



Favorable stories offered for votes

Desperate to win a House procedural vote on President Clinton's crime bill, the White House last week offered its public relations services to at least two House Republicans.

In advance of the vote, which the president lost, Rep. Peter G. Turkildsen received a phone call from a White House staffer promising to ask Boston Globe columnist Tom Oliphant to praise the Massachusetts Republican in exchange for his vote for the bill.

A follow-up note on White House stationery didn't mention Mr. Oliphant but repeated the basic offer.

"Should you decide to support the [bill], I want to reiterate that I will make calls to Boston media on your behalf," wrote Susan Brophy, who works in the White House legislative affairs office. "I know you are getting a lot of pressure. It is my belief that this is a good vote for you politically and substantively."

Mr. Turkildsen was unmoved and voted with the majority against the procedural rule last Thursday.

In Sunday's editions of the Globe, Mr. Oliphant lauded the vote of bill supporter Rep. Peter Blute, Massachusetts Republican, and condemned "the smarmy move of his GOP colleague," Mr. Turkildsen.

"I don't want to make assumptions, but a reasonable person might wonder if there was a connection," the congressman said yesterday.

Mr. Blute, in an interview last night on a Boston radio station, said Ms. Brophy made the same offer to him. "She said we can help you with the regional press up there, like the Globe," he told WHDH-AM.

Regarding the White House's Ms. Brophy's lobbying tactic, Mr. Turkildsen said: "I've never had it happen before, and I don't think any objective media outlet would want to be used that way as part of a lobbying campaign."

Neither Ms. Brophy nor Mr. Oliphant were available for comment yesterday.

H.D.S. Greenway, the Globe's editorial page editor, said there was no funny business afoot. The paper supported the crime bill and could reasonably be expected to criticize those who voted against it, he said.

Mr. Greenway said he never heard from Ms. Brophy but is not surprised by her offer to Mr. Turkildsen. "This is what lobbyists do, isn't it?" he said.

The White House staffer was not the only administration employee working the media angle to

get the crime bill passed. Robert Gabordi, managing editor of the Marietta (Ohio) Times, which has a circulation of 13,000, received a call from Attorney General Janet Reno the day before the House vote.

"Why, I wondered, did the attorney general care what this newspaper in rural Ohio thought?" Mr. Gabordi wrote in his column on Saturday.

He made the connection: Rep. Ted Strickland, a Democrat whose district includes Marietta, was on record as opposing the bill.

"Maybe Reno was showing a great deal of understanding of the local politics. . . . But I suspect it was back-door arm-twisting," he wrote. "I suspect calls were made only to newspapers in areas like Marietta — where the local Democrat was preparing to vote against the president."

The Times had already criticized Mr. Strickland for his position to no avail. Mr. Strickland voted against the crime bill.

Seniors group faces rebellion

Endorsement of Democratic health plans under attack

Thousands of members of the American Association of Retired Persons — outraged by the organization's decision to back both Democratic health care reform bills — are seeking refuge in another group for seniors that's an ardent opponent of those plans.

The 33 million-member AARP won't say how many complaints it's received and says it doesn't know how many members have quit over its support of Clinton-style health plans sponsored by Senate Democratic leader George J. Mitchell of Maine and House Democratic leader Richard A. Gephardt of Missouri.

At the same time, the 400,000-member United Senior Citizens Associates Inc., or USA, says it's received more than 2,800 calls from elderly people upset at the AARP, and more than 2,400 of them said they want to join USA, said Beau Boulter, director of legislative affairs.

So many calls came into USA's Fairfax headquarters on Aug. 11 — the day after the AARP announced its support for Democratic health plans — that the group had to turn its calls over to an Oregon-based telemarketing firm.

Many angry seniors also called members of Congress to urge them not to vote for the Democratic bills. "We have been overwhelmed by phone calls from people in the AARP," a staffer in Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole's office said yesterday.

Some AARP members report-

edly were perturbed to read in The Washington Times that AARP Legislative Director John Rother is married to Christine Williams, Mr. Mitchell's legislative assistant for health.

"AARP can't legitimately claim to represent seniors when it stands diametrically opposed to where senior's stand," Mr. Boulter said. "All the polls, including those conducted by AARP, have shown that elderly Americans more than any group oppose a Clinton-style health plan."

The AARP concedes that it didn't conduct recent membership polls on health care reform, but it said it believes its support for the two bills reflects the views of the largest proportion of its members.

Mr. Boulter, a former Texas Republican congressman, said USA began three years ago as an alternative to AARP, when it backed catastrophic insurance.

A 1988 federal health insurance law, which provided seniors with coverage for catastrophic illnesses under Medicare, was subsequently repealed. The law was opposed by many elderly people who objected to the 15 percent income tax surcharge they had to pay to finance the added coverage.

As a result of the outcry, Mr.

Boulter said, the AARP later reversed itself on supporting catastrophic care insurance.

"Most people belong to AARP for the benefits it offers," such as discounts on travel and health insurance, said Keith Appell, a senior account executive for Creative Response Concepts, which does public relations work for USA. "They don't realize it has a political agenda."

A USA official who requested anonymity said most of the "furious" callers she spoke with last week "generally complained they were not polled" before the AARP board of directors voted to support the Democratic bills.

AARP member Rodney V. Hansen of Camas, Wash., made that point in a letter he sent to USA requesting an enrollment packet. "I had assumed that, after the catastrophic care debacle, [the AARP] would simply let members express their own thoughts to Congress — and not repeat the blunder of a few years ago," he wrote.

"What really got me upset," Mr. Hansen wrote, was when Mr. Rother, in a televised debate, "stated that, within the AARP, only the extremists disagreed with their endorsement. Every one of my many acquaintances in the AARP must be 'extremists.'"

Within hours of the AARP's announcement that it backed both Democratic health care reform measures, AARP spokesman Peter Askenaz acknowledged that the organization's national office in Washington had received "hundreds" of phone calls, most of them from opponents.

House vote bans routine funding within emergency spending bills

The House, in a minor rebellion against its Democratic leadership, yesterday approved by 406 to 6 a bill barring routine funding items from emergency spending bills.

In view of the landslide vote, the House leadership withdrew a softer measure it had backed that would have enabled the House to strike non-emergency items from urgent appropriations bills.

The House also rejected two stronger measures, one requiring Congress to offset emergency spending with cuts of \$540 billion in discretionary programs, and the other requiring Congress to set aside funds each year for use in emergencies.

The bill approved by the House would prevent Congress from "larding emergency bills with pork items" such as funding for train stations and "floating museum" repairs that were included

in California earthquake aid legislation earlier this year, the bill's authors said.

Under current law, Congress may include routine funding items in emergency aid bills for victims of hurricanes, floods, earthquakes and other natural disasters. But unlike the emergency aid, such items are not exempt from discretionary spending caps set under last year's budget agreement.

House Budget Committee Chairman Martin Olav Sabo, Minnesota Democrat, said the reform bill would unnecessarily tie Congress' hands.

"Where Congress spends money is more heavily skewed by what's written into distribution formulas" requiring automatic payment of about \$760 billion in benefits this year, rather than the emergency spending privileges granted under the budget law, he said.

House Appropriations Committee Chairman David R. Obey, Wis-

consin Democrat, said the House has rarely misused its emergency spending authorities, which are needed to quickly provide aid to people left homeless by disasters.

But Rep. John Kasich, Ohio Republican and one of the bill's authors, said the bill was needed if only to prevent the Senate from attaching costly riders to the aid bills. The Senate is not expected to act on the reform bill this year.

When combined with two other significant budget reform bills approved by the House this summer, the emergency spending measure represents the most significant reform effort in Congress in 20 years and sets the stage for a major budget debate next year, the authors said.

The earlier bills would end Congress' practice of automatically providing cost-of-living adjustments for discretionary programs and require Congress to vote on line-item spending cuts proposed by the president.

The VCRTF in the Senate Crime Bill Compared with the Conference Crime Bill

[Per your request, this is is my draft on VCRTF funding in the conference version, compared with last year's Senate bill. We will be providing additional information on the savings associated with the Federal Workforce Restructuring Act of 1994 in a separate transmittal to you.]

1. 1994-1998 crime fighting funding is actually higher in the Senate passed bill than it is in the conference crime bill, compared on a year by year basis as measured in funding made available through the Violent Crime Reduction Trust Fund (VCRTF). The reason that total funding in the conference bill is higher than that in the Senate bill is that the time span for conference bill anti-crime funding is extended two years beyond the time span in the Senate bill (to 1999 and 2000). This is shown below.

As can be seen by the table above, 1994-1998 allowable budget authority under the VCRTF is \$5 billion higher in the Senate bill than the conference version.

Measured in terms of outlays, the trendline is similar, but even more torqued towards higher spending in the Senate bill, compared

with the conference version. This is shown below.

*Implied outlays for crime spending. The Senate bill does not provide specific outlays for crime funding, but reduces the discretionary caps by these amounts.

In a nutshell, for 1994-1998, outlays in the Senate bill would exceed outlays in the Conference version by almost \$10 billion.

2. VCRTF funding has to be appropriated like any other discretionary funding. Funding is not automatically available. Both the Budget Committees and the Appropriation Committees are assigned roles comparable to their current roles for providing funding under the discretionary caps. There is no "free ride" for crime funding under the provisions in the conference crime bill. Indeed, the conference version is more vigorous in terms of crime funding containment than is the Senate version, for two reasons:

-- The conference bill caps crime outlays on a year by year basis. The Senate bill provides no such cap.

-- The conference bill includes a separate section on sequestration with respect to the VCRTF funding. The Senate bill contains no such section on sequestration.

SUBJECT: CRIME BILL COMPARISON

Attached is a comparison of the spending patterns of the Senate Crime bill and the Conference Report. These calculations are preliminary, and will be revised later today.

Note that had the Senate bill been fully "costed out," (i.e., had dollar amounts been supplied in lieu of the "such sums" figures), its cost would have actually been about \$30.5 billion -- almost the same as the Conference Report.

But here is how the Senate Bill's explicit authorizations compare to the Conference Report's totals:

<u>Category</u>	<u>Change</u>
State Law Enforcement	up \$ 115 million
Federal Law Enforcement	up \$ 910 million
Prisons	up \$2.750 billion
Prevention	up \$3.028 billion

Thus, as you can see, about 60% of the increase from the Senate bill to the Conference Report is in law enforcement and prisons.

Finally, the balance of the two bills is not really that different: the Senate Bill put about 80% of its funds into law enforcement and prisons; the Conference Bill directs about 75% of its money to those two functions.
