Dear Ms. Rasco:

Thank you for supporting the funding of the Pediatric/Family AIDS Demonstration Program within Title IV of the Ryan White CARE Act. I am writing today to urge a significant increase for Title IV in the President's budget request for FY 1995.

A significant increase for Title IV in the President's budget request for fiscal year 1995 is urgently needed to enable the Pediatric/Family AIDS Demonstration projects to continue and to provide enhanced voluntary access for patients to clinical research. Your support of a budget increase is crucial.

The pediatric, adolescent, and family AIDS demonstrations that are now a part of Title IV have been essentially level funded for the past three years. The recent consolidation of funding within Title IV to enhance the delivery of services and access to clinical trials does not diminish the need for substantial new funding in FY 1995. With an ever rising demand for services comes a critical need for increased funding.

As the Department of Health and Human Services finishes it's FY 1995 budget request and submits it to the Office of Management of Budget, I ask that you strongly consider the funding request for Title IV of the Ryan White CARE Act be increased to \$42 million. Following a thorough review of funding needs, the Pediatric AIDS Coalition and the National Organizations Responding to AIDS coalition in Washington, D.C. recommended at least a \$42 million appropriation for Title IV programs over current funding levels of \$21 million. These funds are vitally needed for reaching our underserved, low-income women, adolescents, children and families.



RESEARCH

- Because there is no cure for AIDS, clinical research studies represent the patients' best hope for finding treatments that work.
- The Children's Hospital Family AIDS Center is an AIDS Clinical Trial Group Pediatric Subunit sponsored by the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID).



HIV INFECTION/AIDS- A FAMILY DISEASE

- Families affected by Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) or Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) need many medical and social services, yet they often find themselves isolated in a society that is trying to educate itself about the disease and adapt to its growing presence.
- Fortunately, HIV/AIDS families in central and southeastern Ohio can get the comprehensive care they need - medical, social, nutritional, developmental, financial and mental health services - through a Children's Hospital program called FACES.

WHAT IS FACES?

FACES stands for Family AIDS Clinic and Educational Services. It is a program that provides quality, comprehensive, coordinated care for HIV-infected children and their families, including parents who are also infected with HIV/AIDS, and children who are at high risk (those born to an HIV-infected mother).



WHERE IS FACES LOCATED?

FACES is located in the Section of Infectious Diseases at Children's Hospital. To reach the program, call 461-7618 for general referrals to the clinic or for other assistance. Clinic hours are 8 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays and 4-8:30 p.m. on Thursdays.

HOW DOES FACES WORK?

- FACES is staffed by infectious disease specialists, research and clinical nurses, clinical social workers, a certified Child Life specialist, a dietitian and secretaries. A neuropsychologist and a pharmacist offer additional support.
- Each child/family in the program receives case-managed care from a team consisting of a physician, nurse and social worker. Adult family members are seen in the clinic by infectious disease specialists and gynecologists from Ohio State University Hospitals.
- The case-management team coordinates all medical and social-work services, including testing, treating, counseling, educating, assessing mental health, and assisting with housing, transportation and legal matters when necessary. The team links families with agencies that can provide the needed services.

- FACES also assists clients with transportation to and from medical appointments, provides child care during clinic visits, and provides many other helpful services to families in need.
- The FACES staff is committed to educating the public about children affected with HIV/AIDS and about the needs of their families.

CONFIDENTIALITY

FACES recognizes that families have rights that need to be protected, including the right to make decisions about testing and treatment, the right to privacy, and the right for protection from discrimination. Healthcare professionals have a legal duty to keep confidential all information they receive.

HISTORY

- FACES, also designated as the Children's Hospital HIV Program, saw its first patients in the fall of 1985. Since then, more than 100 HIV-infected children or children of high-risk parents have been seen in the program's clinic.
- Children, adolescents and women now compose the fastest-growing sector of new HIV/AIDS cases.
- FACES' recent expansion to include treatment for HIV-infected parents, as well as children who are high-risk for the infection, was made possible through funding from the Maternal and Child Health Bureau.



Dear Ms. Rasco:

I had the opportunity several months ago to meet with you and the health care task force to discuss the particular needs of people with AIDS and how they might be addressed by the health care reform initiative. Your personal concern for the issue, and commitment to maintaining contact with those of us working on the "front lines" was impressive.

I would like to ask for your help. Yesterday, we received a visit from Kristine Gebbie. It was, to say the least, a disappointment. Among the other issues raised was funding for the Ryan White CARE Act, which the President had committed to fully fund. Ms. Gebbie was unable to offer that commitment, and instead said that it was unlikely that the federal government would be able to afford full funding for the CARE Act and for health care reform at the same time (I have attached a copy of an article about her visit from the *Boston Globe*).

Hopefully, this was not an accurate reflection of the President's position. The CARE Act is a lifeline for our community, providing services to people now who will not likely be alive when health care reform shows them any benefits. Moreover, many of the services provided through CARE Act funding complement those health care services likely to be funded through universal health care, and which will be necessary even with universal coverage. This is an issue discussed at our meeting with you, Mr. Magaziner, and Mr. Smith, when you personally assured us that the President was committed to Ryan White and to health care reform.

We have fought so hard for CARE Act funding, and have been so hopeful that President Clinton would be an ally rather than an obstacle. Can we have your assurance that the President will re-commit his administration to full CARE Act funding, and that Ms. Gebbie will work with us to obtain the support of Congress? I would appreciate hearing from you at your earliest convenience. Our community is in shock after Ms. Gebbie's visit, and needs some reassurance from the President that his promise to people living with AIDS and HIV remains intact.


It may come as a surprise that someone with roots in the conservative, evangelical community would openly acknowledge their appreciation for your obviously heart-felt efforts to lead in this cause. However I must, since I was deeply struck by your desire to unite a broad spectrum of the American public in our fight against this devastating disease.

We have sought to bring a balanced medical/public health message in all aspects of this issue, weighing the needs of the infected with the needs of those not infected. We have promoted the value of early diagnosis; voluntary and confidential partner notification; a compassionate response to those infected or affected; development of all medical products to limit suffering; and access to health care, with particular focus today on communities of color.

In respect to educational messages, for example, we articulate the optimal medical position of abstinence as true prevention. We then discuss risk reduction messages beginning with the need to limit number of sexual partners, know their HIV status, and end with a realistic discussion of barrier devices.

Dear Jim,

Having read recent press reports about the CDC's next round in its condom campaign, I would like to make one request. Could it be put off until after Christmas? We've received lots of calls concerned about such insensitivity to the timing (celebrating the Virgin birth four days later).

The way this is striking many, especially in light of Kristine Gebbie's characterization of those who might find condom ads offensive, is that of an institution uncaring about the public's feelings. The most common comment is that this is "an in-your-face" attitude of arrogance. I urge you to reconsider the timing.

Remarkably, we've received more calls on this than on the infected children. I believe that shows, in part, how effective we have been in reaching a broad section of the American public--especially the conservative and religious communities--with a balanced perspective on HIV transmission and disease progression. If we are to continue cooperative and successful coalition building, then I believe the better timing for the condom ads (even with abstinence ones included) is after the holiday season.

Thank you for your thoughtful consideration of this important request.

U.S. to Pay for Ads on Use of Condoms

The Clinton administration soon will venture where its Republican predecessors would not tread: It will unveil a national AIDS advertising campaign for young people that encourages condom use.

The ads mark a new era of frankness in AIDS prevention programs, health experts say.

"This is the first time you'll see a condom in a federally produced PSA [public service ad]," said Kristine Gebbie, national AIDS policy coordinator.

Gebbie made the comments in an interview following a speech yesterday at the University of Michigan School of Public Health.

The campaign has been kept quiet to avoid "weird backlashes," Gebbie said. It is to be announced Dec. 21 by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The ads include messages about abstinence as well as about condoms, spokesman Kent Taylor said. He declined to comment on the precise slogans, saying the scripts had not been finalized.

Michigan was one of the first states to mention condoms in its AIDS education programs. The broadcast, billboard and bus ads featured slogans like "Don't Be Con Dumb," with condoms as the O's, and "Are You a Big Enough Man to Wear a Condom?"

They were "very tasteful," said Randy Pope, who oversees AIDS

programs for Michigan's health department.

Gebbie said the federal condom ads "will be very different than anything you've ever seen before. They reflect the changes we're going through here."

The Reagan and Bush administrations "never thought of doing this or never would have done this," she said.

On the other hand, she added: "Do you think 30 seconds on a national TV show will change some 14-year-old's mind? I don't believe it. We've got to find other ways to match federal and state" initiatives. She hopes to persuade more church and community leaders to include AIDS prevention in their programs.

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





Re: Developments of Recent Meeting

Date: December 9, 1993

The second Future Directions in AIDS Research meeting continued a useful dialogue about the AIDS research effort, bringing together many important voices involved in basic and clinical science and drug development. We applaud the efforts of the organizers. Bringing such a group together is a formidable, but essential task, as we continue into the second decade of AIDS research. The meeting was particularly useful in re-establishing a sense of urgency in our common goal of finding a cure and preventive vaccine for HIV.

One of the proposals advanced at the second meeting is the creation of a large scale pilot program for directed AIDS research utilizing alternative management styles. It seems odd to discuss the structure of a program without first determining what the substantive work of the program would be. Any structure must ultimately depend upon the questions being researched. Additionally, many participants questioned the need for and utility of setting up another directed AIDS research program. A significant portion of the AIDS research portfolio of the National Institutes of Health is already comprised of targeted, strictly managed programs. The pharmaceutical industry has used directed goal- and team-oriented approaches to research for many years in their drug development efforts. How would the proposed new initiative differ from current efforts, both public and private? Has the FDAR group sufficiently analyzed the current effort to determine what is being studied and what mechanisms are being utilized successfully?

It was proposed at the recent meeting that the new program be funded by the federal government at the substantial rate for five years. Unless additional monies could be obtained from Congress to fund this project, an unlikely prospect given the current fiscal climate, funding for the new initiative would most likely come from the existing NII AIDS research budget. What effect would funding another AIDS research program have on

current and future research efforts sponsored through the NIH? Again, additional analysis of the current programs may be needed in order to adequately assess this question. Additionally, it was suggested that community-based fund-raising should also be utilized for the initiative. What effect would this have on current fund-raising efforts for community-based AIDS organizations? More diverse representation from AIDS-affected communities is necessary in order to discuss this adequately. These questions need further discussion by FDAR participants, if our recommendations are to be meaningful.

Finally, as the FDAR process continues, we believe that it is important to establish more firmly how decisions are made by the group, particularly if the participants are to release a set of recommendations. It is unclear whether the meeting participants are represented as individuals or as representatives from their respective organizations, whether it be government, industry, academia, or community organization. This will effect our ability to issue recommendations. We do not wish to burden the group with long deliberations about procedure, but it is important that a method for formulating and agreeing upon recommendations be implemented, if the FDAR process is to be successful.

The need to determine how we will make recommendations as a group is of immediate importance because of the interest that the media has already shown in the FDAR process. Without having any procedures for decision-making, it will continue to be difficult for the FDAR organizers to convey to the press the direction in which the group is moving.

AIDS research is in a period of significant transition, substantively and structurally. The newly re-organized Office of AIDS Research creates a powerful opportunity to strengthen and coordinate our research efforts. The recommendations put forward by the FDAR group can offer a useful viewpoint to assist the new OAR Director in deciding the future course of AIDS research. Our analysis of the current program and any suggestions that we have regarding future projects need to be well-thought out, if this process is going to fulfill its potential. In our desire to rekindle the urgency that we all believe is needed to cure AIDS, we should not lose sight of the need to be as meticulous and thoughtful as possible in our recommendations.

SUBJECT: Madison/Harvard FDAR meeting
November 21-23, 1993

I attended the Future Directions in AIDS Research meeting in Boston this week. This was a follow up meeting from the Madison conference in July. The purpose of this meeting was to get the key players together from the research community (including drug companies), government, and the AIDS advocacy organizations to develop and further recommendations that help move the research agenda ahead.

Attending the meeting from the government and Administration included: Dr. Kessler (FDA), Dr. Varmus (NIH), Dr. Fauci (NIAID) and a few key staff.

The conference concluded with some concrete recommendations which my staff will be following up with. These include:

1. Working with NIH and the National Library of Medicine and others to develop a comprehensive and user friendly electronic information system to assure that all researchers have easy access to available information; and that this information crosses disciplines and can be cross referenced.
2. Working with Congress, OMB, NIH and others to develop a public/business/government partnership for a pilot project to fund a progressive business model for attacking several specific research items.
3. Working with NIH to develop and implement a system of awarding "fast grants" for new and emerging research projects that can be funded in 90 days; rather than the current 12-18 month process.

Dr. Kessler discussed the July recommendation of a National Task Force on Drug Development, which will be unveiled next week, and which received great praise.


