NEIL JACOBSON (CA) -- Vice-Chairperson
KAREN MEYER (IL) -- Vice-Chairperson

Background on the PCEPD

The PCEPD is an independent federal agency created by Executive Order which provides advice and information regarding the development of employment policy and employment opportunities for persons with physical and mental disabilities. PCEPD is operated by the chairperson who reports directly to the President. The Chairperson and the Vice-Chairpersons serve at the pleasure of the President, and their nominations do not require Senate confirmation.

The Nominees

TONY COEHLO (NY) -- Former Member of the United States House of Representatives from the 15th District, California (January, 1979 - June, 1989). Former Majority Whip, United States House of Representatives (December, 1986 - June, 1989). Original sponsor of the Americans with Disabilities Act in Congress. Active member and board of director of various disability organizations. Presently, President and Chief Executive Officer of Wertheim Schroeder Investment Services, Inc.

MAX CLELAND (GA) -- Decorated Vietnam veteran who was injured in action. Former head of the Veterans Administration (Carter Administration). Presently, Secretary of State for Georgia (first elected in 1982).

NEIL JACOBSON (CA) -- Presently Vice-President Corporate System Architect, Wells Fargo Bank. Active advocate in the disability community. In 1989, named to the Governor's Hall of Fame for Persons with Disabilities (California).

KAREN MEYER (ILL) -- Presently and independent consultant and ABC Eyewitness News Weekly reporter on disability issues for WLS-TV in Chicago. Only deaf reporter at a local television.

**PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES
PRESIDENT'S COMMITTEE ON EMPLOYMENT OF PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES
APRIL 16, 1993**

Hello. I'm honored to join this distinguished group of Americans working to bring opportunity and hope to millions of Americans with disabilities.

Together we've begun to shift disability policy in America away from exclusion, towards inclusion; away from dependence, towards independence; away from paternalism, and towards empowerment.

And we have made a commitment -- a real commitment -- to enforce the Americans With Disabilities Act, until all citizens with disabilities receive equal treatment under the law, whether in the workplace, or school, in government or the courts.

I have said -- and committed the bulk of my time as President -- to building a new and lasting prosperity in America. We don't have a person to waste, and it is absolutely clear to me that this includes the many millions of talented Americans with disabilities who can contribute if trained and educated like everyone else, and are allowed to give their full talents to building a better tomorrow.]

But it won't happen unless the government accepts the challenge and does its share.

That is why we have moved boldly to cut the deficit, to reform our bureaucracy, and to invest in the health and talents of our young people so we can compete and win in the new global economy. And it is why I am committed to creating more and better jobs for all Americans.

Americans with disabilities like all Americans want health care reform. The system is too complex, too costly, and delivers too little to too many people.

Because rising health care costs and uneven services disproportionately affect Americans with disabilities, our Health Care Task Force from the beginning has called upon representatives of the disability community to help us shape new policies.

You have helped us understand the importance of being able to choose your own doctor. You have educated us regarding the importance of services such as home and community based long term care. And you have helped us recognize that any benefits package must contain preventive intervention services for people with disabilities, and that includes those with physical disabilities and those with psychiatric disabilities.

Americans voted for change in November because the old policies were no longer working to enrich us or unite us as we strive to build a better future for our children.

Today, there is a new excitement, as we move to solve our problems, and to include all in the American dream again.

These are the values that brought me to public service and that members of the disability community toil every day to make real: to use government to empower and lift up, and to believe in freedom enough to give every American a chance to contribute.

Our work is far from finished. America needs the continued leadership of everyone in this room to fulfill the promise of the Americans With Disabilities Act.

But thanks to you America, is becoming a more just and caring and inclusive nation.

I know, working together, we can build a bigger and brighter future for every generation to come.



Brief Description

In support of both the implementation of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities' mission, the President's Committee is sponsoring the creation of a Business Leaders Network.

The purpose of our "Business Leaders Network" is to enlist the support and involvement of business leaders who understand the benefits of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), both in the work place and in the market place; and, who are willing to share their understanding and experience with other business leaders as well as the disability community.

Members of The President's Committee's Business Leaders Network have proven the meaning of the ADA through results. They have a work force that includes workers with disabilities. They retain workers who acquire disabilities while on the job. And, they've discovered and are courting the disability community as a new market for their businesses.

Members of our Business Leaders Network stand ready to undertake a series of activities with the President's Committee and the disability community which bring their understanding and experience to the attention of other business executives through all types of grassroots ways, including public speaking, published statements or articles, training, mailings, and more.

Background

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) offers both people with disabilities our nation's businesses an exciting opportunity to advance everyone's best interest. It offers people with disabilities a chance for full citizenship, civil rights and economic independence. It offers our nation's businesses an enhanced labor pool as well as a new customer base to reach. And, it offers our Nation expanded economic and democratic might.

However, this exciting opportunity can be lost. Fears and

apprehensions, as well as myths and stereotypes must be eradicated so that logic and good business sense can prevail.

Communication is the key. Communication which tells the facts about ADA, about people with disabilities and about the role of business.

Employer to employer communications has repeatedly proven itself a valuable technique to achieve better understandings about ADA, people with disabilities and the role of business.

Therefore, the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities is organizing the creation of a network of business leaders who can be counted upon to get this message out to their colleagues in business.

Purpose

The purpose of the President's Committee's Business Leadership Network is to organize a cadre of knowledgeable business leaders who can communicate to others, especially other business leaders, the value of pursuing the goals of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Objectives

The objectives of this network are to:

- 1.) Identify business leaders who have demonstrated vision, knowledge and support for the principles of the ADA;
- 2.) Organize these business leaders behind both the President's Committee's programs and other state and local disability related programs;
- 3.) Help coordinate opportunities for the members of the Business Leaders Network to speak, train and otherwise communicate their vision to other employers and other publics;
- 4.) Learn from these business leaders improved strategies and understanding about how to make all our efforts more productive;
- 5.) Provide these business leaders with the materials and support they need so that can grow in their understanding regarding disability issues;
- 6.) Provide added linkages for the members of the Business Leaders Network with both the disability community and disability programs in their area.

Criteria for Membership in the Business Leaders Network

Persons invited for membership in the Business Leaders Network shall meet the following criteria.

1.) They are members of the business community with significant management authority. (Individual business leaders are the members of this Network, on behalf of their corporation -- not the corporation itself.)

2.) They have a good working knowledge of both the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the principles of full inclusion of people with disabilities into every aspect of corporate activity (e.g. as an employee, as a potential customer or client, or as a potential participant in a community based program which the company might support such as public transit, education, JTPA, civic associations, etc.).

3.) They are willing to actively share their vision, leadership and insight with other businesses, especially small businesses, as well as community leaders, in an effort to further advance everyone's understanding for and support of the principles of the ADA.

4.) They have a work force which includes people with disabilities; that retains workers who may become disabled; and/or, they've discovered and are pursuing the market potential of our Nation's 43 million citizens with disabilities.

Responsibilities of Business Leader Network Members

Persons who accept membership on the President's Committee's Business Leadership Network are expected to meet the following responsibilities.

1.) Continue to learn more about the strategies for full integration and equal employment opportunity for persons with disabilities.

2.) Continue to improve or enhance the disability related practices and results of their individual corporation.

3.) Participate, to the maximum extent possible, in the organized activities of the Business Leaders Network (see next section).

4.) Seek every opportunity to exert their leadership skills in advancing both employment and full citizenship opportunities for persons with disabilities.

5.) Report significant accomplishments as well as significant issues or concerns to the President's Committee and other key groups.

Activities of the Business Leaders Network

Once formally enrolled in the Business Leaders Network, the members will be invited to participate in various activities.

The first variety of activities that they may be asked to participate in will be invitations to speak to, or to discuss with other business leaders, their vision, expertise and experiences integrating people with disabilities into their work force and/or into their marketing efforts.

Such invitations to speak may come directly from the President's Committee or may originate from our cooperating partner organizations at either the state or local level.

The second level of activity will be self-initiated by the Business Leader Network member themselves. Here, the member will be expected to seek both internal (within their organization), as well as external (to other business leaders), opportunities to exert their leadership in ways which promote better understandings of the principles of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

In addition, opportunities may present themselves whereby members of the Business Leaders Network will be invited to serve on community or state level groups such as Business Advisory Councils supporting the State's vocational rehabilitation program, a state or local committee on the employment of people with disabilities or other community organization supporting the full inclusion of people with disabilities.

As a way to further develop additional activities, teleconferences will be held with each state's Business Leaders Network to involve all concerned in local planning.

Membership

Persons to be invited to accept membership on the Business Leaders Network of the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities will receive an official letter from the Executive Director or Chairman of the President's Committee, so designating them.

Once they have accepted this appointment, they will be issued a Business Leaders Network membership certificate.

They will serve at the pleasure of the Chairman of the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities.

Membership on the Business Leaders Network represent an "ex officio" status of membership on the President's Committee. Only the officers of the President's Committee can speak for the President's Committee.

Business Leaders Network members serve as volunteers, on their own resources.

Program Plan

The Business Leaders Network will be implemented in stages.

The first state will begin immediately and will continue through May of this year. By that time, we will strive to have developed the basic "administrative" Business Leaders Network's materials, begun a field test of the program in six states and have 15 to 20 business leaders identified and enrolled in each state.

Three staff persons will be assigned two states each to manage. The immediate supervision of the program will rest with the Director of the Office of Plans, Programs and Services of the President's Committee.

Six states will be selected from the following listing.

Staffer #1(RC)	Staffer #2(OPA)	Staffer #3(DS)

The first step will be to call the respective state committees in each of these states to explain the program and then to determine their interest, support and involvement in the setting-up of a Business Leaders Network in their state.

The next stage or phase of the program will be to expand the Business Leaders Network to other states. This second phase should begin some time during the summer months.

Where to Find Potential Members for the Network

There are numerous potential sources to locate or identify potential candidates for membership in the President's Committee's Business Leaders Network.

- 1.) The State's Committee and its mayor's committees;
- 2.) Members of the President's Committee, (especially the Employer Committee);
- 3.) State Vocational Rehabilitation Agencies
- 4.) Local Projects with Industry;
- 5.) Trade Association Network;

- 7.) Chambers of Commerce;
- 8.) Disability Community Network;

9.) Disability and Business Technical Assistance Centers (DBTAC's);

10.) The Job Accommodation Network;

11.) Small Business Organization and Networks



ONLY HALF OF PERSONS WITH A SEVERE DISABILITY
HAVE PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE, ONE IN FIVE AMERICANS
HAS A DISABILITY, CENSUS BUREAU FINDS

Only about half of persons aged 15 to 64 with a severe disability had private health insurance in 1991-92 compared with 80 percent for persons with no disability, according to a survey by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau. The census report, Americans With Disabilities: 1991/1992 (P70-33), the first comprehensive disability survey ever undertaken by the bureau, did not cover persons in institutions.

Another 36 percent of persons with a severe disability and 5 percent of persons with no disability were covered by a government plan such as Medicare or Medicaid. Approximately 15 percent of each group lacked any type of health insurance coverage.

In all, 49 million Americans had a disability in 1991-92, 24.1 million classified as severely disabled. More women (14.2 million) than men (9.9 million) had severe disabilities. A disability is defined by the Census Bureau as difficulty in performing one or more functional or daily living activities, or one or more socially defined roles or tasks. Persons who are completely unable to perform an activity or task, or who must have personal assistance were considered to have a severe disability.

Jack McNeil, author of Americans With Disabilities: 1991/92 (P70-33) says, "The data will be useful in establishing baseline numbers as the nation works to reduce the employment and other barriers faced by persons with disabilities. The fact that only 23 percent of persons aged 21 to 64 with a severe disability were employed shows that the task will be considerable."

The Survey of Income and Program Participation, on which the report is based, also collected information on disabling conditions. Among the 27.3 million persons aged 15 and over with a limitation in a physical or daily living activity, the conditions most frequently mentioned as a cause of disability were arthritis or rheumatism (7.2 million), back or spinal problems (5.7 million), heart trouble (4.6 million), lung or respiratory trouble (2.8 million), high blood pressure (2.2 million), stiffness or deformity of the foot, leg, arm or hand (2 million), and diabetes (1.6 million). The frequency with which high blood pressure was reported as a cause was not statistically different from the frequency with which stiffness or deformity of the foot, leg, arm or hand was reported as a cause.

The survey collected information on six categories of functional activities, including seeing, hearing, speaking, lifting and carrying, climbing stairs, and walking. Among persons aged 15 and over, 34.2 million had difficulty performing one or more of these activities. Of this number, 15.2 million, or 44 percent, were unable to perform one or more of these activities.

The survey also determined whether persons had difficulty performing, or needed personal assistance with, various activities of daily living. The number of persons 15 years and older who needed personal assistance with one or more activities was 9.2 million. Of those who needed personal assistance, 3.9 million were 15 to 64 years old, and 5.3 million were 65 years old or older.

Other highlights from the report include:


- Of the 48.9 million persons with a disability, 6 percent were less than 15 years old, 60 percent were 15 to 64 years old, and 34 percent were 65 years and older.


- The number of persons aged 15 and older who used a wheelchair was 1.5 million (919,000 women and 575,000 men). Another 4 million persons did not use a wheelchair but used a cane, crutches, or a walker and had used such an aid for six months or longer.
- Among persons aged 15 and older, 9.7 million had difficulty seeing the words and letters in ordinary newsprint even when wearing corrective lenses. Of this total, 1.6 million could not see the words and letters at all.
- The number of persons aged 15 and older who had difficulty hearing what was said in a normal conversation with another person was 10.9 million, and 924,000 or 8 percent of these persons were completely unable to hear what was said in such a conversation.


Percent of Persons 15 to 64 Years Old With a Disability and With a Severe Disability, by Race and Hispanic Origin: 1991-92




Percent of Persons 15 Years Old and Over With Low Incomes, by Age and Disability Status: 1991-92




Percent of Persons 21 to 64 Years Old With a Job or Business, by Sex and Disability Status: 1991-92




Percent of Persons With a Disability and With a Severe Disability, by Age: 1991-92

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
