## Best of Both Worlds

This partnership allows students to tour both the Clinton Presidential Library and Heifer Village. - Assess the social, economic, political, and technological efforts to address economic imbalances and social inequalities among the world's peoples
- Construct explanations about the consequences of human-made and natural disasters as they affect global trade, politics, and human migration
- Analyze ways historical contexts continue to shape people's perspectives

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
