**FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON'S SCHEDULE FOR

Washington, D.C. -- The First Lady will travel in New York on Wednesday, July 15 as she continues the White House Millennium Council's "Save America's Treasures" tour.

She will deliver remarks at the former home of Kate Mullany, a young Irish immigrant laundry worker who organized an all-female union in the 1800s and succeeded in negotiating higher wages for women laundry workers, earning almost parity with men's wages.

In Auburn, the First Lady will tour the Harriet Tubman's former home, and deliver remarks in front of the Harriet Tubman Home for the Aged.

In the afternoon, the First Lady will travel to Victor, New York. She will visit the Ganondagon State Historic Site, the former home and burial place of one of the most important figures in Iroquois history, Jikonsaseh, the Mother of Nations. She will participate in a discussion with Iroquois Clan Mothers, and observe a performance by the "Young Spirit Dancers".

In the evening, she will visit the M'Clintock House in Waterloo, where the original "Declaration of Sentiments" was finalized three days before the Women's Rights Convention in 1848. This document marks an important step toward legal, political, and educational rights for women in America. The First Lady will also participate in an unveiling of a new Girl Scout patch which will follow the White House Millennium Program in its endeavor to "Honor the past - Imagine the future".

Washington, D.C. -- On Tuesday, July 14, the First Lady will travel in New Jersey, New York, and Massachusetts, on the second day of the "Save America's Treasures" tour, which is sponsored by the White House Millennium Council to Save America's Treasures. Throughout the trip, she is highlighting America's treasures, including artifacts, and buildings, and monuments, which reflect our nation's heritage; all are in need of preservation and restoration to ensure their survival.

She will begin her day at the Thomas Edison National Historic Site, where Edison spent forty-four years developing products which earned him over one thousand patents. Lab notes, inventions, and letters of Edison are in need of proper protection. After touring the facility, the First Lady will deliver remarks

She will travel to Newburgh, New York to visit the East End Historic District and George Washington's former headquarters. This site was established as a state historic site in 1850. In this district, historic buildings have been adapted in an innovative fashion for use as public housing. The First Lady will speak at the Dutch Reformed Church, which was built in the 1830s and is in need of restoration.

In the afternoon, she will visit the Colonial Theater in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. Built in 1903, this structure is one of the finest examples of legitimate theater architecture in America. The theater has seen performances by such famous entertainers as Sarah Bernhardt, John Philip Sousa, and John and Ethel Barrymore. Although it currently serves as a paint store, the theater's owners have taken care to protect the objects and decor of the theater. Through refurbishment, the theater can be revived as a traditional performance space. She will deliver remarks to the people of Pittsfield from the steps of the theater.

In the evening, the First Lady will visit The Mount, the former home of Edith Wharton. Wharton designed the Mount, and lived here for eleven years. It was designated a historic landmark in 1971. This beautiful house has deteriorated over the years, and is in need of restoration.

Today, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton began a three-day trip to national "treasures," historic sites which reflect our country's heritage. The "Save America's Treasures" tour is sponsored by the White House Millennium Council to Save America's Treasures, and will take the First Lady to eleven historic sites in the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast regions. These sites include such places as the laboratory of inventor Thomas Edison in West Orange, New Jersey, and the home of renowned Underground Railroad leader Harriet Tubman in Auburn, New York. The sites include artifacts, buildings, and monuments which are in need of preservation and restoration to ensure their survival into the next century. FACT SHEET

1. The White House Millennium Council Logo ("Millennium Logo") was designed and created to identify national projects that carry out the Millennium Council's goals of stimulating activities and projects at the national and local levels to mark the new millennium in meaningful ways.
2. The design firm of Carbone/Smolan and Associates of New York was selected with the assistance from the American Institute of Graphic Arts to design the official logo.
3. The White House Millennium Council will designate national partners that are sponsoring national millennium projects in association with the Council.
4. Millennium Council Partners will consist of three types of entities: national non-profit organizations, federal agencies, and intergovernmental agencies and associations. National non-profit organizations are selected by the White House Millennium Council based on the partners' national reach and ability to carry out national projects in accordance with Millennium Council objectives.
5. Millennium Partners may in turn designate other partners which are supporting the national projects, and use the logo to identify those additional partners. For example, the National Trust for Historic Preservation is the Millennium Council's nonprofit partner in a national program called Save America's Treasures. The National Trust, in turn, works with the National Park Foundation and Heritage Preservation as its partners.

**FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON'S
"SAVE AMERICA'S TREASURES" TOUR
OF THE MID-ATLANTIC AND NORTHEASTERN REGIONS
JULY 13 - 16, 1998**

Washington, D.C. - - On Monday, July 13, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will embark on a tour of America's national treasures located in the mid-Atlantic and Northeastern regions. These treasures are artifacts, buildings, and monuments which reflect our nation's heritage; all are in need of preservation and restoration to ensure their survival into the next century. By highlighting these treasures, the First Lady hopes to encourage the continued partnership between the private sector and government to ensure that America's heritage is sustained for future generations.

Throughout the trip, the First Lady will promote the goals of the White House Millennium Council's "Save America's Treasures" initiative, a program dedicated to protecting the nation's historical and cultural heritage into the new millennium. The White House Millennium Council has been joined in this effort by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The Trust has formed a Millennium Committee to Save America's Treasures, made up of individuals, foundations, and corporations. The First Lady serves as honorary chair of the Committee.

The First Lady will kick off her "Save America's Treasures" tour in the nation's capitol, Washington D.C.. The President will join Mrs. Clinton in an event to mark the preservation of the Star Spangled Banner, which is exhibited at the National Museum of American History. Stops along the three-day journey will include sites such as the laboratory of Thomas Edison, an ornate but decaying theater in Massachusetts that has seen performances by famous American performers including Sarah Bernhardt and John Philip Sousa, and the home of Harriet Tubman, the renowned leader in the Underground Railroad Movement. The tour will culminate in Seneca Falls, N.Y., where the First Lady will address the thousands gathered for the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the first women's rights convention.

Stops along the tour include:

**Star Spangled-Banner, Museum of American History
*Washington, D.C.***

President and Mrs. Clinton will honor the original Star-Spangled Banner, which inspired Francis Scott Key to write our national anthem. The flag, commissioned by the War Department and made by Mrs. Mary Pickersgill of Baltimore, flew over Ft. McHenry on the night of September 13-14, 1814. It is in need of extensive repair.

Francis Scott Key Monument

Baltimore, Maryland

The First Lady will announce various millennium preservation commitments to save outdoor sculpture in the "monumental city." The Key Monument itself is in need of restoration and preservation.

Thomas Edison National Historic Site/Invention Factory

West Orange, New Jersey

Over half of Edison's 1,093 patents were earned from the forty-four years Edison spent at this location. Among the products developed here: the motion picture camera, the nickel-iron-alkaline battery, and the disc phonograph. Also, this site housed the world's first building constructed as a motion picture house. Over 400,000 artifacts and five million pages of paper are housed here, including Edison's lab notes and letters. This site hopes to build a new visitors center so that these valuable artifacts can be stored properly and in a climate-controlled setting.

East End Historic District and George Washington's Headquarters

Newburgh, New York

Washington's Headquarters, a state historic site, is the first-ever public preservation site in the country. Established as a state historic site in 1850, this is one of 125 different headquarters used by Washington. He used these headquarters the longest - - over sixteen months between the surrender at Yorktown and the signing of the Paris Peace Treaty. Washington's headquarters is part of the East End Historic District which was recognized on National Trust for Historic Preservation's Eleven Most Endangered list in 1996. In this district, historic buildings have been adapted in an innovative fashion for use as public housing. The First Lady will speak at the Dutch Reformed Church, built in 1835-37 by renowned architect Andrew Jackson Davis. The church is currently owned by the city and in desperate need of preservation and restoration.

The Colonial Theater

Pittsfield Massachusetts

Built in 1903, this structure is one of the finest examples of legitimate theater architecture in America. Entertainers who have appeared at this ornate theater include John and Ethel Barrymore, Sara Bernhardt, John Philip Sousa, and Rachmaninoff. The theater currently serves as a paint store, but the owner has taken care to protect the objects and decor of the theater, which have remained intact. By climbing the theater's main staircase, guests can view the theater's interior, including two balconies, a 50-foot high domed ceiling with a mural, and the box seats. By refurbishing the theater, it theater can be revived as a traditional performance space.

Kate Mullany House

Troy, New York

As the only surviving building associated with Kate Mullany, this modest brick house represents a strong tradition of women's union activity. Kate Mullany, a young Irish immigrant laundry worker, organized an all-female union in the 1860s. The Collar Laundry Union successfully negotiated higher wages for the female laundry workers, earning almost parity with men's wages. Kate Mullany represents one of the American labor movement's earliest women leaders. The house will receive its National Historic Landmark plaque.

Harriet Tubman Site

Auburn, New York

Harriet Tubman lived in this area for over thirty years after assisting 300 escaping slaves on the Underground Railroad. Tubman, a renowned leader of the Underground Railroad movement, was known as "the Moses of her people". Located on this 30-acre property are: the brick house where Tubman lived with her husband, the Home for the Aged which she established, and the Harriet Tubman Memorial Library, which houses historical documents and photos. These sites represent the very few documented, tangible links to Harriet Tubman that exist.

Ganondagan State Historic Site

Victor, New York

This site is the only state historic site in New York dedicated to New York's Iroquois (Haudenosaunee) heritage. The Site features a rebuilt longhouse and is the burial place of one of the important figures in Iroquois history, Jikohnsaseh, known as the Mother of Nations. Although the village on this site was twice destroyed by the French and Americans, the Iroquois consider it a place of peace and associate it with their ancient culture. With help, the educational center can be expanded to properly display Iroquois artifacts, house relevant historical documents, and provide an appropriate setting to instruct Native Americans and visitors about richness of the Iroquois traditions. If the destroyed buildings on this site can be re-built and protected, school children and adults can interpret for themselves the significance of this historical site.

Women's Rights National Historical Park (including the McClintock House, the Stanton House, and the Wesleyan Chapel)

Waterloo, New York

McClintock House - - The "Declaration of Sentiments", the now famous women's rights pronouncement penned in 1848 by such notable women as Lucretia Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Mary Ann McClintock, came to fruition at this house. The creation of this document was a critical step in the fight for legal, political and educational rights for women in America. Although the exterior of this historical house has been renovated, the interior needs restoration.

Stanton House - - Elizabeth Cady Stanton, co-founder of the National Women's Suffrage Association, lived in this house from 1847 - 1862. The house is currently open to the public, but two wings of the home need to be restored.

Wesleyan Chapel - - This chapel housed the first Women's Rights Convention 150 years ago. Only two walls and the roof remain of this chapel.

Seneca Falls, New York

The First Lady will deliver remarks at the 150th anniversary of the Women's Rights Convention. In 1848, over one hundred women gathered to proclaim the equality of men and women in their treatise "The Declaration of Sentiments". That declaration has since reverberated across the globe, and is considered the foundation of a social revolution.

FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON'S TRIP TO CHINA
JUNE 24 - JULY 3, 1998

WASHINGTON - - First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will travel to China with President Clinton from July 24 - July 3, 1998. Mrs. Clinton will participate in several events focusing on women's progress in the areas of education, health care, employment opportunities, legal rights, and political participation, and the continuing challenges women face.

Highlights of the trip include a forum in Beijing with Chinese women and remarks by Mrs. Clinton, and a speech in Shanghai. Three years ago in Beijing, at the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women, Mrs. Clinton delivered a speech on women's rights. In her Shanghai speech, Mrs. Clinton will applaud the progress for women and girls that has been sparked around the world by the Beijing Women's Conference, and talk about how women in China are promoting the protection of their human rights and tackling the challenges created by the economic transformation and social change. She will also announce new exchange programs between women leaders in China and the United States.

In addition to the Beijing Forum and the Shanghai speech, the First Lady's separate activities during the President's trip include:

- A discussion at the Women's Law and Legal Services Center at the Peking University School of Law, with Secretary of State Madeline Albright. The Center, a university-based organization funded by the Ford Foundation, seeks to promote women's consciousness of their legal rights, increased legal protection for women's rights, and improvements in the legal system's treatment of women.
- In Beijing, Mrs. Clinton will meet the physicians from the Center for Disease Control and the Beijing Medical Center who have been involved in a successful collaboration in the prevention of birth defects which have produced results of global importance. She will witness the signing of a new commitment between medical researchers in our government and the Chinese government.
- Remarks at a girls school in Shanghai to highlight raising the status of girls and improving their access to quality education.
- In Shanghai, a visit to a job retraining center. Job retraining is an important tool for Chinese women adversely affected by the economic transformation.
- Remarks at a new pediatric hospital in Shanghai which will serve more than a quarter

million children each year and train medical personnel from throughout China. The hospital is the result of a partnership between Chinese and American, public and private sponsors, including Project Hope and many U.S. corporations. At the hospital, Mrs. Clinton will meet the Chinese muppets of "Zhime Jie", the Chinese version of Sesame Street - a joint project with the Children's Television Workshop and Shanghai Television.

- A visit to the Shanghai Synagogue, which has been recently restored. The synagogue played a historic role as a haven for persecuted Jews during World War II. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright will accompany the First Lady.
- A discussion with Hong Kong women leaders on the role of women in post-reversion Hong Kong. Secretary Albright will participate in this discussion.

JUNE 24 - JULY 3, 1998**

WASHINGTON - - First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will travel to China with President Clinton from July 24 - July 3, 1998. Mrs. Clinton will participate in several events focusing on women's progress in the areas of education, health care, employment opportunities, legal rights, and political participation, and the continuing challenges women face.

Highlights of the trip include a forum in Beijing with Chinese women and remarks by Mrs. Clinton, and a speech in Shanghai. Three years ago in Beijing, at the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women, Mrs. Clinton delivered a speech on women's rights. In her Shanghai speech, Mrs. Clinton will applaud the progress for women and girls that has been sparked around the world by the Beijing Women's Conference, and talk about how women in China are promoting the protection of their human rights and tackling the challenges created by the economic transformation and social change. She will also announce new exchange programs between women leaders in China and the United States.

In addition to the Beijing Forum and the Shanghai speech, the First Lady's separate activities during the President's trip include:

- A discussion at the Women's Law and Legal Services Center at the Peking University School of Law, with Secretary of State Madeline Albright. The Center, a university-based organization funded by the Ford Foundation, seeks to promote women's consciousness of their legal rights, increased legal protection for women's rights, and improvements in the legal system's treatment of women.
- In Beijing, Mrs. Clinton will meet the physicians from the Center for Disease Control and the Beijing Medical Center who have been involved in a successful collaboration in the prevention of birth defects which have produced results of global importance. She will witness the signing of a new commitment between medical researchers in our government and the Chinese government.
- Remarks at a girls school in Shanghai to highlight raising the status of girls and improving their access to quality education.
- In Shanghai, a visit to a job retraining center. Job retraining is an important tool for Chinese women adversely affected by the economic transformation.
- Remarks at a new pediatric hospital in Shanghai which will serve more than a quarter

million children each year and train medical personnel from throughout China. The hospital is the result of a partnership between Chinese and American, public and private sponsors, including Project Hope and many U.S. corporations. At the hospital, Mrs. Clinton will meet the Chinese muppets of "Zhime Jie", the Chinese version of Sesame Street - a joint project with the Children's Television Workshop and Shanghai Television.

- A visit to the Shanghai Synagogue, which has been recently restored. The synagogue played a historic role as a haven for persecuted Jews during World War II. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright will accompany the First Lady.
- A discussion with Hong Kong women leaders on the role of women in post-reversion Hong Kong. Secretary Albright will participate in this discussion.
