✓ Talking Points on Ronnie Musgrove

I. (Improving education): Ronnie Musgrove wants to improve our public schools because an educated, well-trained workforce is the best way to attract new industry to Mississippi.

- a. As a senator, led the fight to put air-conditioners in every classroom in the state.**
- b. As Lt. Governor, Ronnie was the driving force behind the Adequate Education Act that is giving school districts in low-income communities the resources they need to educate our children.**
- c. As governor he will:**
 - ✓ raise teacher salary to the southeastern average to keep the qualified teachers we have and attract more people to the teaching profession;**
 - ✓ lower class size in K - 3rd grade to make sure our children get the attention they need to start off on the right foot for academic success;**
 - ✓ and put a computer on every school desk to put technology at their fingertips and prepare them to compete for the high tech, high wage jobs of the future.**

II. (Expand Economic Development): Ronnie Musgrove wants to support Mississippi companies and small businesses and help them grow. We also need to attract new industries to invest in Mississippi and bring economic opportunity to every level of our community.

- a. Fought for the Workforce Training Act that is helping Mississippians across the state get the training they need to land a good-paying future building job.
- b. Passed tax credits for companies that create new jobs.
- c. As governor he will:
 - ✓ *Expand workforce training because a highly trained workforce attracts new jobs and encourages more companies to locate in Mississippi.*
 - ✓ *Build healthy, supportive, safe and secure communities that foster economic growth.*

III. (Health Care): Ronnie Musgrove wants to take health care to the people with quality, available family medical care where your doctor – not an accountant – decides what treatment you need

- a. Expanded the Children's Health Insurance Program that is providing insurance to the children of thousands of working families throughout Mississippi.**
- b. Doubled the number of prescriptions covered by Medicaid per month (5 to 10).**
- c. Created the Trauma Care Network so that no matter who you are, or where you are, you can get the medical treatment you need that can save your life.**
- d. Created the Rural Health Care Corps to get more doctors to move to rural areas and make medical care available closer to home.**
- e. As governor he will:**
 - ✓ Fight for meaningful Patient Protections for all Mississippians**
 - ✓ Work to provide improved care for Children and the Elderly**
 - ✓ Increase Access to Health Care throughout Mississippi so that more Mississippians can get the medical treatment they need closer to home.**

IV.(Crime/Drugs): Ronnie Musgrove believes our children deserve safe, drug free streets and schools and all of us deserve the peace of mind that comes with strong, secure communities.

a. Led the fight to build separate detention facilities for juveniles so we rehabilitate our children and teach them to function in our communities instead of just teaching them to be better criminals.

b. Created the "Support our Students" -- Funds summer and after-school enrichment programs that keep our children off the streets during the critical areas while their parents are at work.

✓ *We need to put counselors in more schools throughout the state to help resolve student conflicts and spot troubled children before they cause real problems.*

✓ *We also need structured after-school programs to take kids off the streets between the critical hours of 3 to 5 p.m. while their parents are at work.*

✓ *We must continue to focus on rehabilitation and making non-violent inmates productive members of our community.*

RONNIE MUSGROVE BIOGRAPHY

Harry Truman once said, "Progress occurs when courageous, skillful leaders seize the opportunity to change things for the better." During his twelve years of public service, first as state senator then as lieutenant governor, Ronnie Musgrove has been fighting on the frontlines to move Mississippi forward and improve the quality of life for every person who calls it home.

Musgrove was born in Tocowa, Miss. (six miles southeast of Batesville) in 1956 to Henry and Nina Musgrove. His father died when Musgrove was seven, and his mother became a factory worker to support four children. Musgrove worked his way through school and became the first in his family to complete both high school and college. He is graduate of the University of Mississippi and the University of Mississippi Law School.

Musgrove was first elected to the senate in 1987 and was appointed vice-chair of the committee on Colleges and Universities. In 1991 he became chair of the Senate Education Committee, where he championed equitable funding for all schools, the expansion of tech prep sites across the state and increases in teacher pay. Throughout his career, Musgrove has been a strong voice for tougher drug laws, education and rehabilitation, and the creation of the uniform Youth Court System. His contributions to our healthy business climate include the reduction of the tax burden for married residents and the lowering of inheritance taxes.

Elected lieutenant governor in 1995, Musgrove has been recognized nationally for his leadership abilities and is currently chair of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors. From BIG (Business Influencing Generations) to ComPEET (Commercial Post-Graduate Electrical Engineering Training), Musgrove has used the Office of the Lieutenant Governor to start community-based programs designed to connect education and business.

Musgrove resides in Batesville in his native Panola County where he practices law and is a partner in the firm Smith, Musgrove & McCord. Musgrove was selected for membership in the American Inns of Court in 1988 and was inducted as a fellow into the Mississippi Bar Foundation in 1995.

Married to the former Melanie Ballard of Charleston, Mississippi, the Musgroves have two children - Jordan (13) and Carmen Rae (11). Melanie teaches at Pope Elementary School where Jordan and Carmen Rae attend. A deacon of the First Baptist Church in Batesville, Ronnie has also taught Sunday School and served as committee chairman. He has worked in his community with the Batesville Jaycees and is an active member of the Batesville Rotary Club.

Pastor Jerry Young

Pastor Jerry Young, a native of Scott, Mississippi, is the son of Reverend and Mrs. E. L. Young of Greenville, Mississippi. A graduate of Nugent Center High School in Bolivar County, Pastor Young has earned an Associate Arts Degree in Social Science from Coahoma Junior College in Clarksdale, Mississippi and a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology and Social Welfare from Rust College, Holly Springs, Mississippi. He earned a Master of Divinity Degree and his Doctor of Ministry Degree from Reformed Theological Seminary in Jackson, Mississippi.

Pastor Young is married to the former Helen Louise Akins of Starkville, Mississippi. They are the parents of two daughters, Jerlen Louise and Kelli Elizabeth.

Pastor Young's commitment to God and to His church has manifested itself in service on all levels: local, state and national. He began his service in the ministry at the Mt. Tennica Baptist Church in Lamont, Mississippi. He has served as pastor of the St. John and the Pilgrim Rest Baptist Churches, both located in Greenville, Mississippi. He has prayerfully and faithfully served the membership of the New Hope Baptist Church since February 1980.

Locally, Pastor Young has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Mississippi Baptist Seminary as well as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the BI-racial Baptist Commission. He has served the Seminary as a consultant in Evangelism, Leadership Development and Church Administration and as an instructor in Homiletics. Pastor Young serves on the Ministerial Advisory Board at Reformed Theological Seminary, Jackson, Mississippi and has served as an adjunct instructor in Homiletics at Reformed.

Active in the community, Pastor Young has served on the Mayor's Community and Economic Development Commission, the Planning Board for the city of Jackson, as chairman of the sub-committee on the "Family" of the Mayor's special committee on Partnership Against Crime, on the Board of Directors of Catholic Charities as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the New Hope Alcohol and Drug Three Quarter Way House, Jackson, Mississippi. Currently he is serving on the Board of Trustees at Belhaven College as well as the City of Jackson's Comprehensive Planning Committee.

Pastor Young is very active in his state convention. Presently he serves as president of the General Missionary Baptist State Convention of Mississippi, Inc.

Nationally, Pastor Young serves as 2nd vice president of the National Baptist Convention U. S. A., Inc. He works with the Evangelism Board of the Convention and previously has served as a seminar leader in the Sunday School and NBC Administrators Division of the National Baptist Congress of Christian Education.
