

Dear Congressman Downey:

I am writing to you because I have read that you are looking into the Department of Health and Human services, for the new Administration, and also, because of your commitment to the welfare of elderly persons.

I am presently employed as a Program Specialist in the Office for the Aging at Catholic Charities, Diocese of Brooklyn and Queens. This past June, I was appointed to the President's Committee on Mental Retardation, which as you know, is housed in the Administration for Children and Families, in OHDS, in HHS. I was appointed to provide expertise on issues relating to the needs of elderly persons with Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities. I wrote the first dissertation on them, and I was appointed because I am a Professional Social Worker who has worked to improve the lives of persons with Mental Retardation in general, and in particular, the lives of elderly persons with Mental Retardation.

I took the place of Mr. Vincent Gray whose term expires in May, 1993. Because of the change in Administration, I am uncertain about whether I will be re-appointed, something I want very much. One year only just seems too short; my specialty is unique and I feel it is important that elderly persons, with Mental Retardation, continue to be represented on the Committee by someone with knowledge of their issues. As you know, their numbers are rapidly increasing and they have special needs.

The Center has been refunded for another five years by NIDRR, beginning October 1, 1993.

During its first funding cycle, the Center asserted six major principles on behalf of families:

- * all families are strong and capable
- * all families want and need friendships and inclusion
- * all people with disabilities make positive contributions to their families and communities
- * the family's and person's choices should drive service provision and policy making
- * families and people with disabilities, and indeed those of us who are not directly affected by disabilities, should have great expectations for people with disabilities and their families
- * when policy emphasizes strengths, friendships and inclusion, positive contributions, choices, and great expectations, then full citizenship for families and people with disabilities will result

During the first funding cycle, the Center's staff (in special education, law, social welfare, sociology, human development, psychology, and educational psychology) produced over 10 books, 23 peer reviewed articles, 26 chapters, 9 monographs, 4 videotapes and movies, 12 technical reports, and 7 annotated bibliographies. We also reached more than 5,000 family members, individuals with disabilities, providers, policy makers, and researchers through inservice and preservice training.

Our first funding cycle focused primarily on the following areas of research: cognitive coping and stress; technology-supported children; multi-component interventions for families whose adolescent children have emotional disabilities and are at risk of institutionalization; developing model community-based programs for inclusion and transition; developing model programs and encourage friendships between young adults with disabilities and college-aged nondisabled people; developing family-friendly early intervention programs; evaluating permanency planning and reasonable efforts programs; developing and evaluating Parent to Parent programs; analyzing effects of P.L. 99-319 (P&A for Mentally Ill); policy analysis and model statute for family support programs; and other less fulsome research issues.

During the next five years, we plan to exceed our first five years' productivity (dissemination and training) and to retain the same staff capacities and disciplines.

During the next five years, however, we will change the major theme of our research from the "six principles/values" to the theme of "empowerment." We define empowerment as helping families get the appropriate services they need, according to their choices, by (a) motivating them to seek what they want and need, (b) helping them develop the resources and skills to get what they want and need, and (c) changing the provider and policy contexts so that the contexts respond to what families want and need.

We will have 15 different research projects, grouped generally into five different areas of work:

- * technology for inclusion--research for families whose children use assistive technology and also for families whose children depend on medical technologies

- * need responsive programs--research on effectiveness of wrap-around services for children with developmental and emotional disabilities; research on transition support system; research on friendships between children with and without disabilities; research on self-determination training and its effects; research on interagency transition planning; research on empowerment in families, adolescents, and service-provider contexts

- * effective advocacy for policy reform--research on state laws' accommodations for families consistent with ADA and "inclusion" and "family friendly" criteria; see also research on policy issues involving empowerment (see above) and abuse and neglect (below)

- * effective parenting for all--research on fathers' perspectives on early intervention and early childhood special education; research on special issues facing African American fathers; research on special issues facing Hispanic families; research on Parent to Parent programs' effectiveness; establishment of nationwide Parent to Parent network and clearinghouse

- * child abuse and neglect--research on prevention, intervention, training, and policy reform in the area of abuse and neglect of children, birth to nine years old, who have disabilities

Because we are funded to work in the area of families and children, we do not deal with adults except in the transition issues.

We are making special efforts to include African Americans and Hispanics in all of our research but especially in three of our projects.

We have developed and will carry out our research with special contributions from consumers, particularly families, people with disabilities, providers, policy makers, and researchers.

That is why we included consumers in the planning of our research Center but also why we have 18 specific outreach-to-consumers efforts.

Ann and I will codirect the Center, as we have done from its very beginning.

Finally, I should mention our international work, funded by a private endowment. We have been working for four years with a specialized unit of the Organization of American States. This unit is the Inter-American Children's Institute, in Montevideo, Uruguay. The U.S. Representative to IACI is Peter Edelman, special counselor to the HHS Secretary. Our work involves stimulating and recognizing excellence in service, training, and research in Central and South American and the Caribbean; assisting IACI develop international dissemination capacities; assisting IACI help consumer-based and other non-governmental organizations develop management and policy-influencing capacities; and working with trainers and policy makers in Paraguay and Costa Rica through the IACI.

Stan, I am enclosing the Table of Contents of our proposal for NIDRR funding so you can see for yourself the scope of our work and ask for further information.

At the risk of seeming immodest, I will say that we have made a big difference for families in terms of what they think they can achieve, for researchers in terms of how they perceive families and respond to their needs, and for providers and policy makers in terms of the programs and laws they adopt to serve families.

If Ann or I can ever be of help to you or Carol, please let me know.

I'll be in D.C. in early January and hope to see you then,
and possibly to meet her.

H. Rutherford ("Rud") Turnbull, III is professor of special education and law at The University of Kansas. There, he codirects, with his wife Ann P. Turnbull, the Boach Center on Families and Disability, a federally and privately funded research and training center that focuses exclusively on the families of people who have disabilities.

Mr. Turnbull has served as president, American Association on Mental Retardation; secretary, The Arc (formerly, National Association for Retarded Citizens); and treasurer, TASH: The Association for Persons with Severe Disabilities; and he presently serves as executive committee member, National Association of Rehabilitation Research and Training Centers, and chairman, American Bar Association Commission on Mental and Physical Disability Law.

Mr. Turnbull is the author or editor, or coauthor or coeditor of over 100 books, articles, chapters, technical reports, monographs, and other publications in the field of disability law and policy.

He was the principal draftsman of the North Carolina special education and limited guardianship laws and of the federal "Tech act" (Assistive Technology for Individuals with Disabilities Act of 1988). He has served as Jos. P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation Public Policy Fellow and in that capacity was special assistant to Senator Tom Harkin, chairman, U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Disability Policy. Mr. Turnbull has testified before the Senate and House of Representatives on several occasions on disability policy; he also has been "of counsel" on several briefs filed with the United States Supreme Court.

Mr. Turnbull is the father of a 26-year old son who has both mental retardation and autism, and of two daughters (ages 18 and 15).

Following his first law degree, Mr. Turnbull worked at a law firm in Baltimore, Md. Thereafter, he took his graduate law degree and was professor of public law and government, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Mr. Turnbull also is the founder, with Ann Turnbull, and president of a nonprofit corporation that provides community-based services to people with disabilities and their families in Lawrence, Kansas.
