Meredity and Gary: Howard Lefkowitz proposes that we make these changes to our project to post EER pages on the web:

Subject: EER web project

John Dankowski informs me that WHCA is not able to film/record the story tellers/readers at the Egg Roll. Therefore, we now have a decision (I hope) that the project will go forward under Howard Lefkowitz. He will provide the technicians for filming and recording, and for web page design. Meredith informs us he can not give this "gift" to the WH and is inquiring of NPS (which does have gift authority) if the new website can go on their website with a link from the WH EER pages. Howard will then be a "sponsor", interacting with GMJ as our Egg Roll producer.

If there is a problem about posting this on the NPS site, Howard informs me that there are many servers on the Internet which could host this which are NOT commercial. On the Internet, "commercial" is commonly defined by the content/links of the site not necessarily the location of the server. In other words, since our posting will have no links other than back to the WH Web site and no content other than our educational offering, the location of the actual computer which serves it should not be a problem. It is like a blank canvas on which we can draw/put any posting - the canvas is not commercial. (I think it is like a downtown building in which some tenants are shops and some are non-profits public service....)

(Meredith, I'm in over my head here, if you have questions, please contact Howard!)

The advantage to posting on such a site is that Howard does not have to secure access to the NPS (or other Govt) ftpserver. (It can be done, but the process of providing him access may be lengthy...and time is now short.)

If any of you have questions/concerns, please voice them as soon as possible, as we are now moving very quickly on the Egg Roll. Thanks to all of you for your help.

Those running the multi-billion dollar sex industry in the United States are now exploring new ways to expand their markets abroad.

"Welcome to the exotic world of Asia," says an Internet Web site provided by the U.S.-based Ultra Infoseek Company. Click on the advisory page, and you will see dozens of pictures of nude teenage Asian girls.

"Asian girls from Singapore, Indonesia, and the Philippines want to know American/Western men," says an ad at another site. And so on.

The trend to place advertisements like these on the Internet that specifically target sex markets in poor Asian countries is growing fast.

More than 100 Web sites are used exclusively to promote teenage commercial sex in Asia. The Internet sex site owners charge from \$ 100 to \$ 150 for membership and detailed information about sex workers.

Turning lust into dollars, the sex industry earns about eight billion dollars year from pornography, telephone sex, and Internet sex tours, says U.S. author James Ridgeway in his recent work, "Red Light: Inside the Sex Industry."

The trend disturbs human rights groups.

"We are extremely concerned about it. It must be stopped," says Sean Parlamon of the Coalition Against Prostitution and Child Abuse in Thailand (CAPCAT), an umbrella organization comprising dozens of non-profit groups fighting against poverty and child abuse in Thailand.

CAPCAT recently launched a worldwide campaign on the Internet against the California-based company, Earthlink, which provided its web site to the sex-promoting company PVS Publications.

PVS Publications promoted organized sex tours to Thailand on the Internet, offering detailed information about teenage sex workers to its prospective members. The company projected that Western tourists could buy a virgin girl in Thailand for a few hundred dollars.

"How would you like to marry a 14-year old virgin?" asked PVS Publications, as quoted in a recent New York Times article. "Do you know that you can buy a virgin girl for \$ 200."

Parlaman, who noticed the PVS commercial while working on an Internet project with Oregon University, says this is "the worst kind of child abuse."

Featuring "A Gentleman's Guide to the Erotic World of South East Asia," the PVS Web site included books, travel guides, and videos on commercial sex in several Asian countries.

CAPCAT says it is relieved that hundreds of e-mail subscribers responded to its call, and that they succeeded in forcing the company to remove its sex tour guide from the site.

But it regrets that Earthlink company failed to take legal action against those involved in the illegal promotion of commercial sex.

"We want Earthlink to pursue the matter with the law- enforcement agencies and to monitor their customers' web pages for any other illegal sites in the future," CAPCAT said in a recent statement.

"Earthlink seemed like a very respectable corporation, and we knew that with a little pressure, they would care," said Parlaman.

Earthlink says it cannot monitor every site because of a lack of resources. Activists reject this argument.

"Earthlink has 300 employees," says a CAPCAT activist. "So I'm not really convinced that they don't have resources to monitor the sites used for commercial sex. But we hope they will pay a closer attention now."

We should also talk with Debra, since most of the mail would probably be from kids.

I'm against any encouragement to send e-mail from any public event, be it a cybercast from the South Lawn or a political event on the Mall. Especially an Easter event, a religious celebration, basically a party, for which there may be a lot of negative feelings about favoritism or symbolic endorsement. We wouldn't want to analyze the quantity of greeting-card sentiments or comments of the technical aspects of the cybercast to be received from such an event, would we? We are still dealing with a backlog caused during January and February (we are up to March 13th mail).

I think it is disingenuous to solicit mail under the assumption that someone will be reading it. I mean, Kevin could ask to have some kind of special address with a special autoresponse that requires no further comment, but again what's the point? IS&T wouldn't like the extra disk space and computing time that would be required. If it's just a feel-good exercise, then we have done plenty with cybercasting the event. If the offices setting up these events can provide the manpower to respond to the email they solicit, then fine, but the Office of Correspondence shouldn't be made responsible by default.

Therefore, for the same reasons we don't put up a greeting request form on the web, we should not encourage e-mail from an event. If a viewer is truly compelled to send comment, then let them use the regular channels to do so. This would require a measure of effort that would preclude the thoughtless gratuitous response to "send us your comments!"

Please remove the link. And, unless we are going to list every specific section found on the site on the bottom of each page, the "About the Technology" element should not be listed in the bottom navigation

bar on each page. Please remove these links. This is the issue White

House Counsel feels MOST strongly about.

Also, the text describing the link to the "About the Technology" section is correct on the mock-up site, but is the original text on the live site. Can we change it back? The text should read:

"The Internet broadcast of the White House Easter Egg roll is the largest cybercast in history, requiring an intricate combination of manpower, expertise, technology and bandwidth. Learn how its many different parts were brought together to make this cybercast a reality."

Finally, please change the text in boxes that allow viewers to choose the video stream technology they use, so that it does not highlight the company providing the service. Use the names of the technology (Emblaze and TVStation), or use a description that says how they are different: Jave video streaming, etc... But please remove the specific reference to the companies.
