

President Clinton Announces September 8 as National School Modernization Day

As a major part of this year's Back to School Campaign, President Clinton has announced that September 8 will be National School Modernization Day. In kicking off this campaign Clinton has asked mayors to partner with the White House and help coordinate national grass-roots efforts to highlight the need for funding the financing of school modernization. In response to the President's request, Conference of Mayors President and Salt Lake City Mayor Deedee Corradini reacted, "The mayors of America's cities are delighted to be a part of this national school construction campaign. As mayors we continue to advocate partnerships to help communities modernize their infrastructure. In our work to improve public education among the greatest needs is the modernization of our local schools." In addition to the President, the First Lady, Vice President Gore, Mrs. Gore and high level cabinet officials will participate in this national event.

Mayors who are interested in taking the lead in coordinating local efforts to bring together the stakeholders in their cities should contact Joan Crigger on

the Conference staff at 202/861-6726. Local events can be coordinated with the national events and might include educators, parents, the business community and others who want to demonstrate the need for school modernization funding.

The U.S. Department of Education will provide satellite downlinks as part of the national effort. In addition, packets on "how to put together an event" will be available.

Mayors strongly endorsed the School Modernization effort during the Mayors Conference on Public Schools in May of this year following an address by Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun (IL). Sen. Moseley-Braun, a key Congressional leader on the school construction initiative, has introduced legislation in support of the President's proposal. The legislation, S.1705/H.R.3320, would allow local governments to issue special low-interest bonds to help finance school construction and modernization.

The need for federal support of school construction has been identified in several General Accounting Office reports which have estimated that \$112 billion is needed across the nation just to bring schools up to "good overall

condition." The GAO reports also found that 30 percent of rural schools and 29 percent of suburban schools have physical needs as great as urban schools.

In addition, a report issued by the U.S. Department of Education found that over the next 10 years 6,000 new schools will have to be built to meet increasing enrollments.

Also, 50 percent of schools lack

enough electrical power and 64 percent lack the phone lines needed to bring technology to students. And, a recent study by the American Society of Civil Engineers gave the nation's schools an "F" for their physical condition, the only infrastructure area to be rated as failing.

The Mayors Action Plan, which was adopted during the Mayors Conference of Public Schools and reinforced by policy passed by the entire Conference of Mayors during their Annual Meeting in Reno in June, strongly supports school construction financing assistance from the federal government.







The measure would apply to illnesses such as those that VA officials determine to be connected to exposure to a biological, chemical, or other toxic agent or environmental or wartime hazard associated with service in the Persian Gulf War.

• DRUG DISTRIBUTION

A controversial bill to clarify that federal law prohibits distributing controlled substances to be used for suicide or euthanasia will be considered by the House Judiciary panel tomorrow.

The measure (HR 4006), approved by the Constitution Subcommittee along party lines last week, would reverse a recent ruling by Attorney General Janet Reno.

Reno overruled a Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) decision that prohibited doctors from dispensing drugs used in assisted suicide. She said the decision did not fall under the DEA administrator's jurisdiction.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Henry J. Hyde, Ill., the bill's sponsor, said Reno's override leaves the question of assisted suicide to the states.

The legislation would require the DEA to revoke the registration, or prescription writing license, from any doctor who has distributed a controlled substance with the purpose of assisted suicide or euthanasia.

It would exempt those doctors whose patients accidentally die from drugs prescribed to relieve pain.

Ranking Democrat John Conyers Jr., Mich., said he opposes the bill because it would preempt state laws that would allow physician-assisted suicide in some circumstances.

Firearms standards. Also under consideration is a measure (HR 218) that would create a national standard for carrying a concealed firearm.

Some states issue permits to all applicants who meet the state's guidelines, while in other states officials have discretion to deny some otherwise-qualified applicants.

The bill would allow any person with a permit to carry a gun into another state that gives permits to qualified residents, even if the two states differ on their underlying requirements. In cases where a state allows its officials discretion to deny applicants, the governor would have to decide whether to allow the visitor to carry a concealed gun.

Democrats oppose the bill, saying that it overrides state gun laws and jeopardizes public safety.

Class action suits. The committee also will mark up a bill (HR 3789) that

would allow a class-action lawsuit to be moved from state to federal court if any of the plaintiffs reside in different states.

Democrats warn that the change would make almost every class-action case susceptible to a transfer, swamping the federal courts. Democrats also may offer amendments that would exempt tobacco-related lawsuits and gun-related complaints.

Rep. Sheila Jackson-Lee, D-Texas, will offer three amendments, including a substitute that would require a yearlong study to determine whether the proposal would overburden federal courts.

• EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Members of the House Education and the Workforce Committee are trying to hammer out bipartisan agreements in time for Wednesday's markup of three bills concerning education initiatives and a low-cost heating program.

Of the three bills, one (HR 4241) would reauthorize the Head Start program and another measure (HR 4271) concerns the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program.

A third unnumbered draft measure to reauthorize the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) may be added to the CSBG bill as an amendment.

The Head Start bill proposes new educational performance standards and measures, including language and math aptitude tests. The bill would require that by 2003, most Head Start teachers have an associate's or bachelor's degree in early childhood education. The performance measures would take effect Jan. 1.

The CSBG program, sponsored by Frank Riggs, R-Calif., would allow more private agencies, such as religious and business groups, to be eligible for the block grants, which aim to reduce poverty through assistance. The bill authorizes \$535 million in fiscal 1999 and sums as necessary for fiscal years 2000 through 2003.

Democrats are pushing for a five-year reauthorization for the LIHEAP as opposed to two years favored by Republicans. The two-year reauthorization sets the funding level at the fiscal 1998 level, according to a committee spokesman.

The committee held a markup July 20 on the measures but decided more work was needed before further action.

• EDUCATION FLEXIBILITY

Democrats are planning on introducing several amendments to education bills in the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee Wednesday. The committee began marking up a bill (S 2213) that would expand the "EdFlex" demonstration program from 12 to 50 states last week but did not have a quo-

rum for votes. The committee also will mark up a bill (S 1380) designed to expand charter schools.

The "EdFlex" program gives states the ability to temporarily waive federal regulations for individual school districts if the rules interfere with that school's ability to improve education. Six states originally participated, but 12 currently participate in a pilot EdFlex program.

A substitute amendment would require states to hold local education agencies responsible for meeting the education goals in waivers and would prevent the schools from waiving rules that involve health, safety or civil rights.

Jack Reed, D-R.I., offered an amendment last week that would delay the effective date of the expansion until the Department of Education files a comprehensive report on the outcome of the pilot program.

Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., also wants to amend the bill by funding authorizations for afterschool and anti-truancy programs. Other Democrats offered amendments to enact President Clinton's proposals to lower the teacher-student ratio by hiring 100,000 teachers and buying down interest rates for schools.

Many Democrats questioned last week why the expansion could not wait until next year's reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

The other bill (S 1380) would authorize a state educational agency to use federal funds in planning, designing and implementing charter schools, and would require local educational agencies to use such funds for the same purpose.

Democrats are expected to offer several amendments. Some are concerned that the promotion of charter schools would undermine the public school system.

Charter schools, which receive taxpayer support, operate free of many of the usual regulations and requirements imposed by state and local school boards and agencies.

The bill would establish certain priorities for awarding charter school program grants, among them state laws that support: an increase in the number of charter schools; non-local educational chartering agencies or appeals processes for denials of charters; automatic waiver of state and local education laws for charter schools; and periodic review and evaluation.

State educational agencies that apply for charter school program grants would have to outline outreach plans to inform each school of available federal funds and to ensure that each school received the maximum federal education funds allowed.

The bill would extend the authorization through 2002.



Concept: Organize a "National School Modernization Day" on which all of the principals, cabinet members, Democrats in Congress, and supportive state and local elected officials convene at hundreds of schools across the country to call for Federal help for school construction and renovation (and possibly also reducing class size). The POTUS school visit could be beamed by satellite to the local activities to link the whole national effort.

Issue: Do we need an additional press hook? We could release the Education Department's "Baby Boom Echo" report -- new data, state-by-state, on the record number of children in school. In the past two years, this report has gotten extensive tv and print coverage. Or, should that report be issued earlier, at which time POTUS would call for the "National School Modernization Day"?

Timing. September 8, the day after Labor Day, is currently set aside for a Washington-area event for back-to-school. We may want to nail that down so that organizing can begin. [The idea of doing something in Florida the next day has been rejected].

Two questions need to be answered:

- *Does September 8 work for the Hill, or will Members need to be in D.C. (or traveling) that day?*
- *Is it too much of a burden to ask schools to allow a visit on what will be the first day of school for many of them?*

Congressional Involvement. As a part of the Democratic Unity effort, there have already been staff-level discussions of the need to coalesce around a back-to-school message.

We should discuss with Larry Stein and John Podesta about how best to get high-level commitment to aggressively encouraging Members of Congress to exploit this message and policy opportunity by organizing local events.

Sperling, Stein speak with Rangel, Moseley-Braun, Lowey to get them involved on the ground floor.

Education Groups. The groups have already expressed an interest in this type of an effort. In fact, they helped to organize a similar but smaller effort convened by the Vice President in the Spring.

WH Communications and the Education Department should sit down with the groups to identify target locations for local school visits.

State and Local Electeds. Intergovernmental will need to get governors as well as key mayors involved in this effort. We could hold a conference call with Ibarra and several of the key

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



SUBJECT: NATIONAL SCHOOL MODERNIZATION DAY

I wanted to provide you with an update on the national rollout for National School Modernization Day on Tuesday, September 8. We are working in conjunction with staff from many White House departments, i.e. NEC, DPC, Communications, Press, Political, IGA, OPL and Karen Tramontano, and continue to meet with staff from the Department of Education to discuss where we are and ways to increase the number of members participating in events.

As of our meeting this morning, we currently have:

- 79 confirmed events across the country;
- 31 states involved;
- 82 cities involved;
- 4 White House Principals;
- 37 Members of Congress, 1 governor, 7 mayors and 5 school superintendents involved; and
- 8 Members of the Cabinet and Federal Agencies involved (Dept. of Education, Dept. of Interior, FEMA, Army, SBA, VA, Peace Corps and the National Endowment for the Humanities).

We are working with Legislative Affairs and Cabinet Affairs to increase support from the Hill and the agencies. Legislative Affairs is scheduling a meeting for tomorrow with Leaders' Offices from the Hill so that we can coordinate our ongoing efforts to increase the number of members hosting events in their districts. Additionally, we will meet with Gene Sperling on Friday to do an extra push of information on school modernization that will support our efforts.
