THE COST OF UNIVERSAL HEALTH CARE EQUALS 3% OF GLOBAL MILITARY EXPENDITURE

FIDEL CASTRO AT THE WORLD HEALTH ASSEMBLY

"According to United Nations estimates, the cost of universal access to basic health care services would be 25 billion dollars a year, that is 3% of the 800 billion dollars currently devoted to military expenditures", Dr Fidel Castro, President of Cuba, told delegates and guests assembled to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the World Health Organization (WHO) at the 51st World Health Assembly.

He was participating in a Forum of Heads of State or Government on the theme "Health for all in the 21st century" together with the Honourable Tofilau Eti Alesana, Prime Minister of Samoa, His Excellency Henri Konan Bédié, President of Cote d'Ivoire, and Mrs Ruth Dreifuss, Vice President of Switzerland. In a world where the economy has grown six times between 1950 and 1997, why, challenged Dr Castro, "do 12 million children under five years of age still die every year? Why are 200 million children under five years of age undernourished? Why do 250 million children and adolescents work? Why is it that 110 million do not attend primary school?"

Dr Castro told his audience that 17 million people who die in the world every year "are the victims of mostly curable infectious diseases, many of them preventable, at a cost sometimes lower than a dollar". He went on to say that "in spite of efforts by the WHO and UNICEF, in the last 50 years... over 600 million children and 25 million mothers who could have survived died for lack of medical care".

Dr Castro pointed out that, often enough, the prices of medicines are out of reach for the overwhelming majority of patients in developing countries. "The control of patents and markets by the big transnational companies allows them to raise prices over ten times above production costs". He expressed concern over the emergence of old and new infectious diseases. "Either we defeat AIDS or AIDS will ruin many Third World countries where no patient can afford the US\$ 10,000 cost per person per year of the existing treatments..."

Speaking on behalf of all African countries, Mr. Henri Konan Bédié, President of

Cote d'Ivoire, said that "at the dawn of the 21st century health occupies a strategic place". Mr. Bédié pointed out that "the African continent has been hit at the same time both by the worst economic and financial crisis in its history and by fratricidal conflicts which accentuated the poverty afflicting its peoples" If anything, public health problems are increasing in Africa. The burden of traditionally endemic diseases has become much heavier in recent years with the emergence of new infectious diseases. Rapid urban development has triggered off a whole host of new environment-related health factors. "We are also confronted, more so than elsewhere, with the ravages of the AIDS pandemic which is literally decimating our young, most productive, generations. It has reduced the life expectancy of Africans almost everywhere by a good ten years", said Mr. Bédié. But in spite of all the difficulties, African countries, in cooperation with United Nations organizations, are working together to secure a healthier future for the continent.

"Inequalities in health often reflect and arise from social inequalities", said Mrs. Ruth Dreifuss, Vice President of Switzerland, in her speech to the Assembly. She drew the attention of her audience to the fact that "in spite of the overall high standard of health achieved in Switzerland, we observe the same phenomenon as the World Health Organization at an international level: equity is still jeopardized". She listed "a growing number of risk factors within society": the lack of job security, the fragility of social support networks and the deterioration of healthy environmental conditions. "We are glad to be able to rely on the concepts and practical suggestions developed by the World Health Organization in its new strategy Health for All, above all, the proposals aiming for a sustainable development of health care systems", said Mrs Dreifuss. In conclusion, the Vice President reaffirmed her country's commitment to "a health policy committed to a more just society everywhere".

Addressing the World Health Assembly on behalf of Pacific island countries, which share many common features, Tofilau Eti Alesana, Prime Minister of Samoa stressed that "WHO has played and continues to play a very important role in our health development, particularly in the fields of training of our human resources and provision of technical support". The burden of communicable diseases is still felt throughout the Pacific region. WHO has provided much-needed support in fighting malaria, dengue and filariasis. "People need knowledge, awareness and skills to keep themselves, their families and their environment healthy" concluded Tofilau Eti Alesana.

ABOUT THE WOODROW WILSON MEDALLION
Note for the Press

The Woodrow Wilson Medallion which First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will present to the Palais Wilson on May 15 was cast in Virginia at a group workshop not far from the Wilson birthplace and family home. There is no record of the artist, but it likely that both a master craftsman and several of his apprentices participated in its creation.

The bronze medallion was commissioned by supporters of Wilson in 1912, immediately following the election that brought Wilson and his progressive wing of the Democratic party to power. The design imitates the style of veristic portraiture that is found in both Roman sculpture and numismatics. Historically, this style was an attempt to demonstrate the uniqueness and humanity of its subject, without hiding or trying to downplay their less than perfect features. This style is fitting of Wilson who, though idealistic in his approach, sought to bring the full weight of truth and openness in his dealings with the world.

The medallion also echoes the smaller medallions traditionally produced of all presidents by the U.S. mint. It was presented to the Wilson Inaugural Committee in 1913 and was used to adorn the ceremonies associated with that historic event. After the inauguration, the medallion was presented as a token of appreciation to the ceremony organizers.

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ABOUT THE HEALTH-FOR-ALL GOLD MEDAL

Note for the Press

The Health-for-All Gold Medal awarded to First Lady Hillary Clinton at the World Health Assembly May 14 is the World Health Organization's most prestigious award and is given to individuals or institutions in recognition of outstanding achievements in the field of public health.

The medals, which are plated in gold*, are presented to the laureates by the Director General with a certificate printed on parchment bearing a special commendation.

The seven-paragraph inscription on the certificate awarded to Mrs. Clinton reads, in part:

"The First Lady has shown unswerving support for low-income and other vulnerable constituencies. Time and again, Hillary Rodham Clinton has been a steady, reliable and thoughtful voice for people who are poor and in need of help. Her causes have included measures to encourage childhood immunization and to streamline the delivery of services to families and children.

... Mrs. Clinton is perhaps best known for her work as the Chair of the Task Force on National Health Care Reform in the United States. In promoting access to health care as a basic right for all, Mrs. Clinton became one of the most effective advocates for universal coverage that her country has ever known.

... In her capacity as the First Lady of her country, Mrs. Clinton has traveled throughout the world, constantly seeking to educate both herself and others about the problems faced by women and children in their efforts to achieve health and social well-being."

The other recipients of the award this year are: Mrs. Ruth Dreifuss, Vice President of Switzerland, Fidel Castro, President of Cuba, Henri Konan Bédié, President of Cote D'Ivoire, Tofilau Eti Alesana, Prime Minister of Samoa, the Nippon Foundation, and the United Arab Emirates Health Foundation.

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ABOUT THE PALAIS WILSON
Note for the Press

The building was originally constructed in 1875 as a luxury hotel, the "L'Hotel National." In 1920, it became the headquarters of the League of Nations. Two years earlier President Wilson had first announced his vision of the League of Nations as one element of his famous Fourteen Points speech to Congress in which he outlined a peaceful lasting settlement of World War I. In 1924, the building was renamed the "Palais Wilson" following Wilson's death.

The Palais Wilson was occupied by the League of Nations until 1936, when the League, before being formally dissolved, moved to its new headquarters at the Place des Nations. After that, the building was purchased by the Swiss government and housed a variety of offices. Partially devastated by two fires during the 1980s, the Swiss government has now completely refurbished the Palais Wilson in the neoclassical style of its original construction.

Switzerland will put the Palais Wilson at the disposal of the UN on a rent-free basis. It will officially reopen as the headquarters of the U.N. High Commissioner for Human Rights (UNHCHR) on June 5, 1998.

Born in Chicago in October 1947, Hillary Diane Rodham entered Wellesley College in 1965, and graduated with high honours from that institution before commencing legal studies at Yale Law School where she developed her strong concern for protecting the interests of children and their families, with particular attention to women's health and development. In 1973, Mrs Clinton became a staff attorney for the Children's Defense Fund, before being appointed to the law faculty of the University of Arkansas. She served as First Lady of that State for 12 years, and was named Arkansas Woman of the Year in 1983 and Arkansas Mother of the Year in 1984, in recognition of her professional and personal achievements.

Mrs Clinton has been a tireless advocate on children's issues. As Chairperson of the Board of Directors of the Children's Defense Fund for several years, she has been at the forefront of many major initiatives to improve the lives of children and families.

As First Lady of Arkansas, she successfully led efforts for increased investment in early childhood development, culminating in a programme that has become a national model and has had a significant role in improving the health of families and children throughout the country. Mrs Clinton also confronted the problems of teenage pregnancy and infant mortality in Arkansas, reducing the rate of the latter from one of the highest to one of the lowest in the United States.

The First Lady has shown unswerving support for low-income and other vulnerable constituencies. Time and again, Hillary Rodham Clinton has been a steady, reliable and thoughtful voice for people who are poor and in need of help. Her causes have included measures to encourage childhood immunization and to streamline the delivery of services to families and children. Mrs Clinton has demonstrated that the heart of these serious problems is not lack of resources but lack of will.

Mrs Clinton is perhaps best known for her work as the Chair of the Task Force on National Health Care Reform in the United States. In promoting access to health care as a basic right for all, Mrs Clinton became one of the most effective advocates for universal coverage that her country has ever known. Her recommendations were consistent with the view that health care coverage should be comprehensive, job-linked, and cost-controlled. Seeking advice from leaders in the field of public health, medical care and social services delivery, she emerged with a plan that not only set forth the goal of universal coverage but recommended a comprehensive plan for achieving that goal.

HILLARY CLINTON AWARDED UNITED ARAB EMIRATES HEALTH FOUNDATION PRIZE

Mrs Hillary Rodham Clinton, First Lady of the United States of America, was today awarded the United Arab Emirates Health Foundation Prize for her work with women, children and their families. The prize is given annually during the World Health Assembly and carries an award of US\$40 000, which at Mrs Clinton's request is being donated to a World Health Organization (WHO) project in the Kigoma Region of Tanzania entitled "Community Involvement in Reducing Death in Childbirth".

Mrs Clinton was cited for her "impressive record of distinguished contributions and achievements in the field of health and social welfare" and "her pioneering work on behalf of women, children and their families".

Mrs Clinton was first a staff attorney for, then Chairperson of the Board of Directors, of the Children's Defense Fund, where she has been "at the forefront of numerous major initiatives to improve the lives of children and their families. As a lawyer, she worked hard towards expanding access of the poor to legal assistance."

As First Lady of the State of Arkansas, Mrs Clinton led the State in addressing the issue of teenage pregnancy, to the extent that the infant mortality rate in Arkansas, from being one of the highest in the United States, became one of the lowest. As Chair of the Task Force on National Health Care Reform in the United States, she promoted access to health care as a basic right for all.

In accepting the prize, Mrs Clinton highlighted the links between both poverty and education and improved health for women and their children. "For the children being born today, let us declare for all to hear: their basic health should no longer depend on where they live or how much money their parents have. Some of what we have to do is attack the inequalities that deprive children in one area from enjoying the health care that is available to their neighbours. We know child malnutrition

varies greatly from continent to continent. The number of physicians varies greatly depending on the wealth of the country."

"Some of what we need to do is provide better information and education to people so they can make better health decisions for themselves and their children," Mrs Clinton also said. "And in rich countries, there are pockets of despair. To improve health for all, we must make progress in the fight against poverty. To fight poverty, we must ensure health care for all. That is part of the unfinished business of this century."

Mrs Clinton graduated from Yale Law School, Yale University, in 1973. She was admitted to the Arkansas Bar that same year, and to the United States Supreme Court in 1975. She is an Honorary Doctor of Law of several American universities, Honorary Doctor of Public Service, and has been the recipient of several distinguished awards.

Other prizes awarded today during the 51st World Health Assembly were the Sasakawa Health Prize and WHO "Health for All" (HFA) Gold Medals. Recipients of the Sasakawa Prize were Ms Roselyn Mokgantsho Mazibuko of South Africa, Dr AAQ Al Ghassani of Oman, and the Gondar College of Medical Sciences of Ethiopia. Ms Mazibuko and Dr Al Ghassani received an award of US\$30 000 each, while the Gondar College of Medical Sciences received US\$40 000.

Ms Mazibuko's achievements, according to the citation, "are intimately linked with the development of the Hlatlolanang Health and Nutrition Centre in a remote area of the Northern Province of South Africa. The underlying principle of her work has been the promotion of people's self-reliance when addressing problems related to poverty".

Dr Al Ghassani was singled out because he "has been able to exert a marked influence on his country's strategies in the areas of maternal and child health and nutrition, health education and immunization, and provision of health care for the entire population".

The Gondar College of Medical Sciences was cited for establishing training for the key professions working in primary health care centres (health officers, public health nurses and sanitarians). It also set up a surveillance system covering health and demographic characteristics in the North Gondar zone, generating data useful for the design of cost-effective programmes targeted at common health problems.

There were seven recipients of WHO's "Health for All" Gold Medals, awarded in recognition of outstanding contributions to the attainment of health for all. The President of Côte d'Ivoire, Henri Konan Bedie, the President of Cuba, Fidel Castro, the Prime Minister of Samoa, Tolifau Eti Alesana, and the Vice-President of Switzerland, Ruth Dreifuss, received their medals after taking part in a WHA roundtable discussion on the morning of 14 May on "health for all in the 21st century" (see Press Release WHA/5). As part of the awards ceremony in the afternoon of 14 May, the Nippon Foundation, Mrs Hillary Clinton and the United Arab Emirates Health Foundation also received HFA Gold Medals.

The UAE Health Foundation Prize is one of two major prizes awarded each year during the World Health Assembly. The award consists of a plaque and a \$40,000 prize which will be donated to a WHO designated organization in honor of Mrs. Clinton.

The First Lady will also meet with United Nations leader and participate in a discussion on human rights to mark the 50th anniversary of the U.N. Declaration on Human Rights.

Mrs. Clinton will then join President Clinton in Birmingham, England later in the day on the 15th for the Summit of the Eight.

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The First Lady will also meet with United Nations leader and participate in a discussion on human rights to mark the 50th anniversary of the U.N. Declaration on Human Rights.

Mrs. Clinton will then join President Clinton in Birmingham, England later in the day on the 15th for the Summit of the Eight.


