ShipmentsExplanation of packaged bars in Operation No. RPrussian Mint

There are 312 boxes of bars which carry on each bar the stamp of the Prussian Mint and numbers of melt to with the number that each bar occurs in the melt. For example a bar with the number 901/1 means that this is the first bar in melt No. 901 and bar 901/8 means that this is the 8th bar in the same melt. Melts have been segregated in dockings.

No Melters Stamp

There are 270 boxes of these bars. There is no identifiable melters stamp on the bars. Identifying numbers, however, are stamped on the bars. Mr. Schenck was consulted concerning these bars and he advised us that he believed that they were contained in the last shipment that the Reichsbank had received from Italy.

Prussian Mint Alloy Bars

There are 25 boxes of these bars which in addition to the gold content enumerated contain varying proportions of silver. The bars carry the Prussian Mint stamp. Mr. Schenck advised us that they represent a shipment received from Italy by the Reichsbank and melted into the present form at the Prussian Mint.

Good Delivery Bars

There are 6 boxes of these bars. These bars carry the stamps of well known and generally accepted assayers in various allied and neutral countries. The names of the assayers were included in a list originally furnished by the Tripartite Gold Commission as acceptable good delivery.

Moskva (Russian)

There are 12 boxes of these bars carrying the stamp Moskva which is the stamp of the State Refinery in Moscow.

Norddeutsche

There are 4 boxes of these bars carrying the stamp of the Norddeutsche Affinerie which is listed in the Howard Report as a German melter.

There are 7 boxes of these bars carrying the stamps of the BOR Kupferbergwerk und Rotten AG, a Yugoslavian melter. The bars are small, being about 1/3 of the size of a normal bar.

Lab di Foggia P Lecca

There is 1 box of these bars carrying the stamps of this melter who is listed as Italian in the Howard Report.

Degussa

There are 17 boxes of these bars. They include boxes of normal sized bars bearing the stamps of Degussa, some smaller similar bars and a number of bags containing small bars about 1/4" in thickness and 3 or 4" long. Such bars are contained in boxes 1719, 1720, 1721 and 1722. In addition in boxes 1719, 1723, 1724, 1725, 1726 and 1727

there are contained pieces of such bars as described and pieces of thin strips of gold. These pieces are of varying sizes, in some cases small flat pieces and in other cases rolled. There are also present in bag P-56 in box 1726 small pellets of gold which are called droppings.

Miscellaneous

There are 4 boxes of this gold material. In box 1750 there are 4 pieces of gold in the form of cones and one piece of gold in a form resembling a small stick. Also there are small pieces of gold believed to be assay pieces, pieces of gold strip similar to the type described under Degussa, droppings as described under Degussa, and a few very small unmarked bars. In addition there are 36 pieces of gold described in the Howard Report as ingots. They are flat pieces of gold ranging in sizes from several inches in length to approximately 10". They are about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " to 2" wide and about  $\frac{1}{8}$ " thick. Some of these pieces have numbers on, but the numbers seem to be duplicated throughout the lot. This lot is in box 1731. In box 1730 there are 2 pieces of gold in irregular form and shape resembling nuggets. In box 1754 there are 5 very small bars in one bag and one very small bar and pieces of gold strip in the second bag.

MEMORANDUM

21 October 1946

SUBJECT: Special Inventory Procedure on S.S. Boot

1. Due to the necessity for keeping all items of this nature together, the following divergences from the S.O.P. procedure will apply:

(a) All currency will be placed in the same container irrespective of country of issue.

(b) Coin will first be examined and divided into the following categories:

1. gold
2. silver
3. other

(c) Each category will then be divided into denomination and country of issue.

(d) Each denomination will then be counted, placed in a bag (or envelope) and an inventory tag attached.

(e) Bags of the same category (see "b") will be placed in the same container.

(f) Jewelry, scrap gold, silver and other valuable items (including gold coin) will be inventoried by jewel experts.

(g) As far as possible there will be separate containers for various classes of assets - i.e. - precious stones, watches, scrap gold, scrap silver, scrap metal etc.

(h) The experts will dictate their inventory in French. A translator will take their inventory sheet and on a separate work sheet will translate same into English. The two work sheets will be given to the Section Head for examination and classification. Both copies will be retained in the depository section files.

(i) All other assets will be sorted and divided into such categories as postage stamps, bank books, securities etc.

The following report is summarized from a statement by informant which is to be submitted in its entirety to the War Crimes Commission:

1. The monthly report submitted to the SS Wirtschaftsbund Verwaltungshauptamt, Amt D III (SS Economic Office, Section D III), Oranienburg/Berlin, by the SS HQ dental stations of all concentration camps, included a secret account of the dental gold recovered from deceased prisoners.
2. The SS Economic Office had ruled that this gold was the property of the SS and that it was to be delivered at specified dates to Section D III. Upon authorization of the head of Section D III, SS Sturmbannführer Lolling, it was reissued to members of the Waffen-SS and their families for new dental work.
3. In theory, the director of a concentration camp dental station was required to inspect all deceased prisoners in the camp crematorium, personally to remove any dental gold, and to stamp the body "Examined by dental surgeon". He was likewise required to keep a daily log showing in each case the serial number of the deceased and the net amount of gold recovered, to draw up the monthly report for Section D III, and to carry on all incidental correspondence. All these papers were highly classified, and any breach of security was punishable under the laws relating to state secrets.
4. At the Mauthausen concentration camp, where informant was assigned to the dental station, the actual practice was as follows:
  - a. Those prisoners who had a conspicuous amount of dental gold were either assigned to special labor camps where they soon died of hunger and fatigue, or were kept at Mauthausen and taken care of by the SS guards and the prisoners (mostly professional criminals) whom they had appointed overseers and block-leaders.
  - b. A large amount of the gold thus made available for plunder was disposed of directly by the guards and their prisoner accomplices. The rest was collected either in the hospital or crematorium (after bitter jurisdictional disputes) by low-ranking SS officials. They delivered it, more or less intact, to the director of the dental station, SS Hauptsturmführer Höhler, who turned it over to informant for computation and recording.
  - c. According to records kept by informant, the following amounts of pure gold were collected, the March quota being from 528 bodies: January - 2,685.4 grams, February - 2,425.6 grams, March - 3,085.3 grams.





By executive order dated September 20, 1945, the President terminated the Office of Strategic Services, effective 1 October, transferred certain of its functions, personnel (principally research and analysis and presentation branches), records, property and funds to the State Department excluding such functions performed within the countries of Germany and Austria. The remainder was transferred to the War Department.

Brigadier General John McGruder, formerly Assistant Director of Office Strategic Services, has been appointed by the Secretary of War as Director, Strategic Services Unit, Office Assistant Secretary of War and as representative of Secretary of War to administer the OSS functions being transferred to the War Department and to the Secretary. General McGruder has been instructed, subject to the authority of, and policies determined by, the Assistant Secretary of War, to continue the program of liquidation of those activities and personnel so transferred which are no longer necessary or desirable, and to preserve as a unit such functions and facilities as are valuable for permanent peacetime purposes, or may be required by theater commanders or occupational authorities to assist them.

Communications for Strategic Services Unit should be transmitted direct to the unit at 25th and E Streets, NW, Washington. Cable communications for the time being will continue as under present OSS practices.

He does not rpt not recall exact report but apparently it was critical of Army activities. General Reinhardt also spoke to Gruenthaler about an OSS report allegedly accusing American officers of intimate relations with Nazi women.

2. Gruenthaler states Clark's first reaction was to order all OSS activity in Austria to cease forthwith but has now agreed to permit us to function provided all reports henceforth channel through G-2 before being given any dissemination.

3. Please immediately investigate matter fully and take whatever action you deem appropriate to prevent repetition and to explain matter to Clark. You may consider it desirable to go to Verona Monday for this purpose unless Clark goes to Salzburg on that day as I understand he may.

4. Also give me all information on incident soonest in event I am called on carpet which may well be on Tuesday. Heigh-ho.



Hungary's agricultural products were sold Germany; geographical position necessitated German orientation, and when inquired about possibility British market and British political interest was informed thru man named Bruce by Halifax that chance for market in England small, and political interest nil because of Hungary's inability of escaping German orbit.

b. Dropped because of Jewish origin, but admitted also Horthy's antagonism and personal nonconfidence.

c. Wessenmayer advised his impending appointment but Horthy claimed Imredy only represented minority party. Admitted Horthy told him plainly of nonconfidence.

d. Entered at Sztojay's request to co-ordinate economy.

e. Forced out by inability to save Weiss Manfred Works and by constant attack of Arrow Crossers. According Chokey Milano his followers were forced out by Horthy. Chokey more trustworthy.

4. Re Remenyi: According to Imredy Government was very heavily indebted to Central Bank by inflating circulation, but kept prices under very strict control.

5. Whereabouts of illegally removed property is known to Temesvary who was entrusted with the removal by Szalasi but he is not in our custody as yet. Hope to get him soon.



American Jewish Conference has proposed to Secretary of War that 10 Jewish special representatives be appointed from representative U S Jewish organizations to assist in handling non-relief aspects of Jewish stateless and non-repatriable persons in U S Zone Germany. 6 Jewish Congress-Near support proposal. In letter of 11 July to Secretary of War, Congressman Celler emphasizes urgency and requests appointment as soon as possible. Understand parallel approach being made by British organizations to Montgomery.

Function of these special representatives would be to consult with and advise military authorities in problems affecting Jews in U S Zone; to assist in clearing up legal and technical difficulties arising in connection with repatriation or resettlement of displaced Jews; and to serve their religious, education and social needs. Special representatives would be paid by Jewish organizations here.

AJC has discussed proposal with UNRRA, which is reported to be favorably disposed but considers decision for military because of non-relief aspects.

Widespread admiration exists for speed of repatriation but considerable concern is felt, based in part on joint distribution committee and chaplains' reports from Germany, that Jewish non-repatriables tend to be neglected because there is no one to safeguard their interests in same way as

1. Interpreted here from urad CC 6261 that contrary to State Dept understanding there was no credit established to Germany for use of marks required for information centers. Please confirm this interpretation.

2. Following letter will be forwarded to Dept of State in reply to State letter reflected in WAR 90008. Have you any comment to offer concerning it?

"Dear Mister Lovett:

Reference is made to your letter of 7 Oct 1948 requesting information with respect to the way in which funds are obtained for the information centers in Germany and the possibility that such funds can be applied to the claims of German scientists and technicians who suffered a loss as a result of their evacuation by the United States Army.

Advice obtained with respect to your inquiry indicates that prior to the currency reform in Germany the financing of an extensive reeducation program, which included the maintenance of information centers, was effected from profits realized from the sale of overt publications. Since the currency reform, it is understood such profits have become negligible and accordingly are not sufficient to continue the support of the information centers.

Then they would probably react very strongly with at least a propaganda attack claiming confirmation of their past charges that western powers were harboring traitors, fascists, etc. for an eventual attack on USSR.

(2) A survey or discussion of recruitment of displaced persons at this time is considered especially inadvisable because of possible harmful effects on Austrian Treaty Commission in London.

(3) Any recruiting program among displaced persons would greatly interfere with the resettlement programs now under the supervision of IRO.

If displaced persons are needed in the Army, it is recommended that no survey or selection be made in Austria, but that displaced persons be recruited in the United States after emigrating thereto as bona-fide emigrants.

1. Subject of payment of claims of German scientists and technicians evacuated by US Army from what is now Soviet zone in Germany, originally raised by EUCOM in TT 9319 of 7 Apr 48, has been discussed at some length with State Dept.
2. State Dept has acknowledged "that in the circumstances of this case there exist both a moral obligation on the part of the US and reasons of expediency to effect compensation to the evacuees".
3. Based upon such acknowledgment Dept of Army requested State Dept concurrence in proposal that an estimated amount sufficient for payment of these claims be included in Dept of Army fiscal year 1950 budget. State Dept in reply stated:

"The Dept understands that a somewhat similar problem with respect to obtaining marks for the support of information centers in Germany has been dealt with by charging such cost temporarily against the Germans, the Germans to receive a credit in ultimate settlement. Before concurring in the proposal to request the Congress to appropriate dollars to pay the claims of the scientists and technicians, the Dept would appreciate further information with respect to the way in which funds are obtained for the information centers and the possibility that a similar solution can be applied to the claims of the scientists and technicians."

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## Y RESUME OF MEETING AT STATE DEPARTMENT 3 NOVEMBER 1945

SUBJECT: Current Questions in the Military Government of Germany.

PARTICIPANTS: State Department (Messrs Clayton, Thorp, Matthews, Hubin, Riddleberger, Kindleberger and deWilde) Office of Military Government (General Clay, Ambassador Murphy).

FACTORY WITH THE U.S. WHICH WOULD HAVE BEEN CENTRAL ADMINISTRATIVE MATERIALLY WAS ESTABLISHED. WAR DEPARTMENT (GENERAL HILLDRING, LT. COLONEL GROSS) WAS PROBABLY TO WORK OUT DETAILS OF THE TREATMENT OF GERMANY AS THE CONTROL COUNCIL

## 1. Internationalization of Ruhr-Rhineland.

NOTE: General Clay requested definition of U.S. views concerning the French proposal to internationalize the Ruhr-Rhineland. General Clay pointed out that in determining the level of the German peacetime economy against which reparations removals are to be measured, it was essential to know whether the Ruhr-Rhineland were to be separated from Germany. Inasmuch as the Berlin Protocol requires that determination of the amount and character of reparations removals must be made by 1 February 1945, it was of the utmost importance that he be given an indication of the views of this Government concerning the Ruhr-Rhineland question.

Mr. Matthews explained that the Secretary of State had invited the French to discuss the matter in Washington and that it was unlikely that the Secretary would desire to pre-judge the U.S. position in advance of hearing the French arguments. General Hilldring urged that Mr. Matthews attempt to obtain an informal indication of Mr. Byrnes' position before General Clay left Washington.

the last. General Clay stated his opinion that the USSR would be willing to support internationalization of the Ruhr-Rhineland provided they participated in the international regime. However, the French proposal did not envisage Soviet representation. Ambassador Murphy believed that the British silently acquiesced in the French proposal.

*Col. (now)* *Ltr. written by S. W. to USSR* (NOTE: On 5 November General Hilldring recommended to the Secretary of War that he present the problem at the meeting of the three Secretaries on Tuesday, 6 November and that Judge Patterson urge the Secretary of State to advise the War Department of his views concerning the French proposal.)

## 2. Creation of Central German Administrative Machinery.

General Clay stated that the French representative on the Control Council had been instructed by his Government to oppose the establishment of central German administrative machinery pending resolution of the French proposal for internationalization of the Ruhr-Rhineland. The USSR believed that the French obstinacy was receiving tacit support from the British and the United States, although General Clay made it clear that the record of United States action in the Control Council did not support Russian suspicions in this regard. However, in response to a direct question by General Clay, Mr. Matthews admitted that State Department had taken no steps to bring pressure to bear upon the French to cooperate with the other members of the Control Council in carrying out the Berlin Protocol with respect to the treatment of Germany as an economic unit.

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General Clay stated that this involved an apportionment in which he could not concur and that he believed the United States Government should make a clear-cut decision whether the Office of Military Government or the United States representative on the Reparations Commission should determine the amount and character of reparations removals.

Mr. Clayton agreed to a reexamination of Mr. Angell's letter of appointment and a conference with General Clay was accordingly arranged for Monday, 5 November 1945.

NOTE: Conference referred to above was held on the afternoon of 5 November. Pursuant to agreement of the State Department representatives at that meeting (Messrs Rubin, Kindelberger, deWilde and Rostow) a revision of Secretary of State's letter to Mr. Angell will be prepared in consultation with representatives of the Civil Affairs Division).

#### 5. Relation of Restitution and Reparations.

General Clay requested clarification of the relative priorities between restitution and reparations in connection with (a) plants declared eligible for reparation delivery and (b) plants which were deemed essential for the German peacetime economy after the completion of reparations removals. As to (a) he cited the example of a French claim for restitution of 1200 machine tools in a plant which had been declared eligible for reparation removals. If the French claim were honored, the reparations value of the plant as an operating unit would be destroyed. As to (b), General Clay pointed out the danger inherent in removing plants on reparation account if plants or equipment which were left in Germany and which were deemed essential for the German peacetime economy were to be removed as restitution items after completion of the reparations program.

General Clay expressed the view that reparations should be given a higher priority than restitution. Otherwise, countries whose capital equipment had been destroyed as a result of scorched earth policy would receive less favorable treatment than countries whose industrial equipment had been taken by the enemy and used by them in furtherance of the war effort.

The State Department agreed to formulate its position on these questions.

#### 6. German External Assets.

Mr. Rubin raised the question whether there would be any objection to American, British and French diplomatic staff proceeding to Berlin to negotiate with neutrals on the acquisition of German external assets title to which had been vested in the External Property Commission under the recently enacted Vesting and Marshalling Decree.

General Clay explained that he desired to discuss the matter with his advisers before committing himself but that his preliminary reactions were (a) that no tripartite operations should take place in Berlin, which was a quadripartite capitol and (b) discussions with the neutrals in Germany should be carried on by the External Property Commission, which was the agency charged by the Control Council to vest and marshal German external assets.

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General Clay stated that Mr. Nixon is being designated as the acting U.S. member of the External Property Commission and that he considered it very important that the American member of the Commission be a person of outstanding ability and stature.

Letter from the Secretary of the Treasury Concerning Treasury Personnel

General Hilldring referred to a letter received by the Secretary of War from Mr. Vinson in which the latter expressed the view that it would be undesirable to assign to Military Government organizations Treasury officials or personnel who would not report directly to the Treasury and would not be subject to direct Treasury instruction and guidance.

Mr. Clayton agreed with General Hilldring that the War Department should advise the Secretary of the Treasury that such a suggestion was considered to be a matter for discussion with the State Department in the light of the President's letter on August 30, 1945 dissolving IPCOG and charging the State Department with the responsibility to consult with civilian departments and agencies on matters of appropriate concern to them arising out of military government policies.

(NOTE: The Secretary of War has accordingly dispatched a reply to the Secretary of the Treasury in conformity with the foregoing discussion).

The Request of Senator Kilgore to Transport German Witnesses

General Hilldring stated that Senator Kilgore had requested the War Department to bring to the United States three officials of I.G. Farben for the purpose of testifying at hearings of the Sub-committee on War Mobilization. It was agreed that it was undesirable to accede to the request and Mr. Matthews undertook to raise the question with the Secretary of State.

(NOTE: On Monday, 5 November, General Hilldring was advised by Mr. Matthews that the Secretary of State agreed that it would be undesirable to bring the three Farben officials to the United States for the purpose requested. A letter was accordingly dispatched to Senator Kilgore by the Office of the Under Secretary of War on 6 November 1945.)

Disposition of German General Staff

An inconclusive discussion was held concerning General Clay's reference to a proposal which had been submitted to the Control Council to remove from Germany members of the German General Staff and their families and to divide them among the USSR, UK, US and France. Mr. Matthews advised that the State Department had given Ambassador Murphy a tentative reply indicating that the United States would be reluctant to participate in the plan. General Clay ex-

SUGGESTED ACTION ON ITALIAN  
PEACE FEELERS

1. General Eisenhower should be instructed to send two Staff Officers, one U.S. and one British, to Lisbon at once to meet General "C".
2. The communication to General "C" should be on the following lines:-
  - a. The unconditional surrender of Italy is accepted on the terms stated in the document handed to him (Armistice Terms for Italy as already agreed. These do not include political, economic or financial terms which will be communicated later.)
  - b. These terms did not visualize the active assistance of Italy in fighting the Germans. The extent to which the terms will be modified in favor of Italy will depend on how far the Italian Government and people do, in fact, aid the United Nations against Germany during the remainder of the war. The United Nations, however, state without reservation that wherever Italian forces or Italians fight Germans, or destroy German property, or hamper German movement, they will be given all possible support by the forces of the United Nations. Meanwhile bombing will be restricted to targets which immediately affect the movements and operations of German forces.
  - c. The cessation of hostilities between the United Nations and Italy will take effect from a date and hour to be notified by General Eisenhower.

(NOTE: General Eisenhower should make this notification a few hours before Allied forces land in Italy in strength.)

- d. Italian Government must undertake to proclaim the Armistice immediately it is announced by General Eisenhower, and to order their forces and people from that hour to collaborate with the Allies and to resist the Germans.

(NOTE. As will be seen from 2 c above, the Italian

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DIRECTIVE ON MILITARY GOVERNMENT OF CONTINENTAL  
ITALY AND SARDINIA

Section I. Political and Miscellaneous

1. Allied military government will be established and will extend over the whole of the area occupied by the forces under your command. Should it be determined not to occupy all Italian territories in your theatre, you will expressly preserve the right to occupy the remainder of such territories at a later date.
2. The Vatican City State will not be occupied nor will military government apply to its domain. The same applies to the Republic of San Marino.
3. Consistent with military necessity, any other Area, City or Province declared by the Italians to be open, undefended or demilitarized, and so recognized, will be permitted to continue in such status. You will make a public announcement to that effect.
4. The military government shall be a military administration which will show every characteristic of an Allied undertaking. Both the American and British flags shall be displayed at headquarters and posts of the military government. The administration shall be identical throughout the whole area of occupation.
5. The military administration shall contain no political agencies or political representatives of either government.
6. Representatives of civilian agencies of either government shall not participate in the initial stages. Their later participation will be subject, as to time and extent, to decision by the Combined Chiefs of Staff on your recommendation.

The main purpose of closing all banks and financial institutions is to safeguard them and to insure in so far as possible that funds and other valuables are not transferred or records destroyed. Proper safeguards will be taken to insure that all currency notes, securities and records are left untouched. Since the longer the banks remain closed the greater disruption will result in finance, trade and industry, steps will be taken to reopen some of the banks as soon as possible. However, no bank is to be reopened without the approval of the Chief Financial Officer (Civil Affairs). During the period of the moratorium and the closing of the banks, an investigation will be made to determine the proportion that total accessible assets bear to liabilities. Even when a bank is reopened only limited withdrawals, as determined by the Chief Financial Officer, will be permitted.

#### Insurance

(81) Insurance companies and insurance systems will be under the supervision of the Financial Division (AMGOT). Subject to a survey by AMGOT, payments on life insurance will be continued. The same will be the case with unemployment and other social insurances.

#### Private Businesses

(82) Private businesses and industries furnishing war material useful to the military (e.g. cement and asphalt plants) will be operated for the benefit of the military and under the supervision of the Property Custodian. Private businesses in which no such interest exists will be permitted to operate subject to applicable military regulations, e.g. opening and closing hours, price fixing, etc.

#### Currency and Rates of Exchange

(83) Directives governing the currency to be used initially and in later phases and the rates of exchange with the dollar and pound will be circulated as soon as the policy is communicated by the Combined Chiefs of Staff to the C.-in-C. Arrangements for supply of the various currencies determined upon will be made by AMGOT in cooperation with the Financial Officers and Paymasters of the task forces.

NOTE: This plan will be later supplemented as necessary.



Subject: Restitution of Looted Securities

On April 23, 1946 a proposed cable was sent over for our comments from the State Department concerning restitution of looted securities. On April 18, 1946 a cable was drafted by Treasury to be sent to Treasury representatives in Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Netherlands, and Denmark, and AmRep, Austria. A question came up concerning whether this entire matter might be handled by one cablegram covering the entire subject. A meeting was held to discuss a proposed cable which State had drafted attempting to amalgamate the two cablegrams. Present at the meeting were Messrs. Jones, Richards, Pollak, Kotlar and Miss Hodel, representing Treasury; and Messrs. Surrey, Fleischer, Robbins, DeWilden, Perkins and Miss McMillan, State.

A general discussion was held concerning restitution of looted securities. The State Department is primarily concerned in getting an inventory of all looted securities. It was decided that ACC should be approached first concerning the form that should be submitted by the various countries indicating what securities were looted. After approval by ACC it would then be submitted to the various countries.

Possible coordination of IARA was discussed inasmuch as they might serve as an agency for the certification of lists from the various IARA countries. It was noted that an international agreement would be needed and IARA might be helpful. It was pointed out that perhaps a special conference may be needed to include all countries, not merely the IARA countries.

It was pointed out that the question of blocking by various occupied countries was being studied by the State Department. It was also pointed out that the problem was present concerning the retransfer abroad of securities which had been looted.

It was apparent that State Department was concerned with the overall problem of looted securities, while the Treasury at the present is primarily interested in getting certain information to aid us in control work in this country. A cable drafted by Treasury focused on (1) securities issued in the United States and (2) securities payable in dollars. It was pointed out that this information is urgently required and should not be delayed pending a complete census of looted securities.

It was agreed that Treasury should send out the cable as originally drafted with a few changes to delete reference to any specific program of restitution and that a general program be added indicating the lines of approach which State will take on the general problem.

A meeting was held this morning with representatives of the State Department concerning the disposition of looted securities. Mr. DeWilde and Mr. Fleischer represented State and Mr. Jones and Mr. Kotlar Treasury.

A proposed cable to OMGUS and USFA was discussed and various changes were suggested. A draft copy of the proposed cable is attached.

The basic policy expressed in the cable is that "looted securities" should not be subject to vesting by the CEPC under Control Council Law No. 5. A distinction was made between securities which were removed without ostensible transfer of title, for the purpose of "safe-keeping" and those which were transferred in other ways. The reason for this distinction is the problem of the securities of the former Wertpapiersammelbank, which will be discussed later. All specifically identifiable securities would be returned to the countries from which they were acquired. With respect to non-identifiable securities it is suggested in the cable that a scheme similar to the gold pot plan might be adopted.

The cable contemplates that the countries which were under German occupation or control prepare a list of securities acquired by the Germans through any means, irrespective of where issued. Similarly the Allied Control Authority (Germany) and Allied Commission (Austria) would prepare inventories of foreign securities uncovered in Germany and Austria. Experts would then compare these lists. This information would be the basis for working out

proposals for the restitution of non-identifiable securities. It was suggested that international agreement would be necessary to provide for distribution of these non-identifiable looted securities. It was pointed out that some of the lists submitted by the various countries would include securities of German or Austrian issue. It was suggested that a method would have to be devised to trace individual transaction in such looted securities in order to obtain possession of such securities for the purpose of restitution.

Mr. DeWilde pointed out that this problem had been pointed up by various cables from USFA requesting return of securities of the former Wertpapiersammelbank. These securities were removed from Austria to Germany prior to the liberation and deposited in the Regensburg branch of the Reichsbank. On May 16, 1946, in a cable from USFA to the War Department, it is stated that these securities were urgently needed in Austria to establish and clarify ownership rights. Distribution to owners was not contemplated. It was considered that these securities were only "accidentally" present in Germany. It was pointed out by DeWilde that these constitute the majority of the securities in Austria (presumably foreign securities). The cable suggests that these securities should be returned to USFA. After securing quadripartite agreement that Law No. 5 is inapplicable to these securities they would be returned to USFA. It was further stated that these securities were not to be distributed to the owners and would be included in the inventory to be taken by the Allied Commission (Austria) as part of the list of securities acquired by the Germans.

SUBJECT Restitution and Reparations

During the past week several proposed cablegrams, prepared by State, have been sent to us for our comments. Our comments on the Report of the Property Disposition Board have also been solicited.

These proposed cablegrams and the Report of the Property Disposition Board all bear on the questions of "external" and "internal" restitution.

Under Military Government Law No. 53, dealing with Foreign Exchange Control, the Army has accumulated in its foreign exchange depository foreign securities, precious stones, jewelry, gold and other valuables, including gold and silver bullion and coins and paper currency. The securities are the subject of one of the proposed cables and the other items are the subject of still another cable.

This morning Mr. Kotlar had a meeting with Mr. Hammendinger of State and these matters were discussed. It was pointed out that the approach adopted by State concerning these foreign exchange assets, with the exception of currency, is that of restoring as external restitutions those items which were looted and the allocation of the remainder as a part of a reparations scheme. The possible use of this pool of foreign exchange for the purpose of settling claims presented by victims of Nazi persecution was not considered. It was indicated that the dichotomy between

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"external" and "internal" restitution does not aid in an analysis of this problem. Many victims of Nazi persecution are now outside of Germany and they would derive no real benefit from being given German marks. Thus the problem of foreign exchange assets is involved in considering questions of "internal" restitution.

Mr. Hemmendinger indicated that the State Department position was that the only source of foreign exchange for the victims of Nazi persecution would be that available under article 8 of the Paris Reparation agreement. The position of the State Department was, therefore, that in considering the disposition of foreign exchange assets held by Military Government it was only a question of "external" restitution and reparations. Mr. Hemmendinger stated that if the Treasury felt strongly that some other disposition might be made of these assets, such as the use for victims of Nazi persecution, one of our "top men" should confer with Mr. DeWilde and others in a general meeting in which the entire problem of the foreign exchange assets would be discussed. He indicated, however, that he thought little good would come of it, as a denial of such other uses of these foreign exchange assets was implicit when the proposed cables were drafted.

Mr. Hemmendinger indicated that the State Department was working on the problem of "internal" restitution and was considering the recommendations of the Property Disposition Board in connection therewith.

It was indicated to him that the use of German courts and German tribunals for the handling of these matters was considered a serious error. He indicated an awareness of the problem, but stated that Clay had taken a position to the contrary. It was also stated that it was felt to be an error to relax Military Government Law 52 as it applied to the Laender and their political subdivisions as recommended in the Property Disposition Board Report. The possibility of marshalling the assets taken under various legislation and using them as a source of awards for the victims of Nazi persecution was brought up and Mr. Hemmendinger indicated that such claims would be charged against the German State anyway so that the turning over of the various properties to the Laender would really make no difference.

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

NOTE ON ACCOUNTS ATTACHED TO THE FIRST DRAFT REPORT

Only the basic accounts essential to a proper understanding of the report are attached. The figures included are provisional and will probably be subject to adjustment in the draft which will be submitted to the Assembly. They should, however, be sufficiently accurate for preliminary consideration of the report.

The Category A accounts include the total charge for German External Assets within the jurisdiction of member Governments, based on present estimates. They also include the total charges for all Swedish Krener.

The Category B accounts are based on the situation as at 31st August plus a figure in respect of equipment not yet allocated, sufficient to bring the total pool up to the previous estimate of £(1938) 190,000,000. When the draft report is submitted to the Assembly it is hoped that it will be possible to include the actual figure for the final programmes.

PART I

I. THE PARIS AGREEMENT ON REPARATION

A. The Inter-Allied Reparation Agency, hereinafter referred to as I.A.R.A., was created by the Final Act of the Paris Conference on Reparation (hereinafter referred to as the Paris Agreement) which was held between 9 November and 21 December 1945. The preamble to this Act states:-

"The Governments of Albania, the United States of America, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Egypt, France, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Greece, India, Luxemburg, Norway, New Zealand, the Netherlands, Czechoslovakia, the Union of South Africa and Yugoslavia, in order to obtain an equitable distribution among themselves of the total assets which, in accordance with the Provisions of this Agreement and the Provisions agreed upon at Potsdam on 1 August 1945 between the Governments of the United States of America, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, are or may be declared to be available as reparation from Germany (hereinafter referred to as German reparation), in order to establish an Inter-Allied Reparation Agency, and to settle an equitable procedure in the restitution of monetary gold. Have agreed as follows:-" (1)

B. Part I of the Paris Agreement deals with the general principles for the distribution of German reparation. Part II deals with the constitution of the Assembly and the Secretariat and with the internal organisation of the Agency. Part III of the Agreement deals with the restitution of monetary gold; this matter is not, however, the responsibility of I.A.R.A. and no reference thereto is made in this report.

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Footnote (1): On 15 March 1948 the Government of Pakistan was admitted to the Agency and was deemed to have been a Government Signatory to the Paris Agreement from the date of the entry into force of the said Agreement.

The entry into force of the Paris Agreement was governed by Part IV Article 1, of the Agreement. This Article states that "As soon as it (the Paris Agreement) has been signed on behalf of Governments collectively entitled to not less than 80 p.100 of the aggregate of shares in Category A of German reparation, it shall come into force among such Signatory Governments." These conditions were satisfied on 23 January 1946 and this date was therefore taken as the date on which I.A.R.A. came into existence.

D. (i) The general functions of the Agency as laid down in the preamble to the Paris Agreement quoted in I A above, are to "obtain an equitable distribution . . . of the total assets which . . . are or may be declared as reparation from Germany".

(ii) The Paris Agreement divides all reparation into certain categories and classes and lays down the percentage share in these categories to which each Signatory Government of I.A.R.A. is entitled. These percentages, hereinafter referred to as the "Paris Agreement percentages", were based, for each Signatory Government, upon the material damage its economy had suffered, the loss of human life incurred and the contribution of that Government to the war effort.

(iii) The categories into which reparation is divided are set out in Article 1 of Part I of the Paris Agreement, as follows:

Category A: all forms of German reparation except those included in Category B.

Category B: industrial and other capital equipment removed from Germany and merchant ships and inland water transport.

(iv) It is laid down in Article 1 D of Part I of the Paris Agreement that no Signatory Government should receive more than its percentage share of each of these categories as a whole.

This Article reads as follows:

"If a Signatory Government receives more than its percentage share of certain types of assets in either Category A or Category B, its receipts of other types of assets in that Category shall be reduced so as to ensure that it shall not receive more than its share in that Category as a whole".

(v) As will later become apparent, some Signatory Governments have received more and some less than their Paris Agreement percentages of reparation. For the sake of simplicity, Signatory Governments who have received more than their Paris Agreement percentage will be referred to in this Report as being "overdrawn" and the amount by which they are overdrawn will be referred to as their "overdraft". Signatory Governments who have received less than the Paris Agreement percentage will be referred to as being "in credit".

## II. GENERAL REMARKS ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PARIS AGREEMENT

A. (i) At the time when the Paris Agreement was drawn up, no estimate had been or could have been prepared of the total amount of reparation expected to be made available. It was known that most Signatory Governments were already in possession of one class of Category A reparation, namely, German External Assets within their jurisdiction, and that I.A.R.A. would have no say in the allocation of these assets. It was also known that certain Governments would be holding more of these assets than their Paris Agreement percentage entitlement to that class of asset. It was however assumed that other reparation assets to be made available would be of such magnitude that they would permit the eventual elimination of any overdrafts which existed at the beginning of the Agency as a result of certain Signatory Governments holding more than their share of German External Assets already within their jurisdiction. This, however, did not prove to be the case. Other assets eventually proved to be so much less than anticipated that certain accounting provisions in the Paris Agreement (described in Part IV of this Report) which were intended to eliminate overdrafts in Category A became largely inoperative. As a result, the accounting charges in respect of the German External Assets, within the jurisdiction of certain Signatory Governments at the time when the Paris Agreement came into force, greatly exceeded those Governments' entitlement to Category A reparation as a whole. In fact, so large were the amounts of these assets within the jurisdiction of certain Governments that they exceeded, and in some cases greatly exceeded, those Governments' entitlements in the combined total of Category A and Category B reparation. In these circumstances it was impossible for I.A.R.A. to allocate reparation in such a manner that all Signatory Governments received their Paris Agreement percentage entitlement in Category A reparation.

(ii) A somewhat similar situation arose in connection with Category B reparation. Although no estimates of the value of Category B reparation to be made available to I.A.R.A. were possible at the time when I.A.R.A. began operations, the approximate number of plants or part plants was known and the earlier allocation programmes were prepared on the assumption that approximately this number would eventually be received. This assumption, however, proved unfounded and the number originally estimated was progressively reduced to a figure greatly less than the original. The first of these reductions did not take place until August 1947 by which time I.A.R.A. had been operating for over a year and a half. During this period

I.A. disposed of German Merchant Shipping and proceeded with the allocation of other Category B reparation to meet the most urgent needs of Signatory Governments. As a result of these allocations, and in particular of the allocation of German Merchant Shipping, overdrafts arose in the Category B reparation accounts of certain Signatory Governments, which, it was assumed, would be gradually eliminated as the balance of Industrial Capital Equipment was allocated. However, when the first reduction in the number of plants and part plants, expected to be made available, was notified to I.A.R.A. in August 1947, it became apparent that the reduced amount of Category B reparation would be insufficient to permit the elimination of certain overdrafts which had arisen as a result of certain Signatory Governments having received in full their entitlements to Merchant Shipping in accordance with special provisions of the Paris Agreement.

(iii) At this point it was recognised that it would be impossible to distribute, according to the Paris Agreement percentage entitlements, the total pool of either Category A or Category B reparation. The Assembly, nevertheless, continued to the best of its ability to give effect to the intention of the Paris Agreement by distributing as equitably as possible the remaining reparation assets in accordance with the information available at the time of each allocation. The measure of agreement in the Assembly of I.A.R.A. as to the manner in which the total pool of reparation has been distributed would appear to support the view that no more equitable distribution would, in the circumstances, have been possible. All allocations by I.A.R.A. are voted by the Assembly, every Signatory Government having the right to go to arbitration when the Assembly does not agree to a claim by it for the allocation of some particular item or items. Throughout the history of the Agency, on only four occasions have Signatory Governments had recourse to arbitration and no vote has ever been cast against an allocation programme, except to reserve a Government's right to initiate arbitration proceedings in connection with some specific item or items.

B. Further assets in the form of German External Assets in Neutral countries are expected to be made available to I.A.R.A. but the dates when they will be made available is not yet known. The estimated amount of these is relatively small and the manner of their distribution can have no material effect on the percentage shares of reparation eventually to be received by the various Signatory Governments. In the circumstances, therefore, the Assembly of I.A.R.A. considers that there is no reason to postpone the submission of this Report until the remaining assets have been made available and accounted for.

III. NATURE AND VALUE OF ASSETS DISTRIBUTED AND ACCOUNTED FOR AS REPARATION

The following types of reparation were received by Signatory Governments:-

Category A

German External Assets within the jurisdiction of Signatory Governments. These assets were valued by the Signatory Governments in the first instance in their own currencies, usually, but not always, at post war values. The total value of these assets, converted to 1938 values, amounted to approximately \$ (1938) ..... (see appendix ....).

U.S.S.R. Reciprocal Deliveries. These deliveries of commodities, raw materials and manufactured goods, were made by the U.S.S.R. in partial exchange for industrial capital equipment received by the U.S.S.R. from the Western Zones of Germany. It was originally anticipated that a series of consignments would be received by I.A.R.A. Only the first of these consignments was in fact made, for a total value of RM. ...., as valued by the Quadripartite Occupation Authorities of Germany on the basis of 1938 prices in Germany.

// German External Assets in Neutral Countries. As a result of various agreements negotiated by the Governments of France, the United Kingdom and the United States, certain neutral countries made over to I.A.R.A. sums in their own currencies representing part of the German assets within their jurisdiction. The amounts received and distributed by I.A.R.A. to date are Ptas..... Esc..... S.Frs..... etc. Further amounts, as set out in Schedule .... are expected to be received.

Attachment of the Saar to the French Economy. The loss to I.A.R.A. of Industrial Capital Equipment which resulted from the economic separation of the Saar from Germany and its attachment to the French economy was valued by the Occupying Powers of Western Germany at \$17,500,000 on the basis of the price level in 1938. This sum was, by resolution of the Assembly, charged to the Category A Reparation Account of France.

Captured Enemy Supplies. These supplies, consisting of civilian goods, were received by certain Signatory Governments from the Liberating Forces on the Liberation of their countries. They were originally valued in terms of the currency of each Signatory Government and have a total value in dollars, at 1948 prices, of approximately \$.....

Category B

Industrial Capital Equipment. Industrial Capital Equipment distributed by I.A.R.A. had a total replacement value, as valued by the Quadripartite Occupation Authorities of Germany, of approximately RM. .... at the 1938 price level, and a residual value, after allowing for depreciation according to the formulae of the Quadripartite Occupation Authorities, of approximately RM. .... (1938).

German Merchant Shipping. In all ..... ships for a total tonnage of ..... were allocated among Signatory Governments. These ships were valued by the Tripartite Merchant Marine Commission. IV. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING FOR GERMAN REPARATION DISTRIBUTED AMONG SIGNATORY GOVERNMENTS

A. It will be seen from the preceding section of this report that the various classes of assets distributed and accounted for as German reparation were originally valued in a variety of different currencies and on differing bases. Thus some assets were valued on the basis of 1938 prices, whilst others were valued on the basis of post-war prices, and some were valued in Reichsmarks, whilst others were valued in the various currencies of the Signatory and other Governments. Since the basis of distribution of the assets among Signatory Governments, as laid down by the Paris Agreement, was that each Government should be entitled to a percentage share of the total value of reparation in each category, it was necessary to convert the various currencies and bases on which the assets were originally valued to one common accounting currency in order to permit the calculation of percentage shares of the total value. No provisions for the conversion of the value of the various reparation assets to a common accounting currency are contained in the Paris Agreement and the necessary procedure had therefore to be decided by the Assembly of I.A.R.A.

B. A summary of the discussions in the Assembly and of the decisions taken is given in appendix ... of this report. For the purpose of studying the accounts and for a proper understanding of the figures quoted in this report it is sufficient to set out here only the basic procedure decided upon. This was to convert all currencies to the common accounting currency and revalue, on the same basis, assets expressed in terms of 1938 values and assets expressed in post-war values. The procedure adopted for these two stages was as follows:-

- (i) The United States dollar was chosen as the common accounting currency and all other currencies converted thereto according to the procedure detailed in appendix ....
- (ii) The dollar equivalent, so obtained, of assets originally valued at post-war values was reduced to terms of 1938 values by using a conversion factor based on the index of wholesale prices in the United States published periodically by the Bureau of Labour Statistics.

C. The attached accounts are therefore expressed in terms of dollars at 1938 values which for the purpose of this Report will be referred to as the \$ (1938). The values shown in the accounts do not therefore represent the present day value of the assets to recipient Governments. They were adopted in order to arrive at the proportion of the total value of reparation assets to be received by and charged to each Signatory Government.

- (iii) Over the distribution to or receipt by Signatory Governments of the assets numbered 1 to 4 totalling approximately \$ (1938) 302,137,000 I.A.R.A. had no control. By far the greater part of these assets is represented by German external assets which were within the jurisdiction of Signatory Governments before I.A.R.A. came into existence and the rest accrued to Signatory Government as a result of action outside I.A.R.A. In many cases the amounts of these assets received by Signatory Governments bear no resemblance to their Paris Agreement percentage

Footnote (1): The Swedish kronor made available by the Government of Sweden were allocated to individual Signatory Governments of I.A.R.A. by the Swedish Government in proportions determined by it and not by I.A.R.A. These proportions differed widely from the Paris Agreement percentages. Assets received from other neutral countries were allocated to the recipient Signatory Governments by I.A.R.A.

1. Reference is made to your XA 101 of 3 April.
2. Over a period of months several stations have indicated that a certain amount of confusion has resulted in their files from the numbering system used by Saint Austria. As a result of this several changes have been made in our numbering and filing system which we hope will result in greater uniformity within our system and will conform to your files and registries.
3. The main office of Saint Austria is in Salzburg, with a sub-office in Vienna. All of the central files and cards are kept in Salzburg. Because of this fact and because of the fact that Saint Austria must approve all reports, the original memos are first dispatched to Salzburg in the raw form and then are mimeographed or typed in the final form and distributed from Salzburg.
4. Previously the following numbering has been given to the various stations in Austria: LSX for Salzburg, LVX for Vienna, LIX for Innsbruck, and LIX for Linz. We also regret that through the time lag in receiving instructions from <sup>washington</sup> LVX (Vienna) should have been LAX. It should also be noted that both the Innsbruck and Linz stations have been closed out, so that there will no longer be any reports issued from these stations.
5. With this background in mind, the following system is originated. As of 10 May 1946 all out-going reports, memos, correspondence, cover sheets, etc., from Saint Austria will bear the numbers LSX (for intelligence or operational material) and LSX A (for administrative material.) The LSX numbers will take up with the last number indicated in our log book. The LSX A numbers will begin with LSX A1 in view of the fact that no previous numbers in this category have been used by Saint Austria. On all local correspondence, either by Salzburg or Vienna, a local numbering system will be used which will in noway conflict with the general system as indicated above.
6. It is anticipated that the new numbering system will work to the satisfaction of all concerned.

1. Attached you will find first copy received by this office of the magazine "New Times". The propaganda magazine printed by the newspaper "Trud" in English is distributed in Austria and Germany. This magazine is also printed in German under the name "Neue Zeit".

S.M.J.W. 2. Reference is made by this office recently to article underlined on page 18 indicating that General Turkul was working for the Americans in the American Zone of Occupation in Germany. Because of this article, Mr. Murphy, American Ambassador to Germany, requested information from General Sibert, G-2, USFET as to the existence of, and employment of, General Turkul by the Americans. Inasmuch as General Sibert was not familiar with SCI/A projects in Austria, he requested further information from Washington in AMZON #933. Thus, Lucky and Flame have spent past three days discussing Cactus and Crown projects with G-2, USFET who are now perfectly satisfied that (a) there is no question of JE penetration of any SCI/A projects and (b) that General Turkul, himself, has never been used by any American intelligence agency, nor employed or given protection by any other American agency in either Germany or Austria.

3. Magazine will be forwarded to you as it is received by this office.

4. Crown project is now being completely revised by Flame and will be carried to Washington and explained by him in the near future.

SUBJECT: Detailed Interrogation Report of Bertram Schulze, Dr., Oberst Lieutenant, Abwehr Officer *Celik*

1. SCHULZE was arrested by 42nd Division CIC on 23 May 1945 and has been held for interrogation in Salzburg since that date. It was necessary to hold the Subject such a long time in order to check his statements against those of various other members of KdM Vienna, and the TURKUL organization.

2. This marks the second time in this war that Subject has been apprehended by the Allies for his activities in connection with the GIS. The first time he was arrested by CIC Persia, interned, and later exchanged by the BIS for a British captain.

3. Since his return from Persia, Subject has not been as active nor as independent as he desired. He experienced a great disappointment when, upon returning from Iran, he found in 1945 an even greater amount of confusion within the higher GIS circles than he previously believed had ever existed.

4. Subject is a decided security risk and should be forwarded to Golling for continued internment.

Note: VAZIRI is the son of the former Chief of Police in Tabriz, Major VAZIRI. The son himself was a former employee of Iran Tour and agent of the Iranian Police. He originally fled from Tabriz, with the approach of the Russians, to Tehran in the guise of a woman with one SULTAN BEG. Later he made himself very useful to both MAYER and SCHULZE. Shortly after MAYER was arrested, VAZIRI fled to Turkey and safely made his way to Berlin where he reported the complete details of the MAYER arrest, their various activities, and the difficulties that they had encountered. SCHULZE believes that in about May-June 1944, VAZIRI was sent back to Turkey by the Abwehr and told to report to von MOYZISCH. SCHULZE was unable to offer any further information on VAZIRI.

Note: SULTAN BEG (see above), a former Azerbaijan Colonel, originating in Baku, was one of SCHULZE's main agents in Northern Iran. SCHULZE originally met SULTAN BEG in Tabriz in May 1941 through one Mr. FRICK. FRICK was a Caucasian born German subject who had been manager of the silo in Tabriz. He was later arrested by the Russians and taken to Russia. SULTAN BEG, who at that time had a very large agent net-work established in Northern Iran and Southern Russia, placed the organization at the disposal of SCHULZE, and continued to produce some remarkable Russian intelligence until driven out by the Russians in August 1941. SULTAN BEG had many times told SCHULZE that all of his agents were drawn from the two local political groups of the MUSAVAT and MELLI MUDAFAI, but had refused to give him any of the names or locations. SCHULZE last saw SULTAN BEG on 23 August 1941 just before his flight to Tehran, but had later heard in Berlin that VAZIRI stated that SULTAN BEG had gone to Turkey in about April 1942. When he arrived in Turkey, he reported to K.O. Leiter and Naval Attaché, Admiral von der MARWITZ. SCHULZE thought that MARWITZ was still in Turkey and that SULTAN BEG was still working for him.

14. SCHULZE remained in Berlin for approximately three weeks making his reports and searching around for a new assignment. He stated that he had several chances to work under various SD units, but continued to look around hoping to be able to find something with the old Abwehr organization. SCHULZE was not at all familiar with the new RSHA organization and many times expressed the feeling that he had already had enough to do with the SD when he had to put up with the arrogance of Franz MAYER in Iran.

15. During the time that SCHULZE was in Berlin he stated that he spent the greater part of his time in air-raid shelters. During one of these sessions he met General TURKUL, the famous White Russian General who was serving on the German General Staff. At that time, SCHULZE knew little of the Russian organization within the Wehrmacht, but had heard that General VLASOV was commanding all of the Russians that had been obtained through the Russian POW camps, and that General TURKUL, who came under him in the chain of command, commanded one Corps of White Russians who had been drawn

from outside of the POW camps. SCHULZE had several talks thereafter with General TURKUL, and decided that he would like to serve in some capacity as intelligence officer under him. Consequently, SCHULZE approached Oberstltnt. OHLETZ and requested that he obtain an assignment for him with TURKUL. OHLETZ was able to obtain this transfer for SCHULZE and on 16 February 1945, SCHULZE traveled to Vienna, to the Headquarters of TURKUL, to take up his new post.

F. Service as Liaison Officer with General TURKUL's Staff

16. SCHULZE arrived in Vienna on 18 or 19 February 1945 and reported to Oberstltnt. WIESER, Leiter of KdM Vienna, who was to arrange SCHULZE's transfer to TURKUL. SCHULZE stated that he had previously known WIESER, first in 1939 when he was Leiter of Ast Breslau, and knew that in 1941 he had been transferred to Ast Kracow. He thought that WIESER then had become chief of Abwehr Gruppe Sud from 1942-44.

17. Upon being transferred to TURKUL's staff, SCHULZE discovered that all was not as had been represented to him either in Berlin or Vienna. TURKUL, although theoretically under VLASOV, was operating practically an autonomous Corps, composed mainly of White Russians and a very few Germans. For the most part, TURKUL's activities consisted of gathering operational intelligence against the Russians for the German High Command and servicing KdM Vienna with information that they required within their area. SCHULZE, on the other hand, was accepted as a liaison officer on TURKUL's staff, but was not allowed to participate in the intelligence operations nor allowed to handle Secret or Top Secret material. His duties consisted mainly of transmitting routine requests from the High Command and KdM Vienna to TURKUL and in turn receiving some of the answers for relay back to the requesting agencies. He found that in the main, he was being used as a messenger and translator because of his knowledge of Russian and occasionally used to straighten out the difficulties between various German and Russian personalities. WIESER, one IRA and KLATT, were the main contacts with General TURKUL, and refused to discuss most of their activities with SCHULZE.

18. SCHULZE stated that TURKUL was in the main an intelligence gathering agency. He was known, however, as Kommandeur des Freikorps d. Streitkraefte der Voelker Russlands, Generalbevollmaechtiger fuer die Donau- und Alpengaue, and Befreiungskomitee der Voelker Russlands. TURKUL, himself, was the top intelligence chief, but the following individuals, that SCHULZE knew of, were on his staff:

BEISE, LONGIN (arrested), BERGLER (arrested), and TIEMANN.

SCHULZE was actually able to furnish little information concerning the operations or personnel of TURKUL and staff. He thought that TURKUL only had two central radio stations; one originally at Oedenburg (Sopron), Hungary, which had moved to Fuschl in March 1945, and then disappeared, and a second in Slovakia near Pressburg which was overrun by the Partisans.

SCHULZE said that by May 1945 he was certain that TURKUL had lost all control of these stations.

19. It should be noted at this point that, although General TURKUL and the large percentage of his White Russian Corps may have been quite idealistic in their fight against Bolshevism, they were being largely misled by the Germans in a final attempt to split the Allies. SCHULZE claimed that in his many discussions with TURKUL, it was stated that the White Russians would fight together with any army against the common enemy of Bolshevism. Thus when the British were fighting against EAM/ELAS in Greece, who it was known were backed by the Bolsheviks, TURKUL would have been glad to have fought along side of the British. The same parallel was drawn in Jugoslavia, although the position of both TITO and MIHAJOVICH as far as the Allies were concerned, was not too clear to them. TURKUL felt that TITO was certainly sponsored by the Bolsheviks and only financed and supplied by the Americans and British as a military expediency. On the other hand, MIHAJOVICH, who was primarily engaged in the fight against Bolshevism, as represented by TITO, was receiving aid both from the Americans and the Germans. Thus, as the Jugoslav and Trieste situations were publicized in the final days of the European War, the OKW made the last effort to split the Allies by attempting to send TURKUL and a mission to MIHAJOVICH, while TURKUL and his staff in turn felt that they were making their last stand against Bolshevism in the European zone and, even though the German War came to a close, would be eventually fighting under American or British command.

#### G. The Flight from Vienna

20. On 31 March 1945, SCHULZE was dispatched by TURKUL to Salzburg to await further orders. He left with three car loads (train) of personal equipment of Russian officers, W/T equipment, foodstuffs, and miscellaneous equipment of the TURKUL staff. (No records). SCHULZE was accompanied by four German soldiers (one named SCHROEDER) from KdM Vienna, Frau LOCHNER and daughter (friends of the soldier SCHROEDER), and a man named HARRY who was being sent by Colonel SEUBERT of KdM Vienna as an agent to Italy.

They all arrived at Salzburg on 17 April 1945, at which time they stored all of the goods other than the W/T equipment which was shipped to Fuschl. SCHULZE stated that he did not know what became of the W/T equipment thereafter. The four soldiers and Frau LOCHNER and daughter proceeded on to Lauterbach.

21. On 18 April 1945, SCHULZE journeyed to St Ulrich to await General TURKUL and staff.

#### H. Meetings with TURKUL and WIESER and Discussion of Jugoslav Mission

22. TURKUL arrived in St Ulrich on 21 April 1945 and had

several short talks with SCHULZE and WIESER. At that time, TURKUL first told SCHULZE that they were going down to Jugoslavia and would be fighting with MIHAJLOVICH. He asked WIESER to give SCHULZE five of his best Jugoslavian agents, or agents who might work well in that area, immediately so that SCHULZE could prepare the group for "Abwehr operations under the TURKUL staff". WIESER approved of the project and suggested that SCHULZE take Lt. LASKE and have him go to the 506 Nachrichten School at Lauterbach and inform the following agents that they were to be transferred to SCHULZE's command: Mustafa Ali BASCHA, Jurij DOMERTSCHIKOW, Johan SENKOVEC, Duchan MARINOVEC, Vera ROLLINEZ. SCHULZE sent LASKE to Lauterbach on 22 April 1945 to inform these agents of the new project.

23. SCHULZE remained in St Ulrich, at the Pillersee Hotel, until 30 April 1945, with the exception of two days (28-29 May) which he spent in Salzburg. He stated that many of the KdF Vienna personnel and various other Abwehr figures were also staying there, but he was unable to give any information as to where they had gone after he left. He did, however, submit the following list of names of those he knew living in the hotel at that time: Oberst WIESER, Oberstltnt. SEUBERT, Paymaster BEISE (Vienn), Major TOMASOVICH (Abt. I KdF Vienna), Mdm Korv. Kap. REDL (Abwehr Gruppe III Suedosten), Lt. LASKE, Lt. VOGT.

24. On 30 April 1945, SCHULZE again had a short discussion with TURKUL, .... and BEISE. At that time, TURKUL told SCHULZE that he was leaving on the following morning for Jugoslavia where he was going to have a conference with MIHAJLOVICH. He further stated that his whole Corps was under both MIHAJLOVICH and some American command. TURKUL informed the group that he had been in contact with the American forces since 21 April 1945, and that they had agreed to his project in Jugoslavia, and would inform him of the details later. SCHULZE said that all in the group believed TURKUL because of the fact that TURKUL had never been known to give false information. At the conclusion of the meeting, TURKUL informed SCHULZE that he must proceed to Lauterbach and prepare his agents for the mission and that when he was needed, transportation would be furnished him to Jugoslavia. SCHULZE stated that he then asked TURKUL whether they would be in Jugoslavia for any length of time, inasmuch as he would like to make arrangements to bring his wife down there if possible. TURKUL replied that they would probably be there for many months and that he would make every effort to have all of their wives join them.

#### I. Trip to Lauterbach and Subsecuent Capture

25. On 1 May 1945 SCHULZE traveled to Lauterbach and moved into a room in town with LASKE. He remained there until 2 May and then returned on 3 May to St. Ulrich for

provisions. After returning to Lauterbach on 4 May, SCHULZE moved with LASKE to the Muenchner Huette on the Halosangen Alm. Here SCHULZE found Lt. VOGT (new recruit in KdM Vienna), Gefr. KLHRMANN (W/T operator of KdM Vienna), and Gefr. MEIER (W/T operator of KdM Vienna), whom LASKE had brought from the Lauterbach school along with the five agents previously mentioned in para. 22. In an adjoining house, SCHULZE also found Franz HORN (W/T operator of KdM Vienna) and one Frl. Kathe HOCLAS (secretary at KdM Vienna) whom he later persuaded to join the mission. This group remained on the Muenchner Heutte, except for occasional foraging expeditions, until 10 May 1945.

26. On 10-11 May, the Americans entered Kirchberg and SCHULZE immediately went down into the village and spoke with an American Major BEECHAM of Military Government. SCHULZE told BEECHAM that he and his group were part of General TURKUL's army and that they were destined to go soon to Jugoslavia under American command to fight with MIHAILOVICH. SCHULZE further related that he and his group were part of the German Abwehr organization and gave BEECHAM a complete list of the members living at the Huette. SCHULZE then requested that the Major provide him and his group with suitable passes so that they could move in and out of the town while obtaining provisions. BEECHAM refused to give them the passes, but told SCHULZE that inasmuch as he had a list of the people in the Huette he would allow SCHULZE to write his own passes and that if and when the MPs apprehended any of them he would know who they were. Consequently, SCHULZE wrote out the passes indicated in CIC report.

27. On 20 May 1945, after receiving no further word from TURKUL concerning their move to Jugoslavia, SCHULZE sent LASKE, BASCHA, and SENKOVEC to Rauris and Leogang, where he had last heard that BEISE and perhaps TURKUL were located, in an attempt to get a final answer. LASKE was also instructed at that time to ask TURKUL or a member of his staff for more formal passes than they already possessed so that they would have a greater freedom of movement. SCHULZE also sent to TURKUL at that time requests that the wives of SCHULZE, LASKE, and the fiancee of VOGT be allowed to come down from Germany to join the group. These requests were later found on LASKE when he was arrested.

28. On 23 May 1945, SCHULZE and the remaining group at the Huette were arrested. They were brought to Kitzbuhl for questioning and then forwarded to Salzburg on 8 June 1945. LASKE, BASCHA and SENKOVEC were arrested returning from Rauris, and later forwarded to Salzburg.

J. Interrogator's Comments

29. It was necessary first to obtain the results of the WIESER, SEUBERT and TURKUL interrogations in order to check the most naive statements Subject made concerning his activities with KdM Vienna and his plans for future work with General TURKUL's army in Jugoslavia. Although SCHULZE is given to exaggeration of his work and the over estimation of the importance of same, it is believed that in his idealistic manner he is telling what he feels to be the truth.

Only immediately available age group information on male United Nations displaced persons is of the 16 to 50 year old age groups of non-Jewish United Nations displaced persons of whom there are 11,065, both single and married. The Jewish displaced persons represent a continually changing group on which no age group data has been obtained. However, arbitrary estimates based on the United Nations displaced persons figure above are as follows:

A. Estimated number of United Nations displaced persons males 18 to 34 years of age, single and married: Estonian 60, Latvian 150, Lithuanian 125, Polish 800, Ukrainian 1350, Russian 1000, Yugoslav 1000, stateless 300, Jewish 6000, others 600. Total 11,385.

B. Estimated number of United Nations displaced persons males 18 to 34 years, physically qualified for United States Army: Estonian 40, Latvian 100, Lithuanian 80, Polish 50, Ukrainian 200, Russian 700, Yugoslav 700, stateless 200, Jewish 4,000, others 400. Total 7,700.

C. Estimated number of males 18 to 34 years, physically qualified for United States Army and politically reliable: Estonian 30, Latvian 95, Lithuanian 77, Polish 500, Ukrainian 800, Russian 600, Yugoslav 600, stateless 180, Jewish 3,500.

D. Estimated number of males 18 to 34 years, physically qualified for United States Army and willing to serve in Army: Estonians 35, Latvians 92, Lithuanians 73, Polish 500, Ukrainians 800, Russian 600, Yugoslav 600, stateless 100, Jewish 1,000, others 200. Total 4,000.

E. Estimated number of males 18-34, physically qualified for United States Army, politically reliable and willing to serve in the Army: Estonians 30, Latvian 90, Lithuanian 70, Polish 470, Ukrainians 750, Russian 550, Yugoslav 550, stateless 80, Jewish 900, others 160. Total 3650.

It is emphasized that the above figures are estimates only and that no reliable figures are available to make a more precise report. In addition, it is desired to point out that a screening check to ascertain political reliability of those United Nations displaced persons physically qualified and willing to serve in the Army would take over SIX months to complete.

Further, while a survey to determine the facts desired can be made if directed, I strongly recommend against it and against integration of United Nations displaced person into the United States Army while these displaced persons remain in Austria for the following reasons:

It has become evident, as a result of our struggles with the fiscal year 48 budget, that our slender resources will not fully meet estimated requirements during the coming year. I have personally discussed with a few key members in the Senate and House our occupational needs for personnel and for the provision of at least a minimum food level in the occupied territories.

We must support the occupation mission regardless of what cuts may have to be made in respect to other activities. However, it appears that the Congress is determined to cut drastically the amounts estimated for civil relief in occupied territories. The War Department estimate for this item was cut by the Bureau of the Budget, and the apparent Congressional intention is to further reduce the figure by 50 percent. The implications of such a cut are obvious. We have tried diligently to refute any thought that aid to occupied countries can be discontinued or even be materially decreased at this time.

The Senate and House members were particularly critical of the following subject: (A) The employment of an unreasonably large number of allegedly inefficient civilians who are

accomplishing little or nothing of value to the Government. (B) A seeming unnecessarily large number of officers and civilians assigned to all headquarters. (C) Poor administrative practices throughout the Armed Forces which result in direct and indirect wastage of money and effort.

Original estimates submitted by the War Department were drastically reduced by the Bureau of the Budget, and it appears probable that additional substantial cuts will be made by the Congress. Even without such additional reductions, we will be forced to exercise rigid economy in order to maintain minimum standards in occupied territories. I have assured the Senators and Congressmen to whom I have talked that our commanders, particularly in occupied territories, give this matter their constant attention. However, they insist that sufficient emphasis has not been given to eliminating the useless and inefficient. One Senator stated that the major criticisms were not directed against military personnel but rather against the large number of civilians who, unable to secure profitable employment at home, hurried overseas after the close of the war to be supported at Government expense. Some exceptions were admitted.

Our plans with respect to the effect of the proposed cuts in the zone of interior call for cutting in half the Air Forces planned combat strength. It is contemplated that in divisions the equivalent of only 2-1/3 will be retained in Ground Forces in the United States. These forces are and will be almost entirely diverted to the accomplishment of essential administrative tasks in the zone of interior, primarily in support of occupation. We will have overseas some 450,000 to 490,000 troops after 30 June. Support of these troops by service, training and transportation elements, particularly in view of the rapid turnover in foreign assignments, present a very large requirement.

A personal message to me embodying your views, prepared with Clay's assistance, and in a form that could be used in the presentation of our position to the Congress, would be helpful. The message, if you so desire, could be sent in the clear. I have taken a firm stand supporting your estimates for military personnel as being low to the point of danger and

that any further significant reduction, particularly in Ground Forces, must be made only as a last resort. I would like your statement to cover (A) An analysis in broad terms of your civilian employee problems; (B) An outline of your efforts to insure efficient use of civilians and elimination of the unfit; (C) Future prospects for lowering costs of occupation; and (D) Your views on the importance of the funds which you have requested for civilian relief in your territory. This last figure is, of course, a primary concern of Assistant Secretary Petersen who is sending Clay and you a message elaborating on this item. I feel, however, that due to the disastrous effects which open defiance and unrest would have upon your occupational responsibilities, this matter is definitely included in the military problem.

I am sure you will realize the grave implications of the matters covered in this message and the importance of presenting to the Congress the implications of contemplated budget reductions, as well as the necessity for insuring that our skirts are clean and that we have exerted every effort in our operations towards securing efficiency and economy.

Reurad WA 90872 will declassify discharge of displaced persons being used as guards as requested. My comments which follow are interim and hurried due to my departing tomorrow for London. I have not had opportunity to see WA 90872 and to discuss proposal with Huebner. A written report will be made when I have had this opportunity.

Initially my reaction depends somewhat on just what Poles and Polish guards would be used and to how they would be integrated in the Army. I am convinced that German and American soldiers over here would not accept without substantial loss of morale such persons as a carry of the same. If these guards were arranged in separate units complete in themselves such an arrangement would be accepted by the American soldiers. However, I doubt very much if these units would make satisfactory occupation troops. The hatred which exists between the displaced person and the German has increased to anything due to the special conditions under which these displaced persons are being cared for in Germany. We have been criticised materially because our own soldiers have sometimes failed to contribute to our longer term objectives in Germany. We may be sure that this criticism would increase greatly if we created units of Poles and Polish guards. Our experience to date with the latter has not been so highly favorable and it would be virtually impossible to keep them out of the black market and many other activities which would follow their presence in Germany increasingly disastrous to the German people and to the accomplishment of our long range object. Yer.



If these East and Polish guards are to be placed in units for service elsewhere, there might be real merit. They will always present a special problem in discipline and particularly in their relations with the people in the areas in which they are used. Of course, a small number of Balts could be assimilated more readily than any others. The only promising solution would be their acceptance for service at home until they have earned citizenship and can then be used elsewhere.

Documentary evidence in the form of correspondence between KPD District Headquarters Weser-Ems (Bremen) and Land Headquarters Hannover has been obtained indicating that at the direction of the SED-Zentralkomitee, Berlin, the following individuals have been designated by Bezirksleitung Weser-Ems as Cominform representatives: Reinhold Popal, Willi Meyer-Buer, Willi Brandt and Rudolph Rafeth, all of whom are important KPD personages in the Bremen area. Written oaths of allegiance were rendered by these men to the Zentralkomitee. Moreover, Bezirksleitung Weser-Ems is secretly planning to furnish these agents with radio apparatus (B-2). This is the first proof of Cominform activity in western Germany. The likelihood of such activity is confirmed by a report by Director of Intelligence, USE (special biweekly report number 51, TOP SECRET) that the organizational planning department of the Cominform contained a subdepartment for Germany. No confirming information from other areas of Germany has been received. Investigation to uncover aims and extent of Cominform in western Germany continues.



With respect to the question of British recruitment of German scientists from both zones for employment in the Low Countries and Scandinavia without joint clearance, the Department does not feel that the issue can be taken up with the British on the basis of the meager information furnished to the Department to date. For the information of the Political Adviser, the entire problem of the recruitment of German scientists and technicians for countries other than the United States and the United Kingdom is at present under discussion by SWNCC, and it is anticipated that a combined United States-British policy involving bi-partite clearance will be established in the near future.

Meanwhile, however, should specific cases arise which indicate unilateral action on the part of the British, these should be brought to the attention of the Department with complete substantiating information.

Department will advise concerning progress of SWNCC discussion.

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

gesture towards third powers by facilitating clearances for those of the 1,500 listed scientists and technicians who would qualify and be available since there is a presumption of a moral responsibility by the United States for their present unsatisfactory situation.

It is believed desirable at least at the start that formal government requests for individuals selected by name should be made by interested government to Washington rather than here because it is more binding on the third power. Later, if procedures operate satisfactorily, requests could be submitted here for convenience. Agreements might also include that individuals could be returned to Germany for cause.



United States Chiefs of Staff have agreed to a British proposal relative to revision of list of German nuclear physicists who should be subject to special controls. As to establishment of special covert joint United States-British intelligence security surveillance, British Chiefs of Staff are being advised that United States Chiefs of Staff consider it preferable that special controls or covert surveillance be on unilateral equal basis. Within the United States Zone of Germany provisions of last Paragraph of W&R 87915 of 8 October 1947 will continue to apply to any of the scientists on the list forwarded to you by Joint Intelligence Objectives Agency letter 3472 of 15 October 1947. Revision of this list being forwarded by letter.

In addition to whatever measures you may take to fulfill the requirements of MAR 87915, it is desired that, for scientists in the fields of atomic energy who are on the revised list:

8. You institute such special surveillance as is within your means for the purpose of obtaining information of positive foreign intelligence value.

b. Upon request from the Commander in Chief British Zone, you collaborate in the exchange of information as to movements of listed individuals between the United States and British Zones or information of a positive foreign intelligence value relating to them.



Current denial policy in Germany is amended to apply only to those persons who are now on the Joint Intelligence Objectives Agency Lists and to those who may subsequently be added thereto, either by amendment to the objective list or by notice to the theater of allocation to the United States or United Kingdom. With reference to abandonment of the denial program upon termination of the PAPERCLIP project, no decision can be reached until the conditions at that time are known. Important considerations will be:

- a. progress of peace negotiations,
- b. conditions in Germany,
- c. U. S. relations with other nations,
- d. number and categories of scientists remaining in Germany.

the Joint Chiefs of Staff be initially advised as to the location and employment of the specialists in the second revised JICOA objective list and informed of any subsequent changes in location and employment.

Included in the above list of specialists are some 15 known cases of individuals in Germany who fall within such fields of denial as Nuclear Physics, Biological Warfare, Chemical Warfare, Guided Missiles and Electronics, whose employment in the United States under PAPERCLIP has for various reasons been impracticable. Of these cases, 12 are believed to be in the British Zone. As to them, no immediate problem arises and no action is necessary now. The remaining 3 cases are believed to be in the U. S. zone. Efforts are being made to find a practicable means for employing these 15 cases in the United States or the United Kingdom. Until such time as final disposition can be made either in Germany, the United States, or the United Kingdom, it is essential in the interest of our national security that you take such measures as may be necessary to deny to nations other than the U. S. or U. K. both these and such few other cases as may be added. You will be furnished a list of these specific individuals whom you are to continue to so deny.

The U.S. Military have a continuing interest in the Specialists listed in the JIOA Objective List (Revision II) and amendments thereto and desire to be consulted in these cases and in the cases of those specialists who fall within the categories set forth in WAR 824.33, referred to above. Reference URTEL 901, April 17, in which you state that USPOLAD and OMGSUS are unclear as to (a) the exact dividing line between the type of German technicians desired by the Brazilian Government, for example, and top flight German scientists or industrial technicians in war-related fields who remain subject to exhaustive individual investigation; and (b), the exact procedure required in the processing of such individuals.

In reply to the first question, your attention is directed to the definitions or categories of scientists and technicians set forth in War 82433 of March 28, 1946 and included as Appendix B in the SANACC paper forwarded under cover of Instruction No. 7058 of November 24, 1947. These definitions are to be used as standards for guidance in determining the dividing line between top flight specialists and ordinary technicians.

With reference to the aforementioned SANACC policy paper, the Department has just been advised that the British Chiefs of Staff have not accepted it and that it is entirely possible that the Joint Chiefs of Staffs may have to proceed unilaterally on the matter if agreement is not reached within a reasonable length of time.

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

Reurred March WX-98208 State has urged prompt conclusion of agreement to allow 59 German technicians to emigrate to Brazil. Military governor has decided in view of commitments to allow this group of 59 as cleared to leave Germany. He has emphasized that this is a special favor and not to be considered as establishing a precedent. Approximately 10 of group have positive NSDAP records and cannot be processed in time for inclusion in 1 May shipment. Reference Para 3 of subject radio, following are replies to your questions.

List of 80 submitted by Brazilian Military Mission referred to in our March CC3587 is actually a list of 59 and is same as list submitted by Brazilian Embassy to State Department in Washington. None of this list is included among 1500 evacuee scientists and technicians mentioned ourad December CC2705. In view of time element and fact that 1500 evacuee scientists are in general of a higher technical and specialized category than the group desired by Brazilians, it was not considered advisable in this instance to attempt substitution. However, military governor in his note approving the group of 59 has told Brazilian Military Mission that "from time to time, however, this Headquarters is informed of various individual Germans with rather high technical qualifications and safe security records who appear to be clearly surplus so far as the needs of the bizonal economy are concerned, but who might be of great value in such new industrial projects as those underway in Brazil. 
