families' needs also change. So must the government that works to meet their needs. The federal commitments I am enacting today give government a new flexibility -- cutting across agency lines, forging relationships with private organizations, pooling resources to protect the most vulnerable Americans. This is more than good policy; it is a fundamental obligation to our families. As we approach the 21st century, I am confident we will fulfill that responsibility -- and have healthier and stronger families, and a healthier and a stronger America.

I would now like to open the roundtable for discussion, and I look forward to hearing all your perspectives.

Today, President Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton attend the Seventh Annual Family Re-Union Conference being hosted by Vice President Al Gore and Tipper Gore in Nashville, Tennessee. The President announces several important health care initiatives aimed at improving the health of older Americans and children, and reaffirms his support for a Patients' Bill of Rights to make the health care system more responsive to the needs of families.

**A PLAN FOR TRACKING TEENAGE TOBACCO USE.** Before leaving for the Family Re-Union Conference, President Clinton called on the Department of Health and Human Services to gather more accurate and in-depth data on teen tobacco use, provide information on teen tobacco use by brand, and give parents and public health officials greater information on how marketing campaigns affect teen smoking habits.

**A FORUM TO DISCUSS FAMILY ISSUES.** Since 1992, the Vice President and Mrs. Gore have moderated an annual conference to explore ways in which public policy can be viewed through the lens of the family. These "Family Re-Union" Conferences provide the Vice President and others who make policy at the federal, state and local level an opportunity to hear from and learn from the experience of families themselves, and those who work with them. The theme of this year's conference is families and health, the President and Vice President will announce a series of major policy initiatives to improve the quality of health care for our nation.

**SIGNING UP UNINSURED BUT ELIGIBLE CHILDREN FOR STATE HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAMS.** Over 4 million children are eligible for Medicaid but are not enrolled, and as the new Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) is implemented, even more families will have children who are eligible for State/Federal health insurance coverage. Today, the President will sign an Executive Memorandum instructing eight federal agencies to implement over 150 new initiatives to help sign up the millions of children who are eligible for, but not enrolled in, health insurance. These initiatives include:

- Sending over 350,000 letters to federal workers, including Head Start teachers, school nurses, child support workers, and community health center directors, asking them to ensure that all of the families they work with whose children are eligible for Medicaid or CHIP are enrolled;
- Working with national organizations to help enroll children in health insurance programs. The government will work with diverse groups, from grandparents in Medicare to historically black colleges to educate and identify new strategies to help get eligible children health care coverage. This initiative will also ensure that public housing projects, walk-in IRS centers, and job centers have information about how to enroll eligible children in health insurance;
- Releasing a new guide to help child care workers enroll uninsured children. The Department of Health and Human Services is releasing a new child care handbook to ensure that child care workers understand how to identify and enroll families with eligible, but uninsured children in a health care plan.

**A NATIONAL CAMPAIGN TO IMPROVE THE HEALTH OF OLDER AMERICANS.** Today, the President and Vice President will:

- Implement historic preventative benefits for Medicare recipients. Starting July 1st 1998, Medicare will cover two critical preventative benefits -- bone mass measurement tests for osteoporosis, and diabetes education;
- Create a nationwide Medicare Education Alliance Network between the private and public sector that will work to ensure that families have the information they need to make critical health decisions;
- Launch a new Internet site for Medicare beneficiaries. To better educate families about health care decisions involving older family members, a new Internet site, [www.Medicare.gov](http://www.Medicare.gov) is being launched so families can remain up-to-date on new Medicare policy initiatives and health options.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE APPROPRIATIONS BILL, FY 1999  
(Sponsors: Livingston (R); Louisiana; Young (R), Florida)

This Statement of Administration Policy provides the Administration's views on the Department of Defense Appropriations Bill, FY 1999, as reported by the House Appropriations Committee. Your consideration of the Administration's views would be appreciated.

The Committee has developed a bill providing requested funding for many of the Administration's priorities. We appreciate the Committee's decision to fully fund the military pay raise and to fund critical

readiness programs at sufficient levels. Also, we are pleased that most of the modernization priorities of the Department of Defense (DoD) are funded at or near requested levels. The Administration, however, is disappointed that the Committee bill provides \_\_\_\_\_ million below the President's request in order to increase funding for lower priority military construction projects. Also, as discussed below, the Administration has serious concerns about certain provisions included in the Committee bill, which must be addressed satisfactorily as the bill moves through the process.

The Administration strongly opposes any provision in the Committee bill that could be read to require prior congressional authorization of actions taken by the President pursuant to his authority under the Constitution. The President must be able to act decisively to protect U.S. national security and foreign policy interests. This provision would send the wrong signal to the world, including U.S. resolve regarding Iraqi compliance with its obligations with respect to weapons of mass destruction, the SFOR operation in Bosnia, and efforts to deter Serbian President Milosevic from attacks on the people of Kosovo. The President's senior national security advisers would recommend veto of a bill with a provision such as this one that could be interpreted to restrict the President's exercise of constitutional authority.

#### Funding for Bosnia

The Administration regrets that the Committee has not included funding for our ongoing operations in Bosnia. U.S. military presence, albeit at lower force levels, is critical for continued progress in implementing the Dayton Peace Accords. Moreover, a secure funding source for these operations at the start of the fiscal year will allow the Department to manage its readiness accounts effectively throughout the year. Although funding requirements for operations in Bosnia were not known when the FY 1999 Budget was prepared, the Administration created a funding reserve in the budget to cover these costs, and on March 3, 1998, the President requested funding for this purpose. The Administration strongly urges the Congress to provide emergency funding in the Defense appropriations bill to support the U.S. troops in Bosnia.

#### Year 2000 Reserve Funds

The Administration appreciates the emphasis that the Committee has placed on Year 2000 (Y2K) computer conversion activities. In the FY 1999 Budget, the President requested \$364 million for Y2K computer conversion. We recognize, however, that ensuring DoD compliance may require the flexibility to respond to unanticipated requirements. As such, we would intend to employ the contingent reserve set aside by the Committee only to the extent necessary, in order to ensure funds are available to address emerging needs.

The Administration would strongly oppose efforts to strike the emergency contingency fund from this bill. The value of the emergency mechanism approved by the House Appropriations Committee is the flexibility it provides in the event that we determine that additional resources are required. We have only 557 days until January 1, 2000. We want to solve this problem as soon as possible. By delaying approval of emergency funding and reopening the issue of the use of the emergency spending authority, the House will create controversy and delay. We hope the House will reconsider.

#### Operation & Maintenance (O&M) Adjustments

The Administration appreciates the Committee's emphasis on preserving military readiness by funding critical O&M programs. Force readiness could be threatened, however, by the bill's undistributed reductions to other O&M programs, such as civilian personnel pay, travel, and headquarters activities. The President's request is tightly constructed within the discretionary caps agreed to in the Bipartisan Budget Agreement. Any adjustments must be carefully evaluated to ensure that DoD has sufficient funding available for its operations and support programs. The Administration is extremely concerned about reprogramming restrictions on O&M accounts that would hinder a field level commander's abilities to meet emerging mission requirements. Prior to final action on the bill, the Administration would like to work with the Congress to develop reprogramming guidelines that avoid restrictions that would impede commanders' actions to maintain force readiness yet satisfy Congressional oversight responsibilities.

#### Funding Levels

The Committee bill funds unrequested programs at the expense of DoD FY 1999 requirements. Also, the Committee provides funds for programs that, due to higher priority military requirements, are not in the Future Years Defense Program (FYDP). These increases include \$86 million for modifications and upgrades to B-2 bombers, \$398 million for seven additional C-130J airlift aircraft, \$60 million for two unrequested F-16 fighter aircraft, and \$120 million for National Guard and Reserve equipment. Instead of funding these unrequested programs, the Administration urges the Committee to restore disruptive decreases for key DoD modernization programs, including the following:

\$70 million decrease for the F-22 program, the \$220 million decrease for the F/A-18E/F program, and the elimination of funding for the Aerostat program (\$103 million);

reduction for research and development funding of two important Navy programs: the next generation aircraft carrier (CVX-78) and the land attack destroyer (DD-21). The Committee would reduce aircraft carrier development by \$90 million, a 47-percent decrease from the President's request, and research funding for the DD-21 next-generation destroyer by \$69 million, an 81-percent decrease from the President's budget. Reductions of this magnitude would jeopardize the Navy's ability to design new technologies, to deliver these new technologies on schedule, and to achieve life-cycle cost reductions -- a major goal of both programs;

\$59 million cut from the President's request for Chemical Agents and Munitions Destruction. This reduction could delay a program that is on schedule to meet the obligations of the Chemical Weapons Convention;

\$5.5 million cut to the anti-personnel landmine alternative research and development (R&D) program (the Remote Anti-Armor Mine System) and the \$9 million cut to the humanitarian de-mining R&D program; and,

\$10.9 million reduction made to the Global Combat Support System (GCSS). This system will provide technical systems, common technology, and shared data standards that are required for the DoD electronic commerce (EC) initiatives, a key reform objective.

#### Theater High-Altitude Area Defense (THAAD)

The Administration urges the House to support the Ballistic

Missile Defense Organization's request for Theater High-Altitude Area Defense (THAAD). The THAAD program remains the DoD's most mature upper-tier missile defense program. Recent test failures indicate a need to restructure the program, but a complete review will be necessary before this can be accomplished. The Administration intends to work with the Congress on an appropriate funding profile.

#### Cooperative Threat Reduction (CTR)

The Administration urges full funding of the FY 1999 request for the Cooperative Threat Reduction Program (CTR). Furthermore, we oppose restrictions, imposed in the House authorization action (H.R. 3616) and approved by the Appropriations Committee, that prohibit the use of CTR funds for construction of a chemical weapons destruction facility in Russia. These restrictions would institute a minimum one-year delay in the current project schedule, thereby slowing the construction of a safe, secure, and ecologically sound method of destroying these dangerous munitions.

#### Commercial Operations and Support Savings Initiative (COSSI)

The Committee has provided \$62 million for COSSI, instead of the \$103 million requested. This program inserts commercial technologies in existing defense systems, thus lowering support costs and increasing performance while enabling already fielded systems to modernize quickly. The Administration urges full support of this program.

#### High Speed Networks

The Committee makes a reduction of \$34 million to networking research in the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency based on alleged duplication of effort. However, any overlap was removed in FY 1998 as a result of an interagency review mandated by Congress. Accordingly, the Administration urges restoration of funding to ensure the security and survivability of future military networks and systems.

#### Advanced Concept Technology Demonstrations (ACTDs)

The Committee has cut the request for core ACTD funding by \$35 million, to \$81 million. This program supports work on new and innovative defense system concepts, and it could provide the basis for systems yielding a decisive military edge over adversaries in the next century. The Committee's funding level for this program would not provide sufficient funds to support ongoing ACTDs and would preclude initiation of any new ACTDs in FY 1999. The Administration urges the Committee to fund the program at the requested level.
