THE TREATY ROOM

During the first half of the 19th century, this room was used by the presidents as a sitting room or a private meeting room. President Franklin Pierce (1853-1857), however, used it as his office. During the Abraham Lincoln administration, it was a waiting room for appointments to the adjoining President's Office (today's Lincoln Bedroom).

In 1866, President Andrew Johnson made the room his Cabinet Room. It continued to be so used until 1902 under Presidents Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Arthur, Cleveland, Harrison, and McKinley and for the first year under Theodore Roosevelt, retaining most of the furnishings especially made for the room in 1869. On August 12, 1898, this room was the site of the signing of the Peace Protocol ending hostilities in the Spanish-American War.

In 1902, the Cabinet Room and the offices of the President and his staff were moved into the newly constructed West Wing, at which time this room became a private study for Presidents Theodore Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson, Harding and Coolidge. During the Hoover administration, it became a sitting room and was furnished by Mrs. Hoover with objects from the Monroe era and with reproductions of furniture that belonged to President Monroe. It then became known as the Monroe Room.

During the Kennedy administration, this room became a private meeting room for the President, furnished to resemble the Cabinet Room of the late 19th century and named the Treaty Room. On October 7, 1963, President Kennedy signed here the ratification of the Treaty for a Partial Nuclear Test Ban, and on September 30, 1972, President Nixon similarly signed the ratification of the Treaty on the Limitation of Anti-Ballistic Missile Systems.

In 1989, the room was converted back into a Residence office for President Bush.

In 1993, this room, remaining a Residence office for President Clinton, has been refurbished by Little Rock designer, Kaki Hockersmith, incorporating furnishings associated with the use of the room in the 19th century as the Cabinet Room. The painted woodwork installed in the Truman Renovation has been removed to storage and replaced with matching woodwork in a dark-stained walnut. A pair of inlaid walnut bookcases has been constructed for the east wall. Several chairs have been upholstered in a dark red fabric ornamented with gold Napoleonic laurel wreaths. This motif was also adapted for gilded gesso wreaths applied to the center of the walnut cornices installed above new draperies made of a red and blue fabric in a drapery-swag pattern. The room cornice and ceiling medallion have been repainted with details highlighted, while the walls have been covered in a vinyl wallpaper simulating red leather. The 1869 Cabinet table has been returned as a desk along with other historic White House furnishings and artworks (described on the following pages counterclockwise from the hallway door).

oil on canvas, c.1853. Between his two visits to Japan in an attempt to open that country to American trade, Commodore Matthew C. Perry and his naval squadron spent from July 1853 to January 1854 in China. This harbor scene, showing the steam frigates U.S.S. Powhatan and U.S.S. Susquehanna, is believed to have been painted in the fall of 1853 at the time that Perry took up residence in Macao during the refitting of his fleet.

View of Hong Kong by an unknown artist

oil on canvas, c.1853. Perry's full squadron assembled in Hong Kong on August 25, 1853. The three sidewheel steamers at center of this view from Kowloon are the U.S.S. Powhatan, U.S.S. Susquehanna, and the U.S.S. Mississippi. These two paintings were once owned by Lt. J. Hogan Brown of the Susquehanna.

James Monroe (statuette) by an unknown artist

Dieppe ivory, late 19th century, France.

Probably a figure of George Washington, with hinged triptych torso carved, however, to commemorate the life of James Monroe; left panel - as young Virginia officer leading charge in one of many Revolutionary War battles, promoted by George Washington for "bravery under fire" at Trenton, 1776; center - unidentified military meeting; right - standing portrait with American flag, eagle, and scroll marked "Monroe Doctrine", an extract from his annual Presidential message, December 2, 1823, explaining the American position against European interference in the Americas; similar figures of Lincoln, Napoleon, Lord Nelson, and European monarchs are known to exist.

Andrew Jackson by Clark Mills (1815-1883)

white metal, 1855. This miniature version of Mills' heroic rearing equestrian statue of Jackson, unveiled in the center of Lafayette Square across from the White House in 1853, was cast by the Philadelphia foundry, Cornelius & Baker, and purchased by the government for the White House in 1859.

Theodore Roosevelt by James Earle Fraser (1876-1953)

bronze, c.1910. This small bust shows Roosevelt in the neckerchief and uniform jacket worn when he was a Rough Rider (1st U.S. Cavalry Volunteers) in the Spanish-American War. The sculptor is probably best known for his design of the buffalo nickel.

Horatio Nelson (bust) by an unknown artist

bronze/ oak and copper, 1905. For the centenary of the death of Lord Nelson at the Battle of Trafalgar, October 21, 1805, the British Admiralty provided copper and oak from Nelson's still extant flagship, H.M.S. VICTORY for the making of this "memento" bust and pedestal sent to President Theodore Roosevelt.

Benjamin Franklin by Benjamin Wilson (1721-1788)

oil on canvas, 1759. This half-length portrait, commissioned by Franklin in London in 1758, shows a streak of lightning at the left alluding to his electricity experiments, a subject about which the artist had also written. This painting was in Franklin's home in Philadelphia when British troops were quartered there during the Revolutionary War. Major John Andre, the infamous conspirator with Benedict Arnold, took the portrait with him to England, where it hung in Howick House, the home of his commanding officer, Major-General Sir Charles Grey. In 1906, in honor of the bicentenary of Franklin's birth, it was given to the United States by the Governor General of Canada, Albert Henry George, 4th Earl Grey. 906.3501.1

Signing of the Peace Protocol Between Spain and the United States, August 12, 1898 by Theobald Chartran (1849-1907) oil on canvas, 1899. Support in the United States for the Cuban insurrection against Spanish rule, further incited by the sinking of the battleship U.S.S. Maine in Havana harbor (February 15, 1898), led President William McKinley to request and Congress to enact a state of war with Spain as of April 21. The brief hostilities, marked by dramatic naval victories in Manila Bay in the Philippine Islands (May 1) and off the coast of Santiago de Cuba (July 3) were halted after the signing of a peace protocol in the Cabinet Room of the White House on August 12. Shown signing is the French Ambassador, Jules Cambon, who had negotiated on behalf of the Spanish. Secretary of State William R. Day, who signed for the United States, is seated beside him with three American assistant secretaries and one French secretary standing behind them. Although photographs of the event show President McKinley at the north end of the 1869 Cabinet table (869.209.1), Chartran chose to reverse the scene to show the window and view through the South Portico. Although it seems that industrialist Henry Clay Frick intended this to be a personal gift to President Theodore, it was sent from Oyster Bay to the White House because, as Roosevelt wrote, "the pictures of the White House [then almost exclusively portraits] are not all that fancy".

The Peacemakers by George Peter Alexander Healy (1813-1894) oil on canvas, 1868. This scene depicts a meeting late in the Civil War between President Abraham Lincoln and (left-to-right) Major-General William T. Sherman, Lieutenant-General Ulysses S. Grant, and Rear-Admiral David D. Porter. On March 27 and 28, 1865, these leaders met aboard the River Queen, the steamer which had brought the Lincolns to Grant's headquarters on the James River during the siege of Richmond, Virginia. They discussed the favorable prospects for a speedy peace, which engendered Healy's title and inclusion of an optimistic rainbow in the cabin window. The likeness of Lincoln in this group portrait, painted in Rome, closely resembles Healy's 1869 portrait of the president which currently hangs in the State Dining Room. Healy is also represented in the White House collection by six other presidential portraits.

CONFERENCE TABLE

This walnut conference table was purchased for the Cabinet Room (then on the Second Floor of the White House) in 1869 during the administration of President Ulysses S. Grant. It was part of a suite of furniture made by the Pottier & Stymus Manufacturing Company, a New York firm known for its high-quality product uniquely designed for each commission.

It is fitted with locking drawers in which the President and his seven Cabinet officers (State, Treasury, War, Justice, Post Office, Navy, and Interior) could keep their papers. It is uncertain how an eighth Cabinet member was accommodated with the creation of the Department of Agriculture in 1889, but the table continued in use until 1902, when a new Cabinet Room was provided in the newly constructed West Wing.

In 1961, Mrs. Kennedy reassembled the remaining pieces from the suite - this table, a sofa, and four chairs - in that same Second Floor room, renamed the Treaty Room, which had served as the Cabinet Room from 1865 to 1902. Removed to storage in 1989, but recalled for several important treaty signings, this table was returned to the Treaty Room in 1993 for use as a desk by President Bill Clinton.

Among the historic documents which have been signed on this table are the following:

1. The Peace Protocol ending hostilities of the Spanish-American War, August 12, 1898

In attendance in the Cabinet Room were President William McKinley, Secretary of State William Day, who signed for the United States, and French Ambassador Jules Cambon, who signed for Spain. The actual peace treaty, the Treaty of Paris, was signed on December 10.

2. The Pact of Paris (Kellogg-Briand Peace Pact),
January 15, 1929

The table was moved from the Second Floor to the East Room for President Calvin Coolidge to sign this pact after its ratification by the Senate. The pact, signed in Paris by 15 nations on August 27, 1928 and eventually adhered to by 48 others, provided that the contracting powers would "condemn recourse to war for the solution of international controversies, and renounce it as an instrument of national policy". A war of self-defense, however, was understood to be excepted.

3. Arms Limitation Treaty with the Soviet Union, October 3, 1972

The table was moved from the Treaty Room to the East Room for President Richard M. Nixon and Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet Minister of Foreign Affairs, to sign this "Treaty on Limitation of Anti-Ballistic Missile Systems and Interim Agreement on the Limitation of Strategic Offensive Arms".

4. Peaceful Nuclear Explosion Treaty with the Soviet Union,
May 28, 1976

The table was again moved to the East Room for President Gerald R. Ford to sign this "Treaty on Underground Nuclear Explosion for Peaceful Purposes".

5. Egyptian-Israeli Peace Treaty, March 26, 1979

The table was moved to the North Lawn in front of the North Portico for the signing by President Anwar Sadat of Egypt and Prime Minister Menachem Begin of Israel, with President Jimmy Carter witnessing, of the "Treaty of Peace Between the Arab Republic of Egypt and the State of Israel".

6. Intermediate Nuclear Forces Treaty with the Soviet Union,
December 8, 1987

The table was moved to the East Room for President Ronald W. Reagan and Mikhail S. Gorbachev, General Secretary of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, to sign this "Treaty... on the Elimination of Their Intermediate-Range and Shorter-Range Missiles".

7. Agreements and Protocols with the Soviet Union, June 1, 1990

The table was placed in the East Room for President George Bush and Mikhail S. Gorbachev, President of the Soviet Union, to sign an "Agreement on Destruction and Non-Production of Chemical Weapons" and a "Protocol to the Treaty on the Limitation of Underground Nuclear Weapon Tests", among other documents. The table was also used for a news conference held by the two presidents in the East Room on June 3.

8. Treaties and Agreements with several of the former Soviet
Republics, 1992

The table was placed in the East Room for President George Bush for signing ceremonies with the Ukraine (May 6), Kazakhstan (May 19), Russia (June 17).

9. The Israel-Palestinian Agreement, September 13, 1993

The table was placed on the South Lawn for signing ceremonies hosted by President Bill Clinton in the presence of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Chairman Yasser Arafat. The signing by Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres and PLO Executive Council Member Mahmoud Abbas was witnessed by Secretary of State Warren Christopher and Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev. The audience included former Presidents Jimmy Carter and George Bush.

WHITE HOUSE CHRISTMAS TREE TO BE PRESENTED TO

WHITE HOUSE ANNOUNCES RESTORATIONS

As have most of their predecessors in the White House, President and Mrs. Clinton have undertaken several interior refurbishings and restorations to ensure the upkeep of the Executive Mansion as a living museum that has been the home and office of every President since John Adams. No public funds were spent on the work.

The recently completed work is part of the routine maintenance and restoration of the White House and concludes the initial phase of a broader restoration project to include additional repairs and maintenance. According to White House Curator Rex Scouten, significant restorations are necessary about every 10 years due to the heavy volume of tourists and guests who visit the White House each week.

In addition to the routine maintenance and restoration, some changes reflect the lifestyle of the occupant family, such as converting the butler's pantry into an everyday kitchen for family meals, the President's work habits (installing bookcases in the Treaty Room), and the taste and character of the President's principal work place, the Oval Office, which now has new drapes and carpet.

The restoration featured the re-upholstering or recovering of 73 pieces of furniture and furnishings, the conservation of 23 pieces of furniture already in the White House collection and the retrieval of 52 pieces of furniture and 22 historic and decorative pieces from storage for use within the house. Two floors were repaired and re-covered. Twenty-eight windows received new curtains. Nineteen carpets and underlays worn and needing attention were replaced. Eleven chandeliers were conserved.

The President and Mrs. Clinton are already involved in making needed refurbishments in the state rooms of the White House. The Committee for the Preservation of the White House met earlier this month to discuss the restoration projects in the Blue Room and East Room. The President recently appointed Kinshasha Holman Conwill, Director, Studio Museum in Harlem; J. Thomas Savage, Jr., Curator, Historic Charleston Foundation; Dick Moe, President, National Trust for Historic Preservation; Leonore Annenberg and Kaki Hockersmith of Hockersmith Interiors to the Committee for Preservation of the White House. The President re-appointed the following members of the Committee for Preservation of the White House: Leslie Greene Bowman, Curator, Los Angeles County Museum of Art; Wendy Cooper, Curator of Decorative Arts, Baltimore Museum of Art; Jonathan Fairbanks, Katherine Lane Weems Curator of Decorative Arts and Sculpture, Museum of Fine Arts; Richard Nylander, Curator of Collections, Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities; John Wilmerding, Christopher Binyon Sarofim '86 Professor in American Art, Princeton University; Mark Hampton; William Kloss and Charles W.

Engelhard, Jr. (A complete list of the members of the Committee for the Preservation of the White House is attached.)

Included in the restoration were portions of the family quarters and rooms widely used for private work, meetings, official functions, and entertaining -- the Oval Office, Treaty Room, West Sitting Room, and Lincoln Sitting Room. The most extensive changes were made to enhance the special character of the Oval Office and the Treaty Room -- the President's two offices -- and to expand their use as public and private work areas.

- o New gold draperies were installed in the Oval Office after President Clinton's inauguration in January. Further improvements included restyling and recovering the office's two sofas, reupholstering two high-back armchairs, recovering several cane-back armchairs, and installing a new oval carpet with 13 colors that was woven specially for the room. The carpet, with its deep blue field, features the Presidential Seal encircled by fifty white stars and framed by a gilt double rope.

Over the years, the Treaty Room, now a Presidential office located in the residence, has served as a Cabinet Room, sitting room, Presidential reception room, and private study. It has also been the site of important treaty signings, such as the Peace Protocol marking the end of the Spanish-American War in 1898 and the Treaty for a Partial Nuclear Test Ban signed by President Kennedy. Aware of the room's rich past, President Clinton was committed to restoring its 19th century character while also maintaining it as a working office and meeting area for visiting dignitaries. The table in the Treaty Room, now serving as the President's desk, was used this fall by the signators of the Israeli-Palestinian Agreement.

- o The refurbishing of the Treaty Room was accomplished with the addition of stained walnut woodwork, inlaid walnut bookcases, new wallpaper, new upholstery and draperies, and a repainted ceiling medallion.

In the family quarters of the residence, most of the restoration consisted of necessary maintenance, repainting, carpeting, and upholstering.

- o A butler's pantry was converted into an everyday kitchen now used for family meals. A large wood island was removed and replaced with an expandable breakfast table and chairs.

o The carpet on the second floor, worn from constant use, was replaced and moved to the third floor hallway.

o The third-floor solarium, where the First Family entertains and convenes meetings, received new drapes, upholstery and wallpaper. Similar improvements were made to the second floor master bedroom and family room.

The recent improvements, totalling \$396,429.46, were financed by private donations of money to the White House Historical Association, including a donation from surplus funds of the Presidential Inaugural Committee as well as donations of goods and services to the National Park Service. (The Inaugural Committee also contributed funds to the Vice President's Residence Foundation.) The Clintons chose not to use the \$50,000 appropriated by Congress for White House restorations.

Among the donations to the National Park Service was \$74,607 contributed by the Clinton/Gore Transition Foundation in payments to Kaki Hockersmith of Little Rock, Arkansas, for her services as the design consultant for the White House restoration project. (The Transition Foundation is privately funded.) Ms. Hockersmith devoted a significant amount of personal time to the project, essentially closing her small business and dedicating nearly an entire year to the White House refurbishment. Ms. Hockersmith also donated draperies of her design which now hang in the Lincoln Sitting Room. (Lists of those who contributed to the White House Historical Association and the National Park Service are attached. A list of members of the White House Historical Association is also attached.)

In late November 1992, Ms. Hockersmith, president of Kaki Hockersmith Interiors, began working with the White House curator and usher's offices to review the condition of the residence and offices used by the President to determine a priority list for refurbishments. She oversaw the gathering and placement of historic objects to be displayed throughout the residence and offices of the White House -- a priority for the Clintons.

Ms. Hockersmith surveyed storage facilities inside the White House and the main storage warehouse in Maryland for paintings, furniture that could be used after refurbishment, and other suitable furnishings. To minimize costs, nearly all of the furniture used for the restoration came from Executive Residence storage.

Most of the draperies and upholstery were done by Nelson Beck, a Washington, D.C. firm recommended by the White House curator and usher's offices and widely acclaimed for its quality workmanship and attention to historical detail.

Nelson Beck has assisted in a number of earlier projects at the White House, including upholstering the walls of the Green Room, upholstering the Bellange chairs in the Blue Room, and providing slipcovers and upholstery for the Bushes and the Reagans.

Other work done by Nelson Beck includes drapery treatments and upholstery for the Vice President's house during Nelson Rockefeller's term, the draperies and window treatments in the restored period offices at the Treasury Department, as well as work for the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the National Portrait Gallery, the Renwick Gallery, the Museum of Modern Art, the Corcoran Gallery, the DAR Museum and the U.S. Capitol.

"We are grateful to the many Americans whose generous contributions have helped preserve the White House as a proud piece of American history and an ongoing national treasure," the President and Mrs. Clinton said.

THE LINCOLN SITTING ROOM

This small southeast corner room seems to have been little used in the early years of the White House, having been listed simply as "empty" in the inventory taken in 1825. From at least 1829 until 1902, it was a part of the presidential office suite at the east end of the Second Floor of the Residence, a room usually occupied by clerks or secretaries. Although the larger adjacent room was most often used as the president's office or cabinet room, President John Tyler used this room as his office.

In 1866, under President Andrew Johnson, telegraph equipment was installed, and in 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes, the first White House telephone was added to this "Telegraph Room". In 1898, the telegraph reported the news of the sinking of the U.S.S. Maine in the harbor of Havana, Cuba, and the room became the "War Room", in which President William McKinley followed the course of the ensuing Spanish-American War. It was also in this room that the news was first received at the White House of the 1881 shooting of President James Garfield at a Washington train station and the 1901 assassination of McKinley in Buffalo.

When the presidential offices were moved to the newly constructed West Wing in 1902, this room became a small bedroom. In 1933, Eleanor Roosevelt furnished it with maple furniture made at the Val-Kill shop on the Roosevelt's estate, a cottage industry she helped establish to provide fuller employment for farm men and women in the area of Hyde Park, N.Y.

After the Truman Renovation of the White House, 1948-1952, the room was refurnished more as a sitting room, with a small bed serving as a sofa. In the Kennedy administration, it was redecorated in the Victorian flavor, to better complement the Lincoln Bedroom. An olive and rust color scheme was selected, using a dotted fabric on the walls and paisley draperies. In 1973, the Victorian chandelier was added to a room which had become a favorite of President Richard Nixon as a quiet hideaway. In 1981, the room was refurbished in the same basic style, but with new fabrics in a beige and rust color scheme.

In 1993, President and Mrs. Clinton requested a stronger Victorian decor for the room, which was created by Kaki Hockersmith, Little Rock, in burgundy, gold, and cream colors. The ceiling has been covered with a bold coffer-patterned paper. The walls have been painted a cream color with the window frames, chair rail, and cornice in gold and a burgundy sub-cornice band.

At the two windows have been hung draperies of a burgundy silk with gilt decorations, including paired leaf-tailed dolphins seen most clearly at the base of the ovoid valance shield from which swags hang. These draperies, designed by Ms. Hockersmith in 1993 for a Little Rock showhouse, were donated by her.

The ingrain rug is patterned with alternating rosettes and medallions in red, green, and gold. A two-ply wool carpet flat-woven in 36-inch strips, a type popular in American, 1850-1875, it was first reproduced for the Smithsonian Institution's 1976 exhibition on the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.
