ADVISORY BOARD ACTIVITIES

Dr. Franklin and Governor Winter. Governor Jim Hunt of North Carolina hosted a two-day Conference on Race Reconciliation in Charlotte, North Carolina, Oct. 27-28. More than 500 leaders from the law enforcement and business communities, as well as, state and local government attended. Dr. Franklin delivered the keynote address at Tuesday's luncheon. Governor Winter also participated in this conference. Also in attendance were Attorney General Janet Reno and North Carolina Congresspersons Eva Clayton and Mel Watt.

Angela Oh. On October 27, Angela Oh spoke to 200 Los Angeles County managers at the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors meeting. Her comments focused on the importance of diversity in the workplace and other multi-racial issues. The Board of Supervisors agreed to provide her with the county ordinances on affirmative action and their diversity training materials.

Ms. Oh also addressed approximately 300 people at the Southern California Association of Philanthropists on October 29. She spoke at the plenary session about the importance of building bridges between health care and youth. She urged the philanthropic community to support the Initiative by devoting increased resources to issues involving race.

On October 30, Ms. Oh spoke at the California Association of Black Lawyers Conference about the affect of Proposition 209 on diversity in higher education. She challenged

conference participants to become actively involved in the Initiative.

Ms. Oh is working with the California Community Fund and the Multicultural Collaborative in Los Angeles to develop a video of promising practices that promote racial equality and improved race relations in Los Angeles and the state of California.

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

On October 23, I provided Sylvia Mathews with several paragraphs describing the Initiative and its mission. These paragraphs were for inclusion in Presidential speeches and were shared with the President's speechwriters for that express purpose.

OUTREACH

On October 27, Michael Wenger, Claire Gonzales, Scott Palmer and I met with the National Voices Coalition (Urban League, National Conference, LEAP, NCLR, ADL) to explore the ways in which they can assist us in our mission. With the exception of the ADL, the executive leadership of these organizations were present. We agreed to pursue the following agenda: a) the promotion of diversity on college campuses and b) the construction of a partnership between the National Voices Coalition and the Inter-Ethnic Affairs Institute of the National Italian-American Foundation in order to hold a series of town hall meetings and roundtable discussions.

On October 28, Michael Wenger and I met with the Inter-Ethnic Affairs Institute. We discussed the partnership between the Initiative and the National Voices Coalition and invited the Inter-Ethnic Affairs Institute to participate. They agreed to join our partnership. Additionally, they are also exploring other ways in which they can contribute to the Initiative.

On October 29, Michael Wenger met with Rose Ochi, head of the Community Relations Service, and members of her staff, to discuss the details of a) a guidebook on dialogues which they are producing and b) a resource book which they have developed. Our organizations are working closely together to complete these documents.

Also on October 29, Michael Wenger met with Mickey Ibarra to finalize the list of materials to be mailed to the Big 7 in preparation for the November 6 meeting.

RESEARCH AND POLICY PLANNING

Policy. Lin Liu met with the education team October 30 to plan the November 19 Advisory Board Meeting. The November Board Meeting will focus on the value of

diversity in higher education. We are assembling a package of material on housing, employment, and education discrimination issues for the Board.

John Goering attended a meeting with representatives from the National Security Council and the Departments of Justice and Labor to discuss options for supporting the International Labor Organization Convention on Racial Discrimination.

Community Efforts. We completed the summaries for the 10 Community Effort pieces for the website. These summaries will be posted on the website by November 6. We are continuing to also review examples of Community Efforts. Our goal is to find 20-30 more to be included on the website.

Data. Members of the Policy staff met with representatives from the federal statistical agencies. The Policy staff group has prepared a draft of the information to be contained in short fact book. The Policy staff also met with the staff of Council of Economic Advisors and members of our Communications staff on Tuesday to coordinate the steps for the short fact book.

Fairfax Project. The Department of Education has contracted out the Fairfax case study to Policy Studies Associates. Lin Liu met with them on Thursday to formulate the parameters of the study. We have targeted the December Board Meeting as the due date for the case study.

Meetings. Here are brief summaries of the meetings the Policy staff attended this week:

- Michael Wenger, Brenda Toineeta, Lin Liu and I met with Lori Villarosa of the Mott Foundation to gather information for the Community Efforts.
- Michael Wenger and Lin Liu met with the Board of Directors for the National Asian Pacific American Legal Consortium to discuss the Initiative's goals and to solicit NAPALC's ideas on issues, leaders, and community efforts.
- Scott Palmer, Lin Liu and I met with representatives from Equity Research, Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Hispanic American Educational Excellence Commission to discuss their projects with the Departments of Transportation and Energy. We tasked them with developing ideas and a list of participants for November 19 Board Meeting.

Events. Lin Liu joined the First Lady at a round table discussion with 30 high school students from Chicago's *Facing History and Ourselves Project*. The First Lady invited the students to identify issues for the President to address as part of his Race Initiative efforts and to describe their experiences with the program and in their schools.

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Scott Palmer, a staff member, spoke at an event in Fairfax County organized by Sharon Bulova, Supervisor of the Braddock District. The event was entitled on "The Changing Faces of Fairfax County."

Staffing. Cedra Eaton has joined our staff as the Administrative Assistant.

COMMUNICATIONS

Public Outreach. Also, on October 27, Claire Gonzales, Michele Cavataio, Mike Wenger, Jacinta Ma and I had a meeting with deputy Secretary Garamendi; Chantale Wong, Chief of Staff, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Workforce Diversity, David Montoya from the Department of Interior. We discussed the Department's proposal to host events, such as panels on race, at various National Park Sites. We suggested that they involve youth in these programs, possibly high school and college students. We also suggested that they create materials resulting from these panels that could be geared to youth, such as certificates or educational material. They suggested sharing information through the Internet. We also suggested that they think about partnering with state parks to sponsor panels or programs.

On October 29, Claire Gonzales, Lin Liu, Grace Garcia, Scott Palmer, Maria Soto and I met with Miriam Cruz, President of Equity Research; Margarita Benitez, Vice-President of Equity Research; Catherine LeBlanc, Executive Director of the Commission on Historically Black Colleges at the Dept. Of Education; and Sarita Brown, Executive Director of the White House Initiative for Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans. The group highlighted the value of diversity in higher education and how we need to expand the definition of diversity in the higher education system. They discussed the important role minority-serving institutions play in our society. As a result of the meeting, Ms. Cruz, Ms. Brown, Ms. Benitez and Ms. LeBlanc will provide the PIR staff with suggestions for the upcoming Advisory Board meeting.

On October 29, Claire Gonzales had a conference call with John Keene, from Viewing Race, a New York-based company that is producing a video resource publication listing forty to fifty independently produced race-related films and videos.

Policy and Dissemination. The PIR master database is fully operational. The Communications team has been responsible for inputting data into the database. The database has a community efforts section in which the PIR staff will have the capacity to keep track of the community efforts we have encountered.

The PIR staff and White House Communications staff are in the process of drafting the final version of the PIR brochure.

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The Communications staff, in cooperation with other PIR divisions and the White House Communications Office, is in the process of drafting the first "One America on the Move" (broadcast-fax).

We are in the process of drafting a press release for the One America Web Site press roll-out. We are also drafting the talking points for Mike McCurry. The target date for the release is either November 6 or 7.

Upcoming. On October 31, I hosted a briefing, in the Old Executive Office Building, for the Public Leadership Education Network (PLEN) and participants of the Women, Law and Public Policy Conference.

WORK TEAMS

YOUTH OUTREACH

The approval for a specialty media briefing has been approved and awaits the selection of a date. A radio address by the President to Young America calling them to action and becoming engaged in the Initiative has also been approved and will be held on the same date as the briefing. The Call to Action letter is completed and currently awaiting final approval from the White House Correspondence Office.

COMMUNICATIONS/PRESS

With the help of Kevin Moran, we are in the process of finalizing all of the products for the website. We anticipate a public launching during the week of November 3. Kevin has been working with the computer web site team to re-design the One America Web Site, making it more appealing to the general public. They are also working on adding the new products we have developed. The new products for next week's roll-out are:

A welcome letter from Judy to web site visitors;
Talk of the Nation;
Face of America;
Community Efforts; and a
PIR Advisory Board feature.

The Communications team submitted the web site products to Ann Lewis on Oct. 30 for clearance.

The White House/PIR Communications team met to discuss the use of public service

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announcements (PSA's) to fulfill the Initiative's goals. We are in the early discussion of having a meeting in late November featuring a series of consultations by experts on marketing, the media and race.

RECRUITING LEADERS/OUTREACH

On October 29, Michael Wenger, Bob Thomas and Maria Echaveste, participated in a conference call with the corporate executives who have agreed to participate in the regional CEO. The purpose of the call was to plan the proposed agenda for these meetings. I have attached a copy of the proposed agenda for your perusal.

DIALOGUE IN COMMUNITIES

Claire Gonzales and Michael Wenger met with Sylvia Mathews, Rahm Emanuel, Ann Lewis, Paul Begala, Stacie Spector, Stephanie Streett, and Jennifer Palmieri to discuss the President's race-related activities for November and the 12/3 town hall meeting. Among the issues discussed were:

Sometime in November the President meeting with cable industry leadership, brought together by Bob Johnson, to discuss and announce two projects--a late February Presidential or Vice Presidential Town Hall meeting which would be produced by BET and telecast simultaneously by all cable networks, and a series of specialized programs on race to be telecast by individual cable networks;

The activities proposed by the Youth Working Group--letter from the President, radio address, PSA's, briefing for non-traditional press--will all be focused around the 12/3 Presidential Town Hall meeting. Furthermore, an optional format discussed for the Town Hall meeting is to pattern it after the Little Rock Economic Summit. Under that option a panel of authors with diverse views would be invited to participate along with a panel of young people. The venue would be a college campus in the midwest or southwest and there would a possibility of Vice-Presidential participation, as well.

FEDERAL AGENCY ACTIVITIES

USDA

There are 947 active, formal discrimination complaints against USDA programs and services. Since Jan.1, USDA has taken 432 newly registered program discrimination complaints and closed 126.

USDA Civil Rights Implementation Teams have completed work on 60 of the 92

recommendations, or 65 percent from the Secretary's Civil Rights Action Team Report.

USDA officials met with about 50 Native American producers at the Montana/Wyoming Indian Stock Grower's Association Symposium held Oct. 13-15 in Billings, MT to tell them about various risk management tools available to the farming community.

USDA released an interim report on civil rights implementation to Congress, the media, employees, and constituent groups on October 23.

On October 27, Secretary Glickman delivered the keynote address to the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities in San Antonio, TX; he spoke on civil rights, focusing on Hispanic Americans.

On October 28, the Secretary delivered the keynote address to the Intertribal Agriculture Council in Chandler, AZ, where he discussed civil rights and making USDA programs more accessible to Native Americans.

On October 31, Washington state USDA officials will participate in the Hispanic Farmers Economic Development Forum in Toppenish, WA, as part of USDA's continuing efforts to inform minority producers about Department programs and credit opportunities.

Congressional Quarterly and Capitol Hill press covered Secretary Glickman's October 23 testimony before the House Agricultural Committee on civil rights issues at USDA.

San Antonio Express, two local radio stations, and *Telemundo-Channel 60* covered the Secretary's October 27 keynote address to the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities in San Antonio, TX, when he spoke on civil rights, focusing on Hispanic Americans.

DOL

The Department of Labor Civil Rights Director, Annabelle Lockhart, was the keynote speaker at the Sarasota Florida Branch of the NAACP's Annual Awards. While in Florida, Ms. Lockhart held a roundtable discussion with a diverse group of 25 community leaders to discuss the President's Initiative on Race and how the public and private sector can help to promote racial harmony.

DOT

A Departmental working group was formed to discuss, review and develop a comprehensive approach to support the Presidents Initiative on Race. Each of the Departments 23 departmental offices and modal administrations will be involved in this effort. The group will make

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recommendations to the Secretary regarding internal race issues as well as race issues in the external transportation sector. The next meeting will be held on November 4.

DOE

On October 19, 1997, Texaco's CEO, Peter Bijur, signed a partnership agreement with Helen Crawley, CEO of C&L Petroleum, a natural gas company and founding member of DOE's Minority Oil and Gas Outreach Program. Under the terms of the partnership agreement, Texaco has committed to providing the minority business with \$2 million in capital, developmental assistance and other necessary support. Within the next few weeks, Secretary Peña will host a meeting with Mr. Bijur and Ms. Crawley to acknowledge this important new partnership.

VA

On October 24, Under Secretary for Health, Kenneth W. Kizer, M.D., participated in an Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) press event at the VA Medical Center in San Antonio, TX. The event was used to announce VA's partnership with HACU to sponsor 50 interns next summer at VA healthcare facilities nationwide.

HUD

HUD staff participated in the 50th Anniversary Training Conference of the National Association of Human Rights Workers (NAHRW) in Detroit, Michigan on October 14-19th. The Alliance for Better Housing of Kennett Square in Chester, Pennsylvania, with the assistance of the National Puerto Rican Coalition used funds from the Fair Housing Initiatives Program (FHIP) for bilingual home ownership workshops. These workshops included practical information on how to buy a home, how to budget for a home, and the rights and responsibilities of becoming a new owner.

DOT

The Coast Guard has distributed a newly-produced video tape entitled WAVES TO YOUR FUTURE in support of the Coast Guard Recruiting Initiative for the Twenty First Century (CGRIT). CGRIT is a program which is effectively increasing diversity among candidates for the Coast Guards officer corps, allowing the service to more accurately reflect American society. Twelve hundred copies of the video are being sent to high school liaison officers, Historically Black Colleges and University (HBCU) liaison officers, and community influencer to promote and market this recruiting initiative.

The FTA has established a work group of employees to ensure that we are able to report on information from the agency and our constituents which advance racial harmony, including diversity training; statistics; hiring successes; Title VI: Environmental Justice

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initiatives; grantees hiring highlights; outreach to industry associations; efforts in the DBE area; and accomplishments of small and disadvantaged and women-owned business goals.

VA

VA participated in the first Federal Youth Task Force meeting on October 20. The purpose of the meeting was to provide the Youth Task Force members with a general overview of this Presidential initiative, and to discuss the goals and action plans of this Task Force.

SBA

The Administrator met with Congresswoman Waters on October 29 to discuss SBA and small business issues, including financial and technical services, loan portfolios, 8(a), outreach and other programs serving the African American small business community. The Administrator and Congresswoman Waters agreed to explore ways to provide additional support and technical expertise to small business owners and entrepreneurs in the Los Angeles area. Congresswoman Waters also indicated that she is planning to hold hearings on the Community Reinvestment Act in her district sometime in the near future.

OPM

OPM Deputy Communications Director Rosa Grillo spoke at the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) Conference in the place of Acting Director Lachance. She spoke about OPM's efforts to address the under representation of Hispanics in the career civil service. OPM presented HACU with a sixth touch screen computer to provide up-to-date federal job information at a yet to be determined HACU school.

That buys a good EEOC package of:

- * New performance goal (cases averaging 6 months, requires 114 new FTE's);
- * The \$10 million new technology piece;
- * A commitment to doing 10% of all cases by ADR.

It gets a good fair housing package from HUD (\$10 million new targeted, audit based enforcement).

There is no recommendation for the Department of Education in the package as OMB wants to wait and review it in context with the rest of education. ED OCR has requested increased resources including more staff and a more collaborative approach with schools that will rely on improved technical assistance.

For DOL the package includes a 10% increase in the number of compliance reviews conducted (OFCCP started a tiered compliance review system in FY 1998 by which they target serious cases).

HHS OCR is basically maintained, sparing it from the average 4% reduction in other HHS discretionary activities. The funding includes a triaging front-loaded program to focus more resources on outreach and technical assistance

Michael says it leaves another up to \$10 million of new money to play with. Among the options: a beefed up emphasis on compliance and mediation by education and hhs. Some money to improve DOJ's role as coordinator which many groups mentioned to us.

SUBJECT: WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON HATE CRIMES

On November 10, you will host the White House Conference on Hate Crimes at George Washington University. This memorandum outlines the purpose and structure of the conference, and the policy initiatives that we recommend you announce at the conference.

Purpose and Structure of the Conference

The White House Conference on Hate Crimes has three purposes. First, it will call national attention to the serious problem of hate crime in this country and, by highlighting positive community responses, promote unity in addressing the problem. Second, it will demonstrate the Administration's commitment to "draw the line" on hate crimes through combined law enforcement, education, and prevention strategies. Finally, this conference is the Race Initiative event for the month of November.

The conference will highlight the role of law enforcement and prosecutors at the state, local, and national level. The conference also will explore how the public and private sectors can join together in combating hate crime through law enforcement, community efforts, and educational strategies.

Breakfast in the East Room. The Conference will begin with a breakfast in the East Room for the approximately 350 participants. The Attorney General will introduce you, and you will make brief welcoming remarks.

Morning Session. The morning session will begin with welcoming remarks by Maria Echaveste and Stephen Trachtenberg, President of George Washington University. The Vice-President will then speak briefly. The following two persons will introduce you and the Vice President:

- Chuenee Sampson, student, Duke University, North Carolina. As an African-American

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high school student in Crown Heights, NY, Ms. Sampson became a peer trainer with the Anti-Defamation League (“ADL”). She helped start the *Students Against Violence Everywhere* (“SAVE”) while in high school. Ms. Sampson has experienced racial and ethnic violence throughout her life. As a middle-school student in Brooklyn, skinheads threw bottles at the bus that brought her to school. While at Duke University, Ms. Sampson has continued to work with children. Ms. Sampson volunteers at a middle school and works with learning centers in low-income areas.

- William Johnson, Retired Police Officer, Boston Police Department. Mr. Johnson has worked extensively in the hate crimes unit in Boston, and has recently won an award for his involvement.

During your remarks, we propose that you announce several significant new law enforcement and prevention initiatives, including a proposal to expand the principal federal hate crimes statute, 18 U.S.C. §245. These initiatives are detailed later in this memorandum.

Following your remarks, you will moderate a panel discussion with the Attorney General, the Secretary of Education, and eight other participants. Each of the eight participants listed below will give brief opening remarks:

- Peter Berendt, Principal, Mamaroneck Avenue Elementary School, Mamaroneck, New York. Following a series of hate crimes in the community, Mr. Berendt convened the *E Pluribus Committee* to address the underlying diversity issues facing the school community. His school currently is engaged in a multi-year comprehensive diversity awareness program.
- Tammie Schnitzer, Billings, Montana. Ms. Schnitzer is a Jewish woman who was the victim of an anti-Semitic hate crime in Billings, Montana. When Ms. Schnitzer saw that the hate crimes in Billings were targeted toward only the Jewish residents, Ms. Schnitzer galvanized the entire community by encouraging, Jews and non-Jews alike, to display menorahs in the windows of their homes. Ms. Schnitzer’s extraordinary efforts were the subject of a television movie, *Not in This Town*;
- Hon. Sheila Kuehl, President Pro Tempore, California State Assembly. Ms. Kuehl is the first openly gay or lesbian member of the California State Assembly and the author of legislation to prohibit discrimination against gay and lesbian students in California public schools. Ms. Kuehl also has been an outspoken advocate condemning violence against women. As a young actor, Ms. Kuehl appeared in the television series *The Many Loves of Dobey Gillis*;
- Raymond Delos Reyes, sophomore, Franklin High School, Seattle, Washington. Mr. Reyes has worked with the ADL’s Children of the Dreams program. In March, Mr. Reyes traveled to Israel with the ADL’s program. Mr. Reyes is a member of the Peer mediation Training Program and the Filipino Club;
- Samuel Billy Kyles, Pastor, Monumental Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee. Mr. Kyles is an outspoken advocate of civil rights and plays an important role in the religious

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community's efforts to erase hate crimes. Mr. Kyles is a member of Ecumenical Minister's Task Force. He also was a close friend of Dr. Martin Luther King and was with Dr. King during the last hours of his life;

- Arturo Venegas, Jr., Chief of Police, Sacramento Police Department, Sacramento, California. Mr. Venegas helped to develop the Sacramento Police Department's model program to deal with hate crimes in the community. Mr. Venegas has participated in innovative law enforcement strategies to combat hate crimes;
- Grant Woods, Arizona Attorney General. As a Republican, Mr. Woods has coordinated bipartisan support for hate crimes enforcement. He was a strong advocate for one of the first and strongest hate crime bills in the country. Mr. Woods also was the most visible Republican proponent of the Martin Luther King Holiday; and
- Stephanie Tubbs Jones, District Attorney, Cuyahoga County, Cleveland, Ohio. As an African-American district attorney in a major American city, Ms. Jones has first-hand prosecutorial experience with hate crimes.

Afternoon Session. The afternoon session will consist of seven breakout sessions of approximately fifty participants each. Each of these sessions will address a different aspect of hate crimes and will be moderated by a Cabinet Secretary or a senior government official. The topics and moderators of the breakout sessions are:

1. Hate Crimes in Schools (K-12): Prevention and Response (Secretary Riley);
2. Hate Crimes on Campus: Prevention and Response (Franklin Raines);
3. Law Enforcement Response to Hate Crimes (Attorney General Reno);
4. Understanding the Problem: Improving Hate Crime Statistics (Deputy Attorney General Holder);
5. Hate Crimes in Public and Private Housing (Secretary Cuomo);
6. Community Responses to Hate Crimes (Secretary Glickman); and
7. Counteracting Organized Hate (Secretary Slater).

Following the breakout sessions which will permit the extensive interaction and participation of all Conference attendees, the Attorney General will host a panel, consisting of the six other moderators of the breakout groups. This panel discussion will highlight the issues and ideas that surfaced during the breakout sessions. Following the panel discussion, the Attorney General will make concluding remarks.

Satellite Sites. Currently, we have approximately 45 official satellite sites. These satellite sites will view your remarks and announcements, along with the panel discussion you will moderate, from the morning session. Following the viewing of the satellite feed from the Conference, the satellite hosts have planned customized programs to complement and augment the Conference. Some members of your Race Advisory Board will participate at satellite sites. Accordingly, the attendees in these satellite sites will be able to participate actively with the experts assembled at their site.

Policy Announcements to be Made at the Conference

We recommend that you make the following policy announcements at the Conference.

I. LEGISLATION

- You can announce the Administration's support for legislation to expand the principal federal hate crimes statute, 18 U.S.C. § 245, to include gender, sexual orientation, and disability. Currently, Section 245 prohibits hate crimes only on the basis of race, color, religion, or national origin. For the three new categories, this option would require proof of a Commerce Clause nexus as an element of the offense. This Commerce Clause hook is drafted in a way intended to satisfy constitutional concerns in the least restrictive manner possible. Senator Kennedy, along with Senator Spector, is expected to introduce this legislation.

There is some concern that the addition of gender would greatly expand the number of cases that would require investigation by federal agents. In order to address this concern, the Administration supports several limiting principles that would reduce the number of cases actually investigated and prosecuted by the federal government, including limiting the new categories of cases to those involving bodily injury and providing guidance to federal investigators and prosecutors to limit the number of cases to those involving gender-based motivation of a weight sufficient to implicate a strong federal interest in prosecution.

II. PROSECUTION AND ENFORCEMENT

- **Creation of a Network of Local Hate Crime Working Groups.** You can announce the formation of, or federal participation in, local hate crime working groups across the country. Each U.S. Attorney will either establish a local working group in his or her district, or, if such a body already exists, actively participate in the group. These working groups would be federal-state-local partnerships that would be the primary mechanism for evaluating and addressing the hate crime problem of the local community. Members of the working groups would be the U.S. Attorney's offices, the FBI, state and local law enforcement, state and local prosecutors, and advocacy groups. In addition to addressing law enforcement strategies, the groups would seek to increase enforcement of hate crime laws, to maximize reporting of hate crimes, and to educate the public about hate crimes. There will also be a National Hate Crimes Working Group, located at the Department of Justice in Washington, D.C., that would have the role of coordinating the work of all the working groups across the country. As part of this coordinating function, the National Hate Crimes Working Group would distribute, on an ongoing basis, information regarding promising practices that are occurring out in the field to address the

problem of hate crimes.

- **Assignment of New Hate Crime Resources.** You may announce that the Administration will assign new resources for hate crimes enforcement. The Administration will assign significant additional FBI agents and prosecutors to hate crime cases. In addition, the Administration plans to create a Civil Rights Analytical Center at the FBI.
- **Encourage hate crimes training for law enforcement.** You can announce the development of a model law enforcement training curricula on hate crimes which can be incorporated into programs at local and state law enforcement training centers. This curriculum includes three course segments -- one segment directed to law enforcement officers, one segment to investigators, and one general segment for others in the law enforcement field. This curriculum would be available within 60 days for implementation at law enforcement training facilities across the country.

III. STATISTICS REGARDING HATE CRIMES

- **Adding Hate Crime Questions to the National Crime Victimization Survey (“NCVS”).** The NCVS is an annual survey conducted by the Department of Justice’s Bureau of Justice Statistics to measure levels of crime through a national sampling of victims of crime. At present, it does not include questions about hate crime. Beginning in January of 1998, the Department of Justice will include questions related to hate crime as part of its annual survey of victims of personal crimes and vandalism. The survey will inquire whether the victim believes the incident was bias-motivated and why. In addition, the Department of Justice will be conducting extended versions of the NCVS in eleven cities across the country from January through April of next year, including expanded questioning regarding hate crimes.

IV. EDUCATIONAL INITIATIVES

- **Teacher’s resource guide for hate crimes awareness and Hate Crimes Internet Site.** You can announce the development of a manual for educators on preventing youth hate crime. The Department of Justice and the Department of Education have drafted a guide for teachers that encourages schools and school districts to confront hate-motivated behavior among students; promotes development of comprehensive, programmatic responses to prejudice and violence; and provides educators with various resources to undertake such responses. You can announce that the Attorney General and the Secretary of Education will send a copy of the manual to each of the country’s 16,000 school districts by December 1. You can also announce the availability of a website, “Hateful Acts Hurt Kids,” linked to the Department of Justice website. This site will

address prejudice, discrimination, and related issues in an interactive, graphic format designed for children in kindergarten through fifth grade, their parents, and teachers. This site will be available for viewing at the Conference.

THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON HATE CRIMES

November 10, 1997

On November 10, 1997, the President will convene the first-ever White House Conference on Hate Crimes, a day-long event to be held at The George Washington University. At the Conference, the President will announce significant law enforcement and prevention initiatives to get tough on hate crimes. The Conference will examine the positive actions that communities are taking and outline the steps we all can take to prevent hate crimes.

A hate crime is the embodiment of intolerance -- an act of violence against a person or property based on the victim's race, color, gender, national origin, religion, sexual orientation or disability. Every year, thousands of Americans are victims of hate crimes -- and it is suspected that many more go unreported. Teenagers and young adults account for a significant proportion of the country's hate crimes -- both as perpetrators and victims. Every time one of these crimes is committed it creates tension and fear, and tears at the fabric of community life.

The Conference is an important element of the President's Initiative on Race and of his vision for One America. Members of the President's Advisory Board on Race will participate in the Conference at satellite locations.

CONFERENCE PARTICIPANTS

The President, Vice President, Attorney General and Secretary of Education will be joined by other members of the Cabinet, Members of Congress, selected state and local officials, and approximately 350 leaders from the law enforcement, civil rights, anti-violence, youth, education, and religious communities.

Hate crimes survivors will also attend. Participants will include representatives from all 50 states. Thousands more will participate at over 50 satellite-linked events across the country.

CONFERENCE SCHEDULE AND LOCATION

The President will host a breakfast for Conference participants at the White House and will make an opening address at the Conference. After his remarks, the President will chair a panel discussion in which the Attorney General, the Secretary of Education, and several other distinguished Americans will join.

In the afternoon, members of the Cabinet and other senior Administration officials will chair a number of concurrent working sessions to examine various aspects of the hate crimes issue. Afterward, the Attorney General will chair a closing panel to discuss ideas and themes from the working sessions. Participants will attend a closing reception at the United States Holocaust Museum.

The Conference will be held at the Cloyd Heck Marvin Center at the George Washington University, 800 21st Street, NW, Washington, DC, and is by invitation only. The President's remarks will begin at approximately 11:30 a.m. The closing panel and remarks by the Attorney General will commence at approximately 4:15 p.m. The event is open press, except for the working sessions beginning at 2:30 p.m., which are closed press. DRAWING A LINE AGAINST HATE CRIMES*

The Clinton Administration: Fighting Hate in Our Communities

- On October 22, 1997, a federal grand jury returned a one count indictment in *United States v. Bybee*, charging Greg Bybee with violating one count of federal civil rights statute. On December 27, 1996, the victims, a Native American and African American interracial couple, were assaulted and threatened with a firearm by the defendant at the home of the female victim's father on an Indian reservation in Boise, Idaho.
- In Richland, Mississippi, four members of a neo-Nazi skinhead organization, pled guilty to conspiracy and interfering with the housing rights of an interracial couple by throwing a molotov cocktail at their trailer home.
- Three defendants, one of whom is a racist skinhead and a member of the white supremacist group "South Bay Nazi Youth," were convicted of a civil rights conspiracy after they drove through the streets of Lubbock, Texas, hunting African-American men, luring them to the conspirators' car and shooting the men at close range with a short-barreled shotgun. One victim died, one was seriously wounded in the face and another had a finger blown off.
- In Livingston, Texas, six defendants pled guilty to civil rights charges for beating randomly selected African-American men with a rifle and a rodeo belt buckle, and punching them repeatedly as they tried to escape. The defendants had been angered at seeing other black men in the presence of white women. The adult defendants were given prison sentences ranging from 20 to 43 months.
- In Livermore Falls, Maine, two defendants were sentenced to almost 6 years and almost 7 years following their guilty pleas to civil rights charges after threatening four Latino victims, chasing them by car from the store, and firing shots at the victims' fleeing car, wounding one victim in the arm.

Fighting Hate Crimes Through Tough Law Enforcement

Vigorously Prosecuting Hate Crimes Under the Civil Rights Statutes. Several distinct federal statutes provide jurisdiction to prosecute hate crimes -- crimes where the perpetrator selects his victim on the basis of certain characteristics such as race, color, religion, and national origin. Since 1989, over 500 defendants in more than half of the 50 states have been convicted on federal criminal civil rights charges for interfering with various federally protected rights of minority victims. Virtually all defendants charged in these cases have been convicted. President Clinton's Justice Department has vigorously prosecuted hate crime incidents,

particularly where the defendants were members of organized hate groups, such as the Ku Klux Klan, The Order, and various skinhead gangs.

Enhanced Penalties For Hate Crimes. As part of the historic 1994 Crime Act, the President signed the Hate Crimes Sentencing Enhancement which provides for longer sentences where the offense is determined to be a hate crime. In 1996 alone, 27 cases received enhanced sentences.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) Provides Expertise in Arson and Explosives Investigations to Help Fight Hate Crimes Throughout America. While enforcing explosives and arson laws over which it has jurisdiction, ATF has participated in the investigations of bombing and arson incidents at predominantly gay bars such as the incidents reported in Atlanta. For example, in the bombing of the gay nightclub, which occurred on February 21, 1997, the ATF joined the FBI in a task force headed by the U.S. Attorney.

Gun Regulation Helps Stem the Flow Of Firearms that can Fuel Hate Group Activity. Many organized hate groups use guns to carry out violent offenses covered by hate crime statutes. Treasury bureaus work to intercept gun shipments into the U.S. and to regulate the illegal sale and possession of firearms by potential perpetrators of hate crimes and other offenses.

Targeting Ignorance:

Focusing on Youth Attitudes that Create Hate Crimes. The Department of Education is supporting efforts at the local level to develop and implement innovative effective strategies for preventing and reducing incidences of crimes and conflicts motivated by hate in localities directly affected by hate crimes. The Department has funded programs aimed at reducing violent behavior among youth motivated by hate or bias.

Understanding the Problem of Hate Crimes:

Gathering Information on the National Scope of the Problem. The FBI Uniform Crime Report collects the only national data on hate crimes through the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, and has established guidelines for the collection of such data, and criteria for a finding of prejudice. In 1996, 11,355 law enforcement agencies across the country participated in the data collection efforts, representing 84 of the nation's population. From these departments alone, there were 8,734 reported incidents of hate crimes in 1996. [FBI, Uniform Crime Report -- Crime in the United States 1996, 1997]

Studying Anti-Gay Hate Crimes. The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) has funded the first large-scale study of the mental health consequences of hate crimes. The preliminary principal findings of this research are that hate crimes based on sexual orientation appear to have more serious psychological effects on lesbian and gay men than do other non-bias motivated crimes. The study also provides information about the prevalence of anti-gay hate crimes, the

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rate at which these crimes are reported to the police, and the prevalence of other harassment and discrimination against gay men and lesbians.

Prosecuting Hate Crimes Aimed At Our Houses of Worship:

Fighting Hate Crimes Aimed at Houses of Worship. The President fought for and signed the Church Arson Protection Act of 1996, which facilitates prosecutions of racially motivated arsons and other acts of desecration against houses of worship.

Creating the National Church Arson Task Force. President Clinton established the National Church Arson Task Force in June 1996 to oversee the investigation and prosecution of these cases, in response to an outpouring of national concern over arsons at houses of worship around the country. The NCATF has brought together the FBI, ATF, Justice Department prosecutors, and the Community Relations Service, in partnership with the state and local law enforcement officers and prosecutors. Well over 200 ATF and FBI investigators have been deployed in these investigations. In addition, the NCATF has coordinated with other agencies, such as the federal Emergency Management Agency and the Department of Housing and Urban Development, in the federal government's efforts to promote arson prevention and in providing resources for church rebuilding.

- Many of the 508 incidents investigated have been solved, mainly by a combination of federal and state arrests and prosecutions. Since January 1995, arrests of 240 suspects have been made. The 240 arrests have led to over 100 convictions, including the first convictions under the 1995 Church Arson Prevention Act, 18 U.S.C. 247, as amended. This rate of arrest (35 %) for crimes that may have been motivated by hate or bias is more than double the 16 % rate of arrest for arsons in general. As of June 1997, Federal, state, and local prosecutors have successfully convicted 110 defendants in connection with fires at 77 houses of worship since January 1995.[Treasury]

Working with Communities Against Hate

Bringing Communities Together to Fight Hate. The Department of Justice's Community Relations Service often becomes involved when a hate crime incident threatens harmonious racial and ethnic relations. When a hate crime takes place, the Service uses mediation to provide representatives of community groups and local governments with an impartial forum to restore stability through dialogue and discussion. It conducts training conferences on hate crime prevention and response for state and local law enforcement and other governmental agencies, academic institutions and civic, business and community organizations. The Community Relations Service assists local government and organizations in appropriate contingency planning to ensure that marches, demonstrations and similar events occur without exacerbating racial and ethnic tensions.

Fighting Intolerance in our Schools and Communities. The Clinton Administration also supports several desegregation centers. These centers have provided training and technical assistance on hate and bias crimes, and have developed model programs and practices. The desegregation centers and policies and have identified programs that are working in schools to prevent the behavior that leads to hate crimes.[Department of Education, 10/97]
