b. Events.

- 29 Apr 46 - Fire Extinguishers installed on all floors.
- 1 May 46 - Directive Establishing the Offenbach Archival Depot as the sole Archival Depot in the U.S. Zone has been approved by Director, OMGUS.
- 2 May 46 - The top floor was disinfected.
- 3 May 46 - Corporal Rouben Sami, 30000387 was transferred from the 1264th Eng. Bn. B. Co., APO 757 to the 2nd Mil. Gov. Bn. (Sep) APO 633 and assigned to the OAD.
- 4 May 46 - A room designated as Captain Rackovsky Room was established for all loose documents, folders and photographs. The classification of these documents was started.
- 5 May 46 - A special room for packing and crating was established.
- 6 May 46 - Two trucks were given to Professor Pinson for the distribution of books among D.P. camps in the American Zone. Books for this purpose were lent to the AJDC. (Auth: Ltr, General B.L. Milburn to the Honorable Judge H. Rifkind dated 12 Jan 46 in reply to Ltr, The Honorable Simon H. Rifkind to General Lucius Clay dated 1 Jan 46.)
- 7 May 46 - The first load of books from Berlin arrived.
- 8 May 46 - Captain S.J. Pomrenze left for the States.
- 9 May 46 - Captain Johannes Georg Schönau, Dutch Restitution Officer returned from Holland.
- 10 May 46 - The last load of five hundred and sixty-nine (569) cases of books and library material from Schloss Banz arrived.
- 11 May 46 - In the process of sorting loose documents a large file of documents and photographs of the Einsatzstab Reichsleiter Rosenberg (ERR) were gathered.  
- A photographic reel to facilitate the photographic recording of library markings was established.

- 21 May 46 - The two safes in the Rothschild Library in Frankfurt were opened. Two cases of religious articles and 7 cases (70x53x50 cm) of manuscripts were removed and brought to the OAD.

- b. Sorting Program.

1. Books.

By a system of photographic stamps has been possible to sort Hebrew and Russian books by personnel unable to read either. Each sorter is given a series of stamps and a corresponding number. The sorter becomes acquainted with the physical outlines of the stamps and selects the books marked by them and sends them to an appropriately numbered box. The books go from one sorter to another until a negligible number is left for further more detailed classification.

2. Documents.

Captain I. Rackovsky has volunteered to work on his own time evenings and Sundays to sort Hebrew documents and letters.

3. Photographs.

Photographs are being sorted in the Torah room.

c. Schematic working plan of the Depot.

The fact that the first sorting processes have been completed by the end of April has enabled the establishment of a permanent schematic working plan of the Depot. The books, as they arrive, are taken to the top floor. The boxes are opened, the contents examined, and then sent to appropriate departments (See Inclosure 3).

The books and documents from the sorters are taken to the packing room or to the storage of unidentifiable books on the 2nd floor.

S. Recommendations.

- a. The Offenbach Archival Depot has been designated as the sole Archival Depot in the U.S. Zone (Auth: Ltr, Lt. Col. G.H. Garde, Adjutant General, OMGUS, dated 1 May 46, subject: Removal to Central Archival Depot of Archives, Books and other Library material). It is estimated that with the present staff and program all the books can be sorted and crated by the end of August. It is urgent therefore that the transfer of books and library material to the OAD be expedited. Unless more books arrive to the OAD at a more rapid rate, the staff will have to be reduced and the completion of the assigned task thus very much delayed.
- b. A large file of documents and photographs of the Einsatzstab Reichsleiter Rosenberg (ERR) has been collected and is growing daily. It is suggested that this file be kept intact in the OAD or transferred to some other institution where this material can be studied by interested U.S. personnel.







b. Sorting Program.

1. Books.

By a system of photographic stamps it has been made possible to sort Hebrew and Russian books by personnel unable to read either. Each sorter is given a series of stamps and a corresponding number. The sorter becomes familiar with the physical outlines of the stamps and selects the books marked by them and sends them to an appropriately numbered box. The books go from one sorter to another until a negligible number is left for further more detailed classification.

2. Documents.

Captain I. Rackocsky has volunteered to work on his own time evenings and Sundays to sort Hebrew documents and letters.

3. Photographs.

Photographs are being sorted in the Torah room.

c. Schematic working plan of the Depot.

The fact that the first sorting processes have been completed by the end of April has enabled the establishment of a permanent schematic working plan of the Depot. The books, as they arrive, are taken to the top floor. The boxes are opened, the contents examined, and then sent to appropriate departments. The books and documents from the sorters are taken to the packing room or to the storage of unidentifiable books on the 2nd floor.

8. Recommendations.

- a. The Offenbach Archival Depot has been designated as the sole Archival Depot in the U.S. Zone (Auth: Ltr, Lt. Col. G.H. Garde, Adjutant General, OMGUS, dated 1 May 46, subject: Removal to Central Archival Depot of Archives, Books and other Library material). It is estimated that with the present staff and program all the books can be sorted and crated by the end of August. It is urgent therefore that the transfer of books and library material to the OAD be expedited. Unless more books arrive to the OAD at a more rapid rate, the staff will have to be reduced and the completion of the assigned task thus very much delayed.
- b. A large file of documents and photographs of the Einsatzstab Reichsleiter Rosenberg (ERR) has been collected and is growing daily. It is suggested that this file be kept intact in the OAD or transferred to some other institution where this material can be studied by interested U.S. personnel.







Corrected Tentative List, Inclosure 7 of March Monthly Report, given. As the sorting process progresses the list of libraries whose property was stolen grows larger. Captain Bencowitz is preparing a photographic file of the library stamps in the items to facilitate sorting and restitution. It is suggested that requests for lists of libraries from higher headquarters not be included in movement directives since it is impossible to comply with such orders until the boxes are opened and the items sorted.

b. Sorting Program.

The division of labor in the sorting department has expedited the restitution of materials greatly. There are now 11 sorting units (each unit contains a sorter 3 stamp seekers (Stempelsucher), 1 packer) at work. Items with stamps of western countries are sorted and identified at the rate of 30000 items per day. Items with Hebrew and Slavic stamps require specialized personnel and very little sorting in that line has been accomplished. With the addition of Captain Bencowitz to the staff of the Depot the sorting of books in Slavic languages will move faster.

8. Recommendations.

a. Depot as sole archival restitution agency.

The letter of 26 Mar 46 recommending that this Depot be designated as the sole archival depot in the US Zone whereto all books and other library materials be moved when sorting by country of origin is required prior to restitution is still under consideration. It is suggested that this or some similar plan be effectuated soonest since there are tons of books and other library materials scattered throughout the US Zone without adequate preparation for restitution.



Dear Mr. Holmes: Oliver W. Holmes, Nat., Frich, Yes

Your letter of 1 March arrived the other day and this is the first chance I have had to sit down and answer all the questions therein. First let me thank you and Dr Buck for the consideration paid to the materials sent over from here. I did not know whether it was a good idea to send the material but now that I am entirely divorced from the archival program I am glad I did complete the job at Württemberg-Baden. The February report will be sent to you in a few days. More catalogues were forwarded to you on the 9th of February and I also sent a letter to you on the 23rd of February telling you about the impending change in assignment and my objections (of no avail) thereto.

Now about Württemberg-Baden first; then this assignment to the Offenbach Archival Depot (please note it is a DEPOT and not a library or a nice orderly collection); then the problems connected with the probable demise of the whole archives program and the reasons therefore as I see them from my experiences in the field.

The monthly reports on archives in Württemberg and Baden, US Zone, complete all the state and city archival institutions and some of the family archives. The recommendations in the reports, insofar as they are remediable by the military government officers in the Landkreise (counties) have been accomplished by proper military channels and the few things that remain to be done can be accomplished by Poste. Poste by the way is a very good officer and efficient librarian and has not been given a square deal simply because the people on the higher levels did not bother to find out his capabilities. He is former librarian of Columbia College in NYC and has some ten years of practical experience in library administration. Above all, he knows the army and can get things done. Unfortunately he was somewhat denied the credit due him as former librarian for the whole US Western District (now Lands Greater Hesse and Württemberg-Baden) by the former fine arts man who was his immediate military superior.

Now about the assignment to Offenbach. As you know it was done against my will. I did not wish to be given a library job and become a storage and warehousing officer when the Archives had sent me here to do an archival survey. But the Fine Arts officer responsible for this location went to Judge Simon H. Rifkind, behind the back of his superiors and told the Judge (Jewish Advisor to the Supreme Commander ETO) that I was the only man to do the job. Well the order came down from General Clay that I was to go to Offenbach and do the job.

Now what is Offenbach and what type of a job is this. For the past eight months huge, ill-assorted, piles upon piles of books and other

library materials have been found in the Frankfurt vicinity until we now have 5 floors of a building a half a city block long of boxes and loose stacks of about 2 to 3 million books. During the 8 months the collections were housed partly at the Rothschild Library Building in Frankfurt and partly at a building within the I G Farben Plant in Offenbach. The officers responsible for doing this job partly neglected to do their duty in properly safeguarding the materials and partly were bewildered by this mass of books in all European languages most of which they could not read. They left a man in charge who did the best he could but being an American DP (person claiming US citizenship but still of uncertain status by the name of Glenn Goodman, formerly instructor of literature and languages at the University of Illinois) he could not get the army to co-operate. Because of this neglect the books deteriorated more and more; a thousand Jewish scrolls of law (TORAHS) were miserably neglected; religious items were allowed to lie around the floor and open shelves-- in general this job, which was a straight restitution job and therefore of first priority in accordance with quadpartite agreements to which the US was a partner, was completely neglected. The whole thing blew up in the face of the MFAA people when General Clay ordered a loan of 25000 unidentifiable and not valuable Hebrew, Yiddish and other language books made to the American Joint Distribution Committee. For a month practically nothing was done since nobody could come and inspect the books and declare them to be within the category intended by General Clay to be loaned. Well about 1 March I took over.

First the building had to be cleaned up to make conditions livable; second the books from the decrepit building in Rothschild Library at Frankfurt had to be moved here; third about a half a million books lying and rotting at Hirzenhain, Lk. Büdingen about 60 kilometers from here had to be brought into the depot; fourth employees had to be secured.... Well I could go on and on. The only institution had to be built up from practically nothing. The results of this first hectic month will appear in my monthly report and I shall send it to you. All I can say is that this is one of the nastiest assignments I have ever had and in a way will, I hope, be one of the most soul-satisfying when I clean the place up--but mind you it is a library problem and do not let the name Archival Depot fool you. (Enclosed is a directive which I wrote and an organization chart of the institution--these were drafted the first day and they give me plenty of authority to get the job done)

Now about the folding up of MFAA. As I see it this whole program was valid from the standpoint of the War Department for only two reasons: one, to restitute the archives (very little) and libraries (very much material) to their rightful owners; and to preserve them from looting and destruction by Germans (very little); US troops (some); and DPs (more). From the standpoint of the military authorities these two jobs are practically complete (with the exception of a few outstanding sore spots of which Offenbach is the only huge archives and libraries problem). The surveying of German archives, aiding them to get back on their feet, putting over a microfilm project--all such ideas will not be countenanced by the military authorities since they are very eager to reduce the size of US personnel. They consider these projects as non-essential and will not allow their existence.

Furthermore, the situation in MFAA is such that the command channels go through MFA people. ~~the archives people~~ ~~on the top level (c)~~

All the archives people on the top level (Child, Boell and Vanderbilt) are civilians with no army experience and since they are from an army standpoint merely staff specialist officers the ability to do anything depends on their understanding of army channels and the convincing way in which they serve as Josephs to Pharaohs. I don't know the personal conflicts that go on and am not interested since I personally get along with whomever I have to work/ I make it my business to do so. However, it is obvious that when it comes to archival decisions the three archives people on top can do practically nothing for the three on the bottom (or to be more truthful for me). This means that as far as the field personnel is concerned the three experts in Berlin have no relationship, or very little, with the men in the field (that was true of Poste and I). Thus I still have not met Mr. Child nor has he called to find out what I am doing or what the situation is in the field; Boell has not called me once since I left Berlin in December; and Vanderbilt claims he has no jurisdiction or authority to make any decisions in archival practical, down-to-earth problems. Well that situation forces people like Poste and I to depend solely on the MFAA people to get things done for us since they give us efficiency ratings; they fight for us in all the various problems of getting transportation, housing, supplies etc. The result is that from a field standpoint the men in Berlin may not be there since they are of no help to us--sometimes a hindrance since they make decisions without finding out from the man-on-the spot whether it is possible to carry them out. Well they on the other hand feel that the MFAA do things without asking them so we get all the disgust and hopeless feeling--and little is accomplished. Thus Paul tried to do something for Offenbach but was told to keep out since that was under the Land MFAA Specialist Officer for Land Greater Hesse. His program of making a survey will not be completed by June simply because nobody is doing surveys in a technical scale in Greater Hesse or Bavaria like we did in Württemberg-Baden. Further still, the MFAA people are fighting with the Restitution people to save MFAA since the whole program is under the Economic Division and now that restitution is almost over there is no reason for it to exist from that angle. The unfortunate thing is that here are a whole group of excellent specialists capable of doing a good job but completely tied up by a setup which may have been excellent in March ~~1945~~ but is completely outdated today March 1946. And it is nobody's fault, if blame is sought to be placed on anyone.

What might be done to continue this program, i.e., Archives end alone. First the present program under Restitution should be considered a closed chapter and a recommendation should be made in Washington that Archives personnel involved in restitution work should be removed from their work as of 1 June, except the one person, preferably a civilian <sup>with</sup> to handle the Offenbach Depot which can become the center for all continuing restitution work in archives and libraries. Poste is willing to stay as a civilian and become Director when I leave in June (I hope they let me go). All books archives and allied materials found in the US zone that needs restitution, will after 1 June, go to the Offenbach Archival Depot where we NOW have a functioning organization (established in the last 15 days of some 100 German employees who do all the necessary work for restitution). For a Jewish advisor which Poste will need in restituting Jewish books I think I can get the American Joint Distribution Committee to loan us Professor Koppel.

S. Pinson (Professor of History at Queens College) and a learned scholar on Judaica and Hebraica) part time--gratis. Professor Pinson is now in Frankfurt and is very very interested in the fate of this unique conglomeration--the largest collection of books in the US Zone if not all of Europe, except London. That solves the restitution aspect of archives and libraries.

Now for the other and more ~~xx~~ out and out cultural aspects. The state of military government in Europe today is such that a microfilm project of European archives ~~is~~ will be considered impractical and is from a very real sense not feasible for many years. In Würtemberg and Baden the most valuable archival materials are boxed and dispersed in 29 places in the case of the Würtemberg State Archives and in the Salt Mine at Heilbronn in the case of the Baden State Archives. Those documents that are dispersed are the most valuable and it will take at least a year or two for them to be unpacked and put up again so that any microfilming can be done. Straight cultural protection will again not be considered favorably since there is no need to protect these German things from the Germans. As the DPS and soldiers disappear and as life settles down again there is no need, in fact it is a little presumptive, for an American archivist to come and tell the Germans how to preserve archives which they have handled scientifically for at least 100 years or maybe longer. BUT where our program can play a very important role and be preserved is for the archives personnel to be integrated in the Education and Religion Division of Military Government and to serve with the E and R people in building up German libraries and document and archival institutions--aid the universities in getting back their materials and help state and city libraries and archives get on their feet in a liaison capacity as members of the Education and Religion program. In that way we can make surveys; inspect institutions; promote consolidations; and handle the whole archives and libraries program on the land level--one officer or US civilian with military background per one land as a member of the Staff of the Land Chief of Education and Religion. Then next year the setup in Germany may be ripe so that the microfilm restitution program can be accomplished and maybe new ideas and new functions be added to the three or four people who will handle archives and libraries.

These ideas are of course based on the practical experiences I had at Land Würtemberg Baden and at Offenbach. They may not be worth anything since the military government officials may be convinced by now that the arguments put forth for any archives-libraries program are hair-brained. However if Child and Boell and Vanderbilt bring forth similar suggestions (I am stuck at the Depot--the only American with a big plant running since Monday on two shifts) independently it may be worth a try. Also Poste should be asked for suggestions. He has worked at this the longest and knows the practical angle better than anybody else.

Sorry to be so long but you asked a lot of questions. I think I will be able to get home ~~with~~ the help of the MFA people here but in case I fail will you be able to do anything for me? It is a very important personnel problem with me and I don't want to pay for the sins of all the officers who were responsible for this problem before me.

P.S. Häring was a Nazi & removed.

1. 1400 stolen Jewish books, showing no indication of former ownership, have been delivered as a loan from the Offenbach Archival Depot to Dr. Pinson, official representative of the American Joint Distribution Committee. The request for 25,000 of these books was originally received from the Adviser on Jewish Affairs; the selection of the remaining books will be made as rapidly as possible.

2. The Offenbach Archival Depot, the largest collection of Jewish material in the world, is now in operation from 0700 to 2200 six days a week with 70 employees. The first restitution will be made within a few days; a barge on the Main River at the depot is now being loaded with material stolen from Holland.

3. British MFAA officers of the North Rhine Region held a series of informal conferences with American Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives officers of Office of Military Government (U.S. Zone) and Office of Military Government for Greater Hesse in order to discuss procedures for the interzonal movement of German-owned works of art.

4. Restitution of works of art from the Munich Central Collecting Point included 31 objects for which receipts were signed by Belgian authorities. (Including paintings by Roger van der Weyden, Goyen and Rubens.) Also restituted were 747 objects to France, consisting mostly of important

**French silver ware.** Also included in the French objects were two powder boxes formerly belonging to Marie Antoinette.

  - c. Holy Scrolls (Toroth) and other religious ceremonial articles stored temporarily at the Fine Arts Collecting Point, Wiesbaden, returned to this Depot, Wednesday, 20 March 1946.

## 7. Miscellaneous.

The inclosed list is tentative and reliable only insofar as there are at least some books identified as belonging to the institutional or private library collections listed therein. It must not be assumed that the books are segregated in neat piles and available for restitution as separate library collections beyond that which it is deemed advisable to hasten restitution.

- b. Sorting Program.  
(See Inclosure 8)

The whole success of the Depot program at present centers around the sorting program. Four definite phases have been delineated; only the fourth requiring specialists versed in Hebrew and Slavic languages.

- (1) Testing of Closed Boxes to determine whether material therein belongs to one nation or is in an unsorted state. This process will be completed within two weeks.
  - (2) Dividing all unsorted piles of items into identifiable items and unidentifiable items. This process was commenced 26 Mar 46.
  - (3) Sorting the piles of identifiable items by country of origin where possible. This process was commenced 15 Mar 46.
  - (4) Sorting of semi-identifiable items, with various types of stamps and markings, legible and otherwise, largely in Hebrew Script and the Slavic languages. This process has not yet been commenced.


## 8. Recommendations.

- a. Need for additional personnel. One U.S.Civilian, Library Specialist, salary ca. \$ 6,000 per annum. This specialist should be capable of succeeding the Director of the Depot when he is redeployed, May 1946. Date of assumption of duties should be not later than 15 April 1946.

- b. Depot as sole archival restitution agency.

A letter has been forwarded through channels on 26 March 1946 recommending that this Depot be designated as the "sole archival depot in the US Zone whereto all books and other library materials be moved when sorting by country of origin is required prior to restitution".

Inclosure 3, "Floor Plan of the Depot", gives one a graphic idea on how well adapted the physical layout of the building is toward effectuating successfully such a program.





1. The Offenbach Collecting Point is hereby redesignated the OFFENBACH ARCHIVAL DEPOT. The Depot is declared a first priority Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives restitution project and placed directly under the supervision of the Land Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives Specialist Officer, OMG for Greater Hesse.
2. The Land Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives Specialist Officer, OMG for Greater Hesse, will designate a Director of the Offenbach Archival Depot and supervise his activities.
3. The Director of the Offenbach Archival Depot will:
  - a. Establish and maintain liaison with all Allied and other officially-designated Restitution Officers assigned or attached to US Forces, European Theater, and assist them in making available for restitution, books and such other properties as are clearly identifiable as to country of origin.
  - b. Make recommendations as to the disposition of such books and properties as are not identifiable as to country of origin.
  - c. Procure personnel and direct their activities.
  - d. Provide adequate security, supply transportation and maintenance.
  - e. Supervise the storage, warehousing, boxing, crating, and shipping of all books and other properties formerly administered by the Offenbach Collecting Point.
  - f. Prepare military correspondence in the name of the Director, this headquarters, in matters pertaining to the Offenbach Archival Depot only.

g. Perform such other duties and functions as are directed by the Land Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives Specialist Officer, OMG for Greater Hesse.

4. Upon the request of the Director of the Offenbach Archival Depot, The Offices of Military Government for Rbz. Wiesbaden, Rbz. Hessen, LK and SK Offenbach and SK Frankfurt will either provide or direct, through the appropriate agencies of the civil government, provision for such personnel, transportation, supplies, warehousing facilities, fuel, and housing and food for Depot employees as are required for the efficient operation of the installation.



Evacuation of the Rothschild Library Collecting Point to the Offenbach Archival Depot continues, and should be completed within another week. Arrangements have been made with representatives of the Netherlands Government for immediate restitution of identifiable archival collections from the Offenbach Archival Depot, as well as the sorting and transportation of substantial collections of Netherlands archival property now located in the NSDAP Erholungsheim, HIRZENHAIN (G/9900). Procurement of additional transportation will make possible return to Frankfurt of various local library collections for storage and use in local lending libraries. Two truckloads of Judaic cult objects and objects of art were removed from the Rothschild Library and sent to the Central Collecting Point, WIESBADEN, for cataloguing and safe-keeping. Compilation of a complete report on war damage to monuments in the city of FRANKFURT continues.

the volumes would not include items that are "in any way unusual, irreplaceable, very valuable, or difficult to procure". This stipulation, made to protect both OMG (US) and the American Joint Distribution Committee from possibly costly future claims, was agreed to by the C of S, OMG (US) in Reference c, above. Instructions were issued that the loan was to be made in accordance therewith. The instructions assume the presence, while the selection is going on, of US military or civilian personnel competent to determine what volumes chosen might fall within these categories, so that they might fall within these categories, so that they might be extracted prior to shipment. It must be pointed out that neither MFAA Specialist Officer currently responsible for the Depot is in any respect qualified for this exceptional task. Unless an officer or civilian capable of fulfilling the provisions of the instructions, Reference c, above, is assigned to the Depot, a predicament awkward from all points of view will be encountered. The Office of Military Government (US) will be in the position of having agreed to proposals, and issued instructions based thereon, which it is not prepared to execute, and neither OMG (US) nor the American Joint Distribution Committee will be protected against future claims. Thus competent personnel will have to be supplied (which is entirely possible) or the loan will have to be recalled (which would be exquisitely embarrassing).

- e. (1) If the administration and operations of the Offenbach Archival Depot are to be left wholly in the hands of the MFAA Specialist Officers, SK Frankfurt a/Main, it is pertinent, in view of this additional liability, to state precisely:
- (a) The status of these officers.
  - (b) The extent of their duties.
  - (c) The amount of time which can feasably be devoted to an auxiliary mission.
- (2) (a) One of the MFAA Specialist Officers will be redeployed on or about 1 April 1946, leaving one officer in charge. No replacement for the officer redeployed is available.
- (b) Before 1 April 1946 two priority functions, just commenced, must be virtually completed: 1) evacuation of twenty (20) depositories within a radius of 280 kilometers; 2) the screening

and preparation for restitution of loot from  
the contents of these depositories.

- (c) Between the inspection, arrangements for eva-  
cuation, and supervision of movements from  
these depositories, and supervising the screen-  
ing and restitution, the energies of two offi-  
cers are practically depleted. It will not  
be possible, without jettisoning one of the  
functions, to engage in another full-time. The  
most that can be expected is for each officer  
to spend one day a week, or for one officer  
to spend two days a week, at Offenbach.
- f. On this basis, the work at the Depot must necessarily  
be abridged, with a consequent deceleration of  
the identification and restitution program. United  
Nations authorities can, however, be invited to  
assist.
- g. The Technical Advisor on Archives, R&R Division,  
OMG (US) has suggested that the present custodian  
of the Offenbach Archival Depot, Mr Glenn N Goodman,  
might be placed in complete charge. This would be  
injudicious for several reasons. Mr Goodman, though  
a US citizen, if not legally suspect, is still of  
too questionable a status to be sponsored by Mili-  
tary Government for such a position in the most im-  
portant archival collection under US authority in  
Europe. He is unschooled in Hebrew, Yiddish, or  
bibliophily. While enterprising and evidently trust-  
worthy, he lacks the prestige of military status,  
which is compulsory.
4. Conclusion: It is concluded that:
- a. Default by Archival Specialist personnel whose  
preeminent interest is to plan for and conduct the  
collections, protection, and restitution of archives  
as defined by Reference d, above, repudiates certain  
positive obligations and inequitably confers them  
upon other personnel at once unconvansant and over-  
taxed.
- b. Administration and operations of the Offenbach Ar-  
chival Depot require the assignment to the Depot

- e. Such personnel is available in the US Zone of Occupation.
- d. Not to effect such an assignment will:
  - (1) Seriously challenge the presumptive need for the continued presence of US Archival Specialist personnel in the European Theater of Operations, as well as their claims to authority.
  - (2) Make impossible of fulfillment the instructions of higher authority cited in Reference c, above.
  - (3) Expose the OMG (US) and the American Joint Distribution Committee to embarrassment and possibly exorbitant future claims.
  - (4) Handicap the MFA&A Specialist personnel of SK Frankfurt a/Main in the performance of urgent duties.
  - (5) Place upon the MFA&A Specialist personnel of SK Frankfurt a/Main responsibilities to which they are professionally incommensurate, even though they remain willing to undertake them.
  - (6) Impede the restitution of works of art from the Frankfurt area, a work not yet begun.
- e. The custodian of the Offenbach Archival Depot, cannot be put in charge.
- f. Within the limitations of the MFA&A Specialist personnel, SK Frankfurt a/Main, the administration of the Offenbach Archival Depot can be continued, but with restitution therefore proceeding at a much reduced rate.

5. Recommendations:

It is recommended that:

- a. The US military Archival Specialist personnel described in paragraph 3,c,above, be detailed to the Offenbach Archival Depot as a military necessity for a period sufficient at least to carry out the mission of screening books loaned to the American Joint Distribution Committee.
- b. If Recommendation a,above, cannot be put into effect, the MFA&A Specialist personnel now in charge of the Offenbach Archival Depot be relieved of all responsibility for accomplishing the provisions of References b and c, above.

6 February 1946 approximately 440 paintings belonging to the Städelsches Kunstinstitut were evacuated from the depository at Amorbach (N/0817) to the Central Collecting Point at Wiesbaden (M/3665). Evacuation of the Rothschild Collecting Point, Untermainkai 15, to the Offenbach Collecting Point, is in progress. Up to date, the entire first floor has been cleared of all material and the stack-room is approximately one-fourth evacuated. Proper requisitioning of the entire building (Gebäude V 1) in the IG Farben Plant at Offenbach has made possible clearance of all floors of the building, preparatory to the reception of other collections. These include a depository at Hirzenhain (G/9901) comprising approximately eight (8) boxcars of material from the Hohe Schule. Policy and recommendations in regard to the Offenbach Collecting Point, originating in this office, have been accepted by the Office of Military Government for Germany, US, and will greatly facilitate the warehousing and restitution of the material contained therein. The organization and compilation of a complete photographic/historical survey of the monuments in Frankfurt a/Main, to be completed by 1 April 1946, are under way. Full authority has been received from the Office of Military Government for Greater Hesse to take such steps as may be deemed advisable in regard to the screening and licensing of art-dealers in the city.

My recommendation regarding screening of 25,000 books from the Offenbach Collecting Point and the Rothschild Library building selected for loan to Jewish displaced persons at the request of Judge Rifkind of the American Joint Distribution Committee, is as follows:

1. After books are selected by the men appointed by Judge Rifkind, but before they are removed from either building, each volume selected should be inspected by Mr. Glenn H. Goodman (the best authority on identification ownership) and Capt. Joseph Pomrenze (as one familiar with Jewish books) to assure MFAA authorities that the provisions of Judge Rifkind's letter of 1 Jan 46 to General Clay have been complied with. MFAA should, as in other cases of authorized removal, exercise some control over the action. The authorization to remove these books on loan as stated in a letter from Brig. General Milburn to Judge Rifkind dated 12 Jan 46 is subject to the following conditions:

- a) That no book be borrowed that is in any way unusual, irreplaceable, very valuable, or very difficult to procure.
- b) That no book be withdrawn that has been established as the property of any known institution or individual.

In the event of any argument concerning the availability for loan of any particular volume or volumes, the judgement of Mr. Goodman and Capt. Pomrenze should prevail.

2. Before any books are removed, the American Joint Distribution Committee or its agents should be required to give to MFAA a complete list, in duplicate, of all books selected and screened by Mr. Goodman and Capt. Pomrenze, as an appendix to and in definition of the file copy of the loan receipt.



Dear Bill:

I wonder whether, without going to any trouble yourself, you can get a line for me on a man who (I am told) has been used in some advisory or informational capacity by the State Department.

A book is going to be discussed by our judges at their next meeting, in about ten days, which has to do with the state of affairs inside Soviet Russia. My hunch is that it is likely to be a warm contender as a choice, and the reliability of the author will be a question that our judges will certainly want to look into.

The trouble is that around New York everybody is either strongly pro or anti Soviet. One "expert" however, was described to me as pretty objective. His name is Boris Nicolaevsky, and I would like to get his slant on the book.

However, I want to make sure that he is as described. I know that he writes for the New Leader; on the other hand, he is a historian and has been engaged in collecting archives having to do with the Russian Revolution. That type of chap is likely to be a good deal less emotional than the usual so-called experts on Russia, on both sides.

My informer told me that Nicolaevsky had been employed in some capacity by the State Department. He was rather vague about it, and confessed that he really didn't know much, except that there was some connection with the State Department.

Would it be possible for you to check with somebody in the Department who might have had experience with Nicolaevsky? All I want to know is whether he really can be relied upon to be sufficiently detached to give us an unprejudiced judgment about this book.

I have been following your controversy with A.P. and U.P., and needless to say, I am all on your side.

Do give me a call the next time you get to town, and even if I can't see you, we can visit over the telephone for a few minutes.

1. Following the telephone conversation between Maj.  
Nobles and Capt. Hathaway, MFA&A Section, the following letters  
and reports are herewith transmitted:

Section, U.S. Hqs, Berlin District (translation) - (Incl.1);

b. Letter dated 28 Dec 45, Information Services

2. The following observations may be made concerning  
the deposit of books at Eisenacherstrasse 11 - 13, Berlin -  
Schöneberg:

a. The books, estimated at between 200,000 and  
300,000 in number, were confiscated during the war years  
by the Reichssicherheitshauptamt, and are the residue of  
an alleged larger number, some of which were shipped out  
before the end of the war and some of which are said to  
have been removed between the beginning of May 1945 and the  
beginning of July 1945. They were processed by a crew of  
German civilians, between June 1945 and December 1945, work-  
ing under the general supervision of Walter Stolle, Desernent,  
Abteilung für Volksbildung, Bezirksam Schöneberg-Friedenau,  
and paid through this borough office.

b. The books were composed of approximately 50%  
identifiable loot and 50% of unidentified ownership.

c. From August to December 1945, officers of this  
Division, by agreement with the Office for MFA&A, ONGUS  
(ED), visited the Eisenacherstrasse address on an average  
of once every two weeks, keeping the operation under sur-  
veillance. On each visit, the book-sorting crew was informed  
that no books were to be removed without the permission of

the MPAA Section. The name of the interested officer, his address and telephone number at US Group CC/OMGUS, were given in writing to the foreman, Reinhold Klingenberg, and his assistance, Knetter and Ueland. The same information was given to the office of Stolle, at Hauptstrasse 19, on 28 August 1945.

d. Two requests were made to the MPAA Sec, OMGUS, during December, by Dr. Hoecker, Director of the Stadtbücherei, Berlin, for the delivery to him of books from the Eisenacherstrasse Depot. On both occasions Dr. Hoecker was informed that no books could be removed.

e. On 28 January 46 it was discovered that approximately 50% of the books had been removed from Eisenacherstrasse.

f. Inquiry showed that the books had been removed by Dr. Stolle, acting upon authority conferred in the letter attached herewith as inclosure 2.

g. The list of removals furnished by Dr. Stolle (Incl. 3) reveals that he has entirely exceeded any authorization granted to him for book removal. He appears to have restituted few, if any, books to former owners, and he has most conspicuously failed to deliver books to libraries in his district.

3. It is requested that immediate steps be taken:

a. To determine the degree of authority which should be exercised by Information Services Control Section, U S Headquarters, Berlin District, over collection of looted property.

b. To control the activities of Stolle and bring them within the limits of interest of Military Government in the U S Sector of Berlin.

c. To restore to U.S. custody the books removed from Eisenacherstrasse 11-13.

SUBJECT: Jewish Books.

TO : Lt. General Lucius Clay,  
Office of Military Government (US)

Dear General Clay:

1. The cable, copy of which is annexed hereto, rejects the proposal for the temporary utilization of some of the Yiddish and Hebrew books and books in other languages relating to Jewish lore collected at Frankfort and adjacent places. The proposal was that the American Joint Distribution Committee, a large, well-known and responsible philanthropic agency, operating in this Theater by attachment to UNRRA, be permitted to borrow 25,000 volumes for use in Jewish Displaced Persons Centers. Reconsideration of the proposal is urgently requested.

2. There is a pressing need for the provision of educational and recreational supplies and facilities for Jewish Persons in Displaced Persons Centers. This need is recognized as acute by UNRRA and by the voluntary agencies which are cooperating in the rehabilitation of DPs. It is for this reason that the Jewish voluntary agencies now in the Theater are attempting to set up a program of educational and cultural activity which includes the establishment of reading rooms and schools for both children and adults. The residents of the centers exhibit great eagerness for such activity. They are starved for reading and study materials. Moreover, in the case of Jewish Displaced Persons Centers, it is essential that the religious functionaries have accessible certain basic Rabbinic literature. Reference to such literature is a daily necessity for a Rabbi in meeting the demands of his congregation.

3. At Frankfort and Offenbach have been assembled several million volumes of such Jewish literature. These collections contain, in addition to items of value, thousands of ordinary books of no historical or artistic merit such as ordinary editions of standard religious works, text books, Hebrew and Yiddish popular reading matter. It is for these non-valuable items that there is great need in the DP Centers.

4. In order to make certain that no valuable item would be taken from the collection through oversight, I have requested and obtained the consent of three eminent experts to make the selection of 25,000 volumes out of the several million located at the collection points.

These men are in the Theater and have indeed substantially completed the selection. They are: Professor Koppel S. Pinson, Professor of History at Queens College, New York, Editor of Jewish Social Studies, Secretary of Commission for European Jewish Cultural Reconstruction, Vice-chairman of Academic Council of Jewish Relations; Rabbi Alexander Rosenberg, Member of Executive Committee of Union of Orthodox Rabbis, founder and ex-president of Rabbinical Council of America, authority in the field of Rabbinic Scholarship; Professor Samuel Sar (who has recently left the Theater), Dean of Yeshiva College, New York, Vice-president of Mizrachi. These men are eminently qualified to make a selection which would in no way prejudice the preservation of the historical, rare and valuable character of the collection nor interfere with its restoration to rightful owners.

5. This committee drew up the following rules and procedures to guide them in the work of selection:

a. That no book be borrowed that is in any way unusual, irreplaceable, very valuable, or very difficult to procure.

b. That no book be withdrawn that has been established as the property of any known institution or individual.

More important, however, for the protection of possible owners of these books is the fact that the proposed withdrawal is by the way of a loan to a financially responsible organization.

6. Attention is invited to the fact that the collections under discussion constitute the loot assembled by the Nazis out of Jewish libraries and communities in the various parts of Europe.

7. It is suggested that to prevent the use of these books, at a time when there are no practicable alternatives, out of deference to possible claims and out of regard to administrative complications is to attach greater significance to the less rather than the more important considerations.

8. For the foregoing reasons I recommend that the proposed loan be authorized and directed.

Memorandum on removal of books from  
the Rothschild library building, Frankfurt a.M.  
for use in Displaced Persons Camps at  
the request of Judge Simon H. Rifkind of the  
American Joint Distribution Committee.

Judge Rifkind's original application for the loan of 25,000 books from the Rothschild library building, part of the Offenbach Collecting Point, and subsequent discussion had as a premise that the loan was to be limited to books of undetermined ownership. Before formal approval of this project, however, Dr. Pinzen and his staff began selecting actual books for removal, taking them from the shelves and piling them for packing. In discussion of this matter with Mr. Goodman, in charge of current work at the library on behalf of the Frankfurt Military Government, the following allegations come out. I have Mr. Goodman's permission to quote him.

In reviewing the piles of books selected by Dr. Pinzen, Mr. Goodman stated that he found among these books volumes of which he could identify the original ownership. Dr. Pinzen claimed that "ownership" should be established only by a bookplate, rubber stamp or other device actually bearing the name of the library. Mr. Goodman claimed that any way of identifying ownership should be held valid, including manuscript marks, methods of numbering, symbols, etc. Such means of identification are as a fact common in library practice and become known only to personnel who work constantly with the material. Moreover, there is much material from private libraries in the lots form which selection was being made.

Mr. Goodman not only protested to Dr. Pinzen, but called the matter to the attention of Lt. Kulke, who also protested to Dr. Pinzen. Subsequent inspection of piles of selected books showed Mr. Goodman, however, that the practice had not been stopped, and that books of identifiable ownership, contrary to agreement were still being removed from the shelves.

I wish to support Mr. Goodman's view, and condemn Dr. Pinzen's interpretation.

These facts, if indeed true, should have as bearing on any decision concerning reconsideration of Judge Rifkind's application.

With reference to suggestion regarding books unidentifiable as to ownership this office desires to state that books now unidentifiable may well be identified later and should therefore not be loaned. This policy considered necessary in order to protect rights of owners and to avoid complicating an already difficult task of restitution.

SUBJECT: Selection and removal of books from ROTHSCHILD library building at request of Judge RIFKIND.

1. Judge RIFKIND made written application, in a memorandum dated 28 Nov. 1945 to Major LaFarge for the loan of 25,000 books for the use of Jewish displaced persons. The books involved are among those looted by the Rosenberg organization, now stored as part of the Offenbach Collecting Center.

2. I understand that this request was refused by Capt. RORIMER, but later approved verbally by Mr. Breitenbach and Major LaFarge.

3. A cable from USFET (Main) to OMGUS dated 7 Dec 1945 requested clarification of policy for such action. There is no record here of the receipt of any answer.

4. Mr. Breitenbach verbally asked my opinion in this matter, and I replied that I disapproved of such removal unless it could clearly be shown that the books in question were duplicated within the collecting point resources which might remain after restitution of items of identifiable ownership had been effected. I was not at this point directly involved in the actual decision. I did not authorize Mr. Breitenbach to act for me in this matter.

5. The question of whether the cultural materials, of whatever character, in MFAA custody at collecting centers or elsewhere, are to be made available for dispersal according to a variety of education or other projects, while matters of restitution, disposition of unwanted or unidentifiable residue, and return to German civilian custody are still pending, seems to me one of high policy which should not be decided informally. If such removal is authorized in this instance it will open the door to a variety of similar proposals which are likely to result in the dispersal of material which it may later be found should have been kept together for the reconstruction of former libraries or the constitution of new ones.

6. The work of selection, with the sanction of Lt. KULKE, is now underway at the Rothschild library building, but no books have so far actually been removed.

7. I question whether appropriate authorization has been received. The project seems to me contrary to MFAGA preservation, control, restitution and reconstruction policy. It has been verbally disapproved by Col. KNUSS and Mr. BOELL. I doubt whether Mr. Breitenbach or Lt. Kulke are authorized to approve the removal of books from Collecting Points in this way and for such purposes (as distinguished from authorized removal for restitution or return to properly constituted German civilian custody). I doubt whether the consideration of this removal as a "loan" can be taken seriously, in view of the probable actual situation in camps for displaced persons. In a published article concerning camps for displaced persons in Military Government Weekly Information Bulletin, it is indicated that food, fuel and the like are to be furnished by Military Government, but that reading matter and the like is to be supplied by UNRRA.

8. I recommend that selection or other work on this project be stopped immediately until it can further reviewed in the light of overall policy regarding future operations and approval obtained from all concerned.

Dear General Clay:

1. The cable, copy of which is annexed hereto, rejects the proposal for the temporary utilisation of some of the Yiddish and Hebrew books and books in other languages relating to Jewish lore collected at Frankfurt and adjacent places. The proposal was that the American Joint Distribution Committee, a large wellknown and responsible philanthropic agency, operating in this Theater by attached to UNRRA, be permitted to borrow 25,000 volumes for use in Jewish Displaced Persons Centers. Reconsideration of the proposal is urgently requested.
2. There is a pressing need for the provision of educational and recreational supplies and facilities for Jewish Persons in Displaced Persons Centers. This need is recognized as acute by UNRRA and by the voluntary agencies which are cooperating in the rehabilitation of DP's. It is for this reason that the Jewish voluntary agencies now in the Theater are attempting to set up a program of educational and cultural activity which includes the establishment of reading rooms and schools for both children and adults. The residents of the centers exhibit great eagerness for such activity. They are starved for reading and study materials. Moreover, in the case of Jewish Displaced Persons Centers, it is essential that the religious functionaries have accessible certain basic Rabbinic literature. Reference to such literature is a daily necessity for a Rabbi in meeting the demands of his congregation.
3. At Frankfurt and Offenbach have been assembled several million volumes of such Jewish literature. These collections contain, in addition to items of value, thousands of ordinary books of no historical or artistic merit such as ordinary editions of standard religious works, text books, Hebrew and Yiddish popular reading matter. It is for these non-valuable items that there is great need in the DP Centers.
4. In order to make certain that no valuable item would be taken from the collection through oversight, I have requested and obtained the consent of three eminent experts to make the selection of 25,000 volumes out of the several million located at the collection points.



Judge Rinkind's original application for the loan of 25,000 books from the Rothschild Library building, part of the Ortenau Collection, Friburg, and subsequent discussion had as a terminal point the need to be limited to books of undetermined ownership. Before formal approval of this project, however, Dr. Finzen and his staff began selecting actual books for removal, taking them from the shelves and putting them for packing. In discussions of this matter with Mr. Goodman, in charge of current work at the Library on behalf of the Frankfurt Military Government, the following allegations came out. It was Mr. Goodman's permission to quote him:

In reviewing the piles of books selected by Dr. Finzen, Mr. Goodman stated that he found among these books volumes of which he could identify no original ownership. Dr. Finzen claimed that "ownership" should be established only by a bookplate, rubber stamp or other device actually bearing the name of the library. Mr. Goodman claimed that any identification of ownership should be laid aside, including names of authors, methods of publishing, schools, etc. Such means of identification are too exact common library practice and become known only to persons who work constantly with the material. Moreover, there is much material from the libraries in the lots from which selection was made which

Mr. Goodman not only imposed on Dr. Finzen, but forced the latter to the attention of Dr. Blaue, who also commented to Dr. Finzen, and again his opinion of piles of unselected books given to Mr. Goodman. However, after the time indicated, no books stamped and the books of indeterminable ownership, contrary to agreement were still being removed from the shelves.

It will be summarized Goodman's view of Judge Rinkind's interpretation:

STORAGE OF LOOTED DOCUMENTS FOUND

A large cache of documents brought to BERLIN by Amt VII (Political Research and Exploitation) has been found in a synagogue in SCHOENEBERG, BERLIN. The documents fall into three general categories:

1. Business records and dossiers of important firms and individuals, evacuated from PARIS during the German occupation, including complete library bound French newspaper series;
2. Records of German and German-controlled firms doing business in Russia;
3. A 25,000 volume accumulation of Judaic and Hebraic literature looted from synagogues in Eastern Europe. This is part of a larger collection that has since been moved to SILESIA.

(1) Major Lionel Perry, MFA&A, Hq Mil. Gov. North Rhine Province, visited the CCP to plan the return to Dusseldorf of paintings without stretchers from the city of Dusseldorf, authority letter and 1st Ind., Subject: "Return of German Owned Art to Institutions in British Zone" Hq USFET, APO 757, 15 Sept 1945. A total of thirty paintings, comprising all without stretchers, have been packed and prepared for shipment. Major Perry has been notified that the paintings and receipts for his signature are ready.

(2) The German regimental banners from Bernreode were transported from the Marburger Schloss where they had been stored to the CCP at the request of Capt Rorimer, Hq Seventh Army. At the request of Capt Regan, OMG for Germany, the banners were studied and identified. They were found to be regimental and battalion flags of German origin dating from the 19th and 20th centuries. A complete list is in preparation for transmission to OMG for Germany.

(3) About two 2 1/2 ton truckloads of German Military Government records for Belgium and Northern France were discovered in the Staatsarchiv where they had been deposited by retreating German authorities. A report of this was forwarded to Military Gov. Det E-5 dated 27 December 1945. The Fine Arts records have been separated and are being studied at the CCP. It is believed that the documents contain valuable information and recommendation is made herewith that an archive specialist be made available to study them in detail.

(4) The exhibition of 30 paintings "Masterpieces of European Painting" was reopened in the Jubiläumsbau 20 December 1945. Security consists of two armed civilian police 24 hours per day. No more than fifty visitors are permitted in the gallery at one time.

(5) Two paintings from the Collectie Goudstikker, Amsterdam were released to Capt Rorimer on his receipt, dated 13 December 45 for transmittal to the Dutch authorities. The paintings were MAR 102, "Tower of Babel" by Williemaz Hendrik von Cleve and MAR 103 "Moonlight Landscape" by Abels.

(6) Three reliefs in wood from the Rothschild Collection, Paris, were released to Capt Rorimer on his receipt, dated 12 Dec 45, for transmittal to the French authorities. These were MAR 31, high relief, "Rape of the Sabines" 17th century, MAR 32, high relief, "Battle of the Amazons" 17th century; MAR 32, high relief, "Ancient Battle Scene" 17th century.

(7) Capt Valland, Secretary of the Comission de Réparation artistique, Paris, visited the CCP Marburg with Capt Rorimer to examine possible loot from France. She was shown all works of art which are believed to have come from France and was given a list of same. Photographs of each work are being prepared for trans-

mission to her. The works of art are all owned in the Rheinland and therefore were not released to her.

SUBJECT: Selection and removal of books from ROTHSCHILD library building at request of Judge RIKIND.

1. Judge RIKIND made written application, in a memorandum dated 28 Nov. 1945 to Major LaFarge for the loan of 25,000 books for the use of Jewish displaced persons. The books involved are among those looted by the Rosenberg organization, now stored as part of the Offenbach Collecting Center.

2. I understand that this request was refused by Capt. NORIMEN, but later approved verbally by Mr. Breitenbach and Major LaFarge.

FOR THE EXAMINATION OF DOCUMENTS

1. The Jüdischer Central-Verein, e.V. (Jewish Central Union, Registered Society), Berlin W.15, Emser Strasse 42, the largest organisation of the German Jews, was in possession of a library of about 30,000 volumes and a collection of documentary records concerning anti-Semitic measures in Germany. Both the library and the collection was housed at the above-mentioned address. The books bore the stamp: Central Verein Deutscher Staatsbürger Judischen Glaubens e.V., Berlin S.W.68, Lindenstrasse 13 (i.e. the former name and address of the Union), or: Central Verein Deutscher Staatsbürger Judischen Glaubens e.V., Berlin W.15, Emser Strasse 42, or - for a minor part - Jüdischer Central Verein e.V., Berlin W.15, Emser Strasse 42.
2. In February or March 1939, the Berlin Gestapo (Geheimes Staatspolizeiamt fuer den Landespolizeibezirk Berlin), Berlin, Alexanderplatz (Polizeipräsidium), confiscated the library and archives of the Jewish Central Union, together with the library shelves. They were taken to the Reichs-Propaganda-Ministerium, Berlin, and the undersigned Syndikus (Secretary) was forced by the Gestapo to pay RM 967.- to the transport firm who had removed the books and files.
3. We hereby apply to the Allied authorities for measures to be taken to secure the title of the Jewish Central Union to its library and documentary records. We should like to add that both the library and records may have been transferred to Frankfurt-on-Main (Reichsinstitut zur Erforschung der Judenfrage), or to Hungen/Hessen, or to Munich, and incorporated in Nazi collections which are now in Allied hands.
