## PRESIDENT CLINTON APPOINTS NOTCH COMMISSION MEMBERS

President Clinton today appointed two Democrats and two Republicans to serve on the Commission on the Social Security "Notch" Issue.

The term "notch" refers to the difference in Social Security benefit levels between workers born after 1916 and workers with similar earnings who were born before then.

The 12-member Commission, which includes eight members already appointed by Congressional leaders, will conduct a comprehensive study of what has come to be known as the "notch" issue.

The study will examine the causes of the controversy, whether there are inequities in the treatment of Social Security beneficiaries born in different years, whether any legislative action is needed and, if so, how much it would cost.

The Democrats appointed to the commission were:

Alan K. "Scotty" Campbell, a professor of public policy at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business. Campbell, who was the first director of the Office of Personnel Management in the Carter administration, will be designated commission chair.

Lindy Boggs, a former member of the U.S. House of Representatives. Boggs served in the House from 1973 to 1990, was chairman of the Democratic National Convention in 1976 and is a past president of the Women's National Democratic Club.

The Republicans the President appointed to the commission were: Gwendolyn King, commissioner of Social Security between 1989 and 1992, and currently senior vice president for corporate and public affairs of PECO ENERGY Co. in Philadelphia.

Robert Froehlke, president and chief executive officer of IDS Mutual Funds Group and former board chairman of Equitable Life Assurance Society. He is a former secretary of the Army.

The commission's final report is due to Congress on Dec. 31, 1994.

The eight members appointed by the House and Senate are as follows: Robert J. Myers, consulting actuary, former deputy commissioner of Social Security, and chief actuary, Social Security Administration; Patricia M. Owens, former associate commissioner for disability, Social Security Administration; John F. Cogan, senior fellow, Hoover Institution, and former deputy director, Office of Management and Budget for the Reagan administration; Carolyn L. Weaver, American Enterprise Institute, former professional staff to Senate Finance Committee under Senator Robert Dole; James C. Corman, former representative from California and chair of the Ways and Means Subcommittee on Public Assistance and Unemployment Compensation; Carroll L. Estes, chair, department of social and behavioral sciences, University of California; Barber Conable, former representative from New York and ranking member, Ways and Means Committee; and Arthur L. Singleton, former minority counsel, Ways and Means Committee.

MEMORANDUM FOR CAROL H. RASCO

As previously discussed, I am recommending that the President appoint Lindy Boggs and Alan K. (Scotty) Campbell as the Democratic members to the Notch Commission and that the President appoint Gwendolyn King and Robert Froehlke as his Republican appointees. Each has agreed to serve on the Commission.

Gwendolyn King


Vice President, Pennsylvania Power and Light, Philadelphia, Pa., 1992-present; Commissioner of Social Security, 1989-1992.



**MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT**

As you know, legislation enacted in 1992 created a 12-member Commission to study the Social Security notch issue and to report its findings to the Congress. You are responsible for selecting four members, one of whom you will designate as Chair of the Commission. Presidential appointees may be private citizens or Executive Branch employees, but no more than two may be from the same political party. A list of candidates for Presidential appointment to the Notch Commission is attached.

I believe that all of the candidates would make excellent appointees. Prior to your review, however, I have not discussed serving on the Commission with any of the candidates or requested verification of their political affiliation.

Recommendation for Commission Chair

I believe that there are advantages to asking one of your Republican Presidential appointees to chair the Commission and deliver the Commission's findings to the public. I would recommend Republicans Howard Baker or Melvin Laird to serve as Commission Chair. I would also heartily endorse Democrats Alan K. (Scotty) Campbell, former Chairman of the Civil Service Commission and the first Director of the Office of Personnel Management; or Rose Dobrof, Executive Director of Brookdale Center on Aging, Hunter College, New York, to chair the Commission. All four are senior citizens themselves.

Status of the Notch Commission

Congress selected its eight appointees earlier this year -- two members each by the House and Senate Majority and Minority leadership (list attached). The Commission will convene once the four Presidential appointees have been selected and the Commission Chair has been named.

Page 2 - The President

Senator Moynihan recently raised the status of the Presidential appointments to the Commission with me, and also on the Senate floor. I have attached a copy of the letter I sent to the Senator on October 21 assuring him that the Presidential appointees would be named soon.


In addition, Representative Peter DeFazio (D-OR) wrote to both of us in October to request that you appoint him to the Commission. Although Members of Congress and other Legislative Branch employees could have been selected as Congressional appointees to the Commission, they are barred by statute from selection as Presidential appointees. Representative DeFazio has been advised of this statutory restriction.

Once the Commission is appointed and begins its study, Congressional pressure to "fix" the Notch issue will lessen substantially as long as the Commission appointees are viewed as open minded. It is likely that any attempt to move Notch legislation in 1994 can be postponed successfully, since it would be premature to act before the Commission presents its findings to Congress.

#### Background

The Fiscal Year (FY) 1993 Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government Appropriations Act (P.L. 102-393 created the Social Security Notch Commission to study the Notch issue and to report its findings to the Congress. However, Congress did not appropriate funds for its operation until last month. The FY 1994 Labor, HHS and Education appropriations bill (P.L. 103-112), enacted on October 21, includes \$1.8 million activity.

The Commission's final report was originally due by December 31, 1993, but the FY 1994 Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government appropriations bill (P.L. 103-123), enacted on October 28, includes a provision to extend the due date to December 31, 1994.

SUBJECT: The Notch Commission

This note is a follow up to our recent conversation. As you know this issue is highly charged and the Department has not been outspoken on it. The "notch" is a term used to describe the difference in Social Security benefit levels received by retired workers born between 1916 and 1921, compared to people born before 1916. Although reports issued in 1988 by the General Accounting Office and the National Academy of Social Insurance concluded that beneficiaries born after 1916 are being paid correctly and no corrective legislation is needed, 15 notch bills were introduced in the 102nd Congress. Costs for the bills ranged from \$25 billion to \$1 trillion.

A Commission to study the notch issue again was authorized in the Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government Appropriations bill for FY 1993. However, funds have not been appropriated for the Commission's work.

The Department has held discussions with House and Senate members who expressed a desire to move forward with the Commission. The President's budget does not request funds and HHS has not taken a position on the need for funds. In discussion with staff, Senator Hatfield indicated that he would include \$1.5 million in the HHS FY 1994 appropriation and would move the due date of the Commission's report from December 1993 to December 1994. If funds are appropriated, the Commission could be expected to begin work early in 1994 and HHS will be ready and willing to do what is necessary to organize the setting up of the Commission. The National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, the chief proponent of legislation on the notch, agreed to this approach. The attached letter from Secretary Shalala to Senator Hatfield conveys the latest Departmental strategy on this issue.


The President has asked me to respond to your letter concerning the Social Security Notch Commission. As you point out, the Social Security notch issue has been troubling beneficiaries for a number of years. I agree that establishing this Commission, as provided for by law, could be a highly effective step towards permanently resolving this important issue.

As you may know, under the terms of the authorizing statute, the Commission is to consist of four members appointed by the President and eight members appointed by the Congress (two each by the Majority and Minority Leaders of the House and Senate). As you know, although this statute authorized \$2 million for purposes of operating the Commission, no funds have actually been appropriated. However, I share your view that the Commission should be operational as soon as possible.

I am in the process of preparing, for the President's consideration, recommendations for establishing the Commission. The Department of Health and Human Services will work closely with the bipartisan leadership of the Congress in order to coordinate our efforts and to make sure that the Commission can effectively complete its work.

Thank you for your strong interest in this issue. At the President's request, I have sent similar letters to Senator McCain and Representative Kyl.


