Scope and Content

FOIA 2025-0646-F is a video recording of President William Jefferson Clinton at an event for the Beth Medrash Govoha at the St. Regis Hotel in New York, New York on March 11, 1996. The footage includes video of President Clinton entering the event, Jay Schottensetin making brief remarks and presenting the President with a Talmud. While the President does make remarks, the White House Television Office (WHTV) unit did not record the entirety of the remarks.

System of Arrangement

Records that were responsive to this FOIA request were found in one collection area and one series—Clinton Presidential Records: Video of the White House Television Office unit and the series therein—Video Recordings Relating to the Clinton Administration. Processing is done at the individual tape level. While this method maintains tape run time integrity, it frequently results in the processing of video that are not wholly responsive to the subject area.
