

BACKGROUND INFORMATION ABOUT NATIONAL GRADUATE UNIVERSITY

National Graduate University was founded in 1967 as a private, nonprofit educational institution by leaders in government, science, business and education. Among these founders were the Honorable Dr. John R. Steelman, Dr. Chauncey Leake, onetime president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Ambassador Louise Gore, Mr. Frederick Krug, CEO of Canadian Power, and Dr. Melville Grosvenor. Praised by President Harry Truman and many others, the University has now trained nearly 40,000 advanced students from every state as well as 114 nations. Its professors have written books used here and abroad including: " Evolution of a Democracy", " How to Establish a Democracy or Improve the One you Now Have," for which Presidents Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, Boris Yeltsin, Vaclav Havel and Lech Walesa wrote statements.


The University is now preparing to move to its new Capitol Hill Campus this year in order to launch its College of Democracy and Democracy Hall of Fame International with induction of Presidents Harry Truman and Ronald Reagan. At this site also will be its Management College, Human Service and Division of Special Studies now operating in Arlington, Virginia. Students within the College of Democracy, selected because they intend to seek elected office, will work for the Master of Arts in Constitutional Democracy. Among its other programs, the University has recently given a course here on strengthening local government in a democracy for 23 elected mayors from the Philippines.

Substantial Progress at New Capitol Hill Campus

Capitol Hill Campus

Significant progress is being made in rehabilitating the Capitol Hill Campus with installation of 267 windows, 33 furnace/AC units and six heat pumps, thus providing temperature control throughout the buildings. Its Special Exception was granted by the DC Board of Zoning Adjustment. Unanimous support for this had come from the Advisory Neighborhood Commission, as well as from the more than 100 signers of the petition stating they were very much in favor of National Graduate University using the former Buchanan School property.

Philippine Mayors Study Democracy in the College of Democracy

National Graduate University's College of Democracy, in collaboration with the University of Baguio and His Excellency Ernesto M. Maceda, Ambassador to the United States, organized the first of an anticipated series of courses in democracy for elected Philippine mayors and other officials. From November 12 to 26, 1999, 23 mayors, two of their wives, of whom one was a superintendent of schools, and five embassy personnel studied the basics of democracy in the framework of their 1986 Constitution and 1991 Local Government Code authored by Senator Aquilino Pimentel. The curriculum was developed and seminar leaders invited by Dr. Jean K. Boek, Dean of The College of Democracy, with the valued assistance of former Congressman Dr. Orval Hansen, Mr. Amos Camp, University Associate and Dr. Kay R. Scrimger of the United States Conference of Mayors, who later participated as speakers.

Seminars at the Hay-Adams were combined with field trips to the Alexandria and Fairfax governmental offices, Voice of America, Chamber of Commerce, a Rotary International luncheon meeting, the Capitol, Library of Congress and the United States Supreme Court where Associate Justice Anthony M. Kennedy hosted a reception and arranged for them to attend a "non-argument" session of the Court. Their distinguished seminar leaders included Mayor Kerry J. Donley of Alexandria, and Supervisor Stuart Mendelsohn, Christina Manning, Steve Kerr, Barbara Emerson, and Richard Moriarty of Fairfax County. At the Voice of America, they were greeted by its Director, Sanford Ungar, and Jay Henderson, Managing Editor, East Asia Pacific Division.

They heard former Mayor Glenn Cowan of the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs who had

restructured his town's council as one means of controlling corruption. Ambassador Julian Niemczyk recalled his strong defense of democracy throughout his service in Czechoslovakia under the Soviets, while Ambassador George F. Ward, Jr. reviewed the mission and pro-

grams of the United States Institute for Peace.

William Tucker, former Attorney General of Colorado who now observes elections worldwide, gave them a "semester's course" on political parties

Dr. Carsbie C. Adams Joins the Board of Governors

Dr. Carsbie C. Adams, owner and manager of Potomac Point Professional Programs, LLC, was unanimously elected to the Board of Governors during its summer meeting. A good friend of the University, Dr. Adams is an authority on development and clinical testing of food for operators of space vehicles and submarines, as well as being a recognized leader in the field of long term care. His career encompassed projects at General Electric's Space Technology Center and others in Nepal and Ceylon. He is the author of The Cure, Space Flight and Cold Days of Summer. With Dr. Werner von Braun he wrote Careers in Astronautics and Rocketry and Dividends from Space. Dr. Adams, a member of numerous scientific and health care professional societies, has also contributed his time and expertise to civic endeavors and has received numerous honors.



Dr. John R. Steelman University Founder

We were saddened by the loss of Dr. John R. Steelman whose wisdom and wit enlivened his 99 years of unusual accomplishment. With two PhD's from the universities of Alabama and North Carolina, he served the federal government for two decades in a variety of capacities, among these as director of the United States Conciliation Service, which handled about 85,000 labor disputes. On more than

one occasion, he personally settled critical wartime strikes, including those in the steel production and coal mining industries. Following World War II as Director of the Office of War Mobilization Reconversion, he set the stage for the nation's industrial recovery by preventing massive governmental involvement in the economy as demanded by some Congressmen.

Even though a Republican, he was asked by President Harry Truman's to be his Special Assistant and "Chief of Staff". When Mr. Truman decided to campaign for his second term, he sought to maintain a nonpartisan Presidency by asking him to convene the Cabinet, when necessary, and to meet with Senators and Representatives, thus for seven weeks making John the nation's "de facto" President. Later, as a Founder of National Graduate University, Dr. Steelman recounted President Truman's view that such an institution of higher education was much needed, a conviction later echoed by the President's letter written shortly after the University was launched.

William S. Harps and Edwin L. Slusarczyk Honored

William Harps and Edwin Slusarczyk have recently been honored for their outstanding leadership in their professions: Harps in real estate appraisal and Slusarczyk in agricultural communications. Mr. Harps, upon his induction into the Washington Business Hall of Fame, was pictured in a full page article in the Washingtonian's September, 1999, issue. He was lauded for his professional and voluntary contributions, including his presidency of the Washington Board of Trade as well as of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers. In 1997, he, Walter Mess and Elizabeth F. Luttrell guided the University in its acquisition of its Capitol Hill Campus.

Mr. Slusarczyk, has long been recognized for his radio initiatives in broadcasting scientific agricultural reports and events, (106 stations carry his daily programs to a million listeners). As a consultant to the United Nations, he participated in the Food and Agriculture Organization conference in Rome, the World Trade Organization in Geneva and in a review of critically important research at the Egyptian Agricultural Research Institute. In recognition of his "Outstanding Service to Agriculture", the National Grange recently presented him with their Public Service Award.

Dr. Hatten Yoder, Director Emeritus of the Geophysical Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, showed the importance of basic research in democracies and downloaded their own website on science and technology as a handout. In a summary of his 40 years as a voluntary Chairman of the Arlington Regional Parks and Planning Commission Walter Mess urged them to acquire and manage land before development engulfed it, as Arlington had done. Former Congressman and one time candiate for President of the United States, Dr. John Schmitz, informed them of valuable lessons to be learned from our history. James Brooks of the National League of Cities gave them his extensive treatise on "Duties, Functions and Power of City Governments in the United States of America" as the basis of his presentation, while Dr. Walter E. Boek referred to concepts in his two texts, *The Evolution of a Democracy* and *How to Establish a Democracy or Improve The One You Now Have*, to stimulate discussions.

Freedom of speech and expression was the theme of Charles Conconi, Editor-at-Large of the *Washingtonian*, as well as of Donald Larrabee, former President of the National Press Club, and Kenneth Eskey, current Chairman of its Speakers Committee. Ronald Sable, who had been in the Ronald Reagan White House, delineated principles of defense and security, while Isabelle Bully-Omicton of the International City-County Management Association gave an account of her two-year project in a Filipino municipality.

Attorney Llewellyn Fischer, formerly with the Merit Systems Protection Board, told of its role in maintaining ethical behavior of government workers. The work of non-government organizations as "watchdogs" of the three branches of government was spelled out by Larry Wortzel of the Heritage Foundation, and Carl Gershman, President of the National Endowment for Democracy, described the support it gives to programs throughout the world. The Points of Light Foundation represented by Jill Jackson provided information about the national as well as international assistance they give for recruiting and training volunteers, Ben Hecht of the Enter-

prise Foundation sent over valuable information about its programs, and a demonstration of the scope and importance of the internet by Amos Camp and Arthur Farrington.

The course opened with a special presentation on democracy by Ambassador Ernesto Maceda prior to his reception for the Mayors at the Philippine Embassy. Closing exercises on November 26 began with the singing of the Star Spangled Banner and the Philippine national anthem led by Wally Jumat. Each Mayor then spoke of plans for using the knowledge gained during the course, followed by addresses by Minister Laura Q. del Rosario of the Embassy, Dr. Vigilio Bautista President of the University of Baguio, Dr. Walter E. Boek, President of National Graduate University and Board Treasurer, Lester Poretzky. A most important role in arranging for the Mayors to come and who contributed significantly to the resounding success of this course on Effective Local Government in a Democracy were Teresa Jumat, Assistant to the University's President for International Affairs, Emelina and Amos Camp, Associates of the University and Gerald Jumat.

Formation of the Association of the First U. S. Seminar for Philippine Chief Executives on Effective Democratic Government

During their November 12-26, 1999, course on Effective Local Government in a Democracy, the 23 Mayors and others from the Philippines formally organized an association as a first step in recognizing the benefits of their two weeks of seminars and onsite sessions here, as well as their determination to plan for and assist with future similar training at National Graduate University in collaboration with the University of Baguio. Mayor Celia T. Layus, MD, was elected President and Sergio C. Manzana was voted in as Vice President for Luzon. Other officers were Erwin A. Buling, Vice President for Visayas, Vicente C. Sorupia, Jr., Vice President for Mindanao, Gil P. Pacamarra, Secretary, Domingo L. Tan, Treasurer, Florencio M. Villamater, Jr., Auditor, and Marcel S. Pan, Public Information Officer.

The Board of Directors consisted of mayors Ric-Justice Estrada Angobung, Jose V. Baldos, Jr., Gil V. Beltran, Veronica T. Briones, Motin A. Malingco, Fernando B. Melgarejo, Ronnie T.
