Background

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) and Hurricane Mitch

Recently, in light of the catastrophic disaster that resulted from Hurricane Mitch, Rep. Gutierrez has written asking that the President grant Temporary Protected Status (TPS) to Hondurans, Nicaraguans, Salvadorans, and Guatemalans currently residing in the U.S. A grant of TPS would prevent nationals of these countries from being deported to their home countries and would provide work authorization for all nationals of these countries currently residing in the U.S. Though we have not yet reached an Administration position on the granting of TPS, today the Department of Justice is issuing a statement extending the temporary stay of deportation of these nationals to their home countries, at least through the Christmas holiday season (sometime in early January). We -- DPC and NSC, along with the Department of Justice and the State Department -- are considering whether it would be appropriate to grant TPS to one or more of these countries and what other kinds of relief we may be able to offer.

Talking Points

- As the President announced during his radio address last Saturday, we intend to extend our stay of deportation through the Christmas holidays for citizens of the affected countries living in the United States, while examining on an urgent basis recommendations for further relief, consistent with the recommendation Mrs. Gore made after her trip to the region.

“Parity” for Salvadorans, Guatemalans, and Hondurans
November 16, 1998

Background

The Nicaraguan Adjustment and Central American Relief Act (NACARA), enacted during the last session of Congress, authorized the more lenient (pre-1996 Act) rules for suspension of deportation -- a means of obtaining permanent legal status -- to apply to pending cases of Guatemalans and Salvadorans, while providing amnesty (automatic “green cards”) for Nicaraguans and Cubans. The Hispanic Caucus and many Central American advocates have urged the Administration to implement NACARA in a way that would achieve “parity” among all Central American groups affected by the legislation. Congressman Gutierrez has also urged that we seek legislative relief for certain Hondurans, who were completely excluded from NACARA. Congressmen Gutierrez and Becerra have strongly supported amnesty for Salvadorans and Guatemalans (equivalent to that received by the Nicaraguans and Cubans) and the additional class of Hondurans.

Until quite recently, we took the position that Hondurans are not similarly situated to the Central American groups covered by NACARA, and thus had opposed special relief for this group. However, on October 29, 1998, the President sent a letter to Rep. Gutierrez that stated that, upon further study, we have concluded that there is a small class of Hondurans who are similarly situated to the Salvadorans and Guatemalans covered by NACARA, and that this group is entitled to the same relief provided to these other groups. At the end of the last session of Congress, we attempted to attach a provision to the Omnibus appropriations legislation that would have given NACARA-like benefits to Hondurans who applied for asylum in the U.S. prior to December 31, 1992. We were not successful in this effort. However, we continue to favor some kind of legislative solution that would achieve “parity” for this narrow class of Hondurans.

Talking Points

- The Administration shares your concern about the disparities in treatment in NACARA. As the President indicated in his signing statement, we are seeking to minimize these disparities in the implementation process.

In this regard, the Attorney General has authorized a new administrative procedure for adjudicating the cases of Salvadorans and Guatemalans covered by NACARA. This modified procedure will be less adversarial than immigration court and will thus lessen the need for representation by an attorney.

- Also, as noted in the President’s October 29, 1998 letter to you, the Administration is seeking legislative relief for the class of Hondurans that are similarly situated to the Salvadorans and Guatemalans covered by NACARA -- namely, those Hondurans who applied for asylum prior to December 1992.
- The President is generally supportive of efforts to achieve parity among similarly situated groups, but would have to review any proposed legislation carefully before deciding

whether he could support it.

I want to urge that we try to redefine the stem cell/cloning debate. The term "embryo" is being used too broadly, to the advantage of our right-to-life opponents, and to the harm of patients who could benefit from prohibited research. The letter Potus sent Shapiro implies embryos are being created where they are not. We should seek consensus that remodeling (turning back on all of the genes) of DNA from a human somatic cell does not produce an embryo (even when scientists fuse a somatic cell with what was once an egg -- "once" because with its nucleus removed the egg is merely a chemical factory that is being used to turn on genes). Embryo in this debate should be reserved for "the prefetal product of human conception (Webster's II)." For there to be an embryo there must be conception -- creation of a potential human being. Despite Dolly, it is only a theory that the DNA in a human somatic cell can be remodeled to produce a human being. We should state without reservation that we oppose human cloning, but we should not ban various techniques and processes because such techniques and processes might make cloning more likely. We should stop affixing the term embryo to reactivating an individual's DNA for the purposes of producing cell lines or tissue for therapeutic uses. I recognize redefining the debate at this stage will be difficult. Sensational coverage of cloning has created a powerful lens through which the public views the stem cell debate. Too many experts have fallen into the trap of labeling remodeled somatic cells as embryos. But it is possible to draw a bright line between conception and reactivating somatic cells even when it involves components from eggs.

SUBJECT: POSSIBLE POLICY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Following is a list of possible DPC announcements that reflects our discussions at the end of last week.

NOVEMBER:

November 22 **FBI Crime Statistics**

The final 1997 FBI Unified Crime Report data will be released on Sunday, November 22, demonstrating further that crime has decreased dramatically under the President's watch. The President should issue a written statement on that Sunday. **(Ready)**

November 24 **Adoption Registry**

The President could join the First Lady in calling for an Internet-based national registry of children in foster care waiting to be adopted. Prospective adoptive parents will be able to visit the site and meet these waiting children. The registry will cost between \$1-2 million and will be funded through the Adoption Opportunities Grants, which are a part of the President's Adoption 2002 Initiative -- an effort to double the number of children adopted from the public child welfare system by the 2002. November is National Adoption Month, and it is exactly one-year since the President signed the landmark Adoption and Safe Families Act. (The First Lady is planning to make this announcement on November 24.)

DECEMBER:

December 1 **School Modernization and Class Size Meeting with Members of Congress.**

The President could meet with democratic Members of Congress to discuss the importance of working together on enacting school modernization and expanding the effort to reduce class size. This would be an opportunity to highlight the united commitment among Members of Congress and the

President on school Modernization and Class Size. It may also be possible for the President to announce new Department of Education guidelines to local school districts on implementing the class size initiative that Congress enacted last year. In addition, this is an opportunity to highlight all of the funding going out to states in the coming months on class size and other initiatives that passed in the last budget.

December 3 Bipartisan Meeting on Patients Bill of Rights.

After the Republican leadership completes its meetings on committee assignments in December, the President could host a bipartisan meeting with members of Congress committed to passing a strong, enforceable patients' bill of rights. At this meeting, all sides would affirm they are confident that they could pass this bill next year and that all issues, including those associated with enforcement, could be resolved. This meeting would be held to specifically illustrate the momentum this legislation now has and the inevitability of its passage. (December 3 or date when most Republican Members could attend.)

December 10 Campaign Finance Reform Event

The President could host a White House meeting of bipartisan sponsors of Campaign Finance Reform Legislation, which would include Senators McCain and Feingold and Representatives Shays and Meehan. The purpose of the event would be to underscore the President's commitment to enact bipartisan campaign finance reform by next year. The President could highlight examples of excessive campaign spending throughout the country in this past election. (Depends on Members schedules.)

December 11 Car Seat Announcement

The President would announce the final Department of Transportation rule for universal child safety seats. Under the new rule, every seat would be required to fit in every car the same way -- eliminating the current confusion caused by the existence of 100 varieties of child seats and 300 different types of passenger vehicles. The National Highway Transportation Safety Administration estimates that 80 percent of the children strapped into safety seats are at risk because those seats are improperly connected. Approximately 600 children younger than 5 years old are killed and more than 70,000 are injured in vehicle crashes every year. The new rule would make it easier for parents to use child safety seats properly and encourage greater use of child safety seats. (Ready mid-December.)

December 17 Dangerous Toys Initiative

The President could announce the list of 15 toys and child items that have been officially recalled due to safety hazards they present. The President would call on parents to remove the toys from their homes before the holidays as part of Consumer Product Safety Commission's "Toy Recall Round-up."

(If the President is unable to do this event before Christmas, it could be a good option for the First Lady or Vice President.)

December 21 FDA Regulation on Over The Counter Drugs Labeling.

In concert with or soon after Jane Henney is sworn in as the next FDA Commissioner, we could hold an event around the release of a final regulation requiring all over the counter drugs to be labeled in a user friendly manner. HHS and OMB would have to be pushed aggressively to finalize work on this regulation, but it could be ready late in December. Such an announcement would have the support of the pharmaceutical community as well as consumers, and would represent an important breakthrough for those in need to readable, easy to understand usage and compliance information for important medications. (Late December.)

December 22- Drunk Driving Announcement

The President could meet with leaders of the highway safety community (MADD, SADD, etc.) and sign the Presidential Proclamation declaring December, 1988 Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month. The President may also be able to announce the availability of Department of Justice grants of \$12 million to states to combat underage drinking. The President could tape a Public Service Announcement warning against drunk driving during the holidays that can be released at this event in addition to new PSAs the Department of Transportation about the importance of seat belts. (Anytime in December. The Department of Transportation is holding a press conference on Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention on December 18.)

There are several smaller initiatives that we may want to consider rolling out prior to the State of the Union that would depend on budget decisions. These options include:

- **Superbug Initiative**

Recent reports have indicated that resistance to anti-biotics is becoming a major public health crisis, causing prolonged illnesses and even death. For example, pneumonia, which impact over 500,000 Americans each year, is becoming resistance to most antibiotics and staph, the most common hospital-based infection, is now only responding to the strongest drug available and some people are even starting to show resistance to this drug. Experts believe that this critical public health problem is on track to affect more and more viruses. To reduce this problem, the President could: (1) launch a new budget initiative to enable experts to obtain critical information about which viruses are likely to become resistant and why; (2) launch a major education campaign to inform health providers and professionals about how to prescribe drugs more appropriately and increase the use of vaccines to reduce the likelihood that diseases will become resistant; and (3) fund community-based demonstrations to examine how best to implement prevention efforts. (Pending budget decision.)

- Asthma Initiative**
 The President could announce a concerted fight against asthma, which has become a national epidemic impacting the lives of 15 million Americans. The initial goals of this program will be to halt the increase in asthma, reduce by half the number of children who die or suffer activity limitations because of this disease, and limit the disproportionate impact of asthma on minority communities. The President could announce new FY2000 budget proposals to expand programs that have had demonstrated success on a pilot basis in preventing, managing, and understanding asthma. The President could also release an interagency report on best practices and strategies to address asthma. *(Requires budget decision.)*
- Bioterrorism Initiative.**
 The President could announce a new proposal to detect and manage bioterrorism. Bioterrorism is becoming an increasing threat that has the potential to injure or kill millions of Americans through deadly diseases, such as smallpox. While law enforcement and intelligence agencies seek to thwart these kinds of attacks, when prevention fails, we need a system in place that is prepared to manage and minimize the public health consequences. The President's initiative would equip the nation's public health system to both detect and respond to this potential problem. This initiative would: train epidemic intelligence officers who can coordinate with state health departments and other intelligence officers to identify and respond to attacks; develop a Metropolitan Medical Response System, a mass casualty emergency response system, that includes primary care, emergency transportation, and decontamination abilities that will be critical to save lives in the event of an attack; create and maintain a stockpile of pharmaceuticals, that would be critical in the event of a bioterrorist attack that could expose hundreds of thousands of Americans to a disease. Current stockpiles contain many inactive antibiotics and are inadequate to address a major outbreak. The President's initiative would improve research to develop new vaccines and antibiotics that will can be used in the event of an attack. **(Pending budget decision.)**
- Nationwide Crackdown on Food Safety**
The President could announce a new \$87 million budget proposal to crackdown on food safety nationally and a proposed legislative package to give authority to USDA to issue recalls of unsafe food and impose civil fines. In addition, the President would urge states to adopt his model food code for retailers, providing incentives and disincentives for states to adopt to the code. (Ready, depending on budget decisions.)
- Expansion of Values-Based Crime Prevention Initiative**
 Recognizing the important role that civic, community, and faith-based organizations can play in reducing crime, this past July the President announced a \$2.2 million in grants available for 16 community-based collaboratives, including

religiously-affiliated organizations, to target youth violence, gangs, truancy, and other juvenile problems by promoting common-sense values and responsibility. To build on this effort, the President could commit to a series of new grants to support values-based crime prevention efforts, and urge Congress to endorse and increase federal funding for such programs. The President could also highlight the efforts of Rev. Eugene Rivers of Boston, who inspired the President to develop this initiative and has organized a National 10-Point Leadership Foundation to mobilize 1,000 black churches in 40 cities to help at-risk kids in the 50 worst neighborhoods. **(Pending budget decisions.)**

Following is a list of DPC announcements that are under development. We are preparing to have these announcements ready for any message openings that arise in December.

- **"Zero Tolerance" for Drugs in Prisons**
The recently passed omnibus appropriations bill includes an important provision that would allow states to use up to 10% of their prison funds to drug test and, if necessary, treat prisoners and parolees. This policy change, which the President called for in a directive to the Attorney General last January, was strongly opposed by Republicans and represents another victory for the President in the recent budget battle. To highlight this accomplishment, the President could join the Attorney General, General McCaffrey and perhaps group of Governors in issuing new guidelines to ensure that the states use their funds to promote this new "zero tolerance" policy. **(Ready in Mid December)**
- **Fighting Homelessness. On December 20, a number of homeless organizations hold events throughout the country (including in D.C.) to highlight the problem of homelessness. The President could attend a homeless event and announce \$700 million in HUD McKinney grants. In addition, the President could announce the results of a VA survey that will show a significant portion of the veterans treated could be considered homeless. (December 20th)**
- **World AIDS Day**
The President would commemorate the 10th anniversary of World AIDS Day by meeting with youth peer educators from HIV prevention programs, HIV positive youth, and involved parents, and then signing the World AIDS Day Proclamation. The President may also be able to announce new policy initiatives at this time. World AIDS Day is sponsored by the World Health Organization and this year's theme is, "Force for Change: World AIDS Campaign with Young People." In recent years, there has been a significant shift in the demographics of the AIDS epidemic, with new infections in youth rising dramatically. Today, one out of every four new infections in the United States is an adolescent. Every hour another two teenagers are infected. To commemorate World AIDS Day, the President has a unique opportunity to call on parents, teachers, governments, churches, businesses, and young people themselves to build a healthy future for

our youth. (**World AIDS Day is December 1, 1998**)

Youth Crime Gun Interdiction Initiative

The President could highlight the success of his innovative Youth Crime Gun Interdiction Initiative (YCGII), which has been ongoing for two years in 27 cities, by announcing: (1) the release of the second annual report on the YCGII, which will provide new data on guns used in crimes and demonstrate the success of the YCGII; (2) the availability of funds to hire new ATF agents to investigate gun trafficking in these 27 cities; and (3) a proposal to dramatically expand the YCGII to 20 new cities which was just provided for in the recent omnibus appropriations bill. **(Ready February 9, 1999)**

WOMEN, CHILDREN, AND FAMILIES:

November

Title IX Executive Order

The President could sign an executive order as early as next week prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in education programs conducted by the federal government. This includes schools operated by the Defense Department for military dependents, schools operated by the Department of the Interior for Native Americans, and numerous training and educational programs run by federal departments. This is a follow up to an Executive Memorandum the President issued last year asking the Department of Justice to lead an effort to identify all federally-conducted education programs and to recommend appropriate action to end discrimination. **(Ready)**

December

Family Report

The President could announce the findings of a new report by the CEA detailing changes in the last thirty years in family life. The report will show the increased numbers of women in the workplace, and detail the diminished amount of time families have to spend with their children. **(Ready Mid-December)**

December

Foster Care Emancipation Initiative

The President could announce an executive memorandum and preview his FY 2000 budget request to support young people who "age out" of the foster care system. When young people in foster care turn 18, their federal maintenance payments end and they begin an often difficult transition to independence. The President would sign an executive memorandum that would target existing programs to support this vulnerable population (e.g. AmeriCorps, Pell Grant outreach, the Gear-Up Initiative, Work Opportunities), and announce his proposed budget request to increase by 50 percent (to \$135 million) the main federal support program administered by HHS and extend Medicaid coverage for this

population. **(Requires budget decision, not ready until after 12/15)**

January **Ensuring Equal Pay.** The President could announce a \$30 million program to advance outreach to businesses and employees to educate them about the requirement to pay equal wages. The program will provide technical assistance, improve training for EEOC employees and resources for increases in enforcement capabilities. The program also funds a Women in Non-Traditional Occupations Initiative, which will identify best practices, emphasize anti-discrimination and anti-harassment activities, and explore incentives to improve access to and acceptance of women into glass ceiling and nontraditional opportunities such as construction, "high tech," and manufacturing. **(Pending budget decision).**

December **Family/Child Care Package**
The President could announce a "families agenda" that will include proposals to: help working families pay for child care through subsidies and tax credits; give a tax credit to help parents who wish to stay at home to care for their children; provide paid parental leave for families with newborn or newly adopted children; provide funding for home visiting and other parenting skills programs for parents with very young children; and increase support for after-school programs. Also, the President would propose expanding family medical leave so that it would cover employers with 25 employees or fewer. **(Pending budget decisions.)**

HEALTH:

December **Meeting with Presidential Task Force on People with Disabilities**
As required by the Executive Order the President signed in March, the Task Force has prepared a six month report which includes recommendations on administrative and legislative policies to improve employment opportunities for people with disabilities. The President could meet with the Task Force (Secretary Herman, chair, and Tony Coehlo, vice chair) and formally announce his endorsement of the Kennedy-Jeffords Work Incentives Improvement Act -- the disability community's top health priority. The President could also possibly announce at this time new budget proposals affecting people with disabilities, including a tax credit for people with disabilities to help them pay work-related expenses and/or a BRIDGE program to foster more integrated state and local services help people with disabilities go to work. *(Ready --certain components pending budget decisions).*

December **Long-Term Care Tax Credit Package**
The President would announce a proposal to provide a \$1,000 tax credit to people with long-term care needs or their care givers -- which we expect will help about 2.3 million people. At the same time, the President could call for the Federal Employees Health Benefit plan to offer long-term care insurance to federal employees, underscoring that a model employer should promote high-quality

private long-term care insurance policies to its employees. **OPM estimates that 300,000 people would buy these policies. This long-term care tax credit does not currently have offsets. However, pending budget decisions, this policy could be ready to go in December. (Pending budget decisions.)**

WELFARE:

November

Food Stamp Fraud Directives

The President could sign three directives to crack down on food stamp fraud: (1) The President would direct the Social Security Administration to share its death records with the Food Stamp agency to ensure that Food Stamp recipients who die are immediately removed from the rolls; (2) The President would direct USDA to develop a plan to create an interstate matching system to ensure Food Stamp recipients are not receiving benefits in multiple states; and (3) The President would direct Treasury to collect (through offset of federal payments and other means) unpaid fines owed by retailers that have violated Food Stamp rules, such as exchanging Food Stamps for cash. The first two directives will build on the Lugar legislation that passed at the end of the session. **(Ready)**

December

Work Participation Rates

The President could visit a welfare-to-work program and announce: (1) new state work participation rates, showing that almost all states are meeting the welfare law's single-parent requirements, but some are failing to meet the law's separate two-parent requirement; (2) new caseload data showing continuing declines; and (3) new data on the number of people who were on welfare in 1997 and working in March 1998. **(Expected to be ready in mid December.)**

December

Welfare to Work Housing Vouchers

The Congress approved in the VA/HUD appropriations bill full funding for the President's request for 50,000 welfare-to-work housing vouchers. The President could hold an event announcing the opening of the first competition for these vouchers. This is the first time ever that housing vouchers will be linked to welfare reform, and represents an improvement in the way welfare, employment, and housing agencies can work together. **(Ready in December.)**

EDUCATION:

December

Social Promotions Report

The President could announce a new Education Department report on best practices for ending social promotion. This would be an opportunity for the President to renew his call made this year to end social promotion. **(Ready late December or January.)**

January

No-Social-Promotions Initiative

The President could announce a new \$300 million dollar budget initiative to help local school systems around the country follow Chicago's example and end social promotions. This would be a competitive grants program through which the

federal government would pay for the cost of mandatory summer school and after-school to help students meet promotion standards, if the school district agrees to end social promotion. This may be appropriate to announce at the National School Boards Association meeting on January 29-31. **(Pending budget decisions.)**

January Teacher Quality Report

The National Center on Educational Statistics at the Department of Education has conducted a rapid response survey of teachers as well as an analysis of state efforts to improve the quality of the teaching force that will be included in the Department's first biennial teacher quality report. The President would announce the release of this report and possibly announce new budget and legislative proposals to improve teacher quality. **(January)**

EMPOWERMENT ZONES:

January Empowerment Zone Awards

The President could announce the winners of the nationwide competition for the second round Empowerment Zones. Twenty communities will win designations as new EZs -- 15 urban and 5 rural. Like the first round, each EZ will receive a mixture of tax incentives and flexible grants to leverage private, non-profit, and state and local government resources to promote business development and job creation in some of our country's most distressed communities. The EZ statute requires that these designations be made by January 1, 1999. The EZ program is one of the cornerstones of the President's and Vice President's Community Empowerment Agenda. **(Ready in January. The VP likely to do this.)**

TOBACCO

December Counter advertising

The state tobacco settlement is expected to include significant funds for state tobacco Counter advertising and education. To assist states in using these funds most effectively, the President could direct HHS to: (1) designate a National Clearinghouse on Tobacco Counter advertising at the Centers for Disease Control (the President could release at the event a package of "top-10" t.v. ads); and (2) make effective anti-tobacco curriculum available to every school. Two of the "top-10" ads feature supermodel Christy Turlington and musical group "Boyz II Men" who could be invited to participate in the event. **(Ready).**

December Second Hand Smoke

The President could sign an Executive Order directing OSHA to issue within one year a standard establishing a smoke-free workplace for all private sector employees. ETS exposure in the workplace poses significant risks to employees who are non-smokers, including lung cancer, heart disease, and respiratory problems. This standard would be similar to the August 1997 Executive Order banning smoking in Federal building. **(Ready in early December)**

Today is an important day in the long struggle to protect our children from tobacco. The settlement between the Attorneys General and the tobacco companies is a step in the right direction for our nation. It reflects the first time that the tobacco companies will be held financially accountable for the damage that their product does to our nation's health. I want to thank Attorney General Gregoire and all her colleagues for their long and tenacious struggle to bring the tobacco companies to justice.

With this settlement, we are moving forward -- but for the sake of our children, we cannot stand still. The national government, and the national community, must do its part as well. We must press forward on all fronts to end the multimillion dollar marketing campaign designed to hook young people on a product that will kill them.

We began that effort nearly four years ago, when the Food and Drug Administration put in place a strong crackdown on tobacco advertising aimed at teenagers. This was the broadest and most significant effort yet to protect our children from tobacco. But it has been challenged in court by the tobacco companies from the beginning. I want to report that the Solicitor General will urgently ask the Supreme Court to resolve this matter.

But let's be clear: When it comes to protecting our children from tobacco, it is up to Congress to finish the job. This past Congress began with strong momentum toward action, only to see national tobacco legislation derailed by partisanship and special pleading. In the new Congress, I am determined that we will choose progress over partisanship. Comprehensive national tobacco legislation must be one of the top priorities for the new Congress, and I will work hard to see that it becomes law.

We should always remember the stakes. Each day that Congress fails to act, 3300 children start smoking, and 1100 of them will die early as a result. Each day that Congress fails to act, our children continue to be bombarded by massive marketing campaign aimed at recruiting what tobacco industry documents call "replacement smokers." With strong legislation, we can save five million lives in the first five years. Our duty is clear: to protect our children; to wrap a loving arm around them; and to give them the future they deserve.

Jockeying Starts Over
Tobacco Deal

NEW YORK (AP) -- Several state attorneys general say they are impressed with the proposed \$206 billion tobacco settlement but want to examine the details before deciding whether to sign.

A formal announcement of the agreement was expected today.

Negotiators for eight states and the nation's four biggest tobacco makers reached the agreement Saturday, a plan that will settle state claims seeking government health costs for treating smoking-related illnesses.

It has been shipped to the 46 states that have lawsuits pending against the industry or have not yet filed suits, with a reply demanded by midday Friday. It has been crafted in private meetings over the past five months.

The deal would be the biggest U.S. civil settlement ever, and it would remove an enormous financial and legal threat to the industry should it lose a court case to one or more of the states.

This morning, White House press secretary Joe Lockhart said that President Clinton, at a ceremony this afternoon, would call the settlement "an important step forward in the fight to reduce teen smoking." But he said Clinton feels more work must be done with Congress to complete an overall comprehensive strategy.

Tobacco stocks rose this morning. Philip (NYSE:MO - news) Morris Cos. was up 62 1/2 cents a share at \$54.687 1/2 on the New York Stock Exchange while R.J. Reynolds Tobacco parent RJR (NYSE:RN - news) Nabisco Holdings was up 31 1/4 cents a share at \$30.93 3/4 and Lorillard Tobacco parent Loews Co. (NYSE:LTR - news) gained \$1.18 3/4 to \$101.25. American Depositary Receipts of British American Tobacco,

parent of Brown & Williamson Tobacco, were up 31 1/4 cents at \$18 on the NYSE.

The industry would commit \$1.7 billion to research and programs aimed at discouraging smoking, especially by youngsters. It also would accept limits on how it markets cigarettes, though companies could still use human figures like the Marlboro Man and maintain at least one sports sponsorship a year.

The industry has not indicated how many states are needed for it to proceed with the settlement. It is likely that industry payments would be reduced if states decided against signing.

Four states -- Mississippi, Florida, Texas and Minnesota -- have already settled with the industry for a total of \$40 billion.

However, Wisconsin Attorney General James Doyle said the agreement is much better than the \$368.5 billion settlement attorneys general reached last year that later collapsed in Congress. The new deal doesn't need congressional action.

``The question is whether the public health advances and the money involved is enough for Wisconsin to say that it's time now to move past litigation and focus on cessation,'' Doyle said Sunday.

Nebraska Attorney General Don Stenberg was leaning toward accepting the deal because it appeared the state would gain more than it could by pursuing its case.

One of the chief architects of the settlement, Washington state Attorney General Christine Gregoire, conceded that the deal fell short of what industry critics would like.

``There is more to be done legislatively, but we think this represents more than they can expect to receive in the courts,'' she said.

Connecticut Attorney General Richard Blumenthal told The Hartford Courant that the deal falls short of the 1997 agreement but ``may be the best we can achieve now.''

Tobacco analysts will be watching Massachusetts, Maryland and Michigan for their reaction. Massachusetts Attorney General Scott Harshbarger was a state negotiator but walked out of the talks in late August and questioned the industry's commitment to curbing underage smoking. Maryland and Michigan are considered to have strong cases against the industry.

Public health advocates declined to recommend whether the states should embrace the settlement.

``We think it's a positive step forward in the war on tobacco, but it's not the answer and doesn't itself provide a national tobacco control policy,'' said Diane Canova, speaking for the American Heart Association.

She said federal legislation is still needed to give the Food and Drug Administration authority over tobacco products.

Anti-smoking activist Bill Novelli of the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids

said local public health officials were being alerted to make sure the money that would go to the states through the year 2025 ``isn't diverted to non-public health areas.''

``There is going to a huge food fight over these dollars,' he said.

The negotiating states in addition to Washington were California, New York, North Carolina, Colorado, Oklahoma, North Dakota and Pennsylvania.

A separate deal was struck Saturday with U.S. Tobacco Co., the leading maker of chewing tobacco, Gregoire said. It would pay about \$100 million over 10 years for education on the dangers of tobacco in exchange for state claims settlements.

I've quickly read through the settlement (except the exhibits). No surprises, but a few interesting details:

The allowable one brand name sponsorship per year includes a single national or multi-state series or tour (e.g. any number of NASCAR races held in different states as part of a national tour). Events in adult-only facilities and using corporate names are unlimited. Sponsorships of concerts, events with an intended youth audience or youth contestants, or team sports are prohibited except B&W may sponsor either the C country music festival or the Kool jazz festival. Companies don't have to break contracts in effect as of 8/1/98 until they expire or for three years whichever comes first. No brand names on stadiums, arenas, or sports teams.

Outdoor and transit ads are banned, but are defined to exclude: any ads in adult facilities or tobacco manufacturing plants, signs smaller than 14 sq feet in retail establishments, ads promoting an adult only event at the site of that event.

Cartoons are banned and are defined as:

(1) "Cartoon" means any drawing or other depiction of an object, person, animal, creature or any similar caricature that

satisfies any of the following criteria:

- (1) the use of comically exaggerated features;
- (2) the attribution of human characteristics to

animals,

plants or other objects, or the similar use of

anthropomorphic

technique; or

- (3) the attribution of unnatural or extrahuman

abilities,

such as imperviousness to pain or injury, X-ray vision, tunneling at very high speeds or transformation.

The term "Cartoon" includes "Joe Camel," but does not include any drawing or other depiction that on July 1, 1998, was in use in any State in any Participating Manufacturer's corporate logo or in any Participating Manufacturer's Tobacco Product packaging.

I assume the later phrase is to protect the Camel packaging?

Documents: Manufacturers have to maintain at their own expense until 2010 document web sites for existing and new documents except those for which the industry is asserting privilege, trade secrets, etc. Unfortunately, the type of docs are listed in the exhibits, so its hard to tell how complete this is.

Public education: the \$1.45 billion for public education is \$250 million in year 1 and \$300 mi/yr in years 2-5.

National foundation: There are detailed goals for the national foundation (funded at \$250 million total over 10 years), including "developing and disseminating model advertising and education programs to counter the use by youth of substances that are unlawful for use or purchase by youth with an emphasis on reducing youth smoking." What does this mean for our Thursday VP announcement? The foundation shall have a board with 11 directors (

Reform Ideas --Growers and Farmworkers

Recruitment

1. **America's Agricultural Labor Network -- AgNet**

The majority of farm workers find employment through a kinship/friendship network. One problem with this method is that it spawns and reinforces illegal migration to the U.S.; another is that it is highly inefficient in a geographically diffuse labor market. The Department of Labor could serve as an information broker by developing a system that allows growers to find workers and workers to find employment opportunities that meet their needs (e.g., location, duration, type of crop, etc.). This would benefit growers and workers by having an efficient alternative mechanism to match workers with employment opportunities. AgNet would be based on America's Job Bank,, but would be a separate web site devoted to the agriculture industry.

2. **Employment Verification Pilots**

INS has indicated that their existing employer verification pilot program could be adapted to allow for effective participation by H-2A growers. The INS could conduct more aggressive outreach to growers to encourage them to participate in the pilot program.

- Is there something that we can offer growers as a trade for participation in the pilot?

3. **Farm Labor Contractor Certification Program**

Frequently, Farm Labor contractors (FLCs) are inexperienced, poorly educated, not aware of applicable laws and regulations, and lacking in business know-how.

We could require FLCs to satisfactorily complete a Wage and Hour administered course to ensure minimum competency levels for FLCs knowledge of applicable laws and regulations. These courses could also serve to enhance the FLCs's business skills. Successful completion of the course would be a prerequisite to initial issuance and/or renewal of a FLC registration card. The course would include instruction on how to properly comply with MSPA, FLSA, H-2A, OSHA filed sanitation, FICA/FUDA, EPA pesticide worker protection standards, and other labor standards as appropriate.

DOL has estimated the cost of the program to be approximately \$500K per year. We could, of course, charge a fee to each FLC to defray much of this cost.

4. **Farmworker Harvesting Cooperatives**

The Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service and the Rural Business-Cooperative Service staff, along with the Farmworker Coordinator and farmworker organizations, could conduct a feasibility study to research and design "farmworker harvesting" cooperatives. Such a cooperative would be designed to match the job skills of agricultural workers with employers as an alternative to the system of farm labor contractors. The cooperative would serve the functions of recruitment, employment, and transportation of farmworkers. The cooperative could also provide job training for individuals interested in learning skilled agricultural techniques.

Transportation and Housing

5. **Pilot Programs -- Transportation and Housing**

The Department of Labor could conduct pilot programs on transportation subsidies without any legislative change (i.e., creative ways to structure subsidizing transportation costs for migrant farmworkers, including H-2A workers).

However, there is limited latitude to conduct housing demonstrations without a statutory change. Under the H-2A statute, the employer must either furnish housing owned or controlled by him or, in the alternative, provide housing that the employer has secured on the open rental market. We could try to obtain legislative authorization for pilots in housing.

6. **Housing Regulation Reform**

The current housing standard used by DOL in administering the Migrant and Seasonal Worker Protection Act is the OSHA "temporary labor camp" standard (used for housing built after 1980). DOL could revisit this standard and reevaluate whether it correctly balances the protection of workers with the needs of this industry. Given that adoption of this standard was a regulatory decision not a statutory mandate, DOL has the discretion to revise the standard.

7. **HUD-funded Housing for Migrant Workers**

HUD does not currently have a specific program for migrant housing, nor did it request one as part of the FY 2000 agency request. However, there are a number of areas within HUD that could be evaluated as possible funding sources for additional migrant housing including the Community Development Block Grant, the HOME program, the Office of Rural Housing and Economic Development, and the Colonias initiative.

8. **USDA Farmworker Housing Program**

USDA currently provides farm labor housing loans, grants, and rental assistance to farmers. In the FY 2000 agency request, USDA essentially requested to double the funding levels for these programs. The requested increase would roughly equate to 570 more housing units (estimated between 2,280 and 3,420 more migrants housed depending on the type of unit -- family or single). However, according to USDA, H-2A workers are not eligible to reside in housing funded through this program. USDA is looking further into this issue.

9. **Transportation Subsidies**

The Department of Transportation does not currently have a specific program for migrant transportation, nor did it request one as part of the FY 2000 agency request. Two programs that were previously evaluated for this purpose were Access to Jobs and the Formula Program for Other than Urban Areas. It may be possible to stretch Access to Jobs for use of transporting migrant workers. Localities could use funds from the Formula Program for helping migrants with their transportation needs, but it is unlikely that the locality would chose to use their dollars for this purpose without an additional incentive.

If we are able to generate funds from FICA/FUDA equivalent payments by growers (see below), we could use that money to fund pilot programs that subsidize migrant worker transportation.

FICA/FUDA

10. **Growers to pay the equivalent FICA/FUDA taxes for H-2A workers**

We could require growers to pay the equivalent of FICA/FUDA taxes and put the amount in a fund to pay for transportation and/or housing subsidies for migrant farmworkers.

This would generate approximately \$12-\$15 million per year.

Enforcement

11. **Transfer from ETA to Wage & Hour**

The Department of Labor is in the process of transferring authority for administering the H-2A program from the Education and Training Administration (ETA) to the Wage & Hour Administration. We could give the completion of this change a date certain.

12. Department of Labor (DOL) Enhanced Enforcement

DOL has a number of initiatives in FY 1999 targeted at domestic child labor in the agriculture industry. The funds are targeted at increasing enforcement (specifically, the "Salad Bowl" initiative -- targeting lettuce, tomatoes, onions, cucumbers), improving data collection in the National Agricultural Worker Survey, and training migrant workers to be child care providers. In FY 2000, DOL requested to enhance and continue these enforcement initiatives.

We could consider a more substantial increase in these enforcement areas, a more general increase in base funding for enforcement, or an increase in other crop or geographic specific areas.

13. Enhanced protections for U.S. workers

We could explore whether there are statutory or regulatory changes to existing worker protection statutes that could be implemented to better protect the rights of farmworkers.

The following are examples of gaps in existing laws:

- FSLA exemption from minimum wage
The FSLA contains a number of specific agriculture exemptions from the minimum wage requirement. The primary exemption applies to growers who do not use at least 500 man-days of agricultural labor in any calendar year. There are no reliable figures for the number of workers affected by this exemption or the number of workers who, even if subject to the exemption, are paid less than the minimum wage. But it is not uncommon for employers to assert this exemption as a defense in minimum wage cases.
- FLSA exemption from overtime
Most farmworkers are completely exempt from the FLSA overtime provisions. It is very common for farmworkers to work in excess of 40 hours during a workweek but they have no claim to overtime for those hours. Some states -- such as California and Washington -- provide limited overtime coverage to farmworkers.
- FLSA exemption from child labor protections
Children who work on farms may work at younger ages, in more hazardous tasks, and for longer hours than children in other industries. For instance, children over 16 years old can work in any task in agriculture, whereas 16 and 17 year olds in other industries are prohibited from working in tasks deemed by DOL to be too dangerous.

- NLRA coverage
 If the work is defined as “agricultural labor” under the FLSA, it is exempt from coverage under the NLRA. Therefore, virtually all non-processing tasks in agriculture are outside the protections of the NLRA. However, some states -- notably California -- have enacted protections for farmworkers seeking to organize. These state protections may, in some areas, be more protective than the NLRA.

- Workplace health and safety
 OSHA protections for farmworkers are much less extensive than similar protections for other workers (for example, ladder work is much less regulated in agriculture than in other industries) and covers fewer employers.
 - Since 1975, OSHA has been precluded from regulating health and safety on farms that employ fewer than 11 workers on any day during the year. Many farms are therefore beyond the reach of any OSHA standard, including field sanitation. However, under the Migrant and Seasonal Agriculture Worker Protection Act (MSPA), temporary work camp housing standards -- that mirror OSHA standards -- apply even if the OSHA standards do not apply because of the 10 or fewer employees exemption.

 - Farm work is one of the few industries in which workers are not entitled to specific information about the use of toxic substances in the workplace. OSHA does not have statutory authority to require a hazardous communication standard for pesticides and the EPA -- which has the authority -- has failed to issue such a standard.

- State Worker’s Compensation
 Many major agriculture states -- such as North Carolina, Georgia, and Texas -- exclude farmworkers from workers’ compensation coverage. The only recourse for an injured farmworker in these states is the slow, expensive, and uncertain tort law system. The consequence is that farmworkers are unable to get the immediate medical and rehabilitative care and wage replacement available under the State-administered workers compensation system.

- Unemployment Insurance
 Some states either exclude farmworkers from unemployment insurance coverage or impose such stringent requirements on coverage that farmworkers are effectively excluded.

- Protection against retaliation

We could propose to amend MSPA and the Pesticide Act to provide protection against retaliation.

Wages

14. **Wage reform**

After extensive study and consideration, there does not seem much that we could do on the wage front that would more accurately reflect our goals of requiring a fair wage (for both growers and farmworkers) and providing some compensation in the wage for the presence of undocumented farmworkers in the workforce. (See materials handed out by Ceci Rouse).

Research

15. **Funds for mechanization research**

The USDA could sponsor research into the possibilities for mechanization in the crops now dependent on H-2A or undocumented workers (fruits, vegetables, and tobacco). See paper by CEA (Elise Golan).

Childcare

16. **Access to childcare**

One of the barriers to employment for U.S. farmworkers is the lack of child care. Lack of proper facilities is a big problem in rural areas, and most child care programs do not provide funds for capital expenditures (though block grant funds may be available for Head Start).

- Funds could be allocated for the construction and/or renovation of child care facilities in rural areas.
- Also, tax incentives could be made available for farmers who provide child care for their workers.
- Possible creation of a set-aside within existing child care centers for the children of migrant workers.

ETC.

18. Certification v. Attestation

We could consider moving -- for some employers -- away from a certification model and to an attestation model as the gateway to H-2A participation. Thus, an employer who has demonstrated compliance with the program requirements in year X would only have to attest to the same conditions existing in year X+1 in order for that employer to have access to H-2A workers.

Jeff sees a problem I hadn't noticed -- would this provide tobacco companies with an offset for any federal funds to states for health spending, whether tobacco related or not, that are paid for by tobacco tax funds? I had read this as "any form of health care...related to tobacco" but he is reading it as "to any form of health care / or to any use related to tobacco."

He's urging us to get the AGs to get the language clarified, which sounds like a good idea to me. What do you think?

The entire text of the provision is as below:

X. EFFECT OF FEDERAL LEGISLATION

(a) If federal tobacco-related legislation is enacted on or before November 30, 2002, and if such legislation provides for payment(s) by any Original Participating Manufacturer (whether by settlement payment, tax or any other means), all or part of which are actually made available to a Settling State ("Federal Funds"), each Original Participating Manufacturer shall receive a continuing dollar-for-dollar offset for any and all amounts that are paid by such

Original

Participating Manufacturer pursuant to such legislation and actually made available to such Settling State (except as described in subsections (b) and (c) below).

Such offset shall be applied against the applicable

Original

Participating Manufacturer's share (determined as described in step E of clause- Seventh" of subsection IX0)) of such Settling State's Allocated Payment, up to the full amount of

such Original Participating Manufacturer's share of such Allocated Payment (as such share had been reduced by adjustment, if any, pursuant to the NPM Adjustment and has been reduced by offset, if any, pursuant to the offset for miscalculated or disputed payments).

Such offset shall be made against such Original Participating Manufacturer's share of the first Allocated Payment due after such Federal Funds are first available for receipt by such Settling State.

In the event that such offset would in any given year exceed such Original Participating Manufacturer's share of such Allocated Payment: (1) the offset to which such

Participating Manufacturer is entitled under this section in such year shall be the full amount of such Original Participating Manufacturer's share of such Allocated Payment, and (2) all amounts not offset by reason of subsection (1) shall carry forward and be offset in the following year(s) until all such amounts have been offset.

(b) The offset described in subsection (a) shall apply

only

to that portion of Federal Funds, if any, that are either unrestricted as to their use, or restricted to any form of

health

care or to any use related to tobacco (including, but not limited to, tobacco education, cessation, control or enforcement).
