

BIOGRAPHY ON GREGG C. SYLVESTER, MD

Gregg C. Sylvester is the Cabinet Secretary of Delaware Health and Social Services, the largest state agency in Delaware. He assumed this position in January 1998 and is responsible for providing leadership and direction to a department that has 5,000 employees and an operating budget of \$900 million.

In September 1996, Dr. Sylvester became the director of Public Health, and his leadership was pivotal to the successful implementation of major health initiatives for the Governor of Delaware. When the Carper Administration expressed its concern about Delaware's high infant mortality rate, Dr. Sylvester worked with a number of public and private stakeholders to recommend the development of a perinatal board to focus on issues related to infant mortality in our State. Governor Carper accepted the recommendation, and the Delaware Perinatal Board was established in 1995.

Under the Governor's direction, Dr. Sylvester has also provided his leadership and expertise to other health initiatives, such as the Home Visiting Program for First Time Parents. Initiated in 1995, this program has already served over 5,000 families and has received national recognition for excellence in multicultural health.

The school-based health center initiative is another demonstration of successful collaboration between government and local communities. Dr. Sylvester spearheaded this initiative. The goal of these centers is to promote health and prevent disease among adolescent. Ninety percent of Delaware high schools have health centers and there have been over 36,000 student contact with school based health center staff.

Dr. Sylvester has made the reduction of Delaware's teen pregnancy rates a top priority for his Department. A strong partnership has been established with the Alliance for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention. Through education and awareness campaigns, teen focus groups and parent involvement, Dr. Sylvester hopes Delaware will reduce its teen pregnancy rates.

Dr. Sylvester obtained his medical degree from Albany Medical College in 1984 and a Masters of Public Health from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in 1989.

Gregg C. Sylvester is the Cabinet Secretary of Delaware Health and Social Services, the largest state agency in Delaware. After five years of state service, he assumed his current position in January 1998 and is responsible for providing leadership and direction to a department that has 5,000 employees and an operating budget of nearly a billion dollars.

Under the Governor's direction, Dr. Sylvester has also provided leadership and expertise on numerous health initiatives, such as infant mortality reduction; the Home Visiting Program for First Time Parents; statewide school-based health center programs and teen pregnancy prevention.

Dr. Sylvester has led the Department in taking steps to rewrite the state regulations on the delivery of care by Managed Care Organizations in Delaware. He has also been instrumental in the formation of the Delaware Health Information Network. This Network assures the appropriate information is collected in order to assess quality and to monitor health outcomes.

Finally, Dr. Sylvester is leading a state effort to implement managed care for persons in need of long term care. This initiative is aimed at reducing health care costs and providing high quality services.

Dr. Sylvester obtained his medical degree from Albany Medical College in 1984 and a Masters of Public Health from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in 1989. He is a board-certified pediatrician and is board eligible in Preventive Medicine.

Sheila Leatherman

Ms. Leatherman has an extensive background in health care management including public and private sector experience in hospitals, long term care, managed care and public health. She currently functions both within the private health sector as an executive manager and in the public sector performing academic research and policy analysis. Her research and publications have been primarily in the fields of health care quality measurement, performance analysis of integrated delivery systems, and managed care policy.

As Executive Vice President of United HealthCare Corporation (the largest managed care company in the U.S.) she advises on key strategic functions of the corporation principally in the areas of health policy, issues management, government affairs, informatics, international strategy and health services research. Sheila Leatherman founded the Center for Health Care Policy and Evaluation of United HealthCare Corporation. Since January 1989, the Center has conducted research and evaluation on the performance of health care delivery systems in the areas of quality, access, cost and consumer perceptions of health care. Research collaborations exist with universities, government agencies and research institutes including Centers for Disease Control, U.S. Agency for Health Care Policy and Research, Federal Food and Drug Agency, Harvard Medical School, University of Pennsylvania, Rand Corporation, and the Department of Defense.

In her academic and research roles, Ms. Leatherman was appointed a Senior Fellow at the Institute of Health Services Research of the School of Public Health at the University of Minnesota in 1994. In 1997, she received an appointment at the University of Cambridge (England) as Senior Associate at The Judge Institute of Management Studies. In October 1997, Ms. Leatherman accepted an invitation from The Nuffield Trust, the leading health care foundation in the United Kingdom, to conduct a year long evaluation regarding quality management in the National Health Service (NHS) for which the report will be published and presented November 1998. In December 1997, she was elected as a Distinguished Associate Member of Darwin College (graduate school) of University of Cambridge.

In March of 1997 she was appointed by President Clinton to the National Advisory Commission on Consumer Protection and Quality in Health Care to study changes in health care in the United States and recommend policy options to the President and Executive Branch. The Advisory Commission delivered a final report to President Clinton in March 1998. Ms. Leatherman chaired the sub-committee recommending a quality measurement strategy for the United States.

Ms. Leatherman is active in numerous organizations including: Board of the American Association of Health Services Research, Board of the Association of American Health Plans, the Board for Health Care Services of the Institute of Medicine, National Academy of Sciences, and the Board of The Johns Hopkins University Institute of Bioethics.

She has worked internationally through commissioned consultancies or lectureships in Bulgaria, France, Czech Republic, England, Poland, Puerto Rico, Romania, Russia, Scotland and Slovakia.

Milagros Batista is an immigrant from the Dominican Republic. She was born in the northern coastal city of Puerto Plata. In 1968 Ms Batista and her brothers and sisters left their native country for New York City to join their mother and father after five long years of separation. She is the fourth of eight children. She is married and has a 17 year old daughter and a 10 year old son.

Don Jose Batista, the father, was a rebel and an adventurer. He was a peasant whose family lived of the land for hundreds of years. Don Jose was the only member of his entire family to ever leave the family farm, breaking a very strong family tradition of attachment to the land. When he moved to the city from the countryside he became a merchant marine and traveled extensively throughout the world. Traveling often to New York City, he made it his home. Dona Candida Batista, the mother, was also raised close to the land. She has been working since she was 12 years old when she began helping her mother in the fields. As a child she developed above all a very strong work ethic. She is the family's source of strength.

Milagros attended elementary school in her native town of Puerto Plata. From the eight grade through high school she was a product of New York City public schools. Milagros was the first in her family to receive a college education. She holds a Bachelor degree from Brooklyn College and a masters degree in Social Work from Hunter College School of Social Work of the City University of New York.

Milagros has been an active participant in the professional work force since graduation from Brooklyn College in 1979. She has dedicated her professional career to providing services to children and families in need. She began working with youth, children and families in 1979 at the Door, a national model program for youth. She then developed expertise in the work with homeless families, one of the most challenging populations in the field. As a member of the Crisis Intervention Program in New York City, she played a key role in the shut down operations of the most infamous city operated shelters such as the Prince George and the Brooklyn Arms.

In 1988 she joined the development team of the largest Dominican community based organization in the United States, Alianza Dominicana, Inc. While at Alianza Milagros was responsible for the development of several child welfare initiatives. In response to the "crack" epidemic of the mid-80's Milagros founded an intensive family support and drug rehabilitation program for women with children in the Washington Heights community in northern Manhattan. Milagros then joined the development team of Best Beginnings, an innovative project to promote healthy children and families. Based on the Healthy Family America model, the project draws on a collaborative relationship between three major community partners: the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, and Alianza Dominicana, Inc. At Best Beginnings Milagros has pioneered a new method for working with families in the home setting utilizing a holistic approach to care.

Milagros is particularly gifted in techniques for involving the community in resolving its problems. She is the founder of the Washington Heights chapter of the Mothers Against Violence (MAV) Coalition and CO-founder and past President of the Citywide MAV coalition. Milagros is also active in the struggle for women's rights and is involved in several women organizations.

Julie Ginn Moretz, a native of Millen, Ga., is a parent consultant with the Medical College of Georgia Children's Medical Center. Julie serves as the chairman of the Family Advisory Council for the MCG Children's Medical Center and has participated in the design of the \$53 million, 220,000 square-foot new children's hospital in Augusta. Her keen sense of family-centered care principles coupled with first-hand experience has played a significant role in the development and implementation of appropriate policies and comprehensive programs that strengthen family direction. She was instrumental in developing the Children's Advisory Council and oversees their activities.

Although active in many volunteer organizations, Julie devotes a major portion of her time to the MCG Children's Heart Program Volunteer Council at the Medical College of Georgia—a council that she founded three years ago which consists of parents and friends of children with heart disease. The efforts of these volunteers have been recognized nationally, most recently receiving an award from the American Hospital Association. This group has raised more than \$180,000 to fund projects for children with heart disease.

Julie's youngest son, Daniel, was born with complex heart disease (consisting of three major heart defects) and has undergone 10 heart surgeries and neurosurgery for a combined total of 67 hours and 15 minutes. He just recently had his third pacemaker implanted. Despite the odds given him and the challenges that Daniel faces after two strokes, he has learned to walk through sheer determination and now uses his wheelchair occasionally. Through the efforts of early intervention programs, physical and occupational therapies, Daniel is in a regular first grade class.

Julie was recently recognized for her volunteer efforts and received the Golden Rule Award from J.C. Penney and the United Way. She is especially proud of being named the "Most Exceptional Mother of the Year" by the Augusta Chronicle several years ago. She is interested in the legislative process and has become an advocate for children with special needs, having recently testified before the Georgia legislative committee on Medicaid.

Julie received a B. S. in Public Relations from Georgia Southern University. Prior to becoming involved with the medical community, she was an assistant to then Georgia Head Football Coach Vince Dooley. Despite her volunteer activities and with an understanding boss, Julie is also the Business Manager for a private physician's clinic.

She and her husband, David, have three children — Lee-12, Morgan-10, and Daniel-7 and they live in Augusta.

IRWIN REDLENER, M.D., F.A.A.P.

Dr. Redlener is President and co-founder of The Children's Health Fund, a philanthropic initiative created to develop and support health care programs for medically underserved children. At Montefiore Medical Center he is Vice President for the Children's Medical Center, Director of the Child Health Network and Director of Community Pediatrics. He is also Professor of Pediatrics at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Lecturer in Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School.

The nationally acclaimed New York Children's Health Project, the country's largest health care program for homeless children, was developed in 1987 by Dr. Redlener. It is the model for a number of innovative health care projects in The Children's Health Fund's program network for disadvantaged child populations in urban and rural communities across the country.

In his role as pediatrician-child advocate, Dr. Redlener has published, spoken and testified widely on the subjects of health care for homeless and indigent children, child abuse and neglect and national health policy.

Dr. Redlener currently serves as co-chairman of the Healthy Start Advisory Group for America's Promise: The Alliance for Youth. He recently completed a two year term as Chairman of the National Advisory Council on the National Health Service Corps. In 1993 Dr. Redlener was Vice Chairman of the Health Professional Review Group for the White House Task Force on National Health Care Reform.

Dr. Redlener has served as a physician special consultant to the White House, as well as Expert Consultant to Assistant Secretary for Health, Department of Health and Human Services. Dr. Redlener currently leads *Kids First, Kids Now!*, a national initiative proposing comprehensive health reform for children.

From 1986-1987 he was Director of Grants and Medical Director of USA for Africa and Hands Across America. Dr. Redlener practiced general pediatrics and directed a special care nursery for seven years. Previous experience also includes development and direction of a pediatric intensive care unit as a member of the faculty of the University of Miami School of Medicine. He founded and directed a regional program in Florida for the management and prevention of child abuse and neglect.

In his various professional capacities Dr. Redlener has traveled in Europe, the Soviet Union and Central America. He has assisted relief efforts in Honduras, Guatemala, and Ethiopia. From 1971-73 he directed a rural, VISTA-run health center in East Arkansas.

Dr. Redlener received his M.D. from the University of Miami School of Medicine and pediatric training at Babies Hospital of the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York City, the University of Colorado Medical Center and the University of Miami-Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami.

Dr. Redlener and his wife Karen, Director of the New York Children's Health Project, have four children.

Ricki Robinson, M.D., M.P.H. is co-director of the Descanso Medical Center for Development and Learning in La Canada, California. She is a Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Southern California School of Medicine and Senior Attending Physician at Childrens Hospital Los Angeles. She has been in private pediatric practice for over twenty years at HMF/Descanso Pediatrics in La Canada.

Dr. Robinson received her M.D. degree in 1973 from the University of Southern California. The tri-level (state/city-county/neighborhood) initiative seeks to redefine mental health, engage all factors which impact the well being of children and families while magnifying the voice of parents and other recipients in the design, implementation, evaluation and reform of services.

Among other accomplishments, the organization has pioneered a 60-hour parent-focused training program - which prepares and certifies parents to participate as providers in the neighborhood-based system of care. People In Partnership has negotiated contracts with the three behavioral health managed care organizations who will serve the Harris County Medicaid population. Within the People In Partnership provider network - which has grown to over 40 members - parents work along side traditional clinical service providers within the community to provide a family-based array including prevention, intervention wrap-around support and treatment.

Sheila Savannah has a masters degree in Behavioral Sciences from the University of Houston and is seeking National Art Therapy certification. She has over 15 years experience in the design and implementation of child and family-focused programming in the areas of self-esteem, wellness and mental health. She has extensive experience in the analysis of public sector health programs, specializing in long term care and chronic disease management at the federal and state levels. As Senior Clinical Investigator at the National Institute on Aging, she implemented clinical research protocols for the study of patients with Alzheimer's disease and geriatric hypertension. Her current research interests include issues related to the inclusion of elderly subjects in clinical trials, and new models of geriatric care. She earned her M.D. degree from Harvard Medical School in 1985 and a Master of Science degree in Health Policy from the Harvard School of Public Health in 1976. Dr. Salerno also holds a Certificate of Added Qualifications in Geriatric Medicine.

 - ◆ An exciting new **educational CD-ROM**, *Alzheimer's Caregiving Strategies*, offers day-to-day management advice for family members caring for individuals with Alzheimer's disease. This interactive, multimedia program includes a simple, practical tool ("the toast test") to assess the relative severity, or stage, of dementia, and presents stage-specific strategies for dementia care. The project was a collaborative effort of VA's Employee Education System, the GRECC at Minneapolis VA Medical Center, and VA's Geriatrics and Extended Care Strategic Healthcare Group, with the Department of Family Practice and Community Health at University of Minnesota Medical School. **BIOGRAPHY

GREGG C. SYLVESTER, MD**

Gregg C. Sylvester is the Cabinet Secretary of Delaware Health and Social Services, the largest state agency in Delaware. He assumed this position in January 1998 and is responsible for providing leadership and direction to a department that has 5,000 employees and an operating budget of \$900 million.

In September 1996, Dr. Sylvester became the director of Public Health, and his leadership was pivotal to the successful implementation of major health initiatives for the Governor of Delaware. When the Carper Administration expressed its concern about Delaware's high infant mortality rate, Dr. Sylvester worked with a number of public and private stakeholders to recommend the development of a perinatal board to focus on issues related to infant mortality in our State. Governor Carper accepted the recommendation, and the Delaware Perinatal Board was established in 1995.

Under the Governor's direction, Dr. Sylvester has also provided his leadership and expertise to other health initiatives, such as the Home Visiting Program for First Time Parents. Initiated in 1995, this program has already served over 5,000 families and has received national recognition for excellence in multicultural health.

The school-based health center initiative is another demonstration of successful collaboration between government and local communities. Dr. Sylvester spearheaded this initiative. The goal of these centers is to promote health and prevent disease among adolescent. Ninety percent of Delaware high schools have health centers and there have been over 36,000 student contact with school based health center staff.

Dr. Sylvester has made the reduction of Delaware's teen pregnancy rates a top priority for his Department. A strong partnership has been established with the Alliance for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention. Through education and awareness campaigns, teen focus groups and parent involvement, Dr. Sylvester hopes Delaware will reduce its teen pregnancy rates.

Dr. Sylvester obtained his medical degree from Albany Medical College in 1984 and a Masters of Public Health from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in 1989.

Janice R. Lachance is the Director of the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM). She was sworn-in as Director by Vice President Al Gore on December 10, 1997, after a unanimous confirmation by the U. S. Senate on November 9.

The U.S. Office of Personnel Management is the federal government's human resources agency. While daily providing the American public up-to-date employment information, OPM ensures that the nation's civil service remains free of political influence and that federal employees are selected and treated fairly and on the basis of merit. OPM supports agencies with personnel services and policy leadership including staffing tools, guidance on labor-management relations, preparation of government's future leaders, compensation policy development, and programs to improve workforce performance. The agency manages the federal retirement system, as well as the world's largest employer-sponsored health insurance program serving more than nine million federal employees, retirees and their family members.

As Director, Ms. Lachance oversees an agency work force of 3,700 employees and an operating budget of \$376 million. She also directs the senior executive management team responsible for strategic planning and agency management. She is also Chair of the National Partnership Council, and a member of the President's Management Council and the President's Interagency Council on Women.

An attorney, Ms. Lachance has 17 years of experience working with federal agencies, Capitol Hill and labor unions.

Prior to her Presidential appointments, Ms. Lachance was appointed OPM's Director of Communications in 1993. She served as the agency's Director of Communications and Policy from 1994 - 1996. In that position, she was the agency's primary spokesperson with national and local media, and directed media relations, public affairs, marketing and internal communications, overseeing a staff of 24 and a budget of \$2.8 million. Ms. Lachance served as OPM's Chief of Staff from 1996 - 1997. She was appointed Deputy Director by President Clinton in August 1997 and served briefly in that position before assuming the position of Acting Director.

From 1987 until she came to OPM, Janice Lachance served as the Director of Communications and Political Affairs for the American Federation of Government Employees, AFL-CIO, where she directed the political, media, and public affairs programs for the nation's largest federal employee union.

Her early career includes extensive Congressional experience, including Communications Director for Congressman Tom Daschle (D-SD), Administrative Assistant to Congresswoman Katie Hall (D-IN), Staff Director and Counsel for the House Small Business Subcommittee on Antitrust and Restraint of Trade.

In 1996, Ms. Lachance was the Staff Director of the Democratic National Convention's communications operation. In 1992, she was involved in the Clinton-Gore election campaign, followed by an appointment to the Clinton-Gore transition team, where she worked on the confirmations of Cabinet officers and OPM's transition.

Born in Biddeford, Maine, Ms. Lachance holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Manhattanville College, Purchase, New York, and a J.D. from Tulane University School of Law, New Orleans, Louisiana.
