I just got a call from DPC staff to give us a heads up that the WH is being heavily lobbied by community groups (HHS's constituencies) to let community groups get the expanded 21st Century Community Learning Center funds directly rather than through partnerships with schools.

We had persuaded the WH that this was not the way to go, but DPC staff

tell me that it is likely that Bruce and others will ask the Dept. (possibly RWR) strongly to reconsider.

I have a conf. call with DPC and HHS tomorrow to ask HHS to put together paper that makes the case that community groups get funds under the child development block grant for school-age care and will get even more under the expansion. Unfortunately, the word on the street is that there will be "no school-age money for community groups." This is not accurate even though there will not be an explicit pot of money going directly to community groups.

Here are some quick points we can make:

1. 1/3 of the HHS child development block grant funds go to school-age care, and the block grant will be expanded in the FY99 Budget. So there is a pot of money than community groups can tap

directly for school-age care and it is being expanded.

2. We would require schools to partner with other community organizations in order to receive 21st Century funds, and we are proposing a match requirement which will empower the community partners

because the schools will not be the source of all the funds. One of the models for 21st century program is the Virtual Y in which the Y runs afterschool programs in the NYC public schools.

3. We will lose the premise of the 21st Century program -- that we are leveraging underutilized school facilities and resources -- if community groups are allowed to get the funds directly for programs not located at public schools. If the premise of the program is lost,

we are much more likely to end up in a divisive and unproductive voucher debate.

4. ED funds go through the schools -- we are the Dept. of ED!

I thought more about our conversation last night and decided that I

did not make my arguments very well and that I was unconvinced by your

sense that we must have one funding stream. Naturally the Secretary and I will go along with a Presidential decision but my understanding from our conversation is that we have a President's question, not a decision. At the least it seems to me that the Secretary ought to have a shot at weighing in with the President if he believes that a possible policy decision is misguided. The following categorizes some of the arguments. It is not clear to me that we need

to make this decision now -- when it is made the Secretary needs to be

involved!!

1. Some basic facts about the 21st century program:

* The grant recipients are a school or schools in

COLLABORATION

with other public and nonprofit agencies and organizations.

* A program could be run by a nonprofit organization (a Y etc.)

in a sub-grant relationship with the schools.

* The location for the program is a school building -- a major

purpose of the program is to leverage the use of the school

building to a). use a valuable resource more efficiently: b) help

develop the school as a community resource.

* The cost savings in this approach are substantial -- we estimate a federal cost of \$400/child per year. We ask for a match

of

1-1 and expect to obtain a lot more when things like the building are counted. Other programs cost a number of times more.

* One major focus of the 21st century schools programs is on educational activities -- this is not the case with the content of many other day care programs. The educational focus is greatly enhanced by the location of the services -- often libraries, materials, etc.

ALL OF THIS ARGUES THAT THE SITE OF THE AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM IS CRITICAL -- THE ARGUMENT THAT SCHOOLS IN THE PAST HAVE BEEN ADVERSE TO HOUSING AFTER-SCHOOL CARE IS ONE OF THE REASONS THAT WE HAVE BEEN PUSHING THE 21ST CENTURY PROGRAM. WE NEED A CLEAR STIMULUS TO

OVERCOME THIS TENDENCY ON THE PART OF SOME SCHOOLS. The most important

part of this program is to stimulate far more school based programs than we will ever be able to afford.

if WE HAVE AN ALTERNATIVE WE SIMPLY PLAY INTO THE HANDS OF THOSE THAT DO NOT WANT SCHOOLS TO BE A PART OF AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS.

2. DEMAND: We expect 3-5 times as many proposals as we can fund this year and even more next year if the appropriation increases. Recent survey results indicate strongly that parents want their students in after-school programs in schools with learning activities.

3. POLITICS: We have met with both the school groups and the community groups like CDF and they are comfortable with dual funding streams. During the child care debate some 10 years ago a one-stream funding mechanism was proposed and the schools and the community groups were at each others throats and sunk the proposals. We need to

learn from this and from the Am Reads experience -- where the proposal

to make community groups a fiscal agent was soundly rejected.

A second political question revolves around vouchers -- if we open up

the program to multiple bidders we are inviting a Republican move to turn it into a voucher program. THE SECRETARY FEELS VERY STRONGLY ABOUT THIS!!!!!!

4. CHILD CARE BLOCK GRANT: HHS estimates that 1/3 of the block

grant

will go to after-school care. This is roughly 1.3 million.

These block grant funds will increase supply by increasing demand!!!

THE BLOCK GRANT AND THE JUSTICE PROGRAM ALREADY CREATE SECOND FUNDING
STREAMS!!

5. MECHANICS OF FUNDING: The notion of funding community groups by
exception will be very difficult to make work -- To do it we would
have to reserve funds for the community groups, go through the
various

proposals from schools and districts, make these funding decisions,
look through for what districts were missing and then see if

community

groups came in from the missing school districts. This is possible
but it does effectively require having two different funding streams
and competitions. If this is what the President wants to do perhaps
we should specify a percentage set-aside.

Regarding DC I think we can do this with a separate appropriation!!!

Subject: FDA & CDC Funding for Food Safety Activities

You asked that we provide you with an assessment of the OSTP staff complaint that FDA and CDC have not been provided enough funding to meet

the Administration's stated goals in the President's Food Safety Initiative.

FDA's Food Safety Import Funding Level

The passback for FDA included \$24 million in FDA's base to continue food safety initiative activities begun in FY 1998 and an additional \$25 million to fund food import inspection activities and some expanded domestic food safety activities, for a total food safety initiative level of \$49 million.

When we passed back the \$25 million for FDA (we also passed back \$5 million for CDC food safety), we advised HHS that this was all the additional funding they would be getting to cover additional FDA food safety initiative activities and the President's food safety commitments. We did not passback a split for domestic and international food safety and left it to HHS' judgment, assuming that HHS would allocate the funds to meet the President's most recent import inspection commitment.

In previous discussions with FDA, we determined that FDA could reasonably obligate in FY 1999 at least \$15 million to develop a comprehensive international import inspection program and hire over 60 international import inspectors (FDA currently has roughly four FTEs doing international inspection). With such an increase, FDA will be able to evaluate/investigate the food safety systems of 50 to 55 countries phased in over two years.

HHS Advised FDA to Spend Less on Imports

Instead of adequately funding the food import inspection initiative to meet the President's commitment to "dramatically expanding" FDA's food import inspections, HHS apparently advised FDA that of the \$25 million we passed back, \$20 million was for domestic food safety and \$5 million for the President's Food Import inspection initiative.

We spoke to Bill Beldon today at ASMB and advised him that the HHS split for domestic and food import was not sufficient to meet the President's commitment for food import inspections and that FDA would need at least \$15 million, although we were not precluding HHS from allocating more than \$15 million to import inspections of the total \$25 million passed back for food safety. Bill acknowledged our concern and said he would communicate this concern to the rest of ASMB and FDA.

It is our considered judgment that the additional \$25 million (+20% over the FY 1998 enacted level for FDA food safety activities) that was passed back to FDA will be enough to meet the Administration's commitments on food safety in FY 1999, but the funds need to be allocated according to Administration priorities i.e., the majority of the \$25 million should go to import inspection.

Analysis of OSTP Concern Re: CDC Food Safety Funding

In the attached e-mail OSTP staff states that "\$5 million would not enable CDC to put in place the early warning system the President promised last January." We assume OSTP is referring to the "Food Safety: From Farm to Table" initiative announced to support the FY 1998 Budget. If this is the case, the statement is not accurate.

The Food Safety initiative announced by the President last January (and subsequently summarized in a May 1997 report prepared by EPA, HHS and USDA) outlined specific policies and resource levels for FY 1998. While the interagency report identified some "long-term" activities, it did not identify specific resource levels for FY 1999 or other outyears. Specifically, the initiative proposed an additional \$10 million for CDC in FY 1998 (a 222% increase) over FY 1997 to expand from five to eight the number of "Foodnet" active surveillance sentinel sites that conduct epidemiological research on foodborne pathogens, as well as expand the use of molecular "finger-printing" technology to identify the source of infectious agents.

Congress enacted the resources proposed in the FY 1998 Food Safety initiative for CDC. The OMB recommended level for FY 1999 is a \$5 million (+34%) increase over the level proposed by the President in FY 1998 for CDC, but lower than the \$21 million (+145%) increase requested by HHS for FY 1999. The OMB recommendation would allow CDC to build upon the activities that CDC will conduct in FY 1998, although not to the level that HHS would like. HHS is appealing for an additional \$5 million over the OMB

recommendation in FY 1999.

STATE OF THE UNION ADDRESS: NEW EDUCATION INITIATIVES

DRAFT -- January 23, 1998

President Clinton is proposing new initiatives that will dramatically strengthen elementary and secondary education. These proposals will help ensure that all students start out in a small class with a good teacher, in a safe, modern school. They will also help ensure that students, especially in high poverty urban and rural areas, attend schools where high standards are taken seriously and kids are given the help they need to succeed. The President's proposals will dramatically expand access to safe havens for after-school learning, and ensure that low-income students receive the support and encouragement to finish school and continue on to college.

Small Classes with Qualified Teachers to Improve Reading in Grades 1-3. President Clinton is proposing a \$12.4 billion initiative over 7 years (\$7.3 billion over 5 years) to help local schools provide small classes with qualified teachers in the early grades. This will help ensure that every child receives personal attention, learns to read independently and gets a solid foundation for further learning. The new initiative will reduce class size from a nationwide average of 22 in grades 1-3 to an average of 18, providing funds to help local school districts hire an additional 100,000 well-prepared teachers. The initiative will also provide funds to states and local school districts to test new teachers, develop more rigorous teacher testing and certification requirements, and train teachers in effective reading instruction practices. Schools districts will be accountable for demonstrating gains in reading achievement. These steps will help ensure that first through third grade students are receiving high-quality reading instruction in smaller classes from competent teachers.

Modern School Buildings to Improve Student Learning. In order for students to learn and to compete in the global economy, schools must be well-equipped and they must be able to accommodate smaller class sizes. To address these and other critical needs, President Clinton is proposing Federal tax credits to pay interest on nearly \$22 billion in bonds to build and renovate public schools. This is more than double the assistance proposed last year, which covered half the interest on an estimated \$20 billion in bonds. The tax credits will cost the Treasury \$5 billion over 5 years, and more than \$10 billion over ten years. Of the \$22 billion in bond authority, nearly \$20 billion is for a new School Modernization Bonds. Half of this bond authority will be allocated to the 100 school districts with the largest number of low-income children, and the other half will be allocated to the States. In addition, the President is proposing a more than \$2.4 billion expansion of the Qualified Zone Academy Bonds, school-business partnerships that will include funding for school construction and renovation.

Education Opportunity Zones: Helping Students in Poor Communities Reach High Standards. This initiative will strengthen public schools and help students master the basic and advanced skills where the need is the greatest: in high poverty urban and rural communities where concentrated poverty, low expectations, too many poorly prepared teachers, and overwhelmed school systems create significant barriers to high achievement. The Education Department will select approximately fifty high poverty urban and rural school districts with: (1) a demonstrated commitment to use high standards and tests of student achievement as tools to identify and provide help to students, teachers and schools who need it; (2) a strategy to prevent

students from falling behind by ensuring quality teaching, challenging curricula, and extended learning time; (3) programs to end social promotion and turn around failing schools; and (4) evidence of improved student achievement. Added investments in these communities will accelerate their progress and provide models of successful, standards-based reform for the nation.

The President's initiative will invest \$200 million in FY99, and \$1.5 billion over 5 years, in raising achievement and sharing lessons learned with school districts around the country.

Expanding Access to Safe After-School Care. To help create safe, positive learning environments for American school-age children who lack adult supervision during a typical week, the President has proposed to increase the 21st Century Learning Center Program by \$800 million over five years. The program will support school-community partnerships that expand or establish programs providing after-school care for up to half a million children a year.

Early Intervention to Promote College Attendance. President Clinton will soon announce a long-term effort to bring college opportunity to children in high-poverty areas by providing their families with early information about financial aid and the best courses to take to be well-prepared for college, as well as support services to help the children stay on track through high school graduation and into college.

students from falling behind by ensuring quality teaching, challenging curricula, and extended learning time; (3) programs to end social promotion and turn around failing schools; and (4) evidence of improved student achievement. Added investments in these communities will accelerate their progress and provide models of successful, standards-based reform for the nation.

The President's initiative will invest \$200 million in FY99, and \$1.5 billion over 5 years, in raising achievement and sharing lessons learned with school districts around the country.

Expanding Access to Safe After-School Care. To help create safe, positive learning environments for American school-age children who lack adult supervision during a typical week, the President has proposed to increase the 21st Century Learning Center Program by \$800 million over five years. The program will support school-community partnerships that expand or establish programs providing after-school care for up to half a million children a year.

Early Intervention to Promote College Attendance. President Clinton will soon announce a long-term effort to bring college opportunity to children in high-poverty areas by providing their families with early information about financial aid and the best courses to take to be well-prepared for college, as well as support services to help the children stay on track through high school graduation and into college.

In his resignation letter to the President, Gene Ludwig offered the following

statistics on the impact of the Administration's 1993 reform of the Community

Reinvestment Act (CRA):

"Lending commitments under the CRA have increased 15-fold from the pre-1993

era, from roughly \$3 billion a year to \$43 billion a year. These commitments

represent new credit availability for low- and moderate-income urban and rural

communities, including loans for housing, small farms and small businesses. At

the same time, equity investment by national banks in community development

corporations and projects were six times greater in the last four years than

during the previous 28 years combined. Home mortgages to African Americans and

Hispanic Americans have increased more than 50% over the last four years

--

almost three times the rate of increase for the population as a whole. In some

chronically underserved communities the change has been even more dramatic....

moreover, we have been able to achieve these results while

substantially reducing the supervisory and paperwork burdens that the CRA had

previously imposed on the banking industry."

This paragraph highlights what I maintain is still our most successful, yet

underpublicized community empowerment initiative. It also, in my mind, underscores the need for the President to give a major address which ties what

has been a successful strategy to reinvigorate America's cities with his sizable package for urban America in his FY99 budget.

best
complement of folks for the next meeting and begin discussions regarding
what
type of information the school board has/could get which could help make a
"remedial" case. I suggested it is probably NOT the complement of folks
at
yesterday's meeting (while a number of educators/policy makers, still too
many
lawyers). Also, I believe Crew's folks will also be exploring the "boys"
option.

You should know that in the days prior to the meeting, the New
York
Times and Newsday each ran a very short piece (more of a paragraph)
announcing
"federal officials" were to be meeting with school board officials.

Though

Crew's COC assured us that this was not a public event for them and they would

not be speaking to the press, there may be press generated from the very impatient complainants.

Q: In announcing your support for the Conrad Bill, you singled out the need for "a significant price increase to reduce youth smoking" as the "most important" factor in any bill that the President would support. Is this a change in emphasis?

A: No. In fact, the first principle of the Five Principles President Clinton established for national tobacco legislation last September requires "A Comprehensive Plan to Reduce Teen Smoking, " including "Tough Penalties and Price Increases." (Source: White House fact sheet, "President Clinton's Plan for Comprehensive Tobacco Legislation to Protect America's Children.")

Q: What are the other four principles? And does the President still support them?

A: Absolutely. In fact, we specifically said we like the Conrad bill because it meets each of the Five Principles.

The President will not support piecemeal tobacco legislation. The Five Principles that would have to be addressed in any comprehensive

legislation

are:

A comprehensive plan to reduce teen smoking, including penalties and price increases.

Full authority for the FDA to regulate tobacco products

Changes in the way the industry does business, including an end to marketing to children; document disclosure; and corporate compliance programs.

Progress toward other public health goals, including provisions to reduce exposure to second-hand smoke; help to smokers who wish to enroll in cessation programs; and provide resources for medical research.

Protection for tobacco farmers and their communities.

Q: Why are you supporting a bill that Republican leaders say has no chance of garnering any GOP support?

A: We certainly hope Republicans will support this bill. We're

supporting

the bill because it is a very strong bill that meets each of the President's Five Principles. We view it as an important first step toward the enactment of comprehensive legislation and a challenge to other members to work toward this goal.

But, of course, the President will also support other bills that meet his principles, whether introduced by Democrats or Republicans. We want to work with as many members as we can, from both sides of the aisle, to adopt comprehensive tobacco legislation.

But we will not support a bill without the significant price increase necessary to reduce youth smoking.

Q: Doesn't your embrace of a \$1.50 price increase over three years, coupled with all the new spending the President has proposed, vindicate Republicans who say this is all about raising money and a return to Big Government?

A: Nonsense. This is first and foremost about public health, and saving America's children.

First, let me remind you that the President's proposed budget is the first balanced budget in 30 years. This is not about Big Government; it's about smart, disciplined government.

As for the price increase, we have said all along that price increases are

the most reliable way of achieving reductions in teen smoking. Indeed, it's the first of the President's Five Principles for comprehensive legislation.

Q: But the Five Principles called for \$1.50 a pack increase over the next decade. Conrad calls for it in three years.

A: The President believes that if we can get to our goal of reducing youth smoking more quickly, so much the better. In any case, the timing is for Congress to determine.

Q: Isn't the emphasis on price increases at odds with the FDA's regulation, which relies on restrictions on access and advertising?

A: No. The FDA regulation is part of the President's comprehensive plan to reduce youth smoking. As Secretary Shalala has said, we need to use every tool at our disposal to reduce teen smoking, and we know that price is one of the most effective mechanisms. What we need is a comprehensive approach that relies on price increase, as well as restrictions on youth access and appeal.

Q: If price increases are so important, why didn't the FDA regulation raise prices?

A: FDA used the tools it had in its regulatory arsenal. Now that Congress is taking up the issue of youth smoking, it is incumbent upon the Congress to use the most effective weapon we know of, and that weapon is price increases.

Q: With this emphasis on price, are you backing off from your claims that the FDA regulation would have cut youth smoking by 50% over seven years?

A: No. We just need to use every tool at our disposal to cut the number of children taking up this deadly addiction.
