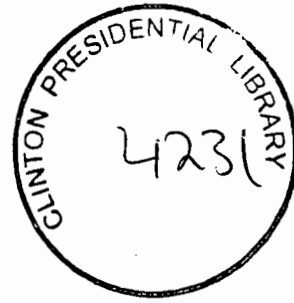

I. BACKGROUND

Executive Order 12863, dated September 13, 1993, combined the President's Foreign Intelligence objective, conduct, management, coordination of activities, and effectiveness with which the Intelligence Community is meeting the intelligence needs of the nation. The Board's purpose is to enhance the security of the United States by improving the quality of intelligence available to the United States. The Board has a full-time staff of five, which is composed of detailees from federal agencies responsible for intelligence activities and it has an annual budget of \$595,000.

II. DISCUSSION

The PFIAB consists of no more than sixteen members, who serve at the pleasure of the President, a one time shall be comprised of Members whose term of service does not exceed two years. The IOB consists of 4 PFIAB members designated by the President. This memorandum addresses four current PFIAB vacancies and the reappointment of nine members.

Both the Office of Presidential Personnel and the National Security Council agreed upon the first two candidates, William J. Perry or Anthony Lake.

III. RECOMMENDATION

We recommend that you approve the following individuals:

STEPHEN FRIEDMAN, Republican of New York, to serve as a Member of the

President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, vice Thomas Eagleton. Mr. Friedman is Senior Chairman and Limited Partner of Goldman, Sachs & Co., which he originally joined in 1966. He served as Chairman and Senior Partner from December 1992 to November 1994 when he retired from active management of the firm. He also served as a member of the Commission on the Roles and Capabilities of the U.S. Intelligence Community.

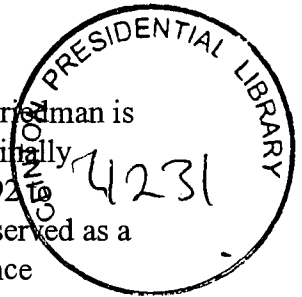

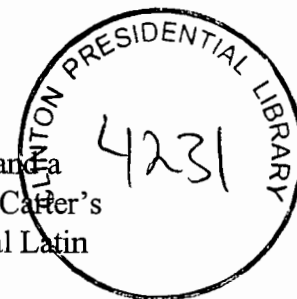

He held several positions at the Pentagon,

including Director of the Chief of Naval Operations Systems Analysis Group. At age forty-nine, Admiral Zumwalt was the youngest four-star admiral in U.S. Naval history and the youngest to serve as Chief of Naval Operations.
