Q. If federal employees in the Executive Branch are subject to drug testing, why isn't the President also subject to tests?

A. The reason the President is not subject to drug testing is the same reason that Members of Congress are also not tested: since they serve at the will of the people who elected them -- and not any other "employer"-- they could not be removed from their positions for failing a drug test. This policy could be changed for Members of Congress and the President, but it would require Congressional action.

**Gun Litigation
Question and Answer
January 5, 1999**

- Q. What is your response to the collective efforts to sue the gun industry cited in today's Washington Post? Will the Administration take a strong position on this issue as it did in the tobacco litigation?**
- A. As the President said last November when Chicago filed its lawsuit, he will be watching this and other lawsuits closely. He was particularly intrigued by the Chicago case which alleged widespread illegal practices by gun dealers. Although we know that legitimate gun dealers make every effort to comply with the law, if these charges are proven true, it would demonstrate that at least some parts of the gun industry are helping to promote an illegal market in firearms. Such disrespect of our law -- by gun dealers or gun manufacturers -- endangers our people. We will continue to track the progress of these lawsuits.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJ: Secretary Shalala's Report on State Welfare Spending

The attached memo from Secretary Shalala provides a useful update on state welfare reform spending trends. While this is a preliminary snapshot of spending, the analysis shows that through June 1998 states spent only about three-quarters of available funds, leaving about \$3 billion unobligated. There is growing concern among states and some advocates that these surpluses may make TANF an attractive target for budget savings. Others worry that states are not doing enough to invest in welfare reform, although, even with these savings states are actually spending more per person than before reform while spending less overall due to caseload declines. On the other hand, these surpluses, which can be carried over from year to year, will help provide assistance to additional families if needed during an economic downturn.

To identify the reasons for these trends, HHS surveyed the 12 states with the lowest obligation rates, which together account for 80% of the total unobligated funds (CA, FL, KA, LA, MN, NJ, NY, OK, PA, WA, WV, WI). Key factors identified by the states include:

- 1) Unexpectedly large caseload reductions provided states with unforeseen funds which they have not yet spent. For example, Minnesota, anticipating caseload increases due to expanded eligibility rules, had actually cut back on some support services. In light of unanticipated caseload reductions, the state plans to increase these services.
- 2) Early stages of TANF implementation. Many fiscal and policy decisions made by Governors and state legislators had not taken effect as of last June. For example, California's new law did not take effect until January 1998, which means counties didn't start bringing large numbers of people into the program and spending new funds until mid- to late-1998.
- 3) Saving for possible economic downturns. States are saving money in rainy day funds to ensure they have adequate resources to meet future spending requirements. For example, Florida's legislature required a \$250 million rainy day fund (which represents 43 percent of their FY 1998 block grant). In addition, states are spending state funds before federal funds in order to meet the maintenance of effort requirement. This requirement, which is a fixed percentage of each state's historic spending levels, must be met each year regardless of total spending level while federal money may be carried over to future years.

4) Some states have concrete plans in place for investing TANF resources, while others do not. The Secretary recommends that we continue to send a strong message about the importance of maintaining investments in low-income working families.

The Secretary's report shows that more states are beginning to use their flexibility to transfer funds from TANF to the Social Services Block Grant and the Child Care Block Grant. By the third quarter of FY 1998, twenty-seven states -- or double the number from the prior quarter -- transferred some funds, although the amount transferred is well below the maximum allowed. There are indications from states that these transfers will increase, which should increase overall TANF spending.

While not specifically referenced in Secretary Shalala's report, it is important to remember that caseloads have fallen by more than one-third from the base years used to calculate the TANF block grant, so even if states spend only 75 percent of their block grant funds this year, they are actually investing more per person. GAO estimates that, nationwide, states had nearly 40 percent more federal funds per recipient under TANF in 1997 than they had in the prior year under AFDC.

President Clinton Continues the Fight Against Youth Smoking 1/4 Draft

Last fall, President Clinton declared the \$206 billion multi-state tobacco settlement a step in the right direction and said enacting national tobacco legislation to finish the job would be one of his top priorities in the next Congress. In the coming months, he will push a comprehensive agenda to reduce youth smoking and hold the tobacco industry accountable for targeting children.

Reimburse Taxpayers for the National Costs of Tobacco

The \$206 billion multi-state settlement with the tobacco industry will reimburse states for tobacco-related medical costs. Now it's time for the federal taxpayers to obtain the same relief.

Costs to Our Armed Forces, Veterans, and Federal Employees. Every year, the Department of Defense, Veterans Affairs, and the Federal Employees Health Benefit Program spend more than \$7 billion in tobacco-related health costs for members of the armed forces, veterans, and federal employees who smoke or use tobacco products. Federal taxpayers, like those in the states, deserve reimbursement for these tobacco-related health costs, and this year's budget will include a \$.55 per pack tobacco excise tax to pay for these \$7-billion-a-year tobacco-related costs.

Costs to Medicare. Tobacco-related health problems cost the Medicare program billions of dollars over the last three decades making it more difficult to preserve and protect Medicare for the 21st century. To recover these losses, the U.S. Department of Justice intends to bring suit against the tobacco industry, and the new FY 2000 budget will contain \$20 million to pay for the necessary legal costs. All recoveries will be used to extend the life of the Medicare program for future generations.

Costs to Medicaid. The federal government pays 57 percent of all Medicaid costs and is legally required to collect 57 percent of state Medicaid recoveries, including Medicaid funds recovered through the state tobacco settlements. However, because the federal government and the states share the goals ensuring the health of our nation's families, the Administration would be willing to consider legislation to waive the federal claim for recovery if states agree to spend a portion of their settlement on a negotiated menu of items. Possible menu options include:

- **McCain Menu** (which was negotiated and agreed to by NGA and the Administration):
1) Maternal and Child Health Bureau's Title V program; 2) Child Care and Development Block Grant; 3) Child welfare programs (Title IV-B); 4) SAMHSA; 5) Safe and Drug Free Schools program; 6) Professional Development (Eisenhower) grants; 7) CHIP matching funds (limited to 6 percent of restricted funds).
- **McCain Plus Tobacco Control and Farmer Assistance:** Another alternative would be to preserve the McCain list but add tobacco control activities, such as counter-advertising campaigns and state and community based education and prevention programs, and assistance to tobacco farmers and their communities.

- **Scaled Back McCain Plus Tobacco Control and Farmer Assistance:** A third option would be to pair down the McCain list to four or five programs and add tobacco control and farmer assistance.

Because adopting a menu will require extensive discussions between the states, the Congress, and the Administration, the Administration proposes to allow up to a year to enact this provision.

To pay for this one year delay in recoupment, the President's FY 2000 budget would accelerate a previously enacted \$.15 per-pack cigarette excise tax increase. If a menu cannot be agreed to within a year, the Administration plans to withhold Medicaid funds from the states in an amount equal to 57 percent of the state tobacco settlements starting in FY 2000.

Reduce Youth Smoking

Every day, 3,000 children become regular smokers and 1,000 have their lives shortened because of it. Almost 90 percent of adult smokers began smoking by age 18 and today, 4.5 million children aged 12 to 17 -- 37 percent of all high school students -- smoke cigarettes. Tobacco is linked to over 400,000 deaths a year from cancer, respiratory illness, heart disease and other problems. To end this scourge, we must do everything we can to reduce youth smoking. The President has set a goal of cutting youth smoking in half within five years. To do so he proposes:

Reaffirm FDA's Authority to Treat Nicotine Like a Drug. Nicotine is an addictive drug, and it's time for the Congress to recognize that by affirming the Food and Drug Administration's authority over tobacco products. In 1996, the FDA approved a regulation designed to keep young people from smoking before they start by stopping advertising targeted at children and curbing minors' access to tobacco products. Unfortunately, most of the rule's provisions have been blocked in court. Now Congress can take this matter out of the courts by confirming FDA's authority in this area. While the new multi-state tobacco settlement contains many important provisions restricting tobacco marketing, it does not go far enough to protect children. Congress should reaffirm FDA's authority by either:

- Clarifying the definitions of "drug" and "device" to explicitly include tobacco products and clarify FDA's statutory authority to place restrictions on medical device products to explicitly include tobacco advertising, as proposed by Conrad, Harkin/Chafee, and Hansen/Meehan.
- Create a separate chapter in the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act to address tobacco as proposed by McCain/Frist.

In addition, legislation could contain additional restrictions on tobacco advertising that go beyond those contained in the FDA regulation, such as banning the use of human images or cartoons in all tobacco advertising, banning the use of all outdoor advertising of tobacco products, and banning tobacco advertising on the Internet.

Look-Back Surcharges. Strong look-back surcharges will act as an insurance policy to ensure youth smoking declines. Because increasing the price of cigarettes is one of the most effective ways to reduce youth smoking, tobacco legislation should increase per pack tobacco excise taxes if youth smoking is not cut in half within five years. In addition, individual companies could pay a surcharge based on how many underage youth smoke their brands, to provide additional funds to fight youth smoking.

Public Health Funding. The President's FY 2000 budget will include core public health funding to prevent young people from smoking by curbing youth access to tobacco products; sponsoring counter-advertising and other public information campaigns, funding prevention programs in states and local communities, conducting additional research on what works, and monitoring youth behavior through expanded surveys. To fulfill these goals, the President's budget will double the funding for the Food and Drug Administration's tobacco budget to \$68 million, increase funding for the Centers for Disease Control's tobacco control efforts from \$73 to \$100 million, and fund \$4 million in research at SAMSHA.

Price. As described above, the Administration proposes to reimburse federal taxpayers for the yearly tobacco-related health costs for the armed forces, veterans, and federal employees. To reimbursing this \$7 billion cost, the President's FY 2000 budget proposes to increase the cigarette excise tax by \$.55 per-pack. This price increase will have the additional benefit of preventing youth smoking, since young people are particularly sensitive to higher cigarette prices.

Protection for Farmers and Their Communities

As part of a comprehensive plan to reduce youth smoking, the President is committed to protecting farmers and farm communities. Currently, there are on-going discussions between the tobacco industry, the tobacco growers, and the states over proposals for purchase guarantees in which the companies would commit to buy a certain amount of tobacco each year, a possible industry-established trust fund of up to \$5.15 billion to help growers adjust as the demand for tobacco declines, and the potential set aside of state settlement funds to assist farmers and their communities.

The President is committed to protecting tobacco farmers and their communities, and he will monitor these efforts closely to ensure they are successful. If needed, the President will consider further measures, such as requiring states to set aside state settlement funds for tobacco farmers and additional surcharges earmarked for farmers if necessary.

Subject: Read-out of stake-out following Crime and Drugs event

Miraculously, today's crime and drugs announcement was the sole topic of discussion at the stake-out (though Sen. Leahy walked out the door of the West Lobby about halfway through the stake-out, and got mobbed by reporters near pebble beach).

General McCaffrey opened the dialogue by giving context on today's announcement. He noted that drug abuse leads to crime and that at least half of those in prison are there for reasons related to drug abuse. He also emphasized that the President announced a 40 percent increase for next year in drug treatment initiatives in the justice system, and that the initiatives announced today will help break the cycle of crime and drugs. Representative Rangel then reflected on his experiences as a prosecutor and echoed General McCaffrey's statements. Maryland Lieutenant Governor Kathleen Kennedy Townsend then emphasized that we must end the useless debate between treatment and punishment, and said that today's announcement guarantees better results. Laurie Robinson, Assistant Attorney General, Office of Justice Programs, agreed and emphasized that we need to use every opportunity to coerce drug abusers to change behavior linked with crime. Judge Jeffrey Tauber, President, National Association of Drug Courts, and Mayor Jeff Griffin of Reno, NV echoed her comments.

Use of Funds for Embryo Research—Limitations

OSTP supports OMB's recommendation to delete this provision and add a footnote proposing to "work with Congress to assess the impact of recent advances in biomedical research, such as research on stem cells, that may hold promise for new methods for diagnosing, treating, and curing disease."

The following comments address statements in the supporting discussion that need some clarification:

- While it is correct that previous budgets (FY97 and FY98) struck the ban, there was no proposal to address the ban in separate, non-appropriations legislation, as suggested in the OMB comments. The Administration position in those budgets was that it "does not support addressing this issue in legislation."
- The statement that "the central issue is whether or not the ban on embryo research would cover stem cell research" does not fully capture the complexity of this debate. With respect to stem cells, there are really two questions—can the public sector isolate stem cells, and can they conduct subsequent research on those cells. The use of federal funds to isolate stem cells, if the cells are removed from embryos, is clearly prohibited by the ban because the isolation process results in the destruction of the embryo. However, federally funded stem cell research may in fact be permissible, as the OMB discussion demonstrates provided that federal funds were not used to isolate the cells. If it is determined that research on stem cells subsequent to isolation is not prohibited, the best motivation to lift the ban is lost, and we may create a situation where the private sector will control the isolation and subsequent supply of stem cells for public sector research.

At Bruce's request I've tried to capture the general approach we said we would use with the civil rights groups today. I've essentially laid out the basic points we want to make, based on what we told POTUS. I assume we will discuss the approach in more general and tentative terms, and give them a chance to have some input:

1. Our intent in ESEA reauthorization is to take a tougher approach to accountability across the board--for states and school districts, schools, educators and students. While the 1994 ESEA provides a framework for tougher accountability, we believe it doesn't go far enough:

 need faster action than current requirements to intervene in low performing schools

 Hold up Bill Taylor's report and indicate that we know implementation of current law could be improved

 Highlight our proposal to put \$200 million in FY2000 budget [I presume we don't want to give them specific budget figure] and to require states to immediately identify and begin to intervene in the lowest performing schools -- those with low tests scores that have not made any improvement over the past 3 years. We will insist that states rely on whatever tests are currently in use--even if they are not the final ones required under ESEA--to meet this requirement.

 Highlight our teacher accountability provisions--require phase out of (1) teachers on emergency credentials, (2) out-of-field teaching, and (3) use of instructional aides as lead instructors -- all practices that disproportionately occur in high poverty schools.

 Point out that we are working on overhauling programs such as Eisenhower, Goals, etc.--so they help provide the resources to phase out these practices

 Highlight ending social promotion as part of this. Talk about linking promotion policy to implementing steps necessary to help kids meet standards the first time--expanded Head Start, smaller classes, improved classroom instruction and better teachers, use of proven practices such as Success for All, early identification of kids who need help, after-school and summer school programs, etc.

One issue they will raise is the use of tests --we should ask for their advice on how to handle this, indicating that we want the tests to be valid for these purposes, and we like the idea of using multiple measures and factors such as teacher judgment. I think we should use this as an opportunity to hear what they think.

I expect they will want to know how we will monitor this requirement -- how we will make sure that states do this the right way. We can talk about requiring plans that will need to be reviewed and approved against some criteria of good practices.

We've talked to OMB and here's what we think we can fund re: legal immigrants. I think both are good policies that build on our successes in the Balanced Budget Act and Ag Research bill. Both proposals are structured to have costs almost entirely in the out years.

Disability and Health Benefits

Because of the Balanced Budget Act, legal immigrants who were receiving SSI before August 22, 1996 or were in the country before August 22, 1996 but subsequently became disabled are eligible for SSI.

Still, most low income legal immigrants who enter the country after August 22, 1996 are barred from SSI even if they experience an unforeseen accident or disabling illness. The proposal would address this concern by restoring eligibility for SSI and Medicaid in FY 2001 to legal immigrants who have become disabled after entering the United States and have been in this country for five years. Thus, legal immigrants would be subject to a five year ban on receiving SSI and related Medicaid benefits (as they are for TANF and regular Medicaid), but would be eligible after their first five years in the U.S. This proposal is estimated to assist 40,000 legal immigrants by 2004, about half of whom are elderly.

Food Stamps

The Ag Research bill restored Food Stamps to legal immigrant children, senior citizens, and the disabled in the U.S. as of August 22, 1996. However, while the disabled provisions covered people in the U.S. by 1996 who subsequently become disabled, the elderly provision only covered those who were already 65 as of August 22, 1996. This proposal extends Food Stamp eligibility to include legal immigrants in the United States on August 22, 1996 and once they become elderly.

On March 31, 1994, I signed into law a landmark education measure called Goals 2000. That legislation did many things. It spurred efforts to fight gangs, guns, and violence in schools. It called for efforts to assure that every student enters school ready and able to learn. Most important of all, it called on states to establish, for the first time in U.S. history, tough standards for what every child in every American school should know. I said at the time, and I believe even more passionately now, that every child can and must learn a world-class standards of excellence. Today, I want to talk about the progress we have already made, and another step we must take, toward meeting that crucial goal.

I am pleased that 48 of 50 states have now adopted the tougher academic curricula we laid out in our Goals 2000 program. The wisdom of our drive for higher standards is confirmed in a new survey in U.S. News & World Report released today. The magazine finds that the best American high schools are not necessarily those in the most affluent communities, but those that have a challenging core curriculum and high expectations of students.

Since the Goals 2000 legislation, schools have cracked down on guns, gangs, violence and indiscipline in schools, and the percentage of students who report being threatened or injured at school nationwide is down. We have begun to organize an army of tutors to help elementary school children learn to read and middle and high school students prepare for college. We have increased investment in early childhood learning through Head Start. We are making progress towards connecting every school and library in America to the Internet by the year 2000. Last fall, we fought for and won from Congress a down payment on 100,000 new,

highly-trained teachers to reduce class sizes in the early grades. I trust that the new Congress will keep up those payments, and I hope they will work with me to build or modernize 5000 of our oldest school buildings.

All these efforts and more are beginning to show results. SAT scores are up. Math scores have risen in nearly all grades nationwide. This is good news. We should be pleased. We should be thankful. But we should not be fooled into complacency. Reading scores have hardly budged. Many of our foreign competitors are improving their educational systems faster than we are.

We must do better. I believe we can, if we continue to demand high standards and if we demand more accountability at every level of our educational system for meeting those standards. Accountability works. I have seen the evidence with my own eyes in the many visits the First Lady and I have made to schools in Chicago. Three years ago Chicago Mayor Richard Daley took personal responsibility for improving his city's schools. He made many changes, the most crucial of which was ending the practice of social promotion, in which students proceed to the next grade level regardless of whether they have mastered the material in their current grade level. Advancing students who have not mastered the basics is no favor to those students, and it sends the message to all students that performance and effort don't matter. But it would be wrong to mark students as failures when it is the educational system that has failed them.

That is why in Chicago students who fail tests the end of 3rd, 6th, and 8th grades are placed in academically-enhanced summer school and after school programs and drilled until they do pass--and most students eventually do. Chicago's Lighthouse after school program keeps 112,000 children in 248 Chicago schools off the street and out of trouble while drilling them in math and reading and providing everything from computer instruction to supervised sports to a hot evening meal. Chicago's summer school program is now the sixth largest school district in America.

This investment in after school and summer school is the linchpin that makes the whole experiment in ending social promotion work. Citywide math and reading scores have gone up three years in a row in Chicago, with the biggest gains coming from some of the most disadvantaged schools. Now other cities such as the District of Columbia, and states such as Delaware and South Carolina, are getting results by insisting that students pass rigorous tests before advancing to the next grade and offering after school and other help in order to pass those tests.

Today, Education Week published a survey showing that in high schools that require students to pass an exit exam before graduating, 68 of students say the tests "make them work harder." Think about that. Sixty eight percent. That means that over two-thirds of these students, by their own admission, were not striving, were not doing their best, until adults had the courage to challenge them and hold them accountable. Now imagine what would happen if we started holding all public school students in America accountable. Imagine what would happen if two-thirds of those students, tk-million students, started trying harder.

After school programs honor our values and benefit our nation. They provide opportunity to students, bolster responsibility among students, and strengthen our communities. Incidents of violent crime by juveniles doubles in the hour after school lets out, and our children are also at greatest risk of becoming victims of crime in the hours

immediately after school. But in communities where children have something positive to do, youth crime and victimization drop steeply.

That is why I have supported grants for quality after school programs through the 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative, first introduced by Sen. Jeffords and championed by Senators Kennedy, tk, and tk. This crucial effort has grown from \$1 million in 199tk to \$40 million in 199tk to \$200 million in the budget I signed last fall. Yet the demand for quality after school, the bipartisan support it has gained, and its potential to transform public education in America, far outweigh the investment we have made so far.

We must do more. Today, I am pleased to announce that my new budget triples investment in after school programs, targeted to schools that stop promoting students to the next grade who have not learned what they should have learned in their current grade. This investment in academically-enriched after school will give more of our students the help they may need to meet the higher educational standards we must set for the 21st Century. It will give more of our children a place to go other than the streets when school lets out--a place where they can study, play, learn crafts, or explore the Internet. It will give peace of mind to working parents as the fight the traffic home at night.

A quality after school program cannot be a substitute for a poor quality program during the regular school day. We will make sure that these investments go only to schools that end social promotion the right way. We must insist on more accountability not just from students but from parents, teachers, principals, school superintendents, and elected officials at the local, state, and federal level. We must have more high-quality child care so that all children are ready to learn on the first day of kindergarten. Raising our investment only a step, but an absolutely crucial step towards transforming our public schools so that every child in America has a world-class education for the 21st Century.

Q. You have proposed increasing this fund from \$40 million to \$600 million in a two-year period. Is this huge increase warranted?

A. Today, there is an overwhelming demand for after-school programs. Over 28 million school-age children have both parents or their only parent in the workforce. At least 5 million children --and possibly as many as 15 million --are left alone at home each week. Experts agree that school-age children who are unsupervised during the hours after school are far more likely to use alcohol, drugs, and tobacco, commit crimes, receive poor grades, and drop out of school than those who are involved in supervised, constructive activities. Statistics also show that most juvenile crime takes place between the hours of 2 and 8 pm, and that children are also at much greater risk of being the victim of crime during the hours after school. **The nationwide demand for expanded after-school programs has made the 21st Century Community Learning Center program one of the most highly competitive programs ever managed by the U.S. Department of Education. In the Education Department's last completed grant competition for this program, the Department received nearly 2,000 applications, requesting more than \$550 million to fund programs in over 6,000 schools in every state in the nation.**

Q. Are these after-school programs effective?

A. Last year the U.S. Departments of Education and Justice released a report, "*Safe and Smart: Making the After-School Hours Count*," that documented the effectiveness of quality after-school and summer programs. The report shows that quality after-school and summer programming can make a difference in student safety and achievement, students' test scores, their attendance, and their behavior. They can also keep kids from experimenting with risky behaviors, such as alcohol, drug, and tobacco use. After-school programs are not only good for education, they make sense to the American public.

Q. What is social promotion?

A. "Social promotion" means allowing students to continue to pass through school with their peers regardless of whether or not the students meet academic standards.

Q. How much of the funds for this program are going to go to districts that end social promotion?

A. The 21st Century Community Learning Center program distributes funds through a grants process. As part of that process, school districts that end social promotion will receive a priority in the grant awards. Because we do not know how many applicants end social promotion or who will receive funds, we will not know until the grants are awarded how much money will go

to schools that end social promotion.

Q: If the President believes ending social promotion is so important, why not make this a condition of funds for school districts that receive 21st Century Community Learning Center grants?

A. The policy the President announced today can be implemented without new authorization from Congress; however, to condition all funds on ending social promotion require new authorization from Congress. Nevertheless, the President is exploring other proposals to end social promotion as part of the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Q. Is the solution to hold back failing students?

No. Students who are held back often fall further behind. And students who are promoted when they aren't ready are harmed as well. The right solution is to give students the help they need to meet the standard the first time. That's what the President's proposal does.

Q. Won't efforts to raise standards and end social promotion end up hurting disadvantaged students?

A. On the contrary, it is the current policies of social promotion and retention that are hurting disadvantaged students. The results of both policies are unacceptably high dropout rates, especially for poor and minority students, and inadequate knowledge and skills for students. Neither practice closes the learning gap for low-achieving students, and neither practice is an appropriate response to the academic needs of students unable to master required coursework. We can best assist disadvantaged children if schools provide adequate opportunities for students to meet expectations on time and pursue effective strategies to assist those students who need extra assistance, including ensuring that all students have access to good teachers, using data to identify at-risk students before they fall too far behind and providing extended learning time for children who need extra help.

REMARKS ON AFTER SCHOOL
EAST ROOM, THE WHITE HOUSE

Thursday, January 7, 1999

Our Founding Fathers believed that American democracy could survive only if its citizens were well-educated. In 1787 they declared that all new territories set aside land for public schools, thereby establishing the principle that public education, though a state and local responsibility, is a national priority. In 1867, the federal government created the land grant college system. In 1917, federal aid for

vocational training began flowing to public high schools. In 1944, the GI bill gave millions of returning veterans tickets to the middle class. In 1958, the launch of Sputnik led to federal funds to improve science and math instruction in public schools. In 1965, federal support for education expanded further to bring minorities long shut out of the classroom inside.

At each of these turning points in history, America strengthened public education to match the challenges of the times. Today, America faces another great challenge: The emergence of a global economy that is fast-paced, technologically sophisticated, and driven by information. An economy in which the workplace is no longer just for men and the work day is no longer bound by the hours of nine-to-five. An economy in which, more than ever before, what you earn depends on what you learn.

To meet the challenge of the new economy and help our people compete, our public schools must change, and change dramatically. They must reflect the way we work and live now, on the threshold of the 21st Century. They must provide every child in America a world-class education. Today, I want to talk about the progress we have already made towards meeting these goals, and another crucial step we must take.

In the last six years, we have made progress. Forty-eight of 50 states have now adopted the tougher academic standards we called for in our Goals 2000 program back in 1994. Thousands of schools have cracked down on guns, gangs, violence and discipline problems, and the percentage of students who report being threatened or injured at school nationwide is down.

We have begun to organize an army of tutors to help elementary school children learn to read and middle and high school students prepare for college. We have increased investment in early childhood learning through Head Start. We are making progress towards connecting every school and library in America to the Internet by the year 2000. Last fall, we fought for and won from Congress a down payment on 100,000 new, highly-trained teachers to reduce class sizes in the early grades. I trust that the new Congress will keep up those payments, and I hope they will work with me to build or modernize 5000 schools.

All these efforts and more are beginning to show results. SAT scores are up. Math scores have risen in nearly all grades nationwide. This is good news. We should be pleased. We should be thankful. But we should not be fooled into complacency. Reading scores have hardly budged and many of our foreign competitors are improving their educational systems faster than we are.

Nor have the majority of our schools kept pace with new patterns of work and family life. A new economy bringing our nation unparalleled prosperity is also drawing more and more parents into the workforce. On any given day in America, as many as 15 million school-aged children are left to fend for themselves at home, idle in front of the television or out on the streets exposed to gangs and drugs and crime. On any given day, when schools let out, juvenile crime soars, as does the number of children victimized by crime. On any given day, when school lets out, tens of millions of working parents look nervously at the clock, hoping and praying that their children will be safe.

It is no secret that I believe that the best way for our nation to meet these challenges is to expand the number and quality of after school programs. With quality after school, working parents have the tool they

need to succeed at work and as parents. Students learn their lessons in the schoolhouse, not on the street. Youth crime and victimization plummet. Quality after school programs enhance opportunity, bolster responsibility, and strengthen communities. They honor our values and benefit our nation.

That is why I have supported grants for quality after school programs through the 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative, first introduced by Sen. Jeffords and championed by Senators Boxer and Kennedy, and Congresswoman Lowey. This crucial effort has grown from \$1 million two years ago to \$40 million last year to \$200 million in the budget I signed last fall. Yet the demand for quality after school, the bipartisan support it has gained, and its potential to transform public education in America, far outweigh the investment we have made so far.

We must do more. Today, I am pleased to announce that the new balanced budget I will submit to Congress next month triples our investment in academically-enriched after school programs. This new investment will give over a million school children all across America somewhere to go other than the streets when school lets out--a place where they can play, study, explore the Internet, and be safe. It will give millions of working parents peace of mind as they fight the traffic home at night. It will make the streets safer for all Americans.

In addition to adapting public schools to the new patterns of work and life in America, we must also provide our children--all our children--with the world-class educations they will need to prosper in the new economy. For that to occur, we must have a revolution of rising expectations and greater accountability in our schools. Quality after school is a key to that revolution.

I have seen the revolution with my own eyes in the many visits the First Lady and I have made to schools in Chicago. Mayor Richard Daley has made many changes, the most crucial of which was ending the practice of social promotion, in which students proceed to the next grade level regardless of whether they have mastered the material in their current grade level.

In Chicago, students who fail tests at the end of 3rd, 6th, and 8th grades are placed in academically-enhanced summer school and after school programs and tutored until they do pass--and most students eventually do. Chicago's Lighthouse after school program keeps 112,000 children in 248 Chicago schools off the street and in the classroom, while its summer school program is now the sixth largest school district in America. Citywide math and reading scores have gone up three years in a row in Chicago, with the biggest gains coming from some of the most disadvantaged schools.

Now other cities such as the District of Columbia, and states such as Delaware and South Carolina, are also ending social promotion and offering after school and other help to students who need it. We should encourage more communities follow their lead. That is why, in the competition for these new after school grants, I want priority to be given to those communities that end social promotion.

Today, Education Week published a survey showing that in high schools that require students to pass an exit exam before graduating, 68 percent of students say the tests "make them work harder." Think about that. Sixty eight percent. That means that over two-thirds of these students, by their own admission, were not doing their best, until adults had the courage to challenge them and hold them accountable. Now imagine what

would happen if we started holding all public school students in America accountable.

A quality after school program cannot be a substitute for a poor quality program during the regular school day. We will make sure that these investments go to schools that end social promotion the right way. We must insist on more accountability not just from students but from parents, teachers, principals, school superintendents, and elected officials. We must have more high-quality child care so that all children are ready to learn on the first day of kindergarten. I will be talking about all this and more in my State of the Union address. But today, by raising our investment in quality after school, we are taking a crucial step towards transforming our public schools so that every child in America has a world-class education for the 21st Century.
