Early Activation of IRO

The following 13 governments have joined IRO by depositing certificates of ratification with the Secretary-General, United Nations:

Argentina	France	New Zealand
Australia	Guatemala	Norway

Dominican Republic		

Belgium has passed the required legislation for adherence and is expected to deposit her certificate of ratification within a few days. The total of allocated contributions of government members including Belgium is 76.7% of the provisional budget for the first year. For activation of IRO the adherence of one more government is required.

Brazil, Denmark, Sweden and Venezuela present the most likely prospects for early ratification.

Brazil. Brazil is currently negotiating a working agreement with FCIRO and has promised to submit draft legislation to its Congress authorizing membership in IRO as soon as the working agreement is concluded. The negotiation of this agreement has been delayed by both parties. W. Hallam Tuck, Executive Secretary, FCIRO, on March 29, 1948 cabled instructions from Washington to FCIRO headquarters, Geneva, which should result in clearing up remaining points at issue in negotiations. FCIRO should be urged to intensify efforts to conclude agreement as soon as possible. These efforts will be assisted by our Ambassador at Rio de Janeiro.

Denmark. IRO should be encouraged to press its current negotiations with the Danish Government with a view to securing early adherence. The U.S. Government cannot assist in this effort because of recent failure to accept Germans resident in Denmark in the U.S. zone of Germany.

Sweden. Sweden has made a contribution of 50 million kroner to a reparations fund for refugee relief to which Switzerland will contribute a similar amount. This fund is administered by FCIRO. It proved impossible to secure action authorizing membership in IRO in the Riksdag previous to last July because of the earlier appropriation of these funds. The U.S. and U.K. Ambassadors have recently reopened the question of Sweden's adherence as the Riksdag is again in session. Mr. Tuck has agreed to send representatives to Stockholm at any moment to assist in the effort to secure Swedish adherence. The reply of the Foreign Office to memoranda presented by the Ambassadors is now awaited.

Venezuela. Venezuela has accepted 4400 refugees and interest in joining IRO has grown lately. Mr. Tuck, Executive Secretary, FCIRO, just returned from a visit to Caracas, reports that the Foreign Minister and the Director of Immigration have promised to urge the President and Cabinet to recommend to Congress that Venezuela adhere to IRO. Congress reconvenes April 19, 1948. Adherence is not dependent upon conclusion of a working agreement now in process of negotiation. FCIRO should be urged to press for adherence without further delay.

The early activation of IRO is essential to favorable action by Congress on the Department's request for an appropriation of \$71,000,000 to cover this government's contribution to IRO for the fiscal year 1948-49.

2. Development of Participation of Other Governments in IRO

In view of the fact that the U.S. contribution to IRO constitutes 80.5% of the actual income of IRO to January 1, 1948 and a higher percentage of the hard currency available to the organization, the impression exists in the Congress that the U.S. Government is carrying a disproportionate share of the load in IRO. On January 1, 1948 government members were in arrears in payment of contributions due in the amount of \$14,843,242, of which \$7,386,231 was owing by the U.K., \$2,955,281 by France, and \$1,360,179 by Canada.

France has not yet made substantial contribution to IRO either in funds or in accepting displaced persons for resettlement. Belgium has made only a token contribution to date and has delayed deposit of its certificate of ratification with the Secretary General of the United Nations even though her legislative action was completed early in January. The Netherlands has made no contribution to date. The U.K. has paid less than one-fifth of its contribution.

Australia, Canada, the U.K., Belgium, Brazil and Venezuela have accepted displaced persons for resettlement. Brazil and Venezuela have delayed joining IRO.

France has persistently sought concessions from IRO in advance of making contribution of funds or accepting refugees for resettlement. In the anxiety to secure French adherence, FCIRO has granted concessions to France and still faces difficult negotiations with respect to the rate of exchange which France is to use in translating the dollar equivalent of her allocated contribution into francs.

It is recommended that Mr. Tuck be advised of the impression in Congress that the U.S. is carrying the ball alone and urged to develop greater participation by other governments in IRO to remove this impression which is somewhat justified.

3. Expanding of FCIRO Dollars To Provide More Shipping

FCIRO needs to safeguard its dollar resources to secure additional shipping for the overseas movement of displaced persons in resettlement. FCIRO is now operating four Army transports, two British, and one Norwegian ship in the movement of displaced persons to Australia, Canada, Brazil, Paraguay, Peru and Venezuela. 20,000 displaced persons are already documented for resettlement overseas beyond the capacity of these seven ships to move. Four additional ships are required to move these 20,000 immediately and others currently being processed. Their early removal will reduce the cost of maintaining them in Germany, Austria and Italy.

Because of the delay in contributions from other governments FCIRO has had to purchase soft currencies to maintain minimum operations. France has endeavored to secure concessions from IRO which will result in the channeling of U.S. dollars through IRO to the French Government.

It is recommended that Mr. Tusk be advised that IRO is not a channel for the routing of U.S. dollars to other governments. FCIRO efforts to secure the maximum percentage of the contributions of other governments in dollars or other hard currency should be increased. Greater resourcefulness might be used in securing contributions in kind from soft currency governments, such as shipping from the Netherlands, chargeable to the Netherlands contribution in its own currency. FCIRO should also add to its staff an expert in foreign exchange to secure the maximum use of the soft currencies received in contributions. The anticipated deficit resulting from the non-usability of soft currencies is at present estimated to be seven million dollars. It is recommended that Mr. Tusk be urged to safeguard FCIRO dollar income with a view to its use in the procurement of additional shipping.

4. Improvement of Financial Controls and Reporting by PCIRO

On the initiative of the U.S. Delegation at Preparatory Commission meetings PCIRO has presented acceptable budget proposals for the fiscal years 1947-48 and 1948-49 which have been adopted by the Commission. At the January meeting of the Commission a financial statement for the first quarter ending September 30, 1947 was presented to the Commission which did not measure up to fair standards of clarity and accountability for receipt and expenditure of funds. On request of the U.S. Delegation another financial statement and balance sheet covering the same period was presented to the U.S. Delegation solely. This statement constituted an improvement over the statement formally submitted to the Commission. The latter statements should have been formally presented to the Commission as a whole and similar statements covering the period to January 1, 1948 are now due. These statements should be supplemented by a statement of the use of funds in accordance with the adopted budget, commitments and expenditures under the budget, and available balances.

The U.S. Delegation to the Commission lacks confidence in the present Comptroller of PCIRO because of his inadequate experience. This lack of confidence has been made known to Mr. Tuck. Assurance is also lacking that adequate financial controls in the expenditure of funds have been established by the administration of PCIRO. The Department is called upon constantly by the Congress to answer detailed questions on the receipt and expenditure of funds by IRO. More complete and up-to-date reporting on the receipt and expenditure of funds by IRO is essential if these inquiries are to be answered promptly. The Department has given Mr. Tuck a written description of the financial statements required. While maintaining his confidence in existing financial controls and in the present Comptroller, Mr. Tuck has indicated his intention to comply with the Department's requests.

It is recommended that the importance of adequate up-to-date financial reports be urged on Mr. Tuck.

"Limited Registration Plan", correspondence or field investigation amounted to 2,809, and included twenty-two nationalities. A significant comparison in the solution of cases is that, from 1 May 1945 to 30 June 1949, 3,762 cases were finalized, a monthly average of 75, whereas from 1 July 1949 until 30 June 1950 the figure was 2,366, a monthly average of 197.

249. Meanwhile the work of Documents Intelligence was pursued energetically. This comprises the collection of documents from National Socialist and other German sources, also those from other countries; interrogation of witnesses, either German welfare personnel, former Nazi officers or even the children themselves; collection of transport lists of children moved into or out of Germany during the war years.

250. The children's Master Index, including a special register of birth certificates from 1939 to 1945, in respect mainly of children born to slave labourers, amounts to 258,648. Of these 138,782 were inserted during the current year.

251. The Child Search programme in relation to the IRO Child Welfare programme was examined by the General Council during its Fifth Session in March 1950. In view of the limitations of time and money it was decided to cease the registration of new cases of children as from 1 April 1950, but to continue up to 31 August 1950 the work of identifying and documenting the children already found. Accordingly, the zonal child search offices were closed by the end of May and all the documents centralized in Esslingen.

SECTION C. REPARATIONS

252. The Reparation Fund was established under Article 8, part I, of the Final Act of the Paris Conference on Reparations adopted by 18 Allied Powers in December 1945 and under the "Five Power Agreement" of 14 June 1946 in which the Five Powers (Czechoslovakia, France, the United Kingdom, the United States of America, and Yugoslavia) agreed on

instructions for the administration of the fund for the rehabilitation and resettlement of victims of Nazi persecution.

253. The administration of this fund has continued under the authority of the Director-General of IRO after its transfer from the Inter-Governmental Committee on Refugees in July 1947.

254. That part of the fund which it was anticipated would be derived from heirless assets of Nazi victims discovered in neutral countries has not materialized up to the present; and the income into the fund has been derived from the two other sources provided for - the sale of "non-monetary gold" and a portion of the German assets found in neutral countries.

255. As of 30 June 1950 total receipts into the fund from the sale of non-monetary gold amounted to the equivalent of \$2,951,984.51 after deduction of authorized liquidation expenses. As for the \$25,000,000 fund referred to in the Five Power Agreement, the governments of Sweden and Switzerland had contributed respectively, Kr.50,000,000.- and Sw.Fr. 20,000,000.- representing a nominal dollar equivalent of \$18,540,051.67. The total income into the fund from all sources, i.e. proceeds from the sale of non-monetary gold and German assets, plus a small amount of exchange gains and bank interest (\$1,577.57) stood, on 30 June 1950, at \$21,493,613.75.

256. As was laid down by the Allied Powers, the actual distribution of Reparation Funds to eligible victims of Nazi persecution is carried on by voluntary societies. Through 30 June 1950, \$19,116,489.21 had been disbursed to the American Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine. Up to the same date disbursements had been made to the following non-Jewish agencies, totalling \$861,483.68.

Allocation of virtually the entire balance of undistributed receipts into the Fund had been made to the Jewish and non-Jewish agencies by 30 June 1950.

257. At the close of the financial year an audit of the Reparations Fund was under way.

258. Further receipts into the Fund were anticipated, including certain sums from the liquidation of non-monetary gold and further contributions from neutral countries out of German assets.

259. Another source of revenue which it is hoped will materialize is the reimbursement to the Fund of \$120,000 by the United States Government under legislation which has been introduced, proposing the refund of customs duty paid on considerable quantities of non-monetary gold brought to the United States for liquidation sale under the auspices of the Merchandising Advisory Committee.

SECTION D. RELATIONS WITH UNITED NATIONS, SPECIALIZED AGENCIES, AND OTHER INTERNATIONAL BODIES

260. The Organization continued during the period under review to maintain close working relations with the United Nations and Specialized Agencies, striving to develop common interest in the refugee problem.

261. Certain problems in connection with which the IRO has been closely in touch with the appropriate specialized agencies are discussed in other parts of this report since they concern specific activities, such as protection and health.

262. The following summary covers the most important developments in this field, apart from legal aspects covered in Chapter V, Section C.
Action on question of United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees

263. The Economic and Social Council, scheduled to meet in Geneva on 3 July 1950 for its Eleventh Session, has been requested to submit further proposals on the question of the establishment of a High Commissioner's office. Details of the discussion of this question will be given in the Director-General's progress report covering the period

Administrative Co-ordination

264. The Organization has taken part fully in the activities of the Administrative Committee on Co-ordination and its subsidiary bodies which have been established by the Economic and Social Council for the purpose of co-ordinating the activities of the Specialized Agencies and to avoid duplication. Representatives from the IRO Washington Office and Headquarters attended respectively the meetings of the Administrative Committee on Co-ordination in October 1949 at Lake Success and in April/May 1950 in Paris. The Administration took advantage of the Paris meeting to call upon the various international organizations with a view to enlisting their support in the resettlement operation of IRO, especially with regard to the difficult groups, such as technicians and other specialists, and drawing their attention to the problem of out-placement of IRO staff. The use of soft currencies was made the subject of a memorandum from the IRO to these agencies.

Regional Co-operation

265. As regards co-operation between IRO and the United Nations and the Specialized Agencies, the IRO associated itself with proposals and recommendations made with a view to establishing closer relations between the various specialized agencies at regional level, and steps have been taken to comply with this policy. In this respect it should be noted that IRO was consulted by the Secretariat of the Economic Commission for Latin America on immigration problems in Chile, Brazil and Venezuela on which the United Nations prepared important field surveys.

266. The Administration also has been in communication with the Secretariat of the Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East in an effort to place technicians and specialists in Asia.

Relations between IRO and the International Labour Organization

267. The IRO maintained its close relations with the ILO during the


